

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## FOREWORD TO THE SECOND EDITION

The TXSSAR Archives Committee has assumed the responsibility for updating the history of our Texas State Society, Sons of the American Revolution. As a part of that responsibility, it was decided to reprint Volume I, which was originally completed in 1980. This work has also involved a detailed proofing of the text to determine whether there were any discernable errors. The result was numerous spelling corrections and slight changes to small portions of the text. Our goal was to maintain the overall integrity and appearance of the original Volume I.

The person most responsible for the results was Raymond W. Cox of the PineyWoods Chapter. Our overall accomplishment is mainly the result of his knowledge of desktop publishing, his dedication to the project, and his ability to focus on vast details. Along with Compatriot Cox, previous TXSSAR Historian Dr. James J. Johnson, Jr., my wife Kaye Ellis Stone, and myself were involved with the review process. As a result of Compatriot Cox's work, we will also be able to produce a searchable text compact disc version of the volume.

After completing this project, I have a greater respect for the efforts of the original author and TXSSAR Historian Howard G. Jessee. He did not have the publishing tools currently available, nor did he have our dedicated team. It must have been a monumental task in his times. Furthermore, we are in search of the other volumes of historical materials that he had collected and bound. On Page 5, Column 2 of Volume I, Mr. Jessee states "I have obtained permission to store the fifteen (15) volumes plus this book in the State Archives in Austin, Texas." Hopefully, we will be able to find them and provide a copied set for our State Archives at North Texas University.

Also, I am grateful to Cannon H. Pritchard for his background work on the life of Ira Hobart Evans and for his contribution to this reprinted Volume I. Cannon was able to update some of the biographical data of our first member.

Our next project is to produce Volume II, which will record our TXSSAR history from 1980 through the year 2005.

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## **FOREWORD**

First I want to thank God for supporting me in accomplishing a portion of what I had planned to do for the Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution, when I started as your state historian in March, 1976. Make no mistake about it, God's help to me personally and his help through my devoted and patriotic Christian friends in the state society has made it all possible. There were times it looked hopeless, but I kept on using all the honest and honorable means I could muster or dream up to accomplish the goals I had set for a permanent and lasting history for the Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution.

When I was nominated and elected as your state historian in March, 1976, your former state historian mailed to me approximately twelve (12) pages of history of which most were letters he had sincerely written to state chapters requesting a complete history of those chapters beginning with the original organization and charter of each chapter. Other letters he mailed to me in that package were copies of letters he had written to the TSSAR State Presidents, Board of Managers and other State Society Officials, in which he expressed disappointment at the lack of response to his pleas for chapter histories. He and other previously elected Texas Society SAR Historians made sincere efforts to obtain input from the society membership to establish a permanent history.

In the beginning after my nomination and election as the society historian, I spent many hours planning and studying a course of action in order to build a permanent history record, which previously had not been successfully accomplished. During this planning and studying period, a three word phrase kept popping up in my mind that had been planted there during the time I was on Air Force active duty with the Strategic Air Command Flying Aircraft Pilot Commander in B-29s. That phrase was made famous by the commander of the Strategic Air command, namely, General Curtis E. LeMay. The quote being, "Get it done." Many personnel under his command have heard him command, "Get it done." That phrase will live with me until my death. It is absolutely astounding the positive thinking that that phrase activates in dedicated human beings, of which I am no exception.

I adopted the positive thinking of "Get it done" and it happened that at that time the Lt. Abraham Cantine Chapter No. 29 of Bandera County, Texas, was being organized, activated and chartered. Due to the close distance from my residence in Hondo, Texas, I obtained permission to closely monitor the organization of that chapter and recommend the format and writing of the complete history of that chapter, along with biographies and portraits of every member. The final history product was outstanding. I borrowed that final complete outstanding bound history and had forty copies of it reproduced by the Xerox Reproduction Center in Houston, Texas. I then neatly bound all forty copies and distributed them to all State Chapter Presidents and District Vice Presidents to use as sample guides in preparing a history of their chapters. Extra copies of that "sample guide" history were given to the other State Society Officials and the Board of Managers. results from this action were very commendable by many chapters.

I then planned a campaign of telephoning and spreading the word of the tremendous importance of permanent state society history. I was, and am a member of the Board of Man-

agers, therefore, I have used every opportunity afforded to me by the Board of Managers, in session, to emphasize the importance of permanent history. I have talked to many society members behind the scenes that I knew would listen and help. The word finally got around that I had no intention of giving up, then everyone started sending me everything they could find that they had stored away. To their surprise they had more history than they realized and didn't know it. They discovered this by searching their homes and offices. all their searching and mailing to me, I read, studied, researched, collated, compiled and discovered I had a gold mine of history of the Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution. All this history was compiled, collated and taken to a printing and bookbinding company in San Antonio and that company professionally bound thirteen beautiful volumes of our TSSAR history which will be increased to fifteen (15) volumes.

This book you are about to examine and read contains the highlights of the Texas Society History since its beginning and charter, December 8, 1896. I have obtained permission to store the fifteen (15) volumes plus this book in the State Archives in Austin, Texas. That office has emphatically assured me that no person will leave that building with any part of our history. You will be allowed to visit and read the TSSAR history but you will not be allowed to take any portion of it from the Archive Building, however, they will Xerox any portion of it from the Archive Building for you, at a current price per page.

In the foreword (introduction) of this book I think it is necessary that I inform you of the tremendous gift to the Texas Society SAR by two (2) brothers, Drs. Valin R. and Cicero Smith Woodward of Irving and Forth Worth, Texas. These two brothers started publishing a newspaper called *The Texas* Compatriot at no expense to the Texas Society SAR. These two brothers started publishing this newspaper, the first edition was in 1933, and continued its publication through February 24, 1952. In a total of 18 years, publishing an edition every quarter, 72 editions of this newspaper were published. I have been lucky to have found the first edition and the last edition dated February 24, 1952. I have also found 12 more editions of that important newspaper. If we had all 72 editions of this newspaper, we would have the most outstanding history that could ever be put together by any state society in the United States. The editions I have, were given to me by our State Secretary-Treasurer, Adrien F. Drouilhet. I want every compatriot of the Texas Society SAR to join me in an all out search in libraries, archives and other places that all these newspapers may be on file. Please concentrate your beginning in Fort Worth, Irving, Dallas and surrounding cities. Austin, Texas, is also a good city to search. If anyone locates them, notify me and I will have them all reproduced and added to the volume of those we now have filed in the State Archives in Austin, Texas. We need them all desperately; they are crammed with Texas Society SAR history and portraits, some of which are included in this book.

I now want to give you the names of some of the outstanding and dedicated, hard working compatriots that assisted me immeasurably in my quest to collect, collate and establish a good Texas Society History. First I want to thank Father Msgr. Anton J. Frank, our beloved Chaplain for his continuous prayers for me personally and his prayers that I might succeed in this history, biography and portrait project.

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I owe much of this history project to Compatriot Robert Carl Tumey, Sr., President of the Patrick Henry Chapter of Austin, Texas. While I was pleading desperately to all chapters for their membership biographies and portraits, Compatriot Tumev's Patrick Henry Chapter had a membership of 80. He sent me over 100 biographies and portraits. I learned through reading those 100 plus biographies that he had researched and collected biographies and portraits of over twenty (20) deceased members of that chapter. He was assisted by Professor William Paxton Boyd. The two of them gave me edited biographies that overwhelmingly exceeded any other Texas Society SAR Chapter. I owe much to Retired Marine Captain Alfred H. Benjamin, our State President who stood shoulder to shoulder with me and campaigned like a seasoned politician, pushing my history campaign relentlessly in every manner available to him. State Society Secretary-Treasurer, Adrien F. Drouilhet used the Society State Quarterly Bulletin many times to constantly remind the entire state society of the priority of the History, Biography and Portrait Project. I have always had the unanimous support of the State Society Board of Managers.

I wish to refer you to a letter that was written on August 14, 1976, by myself, your historian, five (5) months after you elected me as your State Historian. That letter is published in this book and was a result of five months of reading, studying

and evaluating the poor TSSAR permanent history we then had. I am now very elated and enthusiastically happy to report to all of you that the response to that letter caused an awakening and such an outstanding response that I will be eternally grateful to those of you that are true Christian patriots that still maintain the love of your country, responsibility and patriotic dedication that flourished in the hearts and minds of our founding fathers.

There are one or two statements of fact in conclusion I wish to make. There have been in excess of 4500 members in the Texas Society since its charter December 8, 1896. Many are deceased. The present membership is in excess of 1400. In this first edition book, approximately 20% of the present total membership is included with many long deceased members. There will probably be a second edition published in a year or so. As you probably already know, this is the first book of its scope that has ever been published by a state society. As is usually the case, Texas is a first again, however, I would like to remind you that we have some patriotic, hardworking compatriot friends in the states such as Pennsylvania, Florida and California that are not likely to let Texas be a first place State Society very long.

God bless all of you for your sincere, dedicated response to my pleas for help. I sincerely hope that all of you that buy this History, Biography and Portrait Book will find it worth the \$40.00 you paid for it.

# Part I EARLY HISTORY

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## A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

The centennial of the signing of the Declaration of Independence spread a wave of patriotic fervor throughout the United States. The momentum was so great that it reached out to the farthest shores of our country and broke with force over the Rocky Mountains and rushed on to California, where there lived a number of patriotic Americans whose ancestors had taken part in the Revolutionary War. In fact, the records show that many of these men were Real Sons of the American Revolution. So it was not at all surprising that there met in San Francisco, on October 22, 1875, a group of these men, who then and there discussed the possibility of forming a society to perpetuate the memory of their ancestors who fought to make this country free. The small band of citizens met several times during the fall and winter of 1875 and 1876, and then, as San Francisco was to hold a great celebration on July 4, 1876, a call was issued in the newspaper in June 1876, as follows:

"The descendants of the Revolutionary patriots are requested to meet at the headquarters of the Grand Marshal for the purpose of making arrangements to participate in the celebration."

About 50 citizens met in response to this call, marched in the procession, and on the same day organized the "California Society of Sons of the Revolutionary Sires." With the exception of the Cincinnati, this was the first Society in the country, whose members were exclusively descendants from Revolutionary Sires.

The California Society grew and prospered, but no new Societies were formed. On December 4, 1883, a Society was organized in the City of New York under the name of Sons of the Revolution. Then shortly came the 100th anniversary of the inauguration of George Washington as the first President of the United States and this event stirred patriotic emotions anew, and especially of many descendants of Revolutionary stock, particularly in New Jersey which had organized a Society of the Sons of the Revolution, in 1889, and this Society passed a resolution which had far reaching results and as this action was so important in the history of our Society, it is quoted here substantially in full:

"Resolved, that the President of this Society when elected, and the two delegates to the National Society, are hereby appointed a committee to invite the appointment of a like committee from the New York and Pennsylvania Society to cooperate with them and to meet with the descendants of Revolutionary ancestors from the different States and Territories, and assist in organizing Societies whose membership shall be composed exclusively of descendants of Revolutionary statesmen, soldiers and sailors."

The committee was appointed and on April 10, 1889, a call was issued by the committee inviting delegates from all

states and territories to meet in Fraunce's Tavern in New York on April 20, 1889, to organize a National Society, every state to be entitled to one delegate at large, proportioned upon the number of that state. Then at the appointed place and hour, twenty delegates from a dozen states met at Fraunce's Tavern, in the same room in which Washington met the officers of his army and bade them farewell, and after a two days' session, they formed the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, adopted a Constitution, and elected officers.

The first National Congress of the Society was held in Louisville, Kentucky, on April 30, 1890. At this meeting a new constitution was adopted and some important matters were decided. One of these was the decision to have the Society composed exclusively of male members. Up to this time much pressure had been exerted to include women in the organization, and in one or two states there had actually been a number admitted. The clause in the newly adopted constitution which defined the status of women reads as follows:

"For the purpose of making more nearly perfect the records of our Revolutionary ancestors and their descendants, any women of Revolutionary ancestry may file a record of her ancestor's services and of her line of descent with any Registrar, who shall send a duplicate to the Registrar General."

This clause has of course been long since eliminated. Another eligibility clause of this early constitution might, with pertinence, be quoted here, in view of the erroneous statement sometimes heard to the effect that our Society once admitted on collateral descent.

"Any man is eligible for membership who is of the age of 21 years, and who is descended from an ancestor, who, with unfailing loyalty, rendered material aid to the cause of American Independence, etc."

The word "lineal" was inserted in later years, to make this more emphatic, but one is not "descended" from collateral line. It may be mentioned, at this time, that as a result of the meeting in Louisville, and the decision to make the organization a purely male organization, the outcome was the formation throughout all 50 states and in France. It has become, in many communities, the deeply rooted base of patriotic as well as civil betterment.

From its National Headquarters in Washington, D.C., now located in Louisville, Kentucky, it supervises a vigorous and, at times, militant National program against every form of subversion any of its members discover.

In conclusion, I would like to state that the Texas Society was organized December 8, 1896, just seven years after the National Society was organized.

THE OBJECTIVES OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION ARE DECLARED TO BE PATRIOTIC, HISTORICAL AND EDUCATIONAL, AND SHALL INCLUDE THOSE INTENDED OR DESIGNED TO PER-PETUATE THE MEMORY OF THOSE WHO, BY THEIR SERVICE OR SACRIFICES DURING THE WAR OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, ACHIEVED THE INDEPENDENCE OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE; TO UNITE AND PROMOTE FELLOWSHIP AMONG THEIR DESCENDANTS; TO INSPIRE THEM AND THE COMMUNITY AT LARGE WITH A MORE PROFOUND REVERENCE FOR THE PRINCIPLES OF THE GOVERN-MENT FOUNDED BY OUR FOREFATHERS: TO ENCOURAGE HISTORI-CAL RESEARCH IN RELATION TO THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION; TO ACOUIRE AND PRESERVE THE RECORDS OF THE INDIVIDUAL SERV-ICES OF THE PATRIOTS OF THE WAR, AS WELL AS DOCUMENTS, RELICS AND LANDMARKS; TO MARK THE SCENES OF THE REVOLU-TION BY APPROPRIATE MEMORIALS; TO CELEBRATE ANNIVERSARIES OF THE PROMINENT EVENTS OF THE WAR AND OF THE REVOLUTIONARY PERIOD; TO FOSTER TRUE PATRIOTISM; TO MAINTAIN AND EXTEND THE INSTITUTIONS OF AMERICAN FREEDOM, AND TO CARRY OUT THE PURPOSES EXPRESSED IN THE PREAMBLE OF THE CONSTITUTION OF OUR COUNTRY AND THE INJUNCTIONS OF WASHINGTON IN HIS FAREWELL ADDRESS TO THE AMERICAN PEOPLE.

## STATUS OF TEXAS SOCIETY SAR PERMANENT HISTORY

Subject: Status of TSSAR History

Dear Mr. Secretary-Treasurer:

As per recent telephone conversation-discussion, I am sending you a report on the status of the compiling, arranging, studying and binding of our collected history of The Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution since its charter, December 8, 1896.

The first item I wish to clarify to all members of our Society is: yourself, Col. Joe M. Hill, Jr., F. Allen Johnston, James L. Boon, Sr. and Compatriot Latimer have all desperately tried to get all Chapters to get busy and research their records and come up with an acceptable history of their Chapter since the day it was chartered. I am happy to report that three (3) or four (4) have submitted excellent histories, which I intend to show in this report as determined by my personal compiling, reading and studying. The following Chapters are the only Chapters that have responded to the pleas for a history of their Chapters. In other words, to my knowledge the pleas for a history by the Compatriots listed at the beginning of this paragraph have fallen on deaf ears, or someone has lost their History Reports, which has been insinuated to me by some Chapter officials. The following Chapters did submit reports, some of which are very poor and could not be classified as a History Report by any stretch of imagination. History Reports submitted and classified (graded): Chapter 1, Galveston, Poor; Chapter 2, Dallas, Outstanding; Chapter 4, San Antonio, Poor; Chapter 5, Paul Carrington, Houston, Outstanding; Chapter 6, Maj. K. M. Van Zant, Poor; Chapter 10, Panhandle Plains, Poor; Chapter 15, Texas Tech, Fair, too short; Chapter 18, Permian, Poor; Chapter 19, Paul Revere, Poor, one (1) page; Chapter 20, Poor, 2 pages; Chapter 26, Outstanding, Thanks to the Olivers; Chapter 27, Poor, 1 page; Chapter 28, Nathan Gann, Outstanding, chartered 1974.

The following chapters have never submitted the Historical Reports: 3, 7, 8, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 16, 17, 21, 22, 23, 24 and 25. If any of these Chapters disagree with this paragraph, your disagreement is unfounded unless your Chapter History was lost and was never received by this person undersigned, your Historian.

I am aware that some of the delinquent chapters are not very active and have not been for some time, however, there should be some sort of a History Report written by some of those chapter members, giving some History and the reason for lack of leadership and membership lack of duty.

I do not know what action or persuasion you intend to take to get the delinquent chapters to submit a past Historical Report; that matter automatically becomes the responsibility of the State President and the Board of Managers, therefore this matter of delinquency is being passed on to the President, Secretary and Board of Managers.

There is a very important matter that immediately came to my attention while examining past Chapter Historical Reports and that matter is no pictorial data in those reports, which can be easily corrected, however, the action I am recommending will require the help and cooperation of all of our State membership. We need a picture of all past and present officials of each Chapter, District Vice Presidents and State Officials. This is a relatively easy task if all state membership will assist. Along with this picture there should be a short, to the point and concise biography of such individuals typed under his picture (2"x3") preferably. This picture and biography of such individuals should be lightly attached to an SAR letterhead stationery sheet of paper and mailed to your state Historian. I had in my possession pictures of two very honorable and outstanding State Officials that I have made into a guide for all to follow, using the XEROX copy machine. I am enclosing enough copies of these two compatriots for every chapter, District Vice President and State Officials to use as guides in preparing the picture and biography of individuals you submit to your Historian. Space is being set aside for these pictorial biographies.

Past Chapter histories will be closed out in the very near future. This past history will be professionally bound with an attractive front and back and labeled Volume 1, 8 December 1896 through indef. The Board of Managers will make the decision on who and where the custodian of this Volume 1 will go.

I am presently preparing a new type of historical guide, which will be presented to the next Board of Managers for review. This Chapter Historical Guide will be prepared in many copies. It will be an annual historical report by each Chapter that will be easy to follow and complete, to be turned in to the State Historian by District Vice Presidents on the 1st day of each annual convention for a period of eight (8) to ten (10) years. Each annual report beginning with all annual historical reports of Chapter 1 through the last Chapter will be consolidated and turned over to a reproduction company for preparation of sufficient already subscribed to and paid for by members, with a percentage additional, all of which will be contracted to a Book Binding Company to be prepared and bound as a beautiful book which will have a picture and brief biography of all members in the Texas Society. The large chapters do not have to submit a picture and brief

biography on all its chapter members the first year, however, five (5) years is considered sufficient time for a chapter to complete picture and biographies on all its members.

It is very essential and important that you pick your Chapter Historian with the idea of picking the most qualified person, which you probably already know. It always pays to pick someone that enjoys history and genealogy research. Please do not make a snap decision; survey your membership and find out who made outstanding grades in his school years in the subject of history. Make sure that he sincerely wants to do the job and have all chapter members cooperate with him in furnishing him with a 2"x3" picture of themselves and an autobiography. If your choice of Chapter Historian

turns out to be an outstanding historian and shows outstanding performance, then I recommend you retain him in that position for a period of five (5) years or more. I would also recommend this same action by the Board of Managers in retaining the State Historian.

It is my sincere wish and prayer that our society get busy and leave attractive and informative Volumes of Society History that our descendants will cherish hundreds of years from this date.

All future historical reports will be submitted on 8"x11" letter size stationery to fit the folders I have purchased for you to use. Please do not submit any future history on legal size stationery.

District Vice Presidents, Secretaries or Chapter Historians:

This sample guide has been prepared for you as a guide for you to submit your yearly (annual) history folder. You will please use it as a guide. There needs to be more dedicated serious efforts made to prepare and submit an annual history to your District Vice President. Some of you have done this but others have done nothing.

You will note in this guide that special dinners, presentations of awards, plagues and certificates of achievements have been photographed and placed in this chapter history. So it is necessary that each chapter purchase a good 35mm camera which makes outstanding personal portraits, group portraits and any other kind of picture you want. It should take a detailed picture of a certificate or object up to 1 foot away. Someone in your chapter may already have one and will serve as your photographer. Pictures of dinners, social presentations of awards, medals, and certificates should be placed in your annual history for your state historian to make a permanent record of "which will be done." The original picture taken should be put in your annual history book in order that your state historian may have it copied, and made a permanent record in the state history book. Your original history book will be returned to you. All pictures should be taken on black and white film for low cost reproduction for entry in society history.

You will note that all members of the Bandera Chapter have submitted a personal portrait and biographical sketch of each member in that chapter. I am aware that it will be difficult for the large chapters to submit portrait biographies of every member the first year, but a maximum effort is requested. The wives of your members and the DAR chapter will amaze you at how fast that wife and the DAR will get the pictorial biography done. Each District Vice President and Chapter President will be given a good sample guide of one

individual Texas Compatriot, that he may have Xerox copied and given to each compatriot of each chapter as a guide to follow.

This individual, your TSSAR Historian, Howard G. Jessee, will prepare a beautiful volume with all your handsome faces in it. A copy or copies of this volume will be sold to you. No profit will be made. You will get it cost price.

Now I would like to give you some constructive criticism of the Bandera Chapter History Guide. 1. All pictorial biographies should have the picture at the top of the page with the typed biography beneath it. 2. All entries on pages in the chapter should be on good 8½x11 bond paper stationery. 3. All pictures in your annual history should be identified with a typed identity under or beside it. 4. All pages in your annual history should be on a good quality bond 8½x11 bond paper.

I want to take this opportunity to commend the Lt. Abraham Cantine Chapter #29 of Bandera, Texas, on an outstanding annual history book (folder) that I can use as a guide for the other Texas Chapters to follow in preparing their annual history. I wish to express my personal thanks to Mr. William Simmons, District 3 Vice President, Col. John K. Harrell and his energetic beautiful wife, Barbara Ellen, Mrs. John R. Langford, (a DAR jewel), Mrs. John F. Focke, Regent of Bandera Chapter DAR, Mr. Alexander Fraser, past President, San Antonio SAR Chapter and all those others that were published in the Bandera Bulletin Newspaper. Without the help of those individuals, my plans for SAR History might have been a dream, but no more.

CONSTITUTION OF THE TEXAS SOCIETY.

#### ARTICLE I-NAME.

The name of this Society shall be THE TEXAS Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

### ARTICLE II-OBJECTS.

The objects of this Society are to perpetuate the memory of the men of the American Revolution; to honor the noble women of that period, from whom we descend; to revive the spirit of that time; to carry out the purposes expressed in the preamble of the Constitution of our country, and the injunctions of Washington's farewell address; to encourage historical research in our War of Independence; to collect relics and records of that time; to oppose, by moral means, the spread of anarchical ideas and lawlessness; to draw together in a firm and fraternal union the descendants of the patriots of the Revolution who are willing to cherish and maintain American freedom and see that our "Government of the people, by the people, and for the people shall not perish from the earth."

#### ARTICEL III-MEMBERSHIP.

Any male person is elegible for membership who is of the age of twenty-one years, and who is descended from an ancestor who, with unfailing loyalty,

rendered material aid to the cause of American Independence as a soldier or seaman, or as a civil officer in one of the several Colonies or States, or as a recognized patriot; provided he shall be found worthy.

#### ARTICLE IV-officers.

SECTION 1. The officers of the Society shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer and a Historian. The last three offices may be filled by one member, if the Society so elects.

SEC. 2. The officers named in the preceding section, together with four other members, shall constitute a Board of Managers, and this Board shall have the power to fill vacancies that may occur among the officers of the Society or the members of the Board.

SEC. 3. The officers and managers and delegates to the National Society shall be elected by a vote of the majority of the members voting at the annual meetings of the Society. This vote may be personal, by proxy or by letter. The officers and managers shall hold office for one year, or until their successors are elected.

#### ARTICLE V-AMENDMENTS.

This Constitution shall be altered, amended or repealed only by a vote of three-fourths of the members of the Society, the vote being either personal, by proxy or by letter. Amendments must be offered at least one month before the annual meetings, so that they can be submitted to the members of the Society.

#### BY-LAWS OF THE TEXAS SOCIETY.

#### APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. An applicant for admission to the Society must make application in duplicate (on forms obtained from the Secretary) enumerating the services of his ancestor in the War of Independence, together with the detailed statement of the intermediate generations of his pedigree. The applicant shall make oath that the statements of his application are true to the best of his knowledge and belief. Such applicant must be nominated by a member of this Society, and may be elected a member by a two-thirds vote at any meeting of the Society or of the Board of Managers.

#### SUSPENSIONS, ETC.

SEC. 2. The Board of Managers shall have power to suspend or to expel any member of the Society for sufficient cause by a vote of two-thirds of all the members of the Board; provided, two weeks notice of the proposed action shall have been given to such member. A member so suspended or expelled shall have the right to appeal to a meeting of the Society from the action of the Board of Managers.

#### FEES AND DUES.

SEC. 3. The initiation fee shall be two dollars, and the annual dues two dollars.

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#### MEETINGS.

SEC. 4. The annual meeting of this Society shall take place on the twenty-second day of February of eachyear, except when such date shall fall on Sunday, when it shall take place on the following day. At this meeting the officers of the Society shall be elected, a majority of the votes for any officer constituting a choice.

The annual dues shall be collected at this meeting. Special meetings of the Society may be held at the request of five members of the Society or of the Board of Managers.

#### QUORUM.

SEC. 5. At al' meetings of the Society, not less than eight members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a less number may adjourn from time to time.

#### DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

SEC. 6. The President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, or in his absence, a chairman protempore, shall preside at all meetings of the Society. He shall exercise the usual functions of a presiding officer, and shall enforce a strict observance of the Constitution and By-Laws.

#### DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY.

SEC. 7. The Secretary shall conduct the general correspondence of the Society, and shall keep a record of the election, death or expulsion of members. He shall have charge of the seal, certificate of incorporation, and records of the Society. He, together with the presiding officers, shall certify all acts of

the Society or Board of Managers. He shall give due notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Society and attend the same. He shall keep fair and accurate records of all the proceedings and orders of the Society, and shall give due notice to the officers and members of all votes, orders, resolutions and proceedings of the Society affecting them or appertaining to their respective duties. He shall perform such other duties and make such returns as may be prescribed by the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

## DUTIES OF THE TREASURER.

SEC. 8. The Treasurer shall collect all fees and dues, and shall have the care and custody of all the funds of the Society. He shall deposit the same in a bank to the credit of the Society, and shall draw them thence for the purpose of the Society only, as may be ordered by the Society or Board of Managers. He shall keep a true account of his receipts and disbursements, and at each annual meeting shall make report and submit his accounts for audit. He shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

#### DUTIES OF THE HISTORIAN.

SEC. 9. The Historian shall have charge of the membership records and the historical, genealogical and biographical collections of the Society. He shall make such returns as may be prescribed by the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Society.

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#### DUTIES OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS.

SEC. 10. The Board of Managers shall have the general superintendence of the interests and business of the Society. They shall perform such other duties as may be committed to them by the Society. At each annual meeting they shall make a general report. Four members shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the Board.

#### ORGANIZATION OF CHAPTERS.

SEC. 11. When not fewer than seven members of this Society residing in the same locality desire to organize a Chapter thereof, they shall present a written request to the Board of Managers for authority to do so, which authority being granted, they may adopt such a Constitution and By-Laws, not inconsistent with the Constitution of this Society, as they may deem proper.

They shall have authority to admit members to the Chapter, but all such members must first be members in good standing of this Society, and none but such shall be continued in membership in any Chapter.

The President of any Chapter having a membership of not less than twelve members shall be, ex officio, a member of the Board of Managers of this Society.

A Chapter may select one or more delegates to represent it at any meeting of the Society.

In the election of officers for this Society, such a delegate or delegation shall be entitled to cast the votes of the Chapter only by presenting proxies therefor.

Upon all other issues before this Society, a Chapter may certify its actual vote, pro and con, to this Society, and such vote shall have the same potency as if cast by members of the Society actually present and voting:

#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

SEC. 12. At all annual meetings of this Society, the following order of business shall be observed, viz:

- 1. Opening exercises.
- 2. Calling roll of officers and members.
- 3. Reading minutes of last meeting.
- 4. Reports of officers in their order.
- 5. Unfinished business.
- 6. Reports of Committees.
- 7. Election of Officers, Board of Managers and Delegates.
  - 8. New business.
  - 9. Final adjournment.

#### AMENDMENTS.

SEC. 13. Amendments to these By-Laws may be made at any meeting of the Society, by a vote of a majority of the members of the Society; provided, that a notice of the meeting and a copy of the proposed amendment shall be sent to every member at least one month prior to such meeting.

Hon. Ira H. Evans of Austin Chosen
President—Number of Galveston
Men Elected Officers.

A number of gentlemen from over the state gathered at the Tremont hotel yesterday and organized a Texas society of the Sons of the American Revolution. Among those who came here for this purpose were Hon. Ira H. Evans of Austin, Mr. Cheney R. Prouty of Eagle Pass, Mr. Philip Linsley of Dallas, Lieutenant Colonel J. W. French and Major H. S. Kilburne of Fort Clark, Mr. Asa U. Grant of Weatherford and Mr. Robert G. West of Austin.

Galvestonians who were in attendance were Major Sam M. Penland, Mr. H. B. McGavock, Mr. Charles C. Allen, Mr. Roland P. Allen, Mr. T., Allen, George, Mr. George T. Morgan, Major C. W. Preston, Mr. Lawrence V. Elder and Mr. Edward C. Pitkin.

The meeting was presided over by Hon. Ira H. Evans, who is a prominent citizen of Austin, being president of the New York and Texas land company and vice president of the Austin Rapid Transit railway company. Mr. Evans explained the objects of the society as follows:

"The objects are purely patriotic and social. In no respect are they partisan, political or commercial. The members are united by an attractive bond of patriotic and fraternal sentiment. The purpose is, primarily, to unite and promote fellowship among the descendants and perpetuate the memory of the men who, by their services and sacrifices during the war of the American revolution, achieved the independence of the American people. In addition, the society aims to inspire among the members and the community at large a more profound reverence for the principles of the government founded by our forefathers; to encourage research in relation to the revolution; to acquire and preserve the records of the individual services of patriots of the revolution, and documents, relics and landmarks connected with that historic period; to mark the scenes of the revolution by appropriate memorials; and to celebrate the anniversaries of the prominent events of the war. The society also aims to maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, and to carry out the injunctions of Washington in his memorable farewell address to the American people.

"Any man is eligible to membership who, being of the age of 21 years or over, and a citizen of good repute, is the lineal descendant of an ancestor, who, while at all times unfailing in his loyalty, rendered actual service in the cause of American independence, either in the armed forces of the revolution, the minute men or the militia, or in civil office, or as a member of a committee of safety or test association, or as an active and recognized patriot.

"The society is the outgrowth of the public celebrations which took place in every part of the United States, beginning in 1876, of the 100th anniversaries of prominent events of the American revolution. The first state society was pro-

posed at a meeting held in San Francisco, California, in October, 1875, and was actually organized there July 4, 1876. A large number of societies were formed in subsequent years. The national society was organized by representatives of the various state societies at a meeting held in New York city, April 30, 1889, the 100th anniversary of the inauguration of Washington as first president of the United States, and during the great public celebration of that event. The meeting was held in the identical 'long room' in Fraunce's tavern, yet in existence, in which Washington bade farewell to his officers at the close of the revolution.

"There are now twenty-nine state societies with an aggregate membership of 3900.

"The Sons of the American Revolution have adopted a button, in which the colors are blue and white, which may be worn on all occasions. The society has also adopted a badge of great beauty, modeled, in compliment to America's French allies in the revolution, somewhat after that of the Legion of Honor of France. Congress has authorized members of the society in the army and navy to wear the badge on ceremonial occasions."


The following nine reasons were advanced as to why people eligible to membership should join the society:

- 1. The society encourages a revival of public interest in the men, incidents and measures of the American revolution, now often forgotten in the pressure of modern life.
- 2. It encourages the spirit of disinterested service for the whole country, by preserving from oblivion the public services of a member's own ancestors.
- 3. By celebrating the important events of the American revolution, it recalls to memory the objects of that struggle and the principles for which our forefathers fought, as embodied in the declaration of independence, the constitution of the United States and Washington's farewell address.
- 4. To the youth of the families of members it teaches lessons drawn from the heroism and self-sacrifice of their own ancestors, which cannot fail to make them better citizens.
- 5. It preserves family traditions and records, priceless in value to general history.
- 6. In the original thirteen states, it leads to the marking of battlefields, routes of march and historic sites, by monuments and tablets, and to the preservation of historic buildings from destruction.
- 7. In each of the newer states it not only promotes the celebration of anniversaries of the revolution, but also secures a yearly celebration of the anniversary of the admission of the state into the union.
- 8. It encourages the diffusion among our fellow citizens of foreign birth of a better understanding of the principles of free government and a greater love for their adopted country.
- 9. It brings together in friendly relationship the men of the north, the south, the east and the west.

The meeting adjourned subject to the call of the president.



## BIOGRAPHY OF IRA HOBART EVANS Organizer and First President TSSAR

The limits assigned for this sketch of the life of one of the most distinguished citizens of Texas are wholly inadequate to give even a cursory review of the many achievements which have been his, of the brilliant works which he has planned and executed, or of the part which he played in the making of one of the country's greatest commonwealths. His business life has been intimately associated with the growth and development of the Southwest. His executive ability and practical sagacity have been most important elements in the advancement of this section of the country, and through it in the marvelous growth of its commercial interests. But he has been much more than a business man. His life has been dominated by a high sense of responsibility and devoted to the service of religion, philanthropy and the upbuilding of institutions of education. The following sketch must be confined to those incidents of a long life and active and diversified career, which will afford the best clue to the character of the man and to his many and brilliant achievements.

Major Ira H. Evans was born at Piermont, New Hampshire, April 11, 1844, and is a son of Doctor Ira and Emeline (Hobart) Evans. His father, a physician who died when the son was eight years old, belonged to a family which settled originally at Dover, New Hampshire, in 1635. On the mother's side, Major Evans is descended from the Rev. Peter Hobart, the first pastor of the first church of Hingham, Massachusetts, in 1635. He was a graduate of the University of Cambridge and was preceded to this country by his father some time before 1635. Soon after the death of her husband, the mother of Major Evans removed to Barre, Vermont, where the lad was educated in the public schools and the academy of that town. There he was residing when he enlisted in July, 1862, as a private of Company B, Tenth Regiment, Vermont Volunteer Infantry, being later promoted first lieutenant, then captain, and finally brevet major United States Volunteers. He received a medal of honor

from Congress "for distinguished bravery at Hatcher's Run, Virginia, April 22, 1865." His military services were mainly in the Army of the Potomac and the Army of the James, and for two years he filled important staff positions. After the cessation of hostilities, his command, with others, was sent to the lower Rio Grande border of Texas to back up the diplomatic efforts of Secretary of State Seward to remove the French from Mexico, where they had placed Maximilian on the throne during the Civil War. He served there about one and one-half years, and was discharged from military service January 31, 1867. He afterwards settled in a wild region about one hundred miles northwest of Corpus Christi, Texas, and engaged in stock raising, but this venture proved unsuccessful owing to the dishonesty of a partner, through whom he lost his entire investment in this business. Later he entered the United States Revenue Service, and was appointed assistant assessor of United States Internal Revenue for several counties in Western Texas, including the towns of Eagle Pass and Laredo, on the Rio Grande river. Subsequently he became deputy collector of Internal Revenue for the Second District of Texas and had charge of the headquarters office at Corpus Christi.

In the fall of 1869 Major Evans was tendered the Republican nomination for one of the three representatives to be elected from the Western District of Texas, which included all the territory extending from El Paso to the mouth of the Rio Grande, and as far east as Refugio, Goliad, Atascosa and Medina counties. At first he declined the nomination, as he did not desire to engage in politics, but finally yielded to the urgent solicitation of Gen. E. J. Davis, the Republican candidate for the office of governor, and other friends, that he should accept. He was elected in November, 1869, polling the largest vote cast for any candidate for representative of that district. Upon the assembling of the legislature in provisional session, at Austin, Texas, in February, 1870, Major Evans was elected speaker of the house of representatives, and after Congress had accepted the new constitution of the state and seated the newly elected senators and representatives the legislature was convened in special session by the Governor, and Major Evans was re-elected speaker of the house without opposition. He took quite an active part in legislative proceedings and supported Governor Davis in all his vetoes of the legislation passed which was calculated to rob the school fund of the state and grant huge subsidies to railroads, which would have bankrupted the state's finances.

Article 3, Section 4, of the Constitution of 1869, provided that "the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by qualified electors, and their term of office shall be two years from the day of general election." The election law enacted in August, 1870, provided that the first election thereunder should take place the first Tuesday in November, 1872, which would make the terms of the legislators three years instead of two years from the date of their election. Major Evans and several Republican senators and representatives, together with all the Democratic members of both houses, sought to have this law changed so that the next legislature should be elected in November, 1871. For this he and his Republican associates were called before a caucus of his party. These gentlemen denied the right or power of the caucus to pass upon a question of this kind, claiming that they were bound by their oaths of office to support the Constitution of the state and could not conscientiously yield to the mandate of a party caucus upon such a question. The majority of the caucus decided against them on this point, and Major Evans and his associates declared they would not be bound by this decision and left the caucus. It, however, continued in session and resolved to remove Major Evans from the speakership the following morning, because he would not abide by its decision on this question. The next morning a resolution was introduced to declare the office of the speaker vacant, and it was passed under the operation of the previous question, without any reason being alleged, either in the resolution or by its supporters on the floor, for such action. This action by the Republican majority of the house aroused great indignation throughout the state and was generally condemned by the press and public, regardless of party lines. When the Twelfth Legislature finally adjourned, December 2, 1871, Major Evans left political life, as he had no liking for it under the conditions then existing in the Republican party.

On January 16, 1872, Major Evans was elected general manager of the Texas Land Company, a corporation formed by Texas and New York capitalists, who were interested in the development of the state for the purpose of investing in real estate, and continued in charge of this company until it ceased business. On September 2, 1873, he was elected secretary of the Houston & Great Northern Railroad Company, and on July 21, 1874, was elected secretary of the Consolidated International & Great Northern Railroad Company, and also had charge of the land interests of that corporation until April 5, 1880. During this time he also served as a director for several other railroad and land corporations. The International & Great Northern Railroad Company having gone into bankruptcy, all its lands passed into the ownership of a corporation styled "The New York & Texas Land Company, Limited," and Major Evans was elected president of this company April 13, 1880, and held that position for twenty-six years, when the corporation sold all its property in Texas to other parties and went out of business. Since that time Major Evans has continued to represent the owners of the unsold portion of the property, maintaining offices at 356-357 Austin National Bank Building, Austin. He came to this city March 1, 1885, from Palestine, where he had resided from August, 1875, having formerly lived at Corpus Christi from the spring of 1869 until 1872, and at Houston from April of the latter year until his removal to Palestine.

On April 5, 1875, Major Evans was elected a director of the International & Great Northern Railroad Company, and held that office for thirty-two years. He was one of the organizers of the Austin National Bank, in 1890, and has been a director thereof to the present time. He was appointed receiver of the Austin Rapid Transit Railway Company by the United States Circuit Court for the Western District of Texas, February 20, 1897, and continued in that position for five years. Upon its discharge from the receivership he became president of the company, and held this position until failing health compelled him to resign a year or two later. In October, 1891, Major Evans was appointed one of the receivers of the International & Great Northern Railroad by the United States Circuit Court for the Eastern District of Texas, and qualified as such, but never discharged the duties of the office for the reason that the State Court, which had secured possession of the railroad property, refused to surrender control of it to the receivers appointed by the United States Court.

Major Evans' connection with religious, educational and charitable movements has been extensive. He was president of the State Sunday School Association from 1883 until 1885; first assistant moderator of the National Congregational Council at Worcester, Massachusetts, in October, 1889; member, for Texas, of the International Sunday School Executive Committee from 1884 until 1890; member of the board of trustees of the First Presbyterian Church, Austin, Texas, for twenty-two years; president of the board of trustees of the First Congregational Church, Austin, Texas, for five years; president of the board of directors of Tillotson College, an institution for the education of colored youths in Austin, since its incorporation as a college; president of the Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

Major Evans is a member of the following societies: Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution; Society of Colonial Wars, in the state of Vermont; Military Order of the Loyal Legion, state of New York; Military Order of the Medal of Honor; University Club, Austin, Texas; Army and Navy Club, New York City; Texas Academy of Science; Texas Society of Social Hygiene; Texas State Historical Society; American Historical Association; National Geographic Society; American Political Science Association; American Society for the Judicial Settlement of International Disputes; National Economic League, and American Sociological Society.

On July 13, 1871, Major Evans was married to Miss Frances A. Hurlbut, of Upper Alton, Illinois, who was born at Edwardsville, Illinois, daughter of the Rev. T. B. Hurlbut, a Congregational minister. She is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and was one time president of the Texas society of that order. Three sons have been born to Major and Mrs. Evans, all of whom are now grown men and engaged in business; Wilbur

Leslie Evans was born November 27, 1872, graduated at Knox College, Galesburg, Illinois, in 1893, and at Yale University in 1894; Hobart Yale Evans was born December 21, 1876, and studied at Knox College, Galesburg, Illinois, and the University of Texas, but did not graduate; Francis Hurlbut Evans was born February 21, 1880, and graduated at Knox College.

Major Evans is now residing at No. 708 San Antonio street, Austin. The passing years have dealt kindly with him, and although he has reached his seventieth milestone, his "eye is not yet dimmed, nor his natural force abated." At a time when most men withdraw themselves from society to nurse the infirmities which age usually brings, Major Evans, so equable and temperate has been his life, so infused with the elevating power of a cultivated mind, enjoys the ease and dignity of life with the bounding pulse of middle age.

#### Youngest House Speaker Became Colorful Austin Leader

When 26 year old Ben Barnes was elected speaker of the House of Representatives last year, the news media dug back 100 years in Texas history and came up with the fact that Ira H. Evans held that office at the age of 25, making him the youngest speaker elected to that post.

Like many of the strong Texas leaders of his day, Evans was a controversial figure and the fact that he served only one year in office seems to have caused much speculation among historians.

After the dust settled, however, all agreed one reason he was ousted from office was because he opposed legislation "calculated to rob the school fund of the state and grant huge subsidies to railroads, which would have bankrupted the state's finances."

#### Other Reasons

Also Evans had another mark against him. He was a Republican, one of three representatives elected from the Western District of Texas, which included all the territory extending from El Paso to the mouth of the Rio Grande, and as far east as Refugio, Goliad, Atascosa and Medina counties. The year was 1869, and according to the 1914 edition of Texas and Texans published by the American Historical Society, Evans at first declined the legislature nomination but finally yielded to the urgent solicitation of Gen. E. J. David, the Republican candidate for the office of governor. He was elected in November, 1869, polling the largest vote cast for any candidate for representative of that district. He was elected speaker of the House without opposition. He ran into trouble when he opposed legislation which would have made terms of representatives run three years instead of two.

#### Fought Three Year Term

Evans and several Republican senators and representatives, together with Democratic members of both houses, tried to change the three-year law.

"For this he and his Republican associates were called before a caucus of his party and denied the right to power of the caucus to pass upon a question of this kind, claiming that they were bound by their oaths of office to support the Constitution of the state and could not conscientiously yield to the mandate of a party caucus upon such a question.

"The majority of the caucus decided against them on this point, and Evans and his associates declared they would not be bound by this decision and left the caucus."

The caucus continued in session and resolved to remove Evans from the speakership, a resolution was introduced to declare the office of the speaker vacant, and it was passed "without any reason being alleged."

This action by the Republican majority of the house aroused great indignation throughout the state and was generally condemned by the press and public.

When the 12th Legislature adjourned in 1871, Evans left political life but continued to make history in Texas as general manager of the Texas Land Company, a corporation formed by Texas and New York capitalists interested in the development of the state for real estate investment. Later he was secretary of the Houston & Great Northern Railroad Company and served as a director for several other railroad and land corporations.

#### Evans' Background

Ira H. Evans was born at Piermont, New Hampshire, April 11, 1844, son of Dr. Ira and Emeline Evans. His father, a physician, died when his son was eight years old and originally belonged to a family which settled at Dover, NH in 1635. Evans' mother was the daughter of Rev. Peter Hobart, the first pastor of the first church of Hingham, Mass. Evans enlisted in 1862, as a private in the Vermont Volunteer Infantry, climbed the ranks to become major in the U.S. Volunteers.

#### Medal of Honor

He received a Medal of Honor from Congress "for distinguished bravery at Hatcher's Run, Virginia, April 22, 1865." After the war his command was sent to the lower Rio Grande Border of Texas to back up the diplomatic efforts of Secretary of State Seward to remove the French from Mexico. Following his discharge he settled northwest of Corpus Christi, lost an investment in stock raising, entered the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and was appointed assistant assessor for several counties in Western Texas and eventually became deputy collector for the Second District of Texas, headquartered at Corpus Christi.

This was the stepping stone to his political career.

#### Comes to Austin

Following his stint in politics in 1875, Evans was elected a director of the International & Great Railroad Company, and held that office for 32 years, moving to Austin permanently in 1885. He was one of the organizers of the Austin National Bank in 1890. He was appointed receiver of the Austin Rapid Transit Railway Company in 1897, and five years later was president of the company until failing health caused him to resign.

Evans died in 1922.

During his life time, Evans' connection with religious, educational and charitable movements had been extensive. He was president of the State Sunday School Association; first assistant moderator of the National Congregational Council at Worchester, Mass.; member of the International Sunday School Executive Committee; member of the board of trustees of the First Presbyterian Church of Austin; president of the board of trustees of the First Congregational Church of Austin; president of the board of directors of Tillotson College in Austin; president of the Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, later first vice president general of that national group.

#### Wide Interests

He was also active in such societies as the Texas Academy of Science, Texas Society of Social Hygiene, Texas State Historical Society, National Geographic Society, American Political Science Association; American Society for the Judicial Settlement of International Disputes and the National Economic League.


Evans married Frances A. Hurlbut, daughter of an Illinois Congregational minister, in 1871. She was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and was one time president of the Texas Society.

They had three sons. A grandson, H. Leslie Evans, lives in San Antonio. While in Austin, Evans lived in the picturesque "castle" at 708 San Antonio Street, a luxurious home purchased from the estate in 1927 by the Austin Woman's Club. Several years ago members made extensive repairs, restoring the home to its former glory. It is a great monument to the historic Texas.

## THE AUSTIN WOMAN'S CLUB

# (Former home of Ira Hobart Evans, TSSAR No. 1 and first president of the Texas Society)





The distinctive, former home of Major and Mrs. Ira Hobart Evans at 708 San Antonio Street, Austin, Texas was not built at one time, nor by one owner. In May, 1853 the State of Texas transferred this hilltop to a private owner for \$193.00. Through successive owners it remained unimproved until in 1874 Mr. Harvey North and his wife Catherine purchased the property and planned to build a French Chateau in the style of European feudal times. Unfortunately, circumstances prevented them from completing their dream home though they lived there for several years, and what had been built was excellently done. They named their home, Belleview.

In May, 1892 Major Evans acquired the incomplete building and the property for \$8,000.00 from Mrs. Catherine North whose husband, Harvey, had died. To round out the land area he bought the lot at the corner of Eighth and Nueces Streets for \$274.00. He then employed the services of the widely acclaimed English architect, Alfred Giles, to plan the final additions to the structure. He designed and supervised construction of the handsome arched, stone porches on three levels of the south exposure; the stone entrance with its hand carved ornamentations, and the massive, buttressed stone wall which extended across the property from the west end of the building. This wall extends twenty feet underground to bed rock and, at the time, was alleged to contain more cubic feet of rock than any other building in Austin except the State Capitol.

Outstanding features of the interior included metal ceilings of pressed copper in the rooms of the main and upper floors; hand carved sliding doors of Texas curly pine; hand carved cherrywood grill and Texas pine wainscoting on the main stairway; stained glass windows in the hall, and fireplaces of appropriate design in the drawing room, hall, library and music room. A large Seal of Texas in stained glass forms the skylight over the back hall and the stairway.

When finally completed Major and Mrs. Evans, with their three sons and Mrs. Evans' nephew moved into their new home. In 1917 a divorce action separated the Major and Mrs. Evans. In the settlement she received the home where she

resided until her death in February, 1924. The Major died in San Diego on April 19, 1922.

The property was retained in Mrs. Evans' estate for several years before a suitable buyer was found. Then a most fortunate event occurred. On December 18, 1928 the Austin Woman's Club was organized and, barely three months later, on March 28, 1929 the membership voted to buy the property. The purchase price was \$35,000.00. From the very beginning there was a close relationship between the home and many of the Club members who devoted much time, effort and money to the maintenance of the property, and the preservation of its beauty, charm, dignity and stability.

In 1960 an expansion program was completed which included, among other things which added to the convenience of the members, a two story rock structure the west wall of which rested on the huge buttressed stone wall. The stone for this addition was contributed by Mrs. Roberdeau, a member. It came from the old St. Mary's School which had been razed. The upper floor, which opens onto the second terrace and is the hub of the Club's activities, is the Chateau Dining Room. Capable of seating two hundred and fifty diners at a time the handsome room is used for meetings, receptions, luncheon and dinner parties, music festivals and art exhibits. When the Club's facilities are not in use by its members they become available to other organizations, or the public, for their own affairs. Many other improvements have been made through the years including installation of an elevator from the lower terrace and parking area to the Chateau Room; redecoration of the drawing rooms and hall on the street level; complete restoration of the Evans Dining Room, and the installation of central heat and air conditioning to serve the main dining room, the gallery and powder room.

The Club has been awarded the official Texas Historical Marker, and a medallion recording the structure as a Texas Historical Landmark has been erected near the entrance on San Antonio Street. The building is, indeed, a monument to the effort and planning of many dedicated women, and the Club is a focal point for much of the social activity of Austin.

## BIOGRAPHY OF COLONEL JOHN W. FRENCH

First 2nd Vice President TSSAR

## COLONEL JOHN WILLIAM FRENCH

NSSAR NO. 6783 Oregon Society SAR No. 83 Texas Society SAR No. 4

Born in Washington, DC, June 2, 1843. His father was Rev. John W. French, founding rector of Epiphany Episcopal Church in Washington, DC. His mother was Clara (Miller) French, the granddaughter of James Miller, who fought with the First Rhode Island Artillery Regiment during the American Revolution.

In 1856, Reverend French was appointed as Chaplain at the United States Military Academy, West Point, NY, where he also served as Professor of Law and Ethics until his death in 1871.

Colonel French was in the regular army while stationed in New York State. He became a member of the Sons of the American Revolution. Later he was transferred to Vancouver Barracks, Washington, Oregon, where he was a member of the SAR in the Society of Washington, Oregon.

In 1896, Colonel French was transferred to Fort Clark, Brackettville, Texas, where he assisted in founding the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution on December 8, 1896. Colonel French was elected on December 8, 1896 to be Second Vice President of the Texas Society SAR and he was a member as long as he was serving with the 22nd Infantry, USA, at Fort Clark and Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas.

It is of interest to state that Colonel French's ancestor, James Miller, was also the ancestor of Llewelly Brooks Griffith who later became a member of the Patrick Henry Chapter of the Texas SAR Society and served as that Chapter's President during 1974 through 1978. Mr. Griffith is very proud of the fact that his great uncle, Colonel French was one of the founding members of the Texas State Society of SAR and he was pleased to be able to furnish a copy of Colonel French's SAR papers and also a copy of members' records relating to forming of the Texas Society SAR on December 8, 1896.

# Part II THE ERA OF THE TEXAS COMPATRIOT NEWSPAPER 1933-1952



Compatriots Valin Ridge Woodward, M.D., of Irving, and his brother, Cicero Smith Woodward, M.D., of Fort Worth, saw a dire need for some sort of motivation to stimulate interest in the Texas Society SAR. After diligent study and discussions, they decided the best course of action was to start publishing a standard size newspaper (16" x 22" and 4 to 6 pages) — *THE TEXAS COMPATRIOT* — to be published quarterly with copies to each member of TSSAR. Individual members and chapters were urged to submit pictures, portraits, biographies and articles of important history that they considered to be of interest to the membership. Editor Valin Ridge Woodward and his brother, Cicero Smith Woodward, screened all the material submitted and after diligent

deliberation, published what they considered to be the most motivating and inspiring to the membership. This outstanding and positive action was done at no expense to the Texas Society SAR. *The Texas Compatriot* continued to be published for a period of 19 years (1933 to 1952).

This newspaper, published and printed quarterly and distributed to all members, revived interest and motivation to the point that new membership increased dramatically after 1935.

(The tremendous contribution to the Texas Society, SAR, by Valin Ridge Woodward and Cicero Smith Woodward in publishing this newspaper was the most outstanding tangible contribution of anything found by your historian.

This issue is the effort of Drs. Valin R. and C. S. Woodward of Arlington, as a contribution upon their part to start what they hope will create sufficient interest upon the part of the entire membership of the Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, to make it feasible and desirable to have an issue of The Texas Compatriot every quarter.

In this way it is believed that the activities of Texas Society would become of general interest to the membership, and the official family of the Texas Society become better acquainted with the Compatriots through The Texas Compatriot and thereby build our organization into a worth-while Institution of Texans; whose goal and ambition should be of material assistance of TEXAS in "Doing Our Part" to make the TEXAS CENTENNIAL in 1936 a SUCCESS. Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution, will also observe their 40th Anniversary in 1936. Since the Texas Centennial is a patriotic celebration, observing the 100th Anniversary of Texas Independence, Texas Society can assist very materially

with our sister organization, the Daughters of the American Revolution, Daughters of the Republic of Texas and other patriotic organizations in creating the historical and romantic background of our Texas Centennial.

### **EDITORIAL**

"Look to yourselves that we lose not those things which we have wrought." St. John. The editor quoted this passage of scripture from the Bible because we believe it to be a good text for calling the attention of every member of Texas Society to our duties and responsibilities as Sons of the American Revolution.

We are first thinking of these words of St. John as they apply to Christianity and the place religion had in the founding of this government and its maintenance during more than 150 years under a Constitutional system. Promulgated by those early American Patriots, who believe in God and Christianity as being essential in the establishment of a nation where liberty would survive among free men, on the basis that Christianity must not die if our government is to continue.

As Sons of the American Revolution, regardless of our religious faith or creed, we believe supremely in God and his Word. We have no patience with any dictator or government that denies God and His righteousness. While most of the world today is in bloody conflict, the real background of it is will Christianity and civilization survive? Our faith is in Him who will yet subdue all the dictators and a final reign of peace will come upon the return to this earth of the King of Kings. I do not know when He shall come, but I do know He is coming again. It is our duty as Sons of the American Revolution to remember St. John's admonition, "Look to yourselves that we lose not those things which we have wrought." As a patriotic group how may every member of Texas Society apply these scriptures in a very real sense to his patriotism, his duties and responsibility as a good citizen? I am positive that God and

Christianity will survive. I wish I could be as positive that the Constitution as bequeathed to us by the Founding Fathers was as secure.

In the world upheaval that surrounds our beloved country, no right thinking compatriot of the Sons of the American Revolution who reads the press daily will doubt that this government occupies a precarious position in world affairs.

The Sons of the American Revolution are the only patriotic group in existence in these United States of America that has been thought worthy enough to be granted a charter by the Congress of the United States. The editor of the Texas Compatriot has received from Compatriot Charles N. Zively, State Secretary-Treasurer and Registrar, Box A, University Station, Austin, Texas, the membership list of Texas Society which not only contained the mailing address (necessary in mailing the Texas Compatriot) but the status of each member as to his indebtedness to Texas Society. We are surprised that so many of our members had not as of February 6th remitted their dues (\$3.00 per year) to the State Secretary-Treasurer and Registrar. When we consider that \$3.00 per year dues is less than one cent a day, it does seem to us that every compatriot should remit his dues promptly to the State Secretary-Treasurer and Registrar, for it is only by the strictest economy that Texas Society can be maintained with the dues only \$3.00, of which \$1.00 must be remitted to the National Society not later than March 31st annually as a per capita tax to the National Society to maintain membership in the local chapter, Texas and the National Society.

All officers of Texas Society serve without pay and give of their time at some personal expense, other than the State Secretary-Treasurer and Registrar. This officer is under paid and it is unfair to ask any compatriot to assume the responsibilities and the large amount of work required of a State Secretary-Treasurer and Texas Society fail to, at least, pay the expenses necessary to properly care for the affairs of the State Society, including a vast amount of record work and correspondence.

Of the \$840.00 in dues from members of Texas Society due and payable on September 17th, as of February 6th, only \$258.00 has been paid. Of this \$258.00, one third belongs to the National Society as already indicated. The salary of the State Secretary-Treasurer and Registrar is only \$200.00 a year, and it will be seen that thus far this has not been paid. The editor of the Texas Compatriot has assured Compatriot Zively that it will be paid. It has been an oversight upon the part of our members, and I am sure every member of Texas Society who reads these lines will promptly remit their checks to Compatriot Zively.

This is the confidence that the editor has in the members paid, and the need for every member to assume his own responsibility is greater today and means more in the preservation of our Society in Texas than every before.

When I recall that Texas Society took on new life in 1933 with less than fifty active members, confined to six inactive local chapters, to an increase of more than two hundred members of 14 chapters. I think I may as well close this article as I began it, "Look to yourselves that we lose not those things which we have wrought."

### From THE TEXAS COMPATRIOT Newspaper, April 10, 1937 PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS Dr. Valin R. Woodward 40th Annual Session, Texas Society, Galveston, April 18, 1936

My Compatriots;

Following the custom of my worthy predecessors, I bring you my report, as President of Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, for the year closing today.

First, I wish to humbly acknowledge my appreciation for the confidence and honor bestowed upon me just a year ago.

The Secretary-Treasurer's report, which you have just heard, speaks for itself and I hereby acknowledge my grateful thanks and appreciation for the constant interest and devotion to duty that your Secretary-Treasurer has given Past President C. J. Maxwell, and me during the two years he has served the Society.

As the Secretary-Treasurer happens to be my own brother I hope it will not appear that I am trying to be too laudatory of his record during the past two years when I emphasize the fact, as brought out in the auditor's report, that our present membership of those not having paid their dues is recorded for the year closing as 10.29 per cent as against 55.6 per cent when he assumed office two years ago, which, put in another way, means that two years ago less than one-half the membership were paying their dues. The two preceding years 101 of our compatriots allowed themselves to become suspended for non-payment of dues, while the Secretary-Treasurer, and I feel that I can best indicate his service has been rendered because of his unselfish desire to cooperate with Compatriot Maxwell and me, even to the extent that he has not only given freely of his time, but has personally expended more than the small compensation allowed by the Society as a sal-

Having said this much, touching the service of my brother, also the statistical and business part of my report, I now desire to discuss Texas Society from another viewpoint. Before doing so, I desire to call your attention to the fact that this annual meeting happens to come at a time important in the history of not only Texas Society, but our great State and Nation. This is the 40th Anniversary of Texas Society, having been organized in this romantic city. It is also the Centennial year of Texas. While we are observing, within four days, the 100th Anniversary of the Battle of San Jacinto, a battle unparalleled in history, let us not lose sight of the fact that the heroes of this battle and the martyrs of the Alamo and Goliad were the sons and grandsons of those patriots who made possible the opening of this Great Southwest to civilization and progress of the white man, and an extension of that constitution and form of government under which we live.

Let us, therefore, take pride that we are descended from those patriots who made possible all that we have achieved as Texans during these 100 years. The Centennial is a worthy program and the Sons of the American Revolution have been and are glad to enter into the spirit of the occasion and cooperate in every way possible with every section of our state. It is well that large sums of money are being expended, buildings and monuments erected: but there is a tinge of sadness that comes to my heart when I think that eleven patriots of the American Revolution lie buried in the soil of Texas unmentioned and unnoted by our Texas Centennial Commission. I have no desire to be critical, but I have been disappointed that very little recognition has been given, and very little said, in all the publicity I have read concerning the Centennial, about a great American who was one of the best friends Texas ever had, and who made it possible for Texas to become a state. The one to whom I refer is none other than James K. Polk. James K. Polk lived in that area of our forefathers whose bright star in their sky and whose magic word was Liberty. If we understand the purpose for which we exist today as an organization of the Sons of the American Revolution, we, too, love liberty and we are deeply concerned about this magic word of our forefathers, and are made to wonder, by some of the things that have transpired in recent history, if we shall ever be deprived of this liberty, to which our forefathers gave their devotion, and for which many gave their lives. In my opinion, there never has been a time in the history of our country when there was greater need for the

service and influence of the Sons of the American Revolution to be exerted in an effort to maintain this government in its present form and under that constitution that our patriots bequeathed to this great Republic for all time to come. Some of you may say that I am an alarmist and unnecessarily concerned over the possibility that we are rapidly approaching some new theories or experiments in government today. My answer is that one need only to remember what has happened to other governments, which only a few years ago seemed impossible. I am thinking now of the present plight of Germany. No one has a greater admiration for the genius of the German people than I, and yet it is a fact that these people had almost no training in the laws, ways and uses of liberty, therefore their republic soon disintegrated and disappeared. The Italian dictator tells us plainly that liberty is dead; it is a stinking carcass, and ought to be interred. We have but to look at Russia, debilitated by ages of despotism so that when liberty did come to her, she did not recognize it, or know what to do with it — the constitution of the Kerensky regime was quickly crushed by revolution and it had no chance to survive. So we are living in a changing world, whether we like it or not. And while conditions have changed in these United States in the last few years, in many instances, especially in the industrial and political complex of our every day living, let us hope that we shall not tamper or alter further that constitution that has safe-guarded our liberty for more than 150 years. We present day Americans regard liberty as a matter of little concern to be worried about, forgetting that our patriot forefathers suffered and many made the supreme sacrifice that we might have and maintain that liberty that was so precious to them. It should be the task of our Sons of the American Revolution, who value the moral and spiritual qualities of our race, to keep our liberty that cost so much and has meant so much, and may we never shirk our duty as good citizens to speak wherever and whenever necessary against any propaganda that would deprive us of this liberty liberty of thought, liberty of speech, and liberty to worship God according to the Dictates of our own conscience. As Dr. Joseph Fort Newton has well said, "I am one who believes that the future stability of this world, which is now rocking with confusion and upheaval, depends upon the intelligent and understanding friendship and co-operation of the English speaking people. Without it we are lost. There will be no place left where liberty can live."

The Dictators will all topple down, compatriots. Some of us here expect and believe by the Grace of God, to see them all gone. May we hope that the Sons of the American Revolution increase in numbers all over these United States and may it ever be said of Texas Society that its membership roster will be composed of men and citizens who are worthy followers of those zealous compatriots who met in this very city 40 years ago and organized this Society.

Explanation: Officers are not reprinted as to the years in which they may have succeeded themselves for several terms. For instance, The First President remained in office from 1896 until 1903 when he was succeeded by Col. L. J. Polk. C. B. Dorchester remained for nine years or until 1924 when the late Sam P. Cochran and others seem to have started Texas Society off again to a new lease on life and some progress. In fact Sam P. Cochran and our present First Vice President, compatriot James C. Jones, in 1925 began a campaign for NEW MEMBERS which was to see Texas Society put on the greatest growth and activity in its entire history. The records show that more than 200 members were listed during the four years. Sam P. Cochran served as President, James C. Jones as the Secretary Treasurer, and Chas. J. Maxwell as registrar — all of Dallas. The Editor of The Texas Compatriot became a member in 1925 and attended his first Luncheon of the Sons of the American Revolution that year. The luncheon was given at the Adolphus Hotel by the then President Sam P. Cochran in honor of Judge Harvey F. Remington of New York, the President General of the National Society and Vice-President General Breckenridge of Missouri. The compatriot who sat on my right at the luncheon was the President of the American Bar Association — the late Robert E. Lee Saner of Dallas; the man to my left was the Congressman from the Marlin district, now our beloved compatriot, a former President of Texas Society, member of the National Society Executive Committee under Messmore Kendall of New York, our present Senior United States Senator from Texas, the Hon. Tom Connally of Marlin, Texas. The above chart reveals two other interesting things: First, the late F. F. Downs was First Vice President in 1914 and after a lapse of 19 years he was duly elected and installed as President of Texas Society, S. A. R. The late Sully B. Roberdeau of Austin was elected First Vice-President in 1924, but never became President until 15 years later in 1939. J. T. Huffmaster began his service as an officer of Texas Society, that of Registrar in 1902, and served continuously in this office and as Chaplain until

1925, a period of almost a quarter of a century. The office of Registrar is a most important one and compatriot C. T. Maxwell did a long stretch of service for the Texas Society as the Registrar and still on the job after about 30 years in SAR work and at present the valued registrar of Dallas Chapter.

Perhaps the most interesting member we have in Texas Society today is our only Honorary Member, still living, the Hon. Newell Kane of Palestine. The records show that he was among the first members of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution when this organization was organized a little more than 50 years ago. He transferred to the Texas Society and was the 22nd member. In other words his Texas Number is 22. The first 15 members were assigned to the Charter Members who organized the Texas Society in 1896 — the year before our Texas Historical Association was organized. Right in this connection, I note in the Southwestern Historical Quarterly that his organization boasts (in print in their Quarterly) that they are the oldest "learned society in Texas." Well, my good Republican friend Bob Humphreys of Galveston told me a long time ago that our Texas Society was the oldest "learned" society in Texas. He said he didn't belong in 1896, but that Texas Society was organized in Galveston by 15 learned Republicans, and that if the Democrats hadn't finally slipped in, Texas Society could claim title to this boast of the Texas Historical Association. But getting back to our compatriot Kane: the records show that he was a Director of Texas Society in 1898, just a little old 45 years ago.

The Editor of The Texas Compatriot drove down to Palestine to see this interesting member of our Texas Society several years ago while an active officer of Texas Society. We learned that compatriot Kane remembered very well when they returned Abraham Lincoln's body to Springfield, Ill., (his home) for final interment. As a member of the Illinois National Guard at a later date, he was one of those selected to serve as an honor guard to president Grant when he came to Springfield to visit the tomb of Lincoln.

The Texas Compatriot is a project of Dr. Valin R. Woodward and published by him for the benefit of the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution and The Sons of the Republic of Texas.

Our membership is composed of some of our finest patriotic citizens: all direct descendants of the Patriots who founded these two North American Republics, that is, the United States of America and the Republic of Texas — now the great State of Texas.

As the presidents, respectively, of the Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution and the Sons of the Republic of Texas, we are very much interested in having The Texas Compatriot better serve its purpose and the programs of our two organizations in our special fields of endeavor, Patriotism, History and Education, by being published regularly every quarter — four times a year.

This can be accomplished if the membership of both our S.A.R. and S.R.T. will give some encouragement to our Managing Editor in furnishing him with suitable manuscript along the line of our endeavor to present our programs to our members and friends who are interested in an all out war effort for VICTORY and at the same time maintain our American way of life after the war by preserving our CONSTITUTION and form of government as bequeathed to us by our American Patriots, in whose honor we exist today as patriotic organizations.

Both organizations have members and friends who can do this and make The Texas Compatriot of real benefit to our State and Nation by an increased membership with a combined and synonymous task of giving all aid possible to our beloved Nation and her allies for victory over the Dictators of the Axis Powers, who would enslave us and take away our liberty, freedom and the pursuit of happiness. The Managing Editor of The Texas Compatriot desires to continue to maintain our publication upon the same high plane which it has been published by him since 1933 free of advertising matter or subscriptions. Its circulation over the State and Nation, because of its popularity as an outstanding paper devoting itself exclusively to patriotism, history and education, has reached the point where Dr. Woodward can not carry the

financial burden longer in paying its expenses. He will not accept financial assistance from the Treasury of either the Sons of the American Revolution or the Sons of the Republic of Texas, for himself or The Texas Compatriot.

We have, however, persuaded him to allow our members or friends to give financial assistance in the following manner and under the following plan to which he has agreed:

- 1. Mr. Claude Wilemon, Vice President of the Arlington State Bank, has very kindly agreed to serve as the Treasurer of The Texas Compatriot without compensation, and will receive any contributions that may come and deposit same to the account of The Texas Compatriot at the Arlington State Bank and issue all checks against the account when authorized to do so by either, or both the presidents of the Texas Society, S.A.R., or the Sons of the Republic of Texas and approved by the Managing Editor of The Texas Compatriot.
- 2. Dr. Valin R. Woodward of Arlington, agrees to continue as the Managing Editor of The Texas Compatriot without salary or compensation of money other than his actual expense in publishing same such as printing, stationery, office supplies, postage for mailing, occasional stenographic and other necessary help, telephone, or telegraphic expense that may be occasionally necessary and his actual expense should it become necessary for him to travel to distant towns or cities in the interest of either the Texas Society, S.A.R., or the Sons of the Republic of Texas or The Texas Compatriot.
- 3. Should funds in the Treasury of The Texas Compatriot permit, after all other expenses have been paid, the Managing Editor may be allowed, with the consent of the President of either Society (S.A.R. or S.R.T.) to contribute toward the expenses of the annual meeting of each the amount contributed to be on a percentage basis according to the total contributions of members, or friends, of each society made during the fiscal years.

We wish to state that an account has been opened at the Arlington State Bank, Arlington, Texas, under the name "The Texas Compatriot" with an initial deposit of \$100.00 contributed largely by Judge Ben H. Powell, Vice President General of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, Austin. Other initial contributors were Mr. Charles J. Maxwell, Dallas; Dr. Valin R. Woodward, Arlington, both a former president of the Texas Society, S.A.R., and the late John A. Walker of Brownwood, for many years an honored member of the S.A.R. The undersigned will contribute to this fund and support The Texas Compatriot fully; may we urge others to do so. Please make all checks payable to The Texas Compatriot and mail direct to the Arlington State Bank of Arlington, Texas. All such donations can be deducted from your income taxes, we are advised, since this is to a worthy patriotic cause, sponsored by two patriotic groups of some of our finest citizens TO HELP OUR COUN-TRY WIN THIS WAR.

Two troupes of local scouts have been honored with an annual banquet, at which time the scouts have present their proud parents; the village Mayor, the pastors and other leading citizens are present to see the scouts receive their awards and medals according to their age, rank and achievement in advancing in scouting of course.

The above picture shows a scout who has attained the hope and ambition of every Boy Scout, that of attaining the highest rank in scouting; his big moment has come after several years of study and preparation with a constant advancement in his scout work. Added with this has been good morals and clean living, that have won him the respect of the entire community. He is the ideal and example of the younger scouts coming on and advancing in scouting, an honor to his Scoutmaster and his parents who look on in the picture while the Chairman of the local Court of Honor, Compatriot Valin Ridge Woodward, pins the coveted medal upon his uniform,

# JESSE WATKINS' CHAPTER, NUMBER 13, HENDERSON, TEXAS

Jesse Watkins, for whom this Chapter is named, was born in Virginia during the memorial year 1776. He was the son of William Ezekial Watkins and Betzy Jernigan Watkins.

William Watkins was a private in the Revolutionary War, and served in the Cavalry under Lieutenant Colonel Dabney. After the Revolutionary War, William and his family emigrated to Tennessee, leaving Virginia about the year 1800; the family went to Knoxville first thence on to Montgomery County, Tennessee, where he settled near the town of Clarksville and lived and died there in the year 1820.

At William Watkins' death he left several children. John, the eldest was named for his grandfather, lived and died in Montgomery County, Tennessee. Nancy, a daughter, married a Mr. Smith and moved to Calloway County, Kentucky. The youngest son was William Jr., who was a small boy when his father died. He made his home with his brother Jesse, the middle son, until he was grown, and then married and spent the remainder of his life in Tennessee.

Jesse Watkins, the middle son, married Mary White McCorkle, who lived in Tennessee, having emigrated to that new state with her family after the Revolutionary War from Lancaster District, South Carolina, where she was born during the year 1790. Mary White McCorkle was the daughter of Archibald H. McCorkle, who likewise was a Revolutionary soldier, and served under General Green and fought at the battles of Guilford Court House, at "96", at Eutaw, Eutaw Springs and at Savannah, Georgia. Her mother was first cousin to General Hugh Lawson White of Revolutionary fame. Jesse Watkins was a heavy set man about 5 feet 10 inches tall, and had deep set, red-black eyes, and a high forehead. He like his father was a jovial, good natured man, made friends easily, also liked horse racing, bear, deer and fox hunting, and was a good judge of mint juleps, which he liked to take with friends. He also inherited the fault of acting as surety for his convivial friends, and likewise lost much money and property.

However, when he married, conditions changed. This Mary White McCorkle whom he married was a devoted Christian woman, coming from the old Scotch Presbyterian stock, and after she married Jesse Watkins, she put a stop to his rollicking ways and seems to have brought up Jesse's wilder proclivities with a terrible jolt, and he was suddenly cut off from his frequent frolics with his former associates; but such is the way with the good Christian women and as a result, Jesse Watkins settled down and became a Ruling Elder in the Presbyterian Church in Tennessee, and shortly after he emigrated to Texas during the year 1833, as a Ruling Elder, he helped organize the first Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Texas. This also was the first Protestant Church organized in Texas and was known as the Shilo Cumberland Presbyterian Church which was located near the town of Clarksville, Texas. At that time, the settlers were under the impression that this section was in Arkansas Territory. They had no idea that they were making history for their church and for Texas.

Mr. Chairman, Members and Guests of the Sons of the American Revolution:

To have the privilege of addressing so splendid and distinguished a group as The Sons of the American Revolution and their guests upon this occasion is an honor which I deeply cherish and is a pleasure which I shall long remember. More than three hundred and thirty-four years ago there was begun on these North American shores a migratory movement vastly momentous in its consequences. Probably no other colonization effort begun, carried on and ended by uninspired man compare with it in scope or in the far-reaching character of its results. That movement was the peopling of the land we now call America.

It was in 1607 that the first Anglo-Saxon settlers landed on these shores, under the authority of the Jamestown Charter. Fourteen years later, another colony was established on the Massachusetts coast at a place to be called Plymouth. Before 1607, white men had made effort to dominate the land, but the approach of the Anglo-Saxon to the task differed from all other such attempts, in that men landed at Jamestown and Plymouth Rock. As they cleared the land between the sea and the foot of the mountains; as they climbed the Allegheny and Appalachian Mountains; as they traversed the long and weary distances from the Mountains to the Mississippi; as they rafted across the Mississippi; as they toiled and sweated and sweltered across the "Great American Desert"; as they climbed the Rocky Mountains and then the Sierra Nevadas to descend and claim the Pacific on the other side; as they conquered northward to the Canadian border and extended Anglo-Saxon civilization southward to the Rio Grande, womankind was at their sides, saying to them, like Ruth of old:

"Entreat me not to leave thee or to return from following thee; for where thou goest, I will go; thy work, thy dangers, thy accomplishments shall be mine; where thou livest, I will live, and I will build for thee a home; where thou are buried, there will also be my resting place," and thus saying — on the prairie, in the mountains, upon the rivers, and in the cities, towns and villages — she remained at the side of her menfolk, making for them a home. And today the American woman, fundamentally the same as her heroic counterpart of frontier days, stands shoulder to shoulder with her men folk, sharing with them responsibilities just as brave, and facing dangers just as real as those encountered by the brave women without whose aid the settling of America never could have been accomplished.



Favorable comments and publicity was practically nation-wide as a result of the program held at the Home for Aged Masons on last September 17 — Constitution Day — at which time the local Jesse Watkins Chapter No. 12 of the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution held their third annual "Observance of Constitution Day" with Judge Paine Lee Bush of Dallas as the principal speaker upon the subject, "The Constitution of the United States." No man in Texas is better qualified to speak upon this subject than this well known Judge of the 68th District Court of Texas. Judge Bush is the author of a recent book, "Democracy in Action,"

which has already been adopted by the State Board of Education as worthy of a text book in Civics for the public school children of Texas. The speaker was introduced by the president of the local Watkins Chapter, the Hon. Temple Houston Morrow of Dallas, a grandson of General Sam Houston, who originated the Order of Knights of San Jacinto. This order has been revived by the Sons of the Republic of Texas and it was to confer this highest honor upon George B. Dealey of the Dallas News that brought state officers of this latter group to join with the local Granville Watkins Chapter No. 11 of the Sons of the Republic of Texas, to Arlington to participate in this program. President Harry Pennington Sr. was present from San Antonio and personally presented the honor to Mr. Dealey. He likewise recognized and presented a certificate of Honorary Membership in the Sons of the Republic of Texas to Judge Ben H. Powell of Austin, the Chancellor General of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Those present will long remember the classical oration delivered by Judge John M. Spellman of Dallas in the fine tribute he paid to his old friend and fellow townsman, George Bannerman Dealey. Judge Spellman is Chairman of the State Executive Committee of the Sons of the Republic of Texas, President of Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, and was, at the recent annual meeting of the Jesse Watkins Chapter No. 12, advanced from vice president to president, succeeding Temple Houston Morrow, who was

advanced to membership on the executive committee of the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. All other officers of the local chapter were re-elected other than two directors, Judge R. T. Brown of Henderson and Dr. Will B. McKnight were succeeded by Judge Royall R. Watkins of Dallas and Benton Collins of Arlington. Collings is a former state president, having served in 1942.

The history of the Host Chapter for the 44th annual meeting of Texas Society on February 22nd, 1940, had its begin ning in 1930 — started by a conversation between the late Sam P. Cochran of Dallas and Dr. Valin R. Woodward, a physician of Fort Worth. At that time, there were only 9 members of the Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, residing in Fort Worth. Nothing was done until Wood ward again suggested the matter of having a local chapter in Fort Worth at the beginning of 1932 and was finally rewarded for his efforts, with the assistance of Elmer Renfro, by sending out a call to members residing in Fort Worth, to meet in the Directors Room of the Fort Worth National Bank, for the purpose of organizing a local chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution. In the mean time another member, Sam B. Cantay, Jr., was importuned to write a Constitution and the By-laws, which were adopted at the Organization Meeting, which occurred on April 1st, 1932.

The following officers were elected at this meeting, Elmer Renfro, President; Sam B. Gaines, Vice President; Robert W. Fender, Registrar; Joe Ingraham, Secretary-Treasurer; Sam B. Cantay, Newton Gaines, and Dr. Valin R. Woodward, Directors. Others present at the first meeting were Dr. M. Lee Woodward and the late Dr. S. A. Woodward. Not present but the name of Frank D. Kent, a recent transferred member

from the Missouri State Society, was added to the Roster of those whose names should appear on the Charter.

By common consent it was agreed the local chapter would be named in honor of the late Major K. M. Van Zandt, who had distinguished himself as one of Fort Worth's best known citizens for the service he had rendered Fort Worth for more than 50 years. The chapter gave a dinner at the Womans Club on the evening of September 17, 1932, for the purpose of properly observing Constitution Day and to receive the Charter of the Major K. M. Van Zandt Chapter No. 6 of Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution. On this occasion, President Elmer Renfro presided as Master of Ceremonies.



Mr. Fletcher, Ladies and Gentlemen.

It gives me unusual pleasure to be present on this occasion and briefly take part in these exercises. RESOLUTIONS ON THE DEATH OF COMPATRIOT CAPTAIN JOHN WARNE HERBERT III.

The Major K. M. Van Zandt Chapter No. 6, Sons of the American Revolution, Fort Worth, Texas, records their sense of grief and loss in the death of our late Compatriot Captain John Warne Herbert II.

He was born in New York City, January 22, 1899, and died in New Guinea, November 24, 1942. He was the son of John W. and Olivia Herbert, and was educated at Taft School and Choate School. During the first World War he enlisted in the Marines, and became a first Lieutenant and pilot in the Air Force. At the start of the defense movement in this country he helped organize the local units of the Texas Defense Guard, and became Major in command of the local organization. In 1942, he attended the Intelligence Service Officer's School at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, from which he was graduated in July enroute to the West Coast whence he sailed for the Southwest Pacific War area. He was attached to the Third Bombing Group at the time of his death, which occurred while on a bombing mission. Compatriot Herbert was

interested in the S.A.R. as well as the Boy Scouts, Community Chest and other civic enterprises; he was the Texas Trustee of the National S.A.R. in 1938-1939. He has been awarded the medal of the Order of the Purple Heart.

In his untimely passing the Major K. M. Van Zandt Chapter has suffered the loss of a useful and worthy member and our city, state and nation a devoted and eminent citizen. His loyalty to his country and his aggressive energy in her service has made him an outstanding patriot whose loss is sorely felt and whose place not easily filled. We commend the family and loved ones for comfort and strength to almighty God and pray that in the memory of his noble qualities they shall find a solemn pride and joy.

# TIMOTHY B. HOBART NSSAR #12834 TSSAR #34 Pampa, Texas

This veteran of the Texas Society, like Compatriot W. F. Beers of Galveston, just seems to never grow old and tire in the work of Texas Society. It is interesting to go through the Registrar's files; one could just read by the hours, the interesting genealogy of the various compatriots who go to make up the membership of Texas Society.

We started with the First President of Texas Society, the Hon. Ira Hobart Evans, who organized Texas Society nearly 40 years ago; Dec. 8th, 1896, to be exact. Evans was a prominent citizen of Texas 40 years, coming here to take charge of the New York and Texas Land Company, Ltd., many years ago. He had the honor of claiming No. 1 as his Texas Society membership number. We do not know if our First President is now living; our records show him to have gone to California many years ago. If he still lives, he is now in his 90th year, having been born April 11th, 1844, in Vermont. He transferred from Vermont State Society, in which his State Number there was 51, to Texas, and from Texas to California. He became a member of the Vermont Society on Sept. 5th, 1890, at which time his National Number was 2751. We mention to indicate several things of interest. In 1890 the National

Society was only one year old and there were few State Societies then. Today, we received notice of the acceptance of the latest member to Texas Society, one John Norton Groesbeck, who on May 10th was given the Texas Society Number 411, while his National Number is 51424. We had read the first and early minutes of Texas Society which we have in the old original book. We noted that the Hon. Ira H. Evans of Austin, Texas, was conspicuous for several years; his name was always written Ira H. Evans. A few days ago we received the Registrar files, and as stated we started in at number one, the said Ira Hobart Evans and his entire record.

We knew the President of Texas Society in 1932 was our dear friend and compatriot Timothy D. Hobart. Our curiosity got the best of us and we began to turn the pages until we came to Number 34. Here we found out the rather interesting thing to us, that the first President of Texas Society, the Hon. Ira Hobart Evans was the great-grandson of one Captain James Hobart of Vermont; and that still another president of Texas Society in 1932, Timothy D. Hobart was also the great-grandson of the same Captain James Hobart of Vermont.

Timothy D. Hobart was born on the old homestead in Washington County, Vermont, which his grandfather settled 130 years ago, and where his great-grandfather Captain James Hobart spent his last days. Compatriot Timothy D. Hobart was educated in the common schools of Vermont, in Barre Academy and the Vermont Methodist seminary. He taught school in his native state and was the Supt. of Schools at Berlin, Vermont for 3 years. After which or in 1882 he came to Texas and at once entered the employment of the New York and Texas Land Company, Ltd., as Agent and Surveyor.

In 1886 Compatriot Hobart was sent to the Panhandle to take charge of the Company's land in that territory. He remained with this Company 20 years, when he resigned to take charge of what is known as the White Deer Lands with headquarters at Pampa, Texas. He remained in charge of this work for 21 years or until 1914 when Mrs. Cornelia Adair of New York, invited T. D. Hobart to accept the position of General Manager of the J. A. Ranch, owned by her and because of the fact that her nephew and Manager, James W. Wadsworth, Jr., had just been elected to the United States Senate from the State of New York. Mrs. Adair died in 1921, and by the terms of her will, Compatriot Hobart and the late Henry C. Coke of Dallas were made independent executors. Compatriot Hobart was born October 6th, 1885, and has been a consistent member of Texas Society for 34 years, having missed very few annual meetings in all those years. He unfortunately had to miss the last meeting in Arlington because of the illness of one of his employees; this he particularly regretted as he had looked forward to seeing his old friends Col. W. T. Waggoner and Judge J. H. Barwise at the great Arlington Downs.

Compatriot Hobart believes the horse is coming back and that event in his judgment, is a very decided step forward in placing agriculture on a sound basis. He believes that Col. Waggoner stands head and shoulders above all others through his persistent efforts in that direction, and that our State and Nation owes him (Waggoner) a debt of gratitude.

Compatriot Hobart has a son Fred Hobart, who is also a member of Texas Society, and these two Pampa Compatriots were not too busy last year to send in the application of a friend in Pampa for membership in the Texas Society. May our good friend and compatriot Timothy D. Hobart attend the annual meeting of Texas Society, the 100th anniversary of Texas Independence, and let us hope that the Texas Centennial will be in full blast and that Texas Society will be host to the National Society in 1936.

Compatriot Jones is a descendant of Captain George Holloway of Virginia.



### ALBERT C. McDAVID NSSAR #29489 TSSAR #164 President, 1936 San Antonio, Texas

In the long history of the Society no president has worked harder for the upbuilding of the principles laid down by our National Society — that of true American patriotism. No president of Texas Society ever received this honor more humbly than Albert Calhoun McDavid. This honor came to him unsolicited upon his part; it was simply thrust upon him

in recognition of his long service as a worker in the ranks of our Texas Society.

McDavid was a charter member of the local San Antonio Chapter No. 4; was elected the first Secretary-Treasurer and still serves his local Chapter in this capacity, and but for the patient and persistent efforts of McDavid it is doubtful that our Texas Society interest would have fared so well. McDavid has given much of his time and personal means to carry on in the San Antonio area.

Speaking now of the service and record of McDavid as President of Texas Society, we have no hesitancy in stating that the interests of Texas Society have at all times been uppermost in the mind of Albert C. McDavid. While pressure has been brought to bear upon him to make certain rulings and statements that he believed to be of a political nature, tinged with partisan faith in any particular party, yet he has maintained that equilibrium of action in which he has tried to be fair to all, believing that the true principles of our patriotic organization ought to be above political parties or strife. He has worked hard towards the goal of an increased membership in Texas Society and has used his best efforts to secure the highest type of American citizen, irrespective of political or religious beliefs or affiliations.

A glance at the list of new members who have been admitted during the administration of President McDavid will reveal that six of the list are members of the San Antonio Chapter, and were secured by him personally. In addition to these members for his local Chapter, he secured two other members, or a total of eight of the thirty-two members, which are credited to his own efforts. This is a record and a pace that McDavid has set as a precedent for future Presidents of our Society. While thirty-two members exceeds the record of any of his predecessors, with the one exception of the late Sam P. Cochran of Dallas, just think what the record might be if only the membership of Texas Society would bestir themselves and lend their assistance and cooperation to the officers of Texas Society in securing the hundreds of our fellow Texans who ought to have membership in Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

Albert C. McDavid was born and reared in the old Pendleton District of South Carolina, where so many Revolutionary soldiers are buried. His McDavid ancestor came to Virginia about 1730 from Ireland, where the family had been prominent since the Anglo-Norman days, being a branch of the de Burgo family, who were among those companions of William, Duke of Normandy. The McDavid's moved into South Carolina about 1756 and it is through the American Patriot James McDavid that our President secured his membership in the Sons of the American Revolution. Other paternal American Patriots were Captain James Willitts and William Davenport of Virginia. On his maternal line he traces to Major John Lindsay and William Halbert of Virginia; also William Hill, a member from Scurry County, of the Provincial Congress which met at Hillsboro, North Carolina, August 20, 1775.

President McDavid was educated in South Carolina, having obtained a degree in Civil Engineering from Clemson College. He is also a law graduate and a licensed attorney in the State of Texas. However, he does not follow either of these professions, in either of which he would have won success. He became interested in the insurance business and held some very responsible positions with Insurance Companies in the States of New York, Pennsylvania and Alabama. Coming to Texas in 1913 to represent some of these Insurance Companies, he decided to adopt Texas as his permanent home and established the well known Perry & McDavid Insurance Agency of San Antonio, Texas.

President McDavid and his forebears for several generations have resided in the South; both his paternal and maternal people took the side of the South and fought in the Confederate Army. His own father, Dr. John Q. McDavid was in the hospital corps of the 20th South Carolina Volunteers, and we may ruin this article, in the minds of some, when we state that our President McDavid is a liberal Democrat, and proud of it.

Mr. McDavid says that as far as he is concerned, after all, the British have won a victory, for he married Dorothy Malcolm, a British subject from Nova Scotia, Canada, on July 21st, 1913. There are three children, the eldest, Betty, named for his mother, an honor graduate of the University of Texas, last June; then a son who was imposed with the name of his father, and the youngest, John Malcolm, better known to his playmates as "Jackie."

The Texas Compatriot believes that San Antonio and McDavid should be honored by a good attendance to our forty-first annual session of Texas Society on Monday, April 19th, 1937.

### Another Article from *THE TEXAS COMPATRIOT* Newspaper reads:

Largely through the efforts of the late Edwin Leight Porch, Sr. a Mining Engineer then living in San Antonio, Texas, in cooperation with Albert C. McDavid, we managed to get together a few of the Revolution, with a view of forming a local San Antonio Chapter. Application was made showing fifteen members. The State Society held its annual meeting in San Antonio on the 19th day of April, 1930, on which date charter for the San Antonio Chapter was issued. At that time, the only Chapters in Texas were at Dallas, Galveston and Texarkana. Before the annual meeting adjourned here in San Antonio, the local Chapter was organized.

Mr. Edwin Leight Porch, Sr., having been elected to presidency of the State Society, he declined the presidency of the local Chapter. Accordingly, Mr. A. B. Spencer was elected President, Mr. S. W. Scott, Vice President, and Mr. A. C. McDavid, Secretary and Treasurer who together with Mr. F. L. Hillyer and Mr. Jack Beretta were appointed on the Executive Committee of the State Society.

This original charter dated the 19th day of April 1930, shows the following members: Albert Calhoun McDavid, Alexander Burke Spencer, Herbert Spencer, Sr., Edwin Leight Porch, Sr., Francis Lorraine Hillyer, John Ward Beretta, Samuel Walter Scott, Edwin Leight Porch, Jr., Harvie Rogers Mathews, James Culver Bierbower, Richard Fischer Bibb and James Alexander Barnett.

The original application for Charter included the names of Rev. J. W. Meredith, Mr. Arthur Van Horn, and Mr. Wm. M. Barton, but due to the fact that these gentlemen were not residents of Bexar County it was not possible to enter their names in the original Charter, by reason of the bylaws in Section 1, Article 2; hence, the actual charter only showed 12 members to start with. Mr. Hobert Huson, Dr. J.A. Nunn, Mr. Wm. M. Barton, Mr. Eugene Webster Robinson, Mr. Richard F. Fender, Mr. James R. Groesbeck.

Our good friend, Mr. Edwin Leight Porch, Sr., passed away on the 21st day of May, 1930.

The present officers of the local Chapter are Mr. A. B. Spencer, President; Mr. S. W. Scott, Vice President, and Albert C. McDavid, Secretary-Treasurer.

On the occasion of the State meeting of the Daughters of the American Revolution in San Antonio, Texas, on March 19, 1934, Mr. A. B. Spencer was requested to appear as representing the local Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, but due to his sickness he requested the Secretary, Albert C. McDavid, to appear for him to greet the convention. His address was as follows: "Madam Regent and Officers; Daughters of the American Revolution; Honored Guests;

Compatriots and Friends: As the Secretary of the Local Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, it is a pleasure to note that so many of the sons are present here tonight. As a lonesome son at your meeting here about a year ago, in the midst of so brilliant an audience of daughters, I felt almost as inconspicuous and unimportant as the groom does at a large church wedding, however, my superior officer, Mr. A. B. Spencer, President of our Local Society, issued the order that I appear for the Chapter and no patriot will disobey the order of a Superior Officer."

"Both the Sons' and Daughters' Societies have been accused by the uninformed as being a sort of "I LOVE ME" or "MUTUAL ADMIRATION SOCIETY." To this charge, I think the great statesman and writer, Edmund Burke, has aptly replied, when he profoundly remarked that 'a man who is not proud of his Ancestry, will never leave after him anything for which his posterity may be proud of him.' TO YOU, more valuable than all the wealth of ancient Arabia is this heritage of a conqueror — this indomitable will to carry the

torch of liberty onward, even under the most adverse circumstances, in the face of HELL, DISASTER, FIRE, and BLOOD. I submit to you, that only because of the spirit in your forefathers, are you, their children, enabled to peaceable assembly here tonight. I salute you in the name of the Sons of the American Revolution."

Now, on the approach of the Texas Centennial in 1936, there is an awakened desire to study the history, causes and individuals making this great country, hence what more wonderful place could there be for a local chapter of the S.A.R. than here in old San Antonio. The most casual glance into its history reveals wonderful charm, adventure, romance and action, unsurpassed by that of any other section of the English speaking world. What a wealth of material is here awaiting the expert pen of those who enjoy writing.

Dr. C. S. Woodward, manager of the Home of Aged Masons and a past president of the local S. A. R. chapter will welcome the patriots and guests.





# DR. ROBERT HAMILTON NEEDHAM, M. D. NSSAR #53597 TSSAR #434

The Texas Compatriot is pleased to pay tribute to a man who deserves to have worthy things said about him. I have known Dr. R. H. Needham for 30 years and all during that time he has been my devoted and helpful friend. During that period of time, I have known him, first, as my professor of toxicology in the old Fort Worth School of Medicine (absorbed by Baylor in 1918). As a medical student I found, along with other students, Professor (as we then knew him) Needham as true and trusted friend.

Dr. Needham is a native of eastern Kansas, but a Texan by adoption. He was educated as a Pharmaceutical Chemist, receiving his degree at the University of Kansas in 1901 and where he taught two years following. He came to Fort Worth in 1905 to become Professor of Pharmacy at the Fort Worth School of Medicine and was subsequently the Dean of the Pharmacy Department and Professor of Chemistry and Toxicology in the Medical Department. He was my fellow class mate in the College of Medicine and received his degree Doctor of Medicine in 1918. After practicing medicine for a number of years, Dr. Needham decided to confine his practice to the field of eye, ears, nose, and throat. After special work and training in this specialty at Tulane University, he returned to Fort Worth and opened his offices in the Fort Worth National Bank Building, where he enjoys a good practice today.

I have known him in organized medicine for 26 years as a progressive and active physician, always willing to accept any assignment for WORK in behalf of his profession, and particularly, if the public welfare and human needs were to benefit from his activity. His record and work in the Red Cross and Tubercular Society of Tarrant County is well known. He has served as Secretary of the Tarrant County Medical Society, the Fort Worth Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat Society — the latter he was honored as a President a number of years ago. He was at one time the Editor of the Tarrant County Medical Bulletin; he never said NO to any call from his friends in the various organizations in which he has membership. What has been said above can be applied with

reference to his membership and activity in the Sons of the American Revolution. He came into Texas Society upon the record of his direct ancestor Ensign John Needham, a patriot of the American Revolution from Boston, Mass.

Few meetings have ever been called of the Van Zandt Chapter in Fort Worth that did not find Dr. Needham, the Registrar, present and willing to do anything possible to help the SAR cause and programs.

The Registrar is one of the most important (perhaps with the possible exception of the Secretary-Treasurer) offices in any local chapter, particularly IF new members are desired, for this reason many prominent men and citizens know themselves to be eligible by descent from some American Patriot of the Revolution, but they simply DO NOT KNOW HOW TO PREPARE THEIR PAPERS for proof to the Texas and National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. This must be done by one familiar in genealogy, biography, and legal documents and records of various kinds that are necessary to include into the formal duplicate applications for membership in the SAR. Dr. Needham is familiar with such matters and fortunately for himself and Texas Society, his good wife, Mrs. Needham, is an EXPERT in this line of work. Mrs. Needham has traced her lines and has membership in all of the various American and European Genealogical Societies. They have one son, Herbert Hill Needham, also a member of the Texas Society.

It is not always the "big shots" that get the job done in any organization; they are necessary because of their well known identity and influence in public affairs, but the WORKER is how I would classify Dr. Needham and I think that's how he would want me to classify him. This article will surprise him, as he will not be expecting any tribute from me. But I feel that I should say THIS VERY ISSUE OF THE TEXAS COMPATRIOT Dr. R. H. Needham has had a large part in making possible by his remarks made at a meeting of the Van Zandt Chapter last February 12th. This chapter observed the birthday of Abe Lincoln that day at the Texas Hotel with a luncheon.

The Editor of the Texas Compatriot was invited to accompany President Benton Collins of Texas Society to Fort Worth and to attend their luncheon, with the President as their Honor Guest. Dr. Holman Taylor, the Editor of the Texas State Journal of Medicine, was presiding as the President of the Van Zandt Chapter and after the honor guest had made his address, I presume he felt that he must say something nice about The Texas Compatriot and the Editor. At any rate, he told the compatriots assembled how Dr. Valin R. Woodward of Arlington had been publishing The Texas Compatriot to help our program of Patriotism, History, and Education as sponsored by our Sons of the American Revolution, and doing so at a great personal sacrifice of his own time and money. President Collins stated further that Dr. Woodward was quietly, but effectively, keeping informed upon all current public matters that might here or hereafter affect the programs as sponsored by our Sons of the American Revolution. He stated further that all the Editor desired of the Sons of the American Revolution and the Sons of the Republic of Texas was their support and influence banding together our native American stock in supporting fully our Government in the War Effort that we may preserve our American Way of Life, our Constitutional form of government, and thereby honor our forebearers — our American Patriots — in whose deeds of valor we exist as a patriotic, historical, and educational group in this day of our generation.

After President Collins had concluded his address, Dr. Needham arose and said in substance, that he had been reading The Texas Compatriot for several years and that he had never contributed one penny to support — that such a paper was needed and should continue to be published by Dr. Wood-

ward. He thereupon passed a five dollar bill to the Editor, who refused to accept it, but passed along to President Collins, who stated that it would be passed to Mr. C. H. Wileman, a banker in Arlington, who would receive same along with other voluntary donations of members and friends who may care to assist in the program of patriotism, history, and education as sponsored by these two organizations of native stock American citizens — The Sons of the American Revolution and the Sons of the Republic of Texas. It was agreed by those present at this luncheon that the Texas Compatriot could be supported and other contributions quickly followed Dr. Neeeham's and hence this explanation will suffice to make perfectly clear how my friend of 30 years standing deserved this tribute of appreciation from the Editor.

Elected to his first term at the last Congress of the National Society, held in Columbus, Ohio, May 21st 1941. Native Texan, born in Montgomery County, November 12, 1881. Graduate of the University of Texas. Admitted to the Texas Bar in 1903. A former District Judge and later a Judge of the Commission of Appeals of the Supreme Court of Texas for several years. A Vice-President of the Austin Mutual Life Insurance Company and a Director of American National Bank and a member of the American Law Institute which was endowed by the Carnegie Foundation. A member of the Committee appointed by the Supreme Court of Texas to revise the Rules of Civil Procedure and which were adopted and became effective in September of 1941. Member of the Patrick Henry Chapter No. 11 of Texas Society at Austin. President of Texas Society 1941. Married to Marian Leigh Rather; their issue was two sons, the oldest is Ben J. Powell, IV, born 1915. The other was Rawley Rather Powell, born 1918; died 1923.

The picture is made near the mantel and shows Mrs. Powell and her two granddaughters. The eldest is named for her maternal grandmother, Nancy Duncan Powell; the youngest is named for her paternal grandmother, Marian Rather Powell. Over the mantel may be seen a painted portrait of Captain Ben H. Powell IV, only living child of Judge and Mrs. Powell. Captain Powell was reared in Austin, where he attended the public schools until his graduation from High School. He next attended Virginia Military Institute, where he graduated with highest honors, being awarded the Jackson Hope Gold Medal. He was an honor man in the ROTC at V.M.I. and graduated with an A.B. degree and as Captain of Company E of the Cadet Corps. Because of his record at V.M.I., he was given a commission in the Reserve Corps of the United States Army as a 2nd Lieutenant of Artillery.

Ben H. Powell IV returned to his home in Austin, where he entered the Law Department of the University of Texas. Here he again excelled in scholarship, making an all A record in law and in due time received his degree, Bachelor of Law. He returned to the East and entered Harvard Law School, where he obtained the degree, Master of Law.

After all of the careful preparation and background of a thorough education in law, it was to be only for one year that Judge Powell was to have the pleasure and satisfaction of having his son with the firm Powell, Wirtz, Rauhut & Gideon (an outstanding law firm in both Austin and Texas). Long before the incident of Pearl Harbor or the Draft Law, young Powell came to his father and stated that as a true son of old Virginia Military Institute, he felt he must withdraw from the firm and ask for ACTIVE SERVICE in the United States Army, that he forsaw dark days for our beloved Country, and it was his duty to go wherever he could best serve.

No sooner had Ben H. Powell IV offered his services, than the Chief of Staff of the United States Army called him to Washington, DC, and where today he serves as a Captain of the United States Army, working on the Special Staff of the War Department at the Capitol.

Captain Powell married Miss Kitty King Corbett and he with his wife and 2 young daughters reside across the Potomac River from the City of Washington, in a residential district in the vicinity of the old home of General Robert E. Lee, Arlington. So, as the caption over the picture heading this article states, Judge and Mrs. Powell are looking forward to and counting the days until May 31, June 1, 2 and 3rd, 1942, will arrive, for on these days there will not only be the delightful days of attending the next Congress of the National Society, Sons of the American Revolution, but there will be in fact and in truth "A Family Reunion in old Williamsburg, Va."

# JOHN M. SPELLMAN NSSAR #40265 TSSAR #227 Dallas, Texas

John M. Spellman, of Dallas, was one of the first Texas lawyers to specialize in patent law, and in that special field he has become a recognized authority all over the Southwest. It has been said that the highest quality of legal skill is required in the drafting of patent claims, and the fact that in the thousands of cases where Judge Spellman has obtained patents for clients, not one has ever been declared invalid by the courts, is a direct and graphic manner of stating his qualifications and secure prominence in his profession.

Mr. Spellman, whose home is in Dallas, was born in that city and belongs to old and prominent ancestry. His parents were John and Florence Bell (Patterson) Spellman. His mother's father, Judge J. B. Patterson was the first merchant in Dallas and was also the first chief justice of Dallas County, arriving in that village in 1846, and he was also prominent in public affairs and politics. The father of Judge Patterson was Francis Patterson, a pioneer educator of the early West, whose brother Robert Patterson was a contemporary of Daniel Boone and was associated with the founding of Cincinnati, Ohio, Lexington, and other places in Kentucky.

John M. Spellman was educated in the public schools of Dallas and then went to Washington, D. C., where he studied law in Columbia, now George Washington University, being president of his class in 1897. He remained in Washington for a year or two and in 1899 returned to Dallas where he has since practiced law. Since 1905 he has been admitted to practice before the United States Supreme Court. Probably no other attorney in the Southwest has handled a larger and more important volume of patent law cases. Mr. Spellman represented as special counsel the City of Dallas in a very

notable case involving phases of patent law, known as the Traffic Signal case.

During his career as an attorney in Dallas, he has represented interests involving the most celebrated case in the history of the state, and has won these cases in opposition to some of the leading attorneys of the United States. As an orator, Mr. Spellman ranks with the foremost in the state and he is constantly in receipt of requests in small parts of the state to speak on a variety of subjects.

He is a man of great learning and versatile interests. He has long been prominent in Freemasonry; is active in Patriotic organizations, and was a means of service to his native state; he is founder and past president of the Texas Institute of Natural Resources and Industrial Development; is past State Governor of the Sons and Daughters of the Pilgrims; Past State President of the Sons of the Republic of Texas; President of the local Thomas J. Rusk Chapter of Dallas. He is also a member of the Jesse Watkins Chapter No. 12 of Arlington, Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution.

Since early manhood he has been a deep student of Masonry and much credit was given to him individually for the establishment in Dallas of the Scottish Rite Cathedral. For his services in Masonry he was awarded the Thirty-Third Degree Honorary in the Scottish Rite and is a past Master of all Scottish Rite Bodies in Dallas. He is a Past Potentate of Hella Temple Order of the Mystic Shrine; belongs to the Dallas Bar, the Texas State and American Bar Associations. During the first World he was a Four-Minute Speaker and member of the Legal Advisory board. (From Wharton's History of Dallas).

# MAJOR K. M. VAN ZANDT CHAPTER NO. 6 Fort Worth, Texas

This chapter was organized in the Directors Room of the Fort Worth National Bank on April 1st, 1932, with the following members of the Texas Society constituting the list of Charter Members; Elmer Renfro, Sam B. Cantey, Jr., Robert W. Fender, Samuel M. and Newton Gaines, Samuel A., Mor-

timer Lee, and Valin R. Woodward, Chas. L. Stowe, Jr., Chas. L. Rowan, Joe Ingraham, and Elias P. Van Zandt. The following officers were elected after Sam B. Cantey had acted as Temporary Chairman, and who had prepared the Constitution and By-laws with Joe Ingraham as Temporary Secretary; Elmer Renfro, President; Samuel M. Moore, Vice President and Chaplain; Robert W. Fender, Registrar; Joe Ingraham, Secretary-Treasurer. Board of Directors were, Sam B. Cantey, Jr., Valin R. Woodward, Newton Gaines, and E. P. Van Zandt.

Compatriot Van Zandt is a son of the late Major K. M. Van Zandt, for whom the chapter is named, and for whom the City of Fort Worth owes much for its progress and development during the past 60 years in religious, civic, and patriotic endeavors.

The organization of a local chapter in Fort Worth is due primarily to the persistent efforts of Compatriot Valin Woodward, who had previously sought and obtained the cooperation of the officers of the various Fort Worth chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution, in sponsoring a dinner on the lawn of the Woman's Club on Constitution Day, at which time there were present, President Edward M. Polk and other officers of the Texas Society.

#### IN MEMORIAM

# SAM HOUSTON WATKINS NSSAR #56570 TSSAR #507

Born 1866 Died 1941 Charter member of the Jesse Watkins Chapter No. 13.

It will be recalled by compatriots in attendance at the last annual meeting in Dallas last February 23, that the Necrology Committee did not include the name of our last Compatriot Sam Houston Watkins of the Jesse Watkins Chapter No. 13, who died at his home in Nacogdoches, April 19, 1941, in his 75th year. He was the son of Robert McCorkle Watkins and Sarah Jane Hayter; the grandson of Jesse Watkins, for whom his local SAR Chapter was named and of which he was a Charter Member. His death is the first to occur among the members of this unique Texas Society local chapter. The membership is composed entirely of the descendants of their noted Texas Ancestor, Jesse Watkins, who came to the Republic of Texas in 1834 at the urgent request of his old Tennessee friend and former neighbor - Sam Houston for whom he was named. The Texas Compatriot is very glad to give this notice of the loss within our active ranks of this good man and distinguished pioneer citizen of The Editor recalls with pleasure meeting Sam Houston Watkins shortly before his passing to the fathers, at the annual meeting of this local Chapter at the country place near Henderson, of his cousin, Dr. J. Ed Watkins, the President of the Jesse Watkins Chapter. As his picture above will indicate, he was one of those old strong type Texans - of whom we shall soon see no more, whose word was good as his bond. This was the reputation he bore in the community of Nacogdoches, where he was born and lived all of his life. He was a Director of the old Stone Fort National Bank of Nacogdoches at the time of his death. His passing was reported to the last annual meeting of his local chapter, where his kinsman, Judge Royall R. Watkins of Dallas, paid tribute to his life and achievements as a good citizen and widely known for his business acumen and his philanthropies. We regret that his name was unavoidably absent from the list handed to our Necrology Committee of the Texas Society. Strange as it may

seem, the last annual meeting of the Jesse Watkins Chapter was held at the spring in Tarrant County, near Arlington where Jesse Watkins is said to have lost his life at the hands of the Indians in the fall of 1838. He had been sent out to treat with the Indians by President Sam Houston and was accompanied by a Mexican interpreter, Sanchez by name, who escaped and returned to his people — some of whom returned later to this Spring with the Mexican. The property belongs to Compatriot Tom Cravens, a former president of Arlington Chapter No. 12 and a descendant of Jesse Watkins. The mother of our deceased compatriot Sam Houston Watkins, Jane Hayter, was a sister to the first Presbyterian preacher to come into and settle in the Arlington community, Rev. Andrew Shannon Hayter. He was also the first postmaster, the first school teacher and the first Master of the Arlington Masonic Lodge (1874).

# THE STORY OF THE FIVE BICENTENNIAL PATRIOTS PLAQUES TEXAS SOCIETY, SAR

It was during the Texas Centennial of 1936 that seven graves of Patriots of the American Revolution were recorded and marked. At the time the Texas Society, SAR, met in Convention at McAllen, Texas, in 1968, the list of names of Patriots had more than doubled. A resolution was adopted by the Board of Managers to commemorate the Patriots of the American Revolution who were buried in Texas. It was recognized that locations of some graves could not be determined exactly. A joint tribute was deemed most appropriate.

Compatriot Thomas T. Currie of the Graves Registration Committee undertook to collate the list of Patriots and to photograph as many grave sites as possible. With the advent of the American Bicentennial, interest quickened and others commenced discovering new names. SAR's, DAR's, American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas (established as the result of legislation promoted by Compatriot Weaver Moore in 1969), Institute of Texan Cultures, and others shared their information with us and vice versa.

At the Board of Managers meeting in Austin, July 26, 1975, Compatriot Randolph S. D. Lockwood of the Bicentennial Committee submitted a resolution to implement fully the McAllen resolution adopted in 1968. This new resolution, which was unanimously adopted, called for the casting of one or more Plaques listing the names of Patriots of the American Revolution who were buried in Texas, with all costs to be defrayed by voluntary contributions. A design was submitted and adopted for the final casting. President Joe M. Hill, Jr., appointed a Patriots Plaque Committee with Compatriot Neill F. Amsler, Jr., as chairman. As the meeting ended, Compatriot Frank Tritico suggested to Lockwood the name of a casting firm in San Antonio.

On July 28, 1975, following the Austin meeting, Compatriot Lockwood contacted the Southwell Company, a century-old firm that had cast the Texas Centennial markers, and obtained favorable estimates as to costs. These were reported to Chairman Amsler and President Hill. Compatriot Louis L. Casten donated his SAR Seal for the making of castings at the tops of the Plaques. Before any contract could be negotiated, funds had to be forthcoming.

Meanwhile, more names were added to the list until a final total of forty-six was obtained — nearly seven times the number on the initial list of forty years before! No new names have been reported in the ensuing years.

By the early part of 1976, the call for contributions had resulted in a flow of funds that far exceeded earlier expectations. In the end, there was a sufficiency to defray the cost of five bronze Plaques, dimensions of twenty by thirty inches, and each weighing sixty-three pounds. Following the State Convention in Dallas, March 19, 1976, a contract was signed with the Southwell Company. By May, the castings had been completed, in a superb manner, at a total cost of \$2,415. Final selected locations of the Plaques were as follows: Capitol Building, Austin; Hall of State, State Fair Grounds, Dallas; Fort Bliss, El Paso; War and Peace House, Sam Houston Museum, Huntsville; and Federal Building, San The Plaque in the last location was unveiled initially at the Bicentennial Ceremony in front of the Alamo, July 4, 1976, before a large assemblage; subsequently, it was installed in the lobby of the Federal Building, October 19, 1976, anniversary of the British Surrender at Yorktown three of the Patriots were present at the latter momentous



event. Within the year following the installation of the first Plaque, the remaining four were installed at their locations with appropriate ceremonies. Thanks to the good offices of Past President General Walter G. Sterling, approval was obtained from the Governor of Texas for installation of the Plaque in the Capitol; subsequent legislation permitted affixing the Plaque to the wall. President William T. Barron, cognizant District Vice Presidents and Chapters arranged for installations at the remaining locations. In the Summer of 1977 issue of the SAR Magazine, the Texas Society dedicated a page to the five Plaques.

#### THE PATRIOTS' FUND

At the 1976 State Convention in Corpus Christi, it was proposed that the Texas Society establish an agency within itself to accept donations to a Fund which would be expended exclusively in stimulating patriotism in our State. This proposal got underway in earnest at the State Convention in 1977 when a Committee was appointed, with General Kidwell as Chairman, to draft a charter for such a Fund, obtain tax exemption status from the Internal Revenue Service, and approval from the State of Texas.

Thanks to the work of our State Chancellor, Compatriot Elmer Ware Stahl, whose legal knowledge produced an outstanding document, a resolution was presented to the State Convention in 1978, which was adopted without change.

The State Society donated \$4,000.00, which together with the solicitation of membership donations brought the Fund to over \$10,000.00 by Convention time in 1979. Because the State Society did not receive approval of the Fund's Tax Exempt status from the Internal Revenue Service and the State of Texas until late in 1978, it was decided to classify contributors as Charter Donors until the 1980 State Convention.

The Patriot's Fund is managed by seven trustees, of which five are appointed and two elected, namely the Society's President and the Society's Chancellor. The State Society's Secretary-Treasurer serves the trustees as their Secretary-Treasurer, but is without vote in their deliberations. The appointed trustees were named for five, four, three, two and one year terms; thus the newly-elected State Society President, after each State Convention, must appoint a new trustee whose term will be for five years. The trustees then elect a chairman and a vice-chairman from within its membership.

It must be emphasized that the trustees are charged with wisely managing and investing the Fund. Only the members of the State Society at its annual conventions shall establish projects to be undertaken, and shall authorize appropriations from the Fund to support such projects. Only the interest earned from the Fund's corpus can be expended on such projects.

The Texas Society is one of the very few State Societies with such a purpose. The State of Maryland Society has established a similar Fund, using our charter as a basis for its own similar activity. Past President General Wilson King Barnes, a distinguished Maryland Judge, has commented most favorably on our charter as being a most outstanding model for such activities. He further states that our society is most fortunate to have as its chancellor such an able jurist to compose our Fund's Charter. With this accolade, donors may be assured that their contributions will be used for the purpose of installing patriotism and that only.

Funds are solicited at any time, but on the annual statement of dues, members are invited to augment their remittances with a specified donation to the Patriot's Fund. It is noteworthy that the Fund can accept cash or other assets from anyone and for any specified purpose or purposes, if such be within the scope of the basic charter of the Fund and our Society's charter from the National Society. Contributions are not restricted to Society members only. We hope to encourage contributions from any patriotic person or foundation. There are several classes of donors and certificates are presented to contributors indicating the category of the donation as follows:

For several years he was chairman of a subcommittee which handled important defense legislation; was author of Family Survivors' Assistance legislation, and other important military measures - including personnel matters, reserve and National Guard measures, Service Academies, etc. In Congress he was a leading authority on wool, mohair and livestock; was co-author of National Wool Act and other livestock related matters. 

TSSAR State Historian March 1976-Indef.

Biographical Information: Born November 9, 1921, in Russell County, Hansonville, Virginia, (Russell County, Virginia, named in honor of General William A. Russell of Revolutionary War fame). Compatriot Jessee attended public schools in Russell County, Town of Lebanon, Virginia. Graduated from high school at age 16 years. Began working at the Tennessee Eastman Corporation, Kingsport, Tennessee, at age 17 through the help of Senator William A. Buckles, his father's cousin, who was aware of his deep rooted desire to become an Attorney at Law. It was necessary for him to work to save money to attend Cumberland University Law School at Lebanon, Tennessee, the United States' best pre-law school, which was the Alma Mater of Cordell Hull. He saved enough money to attend pre-law at Cumberland University. Adolph Hitler cut short his ambition to become an Attorney at Law. He was about to be drafted, but chose to take the Aviation Cadet Examination, which he passed, which began his training as Aircraft Pilot which he successfully completed in June, 1943, (Class 43F). He was chosen by his officer peers to be Aircraft Commander or first pilot in the United States Army Air Corps' heaviest bomber aircraft. These large bombers he flew, began with B-24s, B-17s and on to B-29s, B36s, B-47s and B-52s.

Service to the U.S. Army Air Corps and Air Force: Was commissioned 2nd Lt. Aircraft Pilot in June, 1943, and began his career as Aircraft Commander, First Pilot Heavy Bombers. Flew combat missions against the Nazi War Machine in B-24s and B-17s. Helped burn down Japanese cities and factories flying B-29s in World War II. Also actively engaged in combat against North Korea. Also engaged in two tours of combat duty isolated/remote against North Vietnam. He received many high decorations during his continuous active duty in the Army Air Corps and Air Force, i.e. Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star, Legion of Merit, Air Medal with Silver Cluster, Presidential Unit Citation, Air Force Commendation Medals, Meritorious Service Award, also fifteen other medals and awards of lesser recognition. He served 29½ years continuous active duty and was retired at his highest reserve officer rank in AUS (ROPA) LTC. He never applied for a regular commission due to his indecision about pursuing his law degree. He was twice caught in the active duty Reserve Officer Reduction in force action during permanent change of station from overseas back to U.S. Air Force Bases, at which time he served active duty time as Master Sergeant, Senior Master Sergeant and Chief Master Sergeant. He held his inactive reserve commission while serving as an enlisted man. He states that his time as an active duty non-commissioned officer was of paramount importance in his military career. He refers to it as his hardest working and learning period of his military career. He retired from the Air Force in November, 1971. He spent many years in the Strategic Air Command under the outstanding Commander, Curtis E.

Civic Organizations: After retiring from the Air Force, he soon realized he could not cope with idleness and became an international member of the Lions Club. Then he became very interested, as is the trait of all his ancestors, in Colonial and Revolutionary History, thus he became a member of the Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution on the 15th day of March, 1974. He was immediately elected as Chairman of the State Awards and Decoration Committee, which he tried desperately in many ways to improve the image of the TSSAR. His persistence was honorably noted by the TSSAR Board of Managers. At the state convention in the latter part of 1975, he was nominated and elected to the office of TSSAR Historian 1976.1977, then was re-elected 1977 to date. When elected to this office, he was very disappointed to find that since the TSSAR fraternity was chartered on December 8, 1896, that no previous historian had collected, collated and bound any fraternity history. He was given less than a dozen (12) pages of past TSSAR History. That was the day he really got disgusted, bound and determined that he would build a TSSAR History that would not be surpassed, or near what he was determined to do for the TSSAR. He also decided that no other State Historian could or would surpass him. He began his campaign by every means available to him. He begged, fussed, badgered, grumbled, pampered, reminded, called by long distance telephone, prayed, drove all over the state until all Texas Compatriots decided the best way to shut him up was to go through every TSSAR paper they had and send any information to him. Then came the windfall, out of attics, stored away old dead papers, back of closets, out of rat eaten boxes, old offices, grandfather clocks, personal files and every other conceivable place, then it all started a flood in to him. To date he has thirteen (13) neatly commercially bound Volumes of TSSAR History, total thickness two (2) feet. He is now working on Volume 14 to be in book form with the picture of every TSSAR compatriot and their biography. Howard has often quoted the world wide Jessee Motto: "I am only one, but I am one. I can't do everything, but I can do something. What I can do, I ought to do, and what I ought to do, by the grace of God I will do." On the 12th day of March, 1976, he

became a member of the Somerset Chapter Magna Charta Barons by being direct lineal descendant (non-collateral) of four (4) of the twenty-five (25) Magna Charta Barons, namely, Barons Richard DeClare, Gilbert DeClare, Saire DeQuincy and William DeMalet. This honorable Christian Patriotic Society has recently requested compatriot Jessee's assistance in historical record keeping. On March 31, 1978, Compatriot Jessee was awarded the Gold Good Citizenship Medal by the TSSAR Board of Managers. He was a member of the National SAR Public Relations Committee.

Immediate Family: Thirty-one (31) years ago, Compatriot Jessee married Miss Gladys Von Böhlen who is a direct lineal descendant of the Von Böhlen and Von Krupf families of Hamburg, Germany. Graber Kidwell was born in Dallas, Texas on February 4, 1910 where he went to public school and later was graduated from Texas A&M University in 1932 where he was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in Field Artillery Reserve.

He was active in the Field Artillery Reserve until December, 1940 when he was called to active duty at Fort Sill, Oklahoma where he commanded a School Troops Battery and

later a Training Battalion. During this time, he attended the Field Artillery School Field Officer's Course and the Command and General Staff School at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. He went overseas in August, 1974 to the European Theater as Executive Officer of the 401st Field Artillery Group, later commanded the 745th Field Artillery Battalion, later commanded the 94th Division Artillery in combat. After World War II, he was assigned as Public Utilities Officer for the U.S. Forces in Austria in Vienna with the responsibility of getting the power plants and transmission lines back into operation. He was separated from active duty in June, 1946, with the rank of Colonel. He remained active in the Army Reserve commanding the XXXIII Corps Artillery and later the 90th Division Artillery where he was promoted to the rank of Brigadier General, AUS in 1956. He was statutory retired in June, 1962 as Brigadier General, AUS.


General Kidwell is a Registered Professional Engineer, Civil in Texas and is President of the Kidwell Construction Company, a highway general contracting company specializing in bridges, underpasses and overpasses, underground work and the like. He is a member of the Preston Hollow Presbyterian Church in Dallas, the American and Texas Society of Professional Engineers, the Associated General Contractors of America, the Retired Officers Association, the Military Order of World Wars, the Reserve Officers Association, the Association of the United States Army, the National Rifle Association, the Association of Former Students Texas A&M University, and the Sons of the American Revolution.

General Kidwell presided over the Texas Society's 75th Diamond Anniversary Convention in Dallas March 24-25, 1972, whence he turned over the gavel to Colonel Karl E. Wallace.



ROBERT LEE LOCKWOOD NSSAR #181134 TSSAR #1247

He is a tenth generation descendant of Robert Lockwood (about 1600-1658) who arrived in Massachusetts in 1630 with the Winthrop Fleet from England. In a short time, Robert Lockwood settled in Connecticut and became a Sergeant in the Fairfield Regiment of Fairfield County, Connecticut. Twenty-three male descendants of Robert Lockwood served in the American Colonial Wars and 156 entered the armed forces during the American Revolutionary War.

Robert Lockwood's son, Jonathan Lockwood (1634-1688) became a member of the Connecticut Colonial Assembly for four years. Later, he served as a justice of the peace and held the rank of Lieutenant, Chief in Command of the Greenwich, Connecticut Militia. Upon his death, the townspeople met and passed a resolution "deploring the loss of so valuable a citizen."

Jonathan's son, Gershom Lockwood (1676-1762), became a deputy of the Colonial Assembly of Connecticut in 1726 and Gershom's son, Nathan Lockwood (1704-about 1761) served as a volunteer in the Connecticut Militia that marched to the relief of Fort William Henry in 1757 during the French and Indian War.

Nathan's grandson, William Lockwood (1753-1837) served as a volunteer member of the New York lines which engaged the invading army of the British Generals Howe and Cornwallis during the Battle of Flatbush, Long Island on the road to Brooklyn, New York. Although the Americans were outnumbered 10 to 1, William Lockwood survived the Battle of Flatbush which began shortly before daylight on August 27, 1776, in unseasonably cold weather. Afterwards, he was with the miserable and beaten American forces that camped with General Washington in Harlem Heights, New York where the patriots won a morale boosting skirmish against the British

troops on September 16, 1776, in the Battle of Harlem Heights. In 1780, William Lockwood volunteered into the whale and gunboat service under the command of Colonel Jabez Fitch. During this tour of service, Lockwood was wounded in the capture of a ten-gun British sloop. Following the Revolution, William Lockwood moved his family from Connecticut to New York.

Again, on his paternal side, Lee Lockwood is a descendant of Peter Crans (1747-1813) who served as Quartermaster in the Phillips Regiment, New York Troops. In December 1877, James Harvey Lockwood, the father of Lee Lockwood moved with his parents from New York to Navarro County, Texas, and settled in Rice, Texas. In 1888, the Lockwood family established their permanent home in Waco, Texas. He was born in Waco, Texas, November 11, 1900 and married Marie Coates in 1923. Children include Ann Marie (Mrs. Duncan C. Howard) and Mrs. Laurine Lockwood Dosher, four grand-daughters and one great-granddaughter and one great-grandson.

**Education:** Graduated from Waco High School in 1918, University of Texas 1918-1922, Honorary Degree Doctor of Law, Baylor University, 1960.

ROBERT LEON SONFIELD NSSAR #29478 TSSAR #162 Deceased

He was born March 6, 1893, at Nacogdoches, Texas. His father was Leon Sonfield, then a Methodist Preacher, and his mother was Martha Chapman, a daughter of Captain Robert Duncan Chapman, a well known Confederate Veteran who came to Texas in 1865. His parents moved to Galveston, Texas, where his father was pastor of St. James Methodist Church, then the largest in Texas. Shortly thereafter his father resigned the active ministry, became a lawyer, subsequently serving as a Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas. The family was living in Galveston at the time of the great hurricane of 1900, managed to survive, and thereafter moved to Beaumont, Texas. He received his early education in Allen Academy, Bryan, Texas, and his college education in the academic and law departments of the University of Texas, with post graduate law at Columbia University in New York, being admitted to the Bar in 1914, before completing his law course. He engaged in the practice of law after returning to Beaumont in June, 1916. He was appointed U.S. Commissioner for the Eastern District of Texas, with headquarters at Beaumont. He became a member of the law firm of Sonfield, King and Sonfield. Soon World War I intervened and he volunteered for service on the day of the declaration of a state of war. He enlisted in the Texas Guards, April 6, 1917, and entered the Officers Training Camp at Leon Springs, May 4, 1917. He was appointed 2nd Lt., Fifth Infantry, T.N.G., and assigned to Company G, and subsequently transferred to Company B, 143rd Infantry, Thirty-Sixth Division. He sailed with the First Battalion, 143rd Infantry, from Newport News, Virginia, for Camp Aldershot, near Halifax, Nova Scotia, for an exhibition review before the Governor General of Canada, thence for France, where his Battalion rejoined the 36th Division, which participated in the Champaigne offensive and the Meuse-Argonne offensive. He was promoted to the rank of 1st Lt. in August 1918, appointed as aerial observer of the 36th Division, later rejoining his division. After the armistice in 1918, he was detailed as a member of the Inter-Allied Commission on the repatriation of Russian and allied prisoners of war, and the American Military Mission with headquarters at Berlin, Germany, in charge of the supervision of all prison camps in which allied and Russian prisoners were confined, and distribution of food therein. He received a citation from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs of Great Britain for the aid he rendered British prisoners of war, and letters of commendations from General John J. Pershing, General George H. Harries, and from Lt. Col. Carl Taylor. Upon his release from the Army he resumed the practice of law at Houston, Texas, and continued until the outbreak of World War II. He was recalled to active duty in the early part of 1942, served for a time with the parachute troops, and was subsequently assigned to the Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia as Staff Judge Advocate. At the request of the Army, he wrote a textbook on Military Justice, "A Guide for the Administration of Military Justice," printed by the Army in two editions which was widely used as a textbook, and also at the Nuremberg Trials. He retired with the rank of Lt. Col., and in October of 1946, returned to private law practice in Houston. Late in the fifties he and his son, Robert Jr., formed the partnership of Sonfield and Sonfield. Mr. Sonfield was authorized to practice law before all the courts of Texas, Federal Courts, Supreme Court of the U.S., all governmental tax agencies and the U.S. Court. He was an active member of the SAR for more than fifty years, having joined on March 18, 1918. He claimed membership through his great-great-grandfather, William Chapman, who served as Sergeant in Captain Uriah Goodwin's Company, Third South Carolina Regiment of Continental Troops. He served both the State and National Societies in numerous capacities, such as President of local and state society; Secretary-Treasurer of both, Chancellor of the State Society. He served as National Trustee and was a member of the Executive Committee several years. He was Chancellor General in 1961-1962 and he was President General in 1963-1964. For many years, he regularly attended the National Congresses and the Executive Committee Meetings. He served on the Americanism and American Sovereignty Committees; the Implementation of our Chartered Purposes; and the Resolutions Committee for three National Congresses. Among the outstanding awards he received for his services were: the Minute Man Award; the Patriots Award; the Gold Good Citizenship Award and the Silver Good Citizenship Award. He was active in civic and veterans organizations, was District Commander of the eighth district of the American Legion and for over twenty years served on the Official Board of his church. The law firm of Sonfield and Sonfield served as the attorneys during the development of Valley Inn & Country Club at Brownsville, Texas. Due to the demands of the work, Mr. Sonfield moved to that location in January, 1971. He had hoped that he would enjoy semi-retirement in a very pleasant-like area. But that was not to be - his death came rather suddenly on June 24, 1972. A courageous compatriot — he loved his country, and served it in War and Peace, speaking out firmly for his beliefs. A devoted husband and father; a true Patriot and Friend, his memory shall be cherished always. He married Dorothy Huber in 1927 and she died in 1949. They had two sons, Robert L. Sonfield, Jr. and Richard Huber Sonfield. Married Margie Whitson Erwin in 1952. One stepson, Thomas S. Erwin. There are seven grandchildren and two step-grandchildren. His Revolutionary ancestor is William Chapman of South Carolina.

JOSEPH GARLAND BARCUS NSSAR #72825 TSSAR #887 President, Patrick Henry Chapter from 1954-1956

He was born June 24, 1896, at Clarendon, Donley County, Texas, the son of James Samuel Barcus and Minerva Florence Williams. At that time the father, a descendant of a long line of Methodist ministers and educators, was president of Clarendon College, a Methodist school. The other children were a daughter who died in infancy, a younger daughter — Annie Edward — who died in 1976, and a son, James Samuel, Junior, who died in 1973.

Garland's childhood and youth were spent in "The Parsonages" of the Methodist churches in many towns in Texas. His were the usual educational advantages that went with a household dedicated to the betterment of life, and in the atmosphere of schools and colleges where his father occupied high positions. He earned the B.A. Degree from Southwestern University and the B.B.A. Degree from the University of Texas.

His marriage to Miss Jacque (Bessie Hazel) Jordan in Somerville, Texas, April 6, 1920, lasted fifty-two years, until his death in 1972.

He was a practicing public accountant most of his adult life. In addition to his B.B.A. degree, he studied constantly and took many courses to keep abreast of the times. His success can be measured by the fact that for more than twenty years he had supervision of the business management of the Texas Schools and Colleges of higher learning in Texas. He was largely instrumental in compiling a manual for the guidance of State Schools in the administration of business management of these schools. Perhaps the greatest indication of the quality of his work was that in 1962. A & M University sent him to East Pakistan on a two-year tour of duty as Management Consultant for the East Pakistan Agricultural Universities.

His physical health that under girded his activities was exceptionally good until after his return from Pakistan in late 1964, when he had a light attack of gout resulting from a difficult dietary situation and had his first experience in a hospital. He was always men-

tally alert. His perception was keen, his attention span was excellent, and his memory was exceptional. His reasoning ability and judgment were of high rank.

In every aspect of his life, Garland Barcus was a moral man. He was deeply religious in a quiet way, and in times of stress relied heavily on Bible lessons for consolation. He was keenly appreciative of good music, though he played no instrument. His courage, his well-controlled temper and a keen sense of humor helped make his life a pleasant experience. He was an active member of the Methodist Church and always contributed to worthy causes. His last few years were spent as a weekly attendant in association with a Presbyterian Church and as a contributor, though he never severed his relations with a Methodist Church.

In his ready willingness to do his share for needy humanity, Garland became an active member and officer of the Lions Club and later the Rotary Club, bowled on a Kiwanis team and participated in their charitable projects. He was a long time 32nd degree Mason, having been Master of University Lodge No. 1190, a member of the Austin Commandry, and Master of all four Lodges of the Scottish Rite Bodies in Austin, Texas, as well as a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor of the Scottish Rite, and a member of Ben Hur Shrine, having been a permanent contributor to the Shriners' Crippled Children's Hospitals. His many interests included genealogy, which he used to help many others in their research. He was registered as a Certified Genealogist in England. Also, he was one of a small group including his wife who founded the Austin Genealogical Society.

Mr. Barcus never held any civil office, but he volunteered at an early age for service in World War I, where he served as a non-commissioned officer, Sergeant First Class, and was honorably discharged March 29, 1918, at Camp Bowie, Texas, his discharge listing his character as "Excellent."

His patriotism was never questioned. He worked untiringly to perpetuate the principles in which he believed.

Garland Barcus was a charter member of the Society of Colonial Wars when it was instituted in Texas. He served as Governor General of the Texas Society. He was Treasurer General of the Society of the War of 1812, and held membership in the Texas Sons of the Confederacy.

Garland served two terms as President of the Patrick Henry Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution from 1954 through 1956 when the Chapter was greatly in need of his enthusiastic leadership. In 1958 he served on the Board of mangers of the Texas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

His membership in S.A.R. derives from the services of his great-great-grandfather, William Barcus, who emigrated from England shortly before the Revolution and volunteered in the Maryland militia. His descent is through five generations of the male line of Barcuses.

Garland died April 19, 1972, in St. David's Community Hospital in Austin after eighteen months of treatment for cancer. In his funeral services at Weed-Corley Funeral Chapel, Minister Ed Salvant of Wilshire Presbyterian Church, Austin, was assisted by Garland's cousin, Reverend V. Cyrus Barcus, a retired Methodist Minister from Waco. Burial was in the Master's Section of the Masonic Garden in Capital Memorial Park, with Vernon K. Calloway 32° conducting the Masonic Internment Ritual and Masonic brothers as pallbearers.

The sounding of taps for Garland marked the end of a long, useful life, an example to so many.

Mr. Brown was born March 31, 1890, on a ranch near the city of Cherokee, in San Saba County, Texas.

He is the son of Joe Frazer Brown and Dorothy Wadsworth, there was one son born to this holy union, namely, Joseph Murchison Brown. Mr. Joseph Joshua Brown is blessed with four grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren. His father graduated from the University of Mississippi in 1862 and later moved to San Saba County, Texas, and became the sheriff and later county judge of that county and later was elected State Legislative Representative for that District. He also fought in the Civil War in the Confederate Army with the rank of 1st Lieutenant in Company "G", 1st Heavy Texas Artillery.

Joseph Joshua Brown received his Bachelor and Masters Degrees from Texas A & M in 1912 and taught in the public schools of Texas. During World War I, he commanded the Fourth Trench Battalion in France

He was appointed Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture in the State Department of Education, and as such, published a bulletin on Exhibits for State Fairs. In 1929, J. J. Brown moved the State of Texas into the vocational rehabilitation limelight. Although the federal program was ten years old, Texas had not seen fit to move towards that program. Mr. Brown wrote the 1929 law, and talked to enough committees, legislators and government leaders until that Division was created and placed in the State Department of Education. The State Superintendent appointed J. J. Brown to start the program effective September, 1929, and he remained as the Director of Vocational Rehabilitation Department until his retirement after thirty years, July 2, 1960. Under his leadership, the Rehabilitation Division became one of the leaders in the United States and still maintains that record.

Originally, the work of the Rehabilitation Division encompassed all disabled including the blind, but Mr. Brown and others quickly saw that work with the blind could best be done by a full time effort, therefore, Mr. Brown was instrumental in passing the law setting up the State Commission for the Blind in 1931.

Again, in 1933, Mr. Brown was able to talk an economy minded Ma Ferguson (Governor) into a whole new program — a Crippled Children's Division which Mr. Brown administered (along with rehabilitation until 1943, when the Federal Rehabilitation Office decided the two divisions should be separated.

In 1936-1937, J. J. Brown administered the FERA program which allowed us to take disabled persons off the relief rolls and rehabilitate them with funds provided wholly from the Federal Education Rehabilitation Act. He also had under his direction the Disability Determination Division for Social Security. Mr. Brown served as President of the National Rehabilitation Association, and is a life member. He is also a life member of the Texas Rehabilitation Association.

It was a lucky day for Texas rockhounds when J. J. Brown decided to become a rock hound.


There had been other hobbies — digging in Indian mounds for arrowheads and artifacts, collecting rare cacti, and playing golf, to name a few, each one pursued with the same fervor as he hunted rocks.

In April, 1947, J. J. Brown was elected President of the State Mineral Society of Texas at the annual meeting in the Plaza Motel in San Antonio. At that time there were only two mineral societies in Texas the Texas Mineral Society composed of Dallas members, and the State Mineral Society of Texas. The president of the Society forgot about the meeting in San Antonio, and Mr. Brown was attending to State business and could not attend. He was notified by mail of his election, and was given the names of a handful of persons scattered around the State, and a bank balance of no dollars and no cents! Did that bother the newly elected president? I should say not. He immediately got out a newsletter to each of the members and to any one else in the State who said he was interested in rocks. Before long, the membership had increased and interest in rock hunting was growing.

In April, 1948, the State Mineral Society of Texas held a show at the Driskill Hotel, a first for Austin. Letters were sent to out of state dealers asking them to come to the show — but then Mr. Brown went one step further. He told the out of state people if they couldn't come to the show, send an exhibit and he would put it up, and return it after the show. The response was overwhelming — he even had to rent space for the exhibits to the Driskill Hotel. Some were too big to go in the elevator and were raised to the second floor from the outside.

Mr. Brown served as President until 1950, but he is just as enthusiastic about gems and minerals and rock shows as ever, and you will see a dozen or more cases of beautiful material exhibited by him each year.







He is a licensed attorney, as well as a Certified Public Accountant, in the State of Texas.



In 1942, he enlisted for service with the newly formed Transportation Corps and requested an overseas assignment. His unit departed New York in early 1943 and landed in Oran, North Africa. It was due to Mr. Linville's willing him a well improved eleven hundred acre cotton plantation in Robertson County near Marlin, Texas, on the Brazos River that he was able to receive a start on his long and

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active ranching and farming career. It was on this plantation in 1934 that he became the first farmer in the Brazos Valley in Robertson County to turn to the raising of alfalfa seen as a cash crop. He attended Southeastern State Teachers College in 1937-38 and transferred to Oklahoma A & M College (now Oklahoma State University) in 1938. His major studies included: campusology, science, history and government, and he received a BA degree in 1941. He was accepted to the University of Oklahoma Medical School and received a reserve commission as 2nd Lt. MAC in October, 1941. His medical studies were interrupted by Pearl Harbor, and he was assigned to active duty December 8, 1941. He married Grace Louise Phillips of Watonga, Oklahoma on December 20, 1941, in an Episcopal Ceremony at the Presbyterian Church of Watonga. After receiving a Bronze Star and Silver Star and Purple Hearts in the South Pacific and the Aleutian Islands he received an Honorable Discharge September 25, 1945, with the rank of Major. His final assignment with the Army of the US was as Post Exchange officer at Tinker Air Force Base in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. He did not continue with the study of medicine after WWII but instead went to work for the Boy Scouts of America as a Professional Scouter. His first assignment with the Boy Scouts was in New Mexico. He worked Hobbs, Roswell and Clovis until 1948. His wife gave birth to a daughter in Roswell, Patricia Louise. From

New Mexico they were transferred to the lower Rio Grande Valley at Brownsville. He worked all the Valley including Raymondville, Edenhert, Starr and Zebeda Counties except McAllen, Mission and Harlingen. They had a son born in Brownsville, Joe Ben Hunsaker III. 

### CHARLES PRESTON HUTSON NSSAR #105987 TSSAR #2749

Charles, the eldest sibling of six, was born March 29, 1908, in Lufkin to Womack and Fannie Inez (Gann)) Hutson. He was named for two uncles: Charles Gann and Preston Hutson. Of the six, Charles Preston, Robert Vance, Fred Allison and Elgin James are members of the Lt. Nathan Gann Chapter of TSSAR and descended from Lt. Nathan Gann. At this writing in October 1978, Elgin James headed the chapter. Genealogical information for eligibility as member of SAR was researched by esteemed relative Jessie Louise (Wright) Jordan and her compatriot husband, Leland T. Jordan, since departed. Charles is a Charter Donor to the Patriot's Fund. After three sons and one daughter had arrived, Womack, who said Lufkin at that time was too evil a community in which to rear a family, decided to leave it. He packed the family aboard a train and the first destination was a prairie community called Treadway in West Texas. He had attended Huntsville Teachers College, had a permanent certificate to teach and was to take a teaching job in Treadway. He had also served as an attorney and land surveyor in Trinity and Angelina Counties. To a child in Treadway, compelling memories were the grinding windmill, the little surface tank of water, the distant and lonely howls of nightly prowling coyotes and the underground hurricane cellar in which the family took refuge for a night while the storm blew over. Later the family went to Gail in Borden County where another son, Fred Allison was born. Charles, who had been tutored at home by his mother Inez, was promoted to the second grade the first day at school and two days later was thrashed because he arrogantly teased a girl seatmate. His father demonstrated that he had not been idly talking when he stated that any whipping suffered in school would

be matched by one at home. The family later moved to O'Donnell in Lynn County to another teaching job. Charles and some companions there learned what sick and miserable reactions beginners inflict upon themselves when they first try smoking tobacco. The next stop across the state of New Mexico was Mesa, Arizona where the family learned about planting, irrigating, chopping, cultivating and picking cotton as tenant farmers. Long staple cotton was then selling for around a dollar and up per pound. Due to high temperatures, work in the fields was started early in the morning. After a midday lunch respite in the shade, there would be a late afternoon return to the fields to remain until one was too weary to continue. On one particular day at 11:00 a.m. a reading of 114° was noted in the shade of the blackberry vines. Charles' first full season of picking cotton netted \$30.00, of which \$28.00 was spent for a Sears Roebuck bicycle. After buying the first automobile, a 1920 model 490 Chevrolet touring car, the family moved to the Mormon community of Franklin in Eastern Arizona. There Charles was one of six in the seventh and eighth grades in a two room school house. His father, Womack, was the teacher and his dedication, interest, clarity, and perseverance in finding and imparting facts and truths have been sources of admiration since. On the other hand, Charles was verbally and properly chastised for trading his father's 410 gauge shotgun for a 22 caliber repeating rifle that had seen better years. The last child, Elgin James arrived in Franklin. Charles later attended Duncan High School, participated in the ROTC program and played catcher on the baseball team because the coach had not detected any blinking on his part when the batter missed the pitch. A neighbor by the name of Crocket was a relative of another one by the name of David. The family returned to Mesa, then Chandler and Tempe, all within a few miles of each other. At Chandler the family lived near an ostrich farm and the children would lure them to the fence with tufts of grass and try to pluck tail feathers. Charles played hooky from school the one, and only one, time with a companion whose last name was Clemens (a distant relative of Mark Twain). During vacation from high school, Charles and a chum journeved into the mountains about sixty miles east of Mesa where Paramount Pictures was filming Zane Grey's Light of Western Stars. He and his friend were avid would-be cowboys and hoped to secure jobs as movie extras. Failing in this they stayed around several days watching Jack Holt, Billie Dove, Noah Beery and others in the cast do their scenes. A publicity man apparently thinking Charles was an extra interviewed him briefly and later wrote about the teenage rider too young for a beard being on location for filming Light of Western Stars. On another occasion, Charles went to Continental, Arizona, a community south of Tucson, with a family and assisted the father and son build and operate a cotton gin to clean, seed and bale cotton being grown on the 3,000 acre farm there. The acreage had once been used to grow guayule plants from which rubber could be extracted. From Tempe a short foray was made to Long Beach, California, where Charles worked as a boilermaker helper on Terminal Island erecting a power plant. One day while basking in the sun on the beach, he detected a girl swimmer in trouble about a hundred yards into the surf. He went to her and after considerable effort, including a large swallow of salt water, he maneuvered her out of the water. Exhausted, he lay down on the sand with a queasy stomach to recover. The distraught girl recognized friends and joined them. It was much later that he realized that the girl had not taken the trouble to thank him for saving her life. He returned again to Temple in order to be a part in the family trek back to East Texas in two, not always, dependable cars. He secured a job with the Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company and worked up from a casting chipper to operator of a large radial drill press. The job was interesting and finally paid \$3.00 per day but one day in an uncalled for sense of dedication and frustration at being unable to secure immediately a specific drill he needed he resigned in a huff. This was a mistake since in 1927, jobs for his skill were scarce and available ones became less desirable as time went on. Somewhat dispirited, he went to Houston in the fall of 1929 and enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps. At Parris Island, South Carolina, at the training center he measured 5 feet and 8 inches in height and weighed 132 pounds. That wasn't enough. The training authorities decided, however, to request a waiver from Washington, DC and when granted the rigors of training began. The sand fleas were sticky about the eyes, nose and ears and the "boot" was not permitted the unmilitary-like swipe at them while in ranks. In September the sun was either burning or hidden behind dark clouds while the rain poured. Because of his height and ROTC training, he was made squad leader of the 8th squad in the platoon. This, an end squad, would at times lead the other seven in sometimes complicated maneuvers. There was great joy when the "boots" finally heard no more taunts of "You, clown straighten that line", "You awkward clodhopper, get in step" and "Whoever told you that you could be a Marine?" and like challenges and were sent to operating posts. After "boot" camp, Charles was sent to Brown Field, in Quantico, Virginia. He had requested training as a pilot but learned that the waiting list would require at least a three year wait. A son of a former senator from Texas, however, remained on the list less than a month it was currently rumored. After less than a month in March 1930, he has hustled out of the mess hall into a Ford Trimotor transport airplane and deposited with five others at the Naval Air Station, Anacostia, D.C. The station was located on the east bank at the confluence of the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers. The small group was to assist with preparations for a forthcoming seaplane race. Glenn L. Curtis, head of a large engine and aircraft manufacturing company sponsored the annual event which was usually held in June. Charles was assigned to the flight test office, although his qualification was officially recorded as aircraft mechanic. However, seeing newly designed and manufactured airplanes, monitoring their performance potentials as developed by the flight test pilots, assisting in preparing reports to headquarters, learning later that some had gone into operation in the Marine Corps and Navy fleets and realizing that he was associated with such national efforts was tremendously rewarding. Sometimes visitors at NAS Anacostia, DC were Will Rogers, Eleanor Roosevelt, Charles and Anne Lindbergh, Wiley Post. An almost everyday visitor was Ernie Pyle, then an aviation writer for the Washington Daily News. Physically, Ernie was small but a giant in his dedication and skillful reporting of the plight of the GI's in World War II. He was incomparable. After the seaplane race, Charles and another Marine were told that a request for continuance of their services had been made and if granted by Brown Field, they would stay at Anacostia temporarily at least and be recommended to the Marine Corps candidates for commission class. After months of study reaching the approximate level of a college associate degree, they took the entrance examinations in the ten required subjects. However, Charles failed two of the mathematical subjects. The other Marine succeeded, became an officer, also an aviator and later retired as a colonel. A private just prior to this time was paid \$21.00 per month but had to contribute 20 cents to the Navy for reimbursement for medical and health care costs. Charles had qualified on the rifle range as a sharpshooter which provided a \$3.00 a month bonus. However, the Marine Corps terminated that program and when President Franklin D. Roosevelt reduced all federal salaries by 15%, Charles' pay dropped to \$17.65 (less 20 cents) per month until a short time later when he was made a corporal. After being discharged in 1936, Charles qualified through Civil Service examination and accepted a low grade typist position at the Naval Gun Factory, also within the District of Columbia. Within a year, he returned to the flight test section at the NAS, this time with the same duties but in Civilian clothes. In August 1938, he and Sylvia Fay Lorenz were married in the National City Christian Church Washington, DC. She, from Missouri, was a low grade government typist also, and they were promoted up the ladder almost simultaneously for several years. In November 1948, their daughter Karen Rae Hutson was delivered by Caesarian Section, but lived only about 60 hours due to a malformation of the heart. She was a so-called "Blue-Baby". Earlier in 1943, he was transferred with the flight test facilities to the newly commissioned Flight Test Center at Patuxent River, Maryland on Chesapeake Bay. There, as the ranking clerk and officer manager in the flight test unit he had the pleasure of serving some who became famous later. Among them, Paul H. Ramsey was the director of flight tests and became famous later as the leader of "Ramsey's Labsies" off Korea. Also, as test pilots, were the then Navy's leading aces, Noel A.M. Gayler and Najeeb Halaby, who later became a high government official. Halaby also became head of a major airline and through the marriage of his daughter in 1978, father-in-law of the King of Jordan. Charles returned to the NAS, Anacostia in 1945 and became chief clerk; a short time later to be assigned as the industrial relations officer (civilian personnel officer). However, another move took place soon after when officers, enlisted personnel and civilian


employees, along with their duties, were sent about ten miles away to the east to the Andrews Air Force Base in Maryland. Most of the civilian employees were reduced in force, therefore, Charles, to avoid demotion, accepted a transfer to the Washington Navy Yard. He became an employee-management relations specialist, a small duck in a larger pond. A heart attack in March 1969, temporarily slowed his activities and in October 1969, with 38 years of creditable service he retired. In the meantime, all the family siblings had married, gone into business or joined the armed forces and been discharged. Womack, the father, had finally stopped teaching and was elected to the position of Trinity County Judge. Sylvia retired from the State Department in August 1977, as an international economist. At this writing they live in Takoma Park, Maryland, a suburb of Washington, DC. They display a number of bowling trophies, most of which she earned and a few earned by the two of them as a team. Charles has golf trophies and the two have hopes of procuring some more lapidary equipment with which they expect to form, grind and polish stones, do silversmithing and create jewelry in an amateur sense. Revolutionary ancestor is Lt. Nathan Gann, Virginia.

He was born November 20, 1916, to John I. Mays and Lena C. Scholle. His father, a Civil Engineer, owned the Pittsburgh Steel Erection Co., Pittsburgh, Pa. The capacity of his work was (as the title implies) erection of structural steel in buildings, warehouses, on road construction, etc. The major portion of his working years was spent in serving the Pittsburgh Steel Erection Co. as office man-

ager intermingled with bookkeeping and other subsidiary phases of office managing. The relationship was dissolved only with his father's sudden and tragic demise, from a coronary occlusion in early January of 1963. The remainder of his working years were divided in various types of jobs from the East Coast all the way into the Hawaiian Islands. When unengaged, with employment, he turned to various types of historical research...something in which and from which he extracts a great deal of pleasure. His formal education was completed with the earning of a B.A. from a small and devoutly religious college in central Ohio which he completed while yet in his early 30's. He came from a family who considered it much better not to become deeply involved in either politics or the social "graces". It was probably the chief reason why he remained a bachelor. However, even a rolling stone stops somewhere and, for some reason wholly inunderstandable to him, he cast his lot with Austin, TX. 




He was the fourth child of Wade H. and Minnie G. (Jenness) McCoy. His paternal grandparents were: Benjamin F. and Laura Etta (Crosby) McCoy, and his maternal grandparents were: Benjamin L. and Eliza 10, 1906, on a farm in the New Salem community that his parents had bought, September 30, 1905. The New Salem community is about seven miles southeast of Rockdale, in Milam County, Texas. He was the only child of Wade and Minnie to be born in the sandy land area of Milam County, as this farm was sold in 1907, when Benjamin was about nine months old and the family moved about nine miles northwest of Rockdale to the Tracy community. His parents had bought a farm in that community about the time that they sold the sandy land farm. It was in this community that Benjamin grew up. He started his schooling in a one-room school house, called the Leachville School, in 1913 or 1914. About two years later this school was consolidated with the Tracy school, which had two rooms. He attended this school until he was in the ninth grade. He was rather large for his age and was expected to do some farm work at an early age. He was especially good at picking cotton and on his sixth birthday he picked one hundred and ten pounds of cotton. His parents worked very hard and they expected no less from their children. Their farm was a one hundred acre tract and the parents and three children did most everything that was required to cultivate and harvest the crops. And quite frequently, they had enough time to hire out to their neighbors when they needed extra help. parents sold this farm in 1918 and purchased a larger farm east of Tracy, where they lived until 1923, when they moved to Rockdale in order that their children could get a better education. By this time, the two older children had married and had a home of their own. Gaylon and Bonnie were ten and eleven years younger than Benjamin and practically all of their education was received in the Rockdale schools. Benjamin liked all sports and he lettered in football, baseball, basketball and track his first year in the Rockdale high school. Baseball was discontinued the following year because of lack of funds to hire a baseball coach. He lettered his last two years in the other three sports. He worked in a grocery store on Saturdays. And during the summers, he worked in the same store while the regular employees took their vacations. He graduated from high school in the spring of 1926. That summer he attended, Toby's Business College, in Waco, Texas. Toward the end of the summer, he was offered a job in the office of Scarborough and Hicks Company, of Rockdale, which he gladly accepted. His starting salary was twelve dollars per week. The week consisted of five 11 hour days and a Saturday of 12 hours. He was allowed one week of vacation each year. While he was working here, he met and married Martha Lois Clare, May 8, 1927. She was a daughter of O.J. and Sarah (Waddle) Clare. He was making fourteen dollars per week by this time. Billie Mack, the first and only child of Benjamin and Lois, was born, April 21, 1928. They were living in a small one bedroom and kitchenette apartment at the time. There water supply was from the bathroom which was down a hall, and also served as the bath for, Mrs. Helen Perry, the owner of the house, and her father and son. Billie Mack was a small baby at birth, weighing only four and three fourths pounds. In the early part of 1929, Benjamin took a civil service examination at Houston, Texas, for a position of postal clerk in that office. Of the more than seven hundred that took the exam, he scored twelfth highest and was offered a job to begin September 1, of that year. In November of that year, the great depression began. Things looked very bleak for everyone, and was especially bleak for hourly employees. All postal employees of that time began as substitutes, at sixty-five cents per hour. Rumors of bad things to come were rampant during this time and even though he was making a living, he did not hesitate to accept a regular job back in Rockdale, as a bookkeeper in the Rockdale State Bank, when it was offered him. He resigned his job as substitute clerk at the Houston Post Office and accepted the bank job, beginning his work there about February 15, 1930. His beginning salary was one hundred dollars per month with a promise that he would be raised to one hundred and twenty five dollars per month within six months. Things were very bad and he did not receive the increase until after the bank for which he worked took over another bank in Rockdale, that had to close because of the depression, and then he was only raised to one hundred and ten dollars per month. This in spite of the fact that his work load was almost doubled because of the consolidation. In 1931, he received a notice from the Austin, Texas post office that a substitute letter carriers job was available, if he wanted it. Because of the unreasonably long hours that he was being required to work at the bank, he accepted the offer and began working in the Austin post office, June 15, 1931. Even though there were many months when he only made sixty or seventy dollars per month in this job, he held on and during his four and one half years that he served as a substitute he was able to get transferred from a substitute letter carrier to a substitute clerk. He finally was appointed to a regular position in the incoming mail section, December 15, 1935. He worked in this section and the bookkeeping section until in 1942, he was promoted to a supervisory position in the mailing section. In 1943, he was made head of the accounting section. In 1944, he was drafted into the Army, where he was assigned to the G-2 section of the Southern Defense Command, at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas. By November of that year, they had begun releasing army personnel if they were able to go back to a productive job. Since post office work was judged to be essential, he was released and he went back to his former position of Auditor, where he remained until the early part of 1955. At this time, the financial part of the post office was transferred to the Dallas, Texas region, and he was assigned to the East Austin Station, as Superintendent of that facility. He remained here for more than eight years until he retired, December 28, 1963. He and his wife, Lois, worked very hard outside their regular jobs, buying and fixing up old houses for resale. They spent most of their spare time, including vacations and holidays doing this and fortunately it worked very well for them. Their son, Billie Mack, grew up and after going through the Austin public schools, he attended the University of Texas at Austin, for a couple of years. He married Shirley Ann Benwell in

1949. In 1950, he volunteered for service in the Air Force during the Korean War, for four years, and was assigned to, Carswell Field, at Fort Worth, Texas. After fulfilling his commitment to the Air Force, they moved to Denver, Colorado, where he went into business as a manufacturer's representative. Their two sons were born in Denver. Michael is in the Law School at the University of Texas at Austin and Kevin is a senior at Colorado State University at Fort Collins, Colorado. Benjamin is of the Christian faith, having joined the First Christian Church at Rockdale, in 1926. He has never taken an active part in church affairs, although he feels absolutely sure that God is real and that without Him and His guidance we could do very little. Politically, he is conservative, and believes that our form of government is the greatest in the world. 



Our outfit was the "8th Port of Embarkation", and the duties were to operate the Port. He was Technical Sergeant in charge of port salvage, which was mostly broken boxes, sacks and other containers. We operated the Bizerte Port until April, 1944, when we shipped out of Civitavecchia, Italy, to operate that great port. We stayed there until the war was over

and returned home in October, 1945. He held the same rank and the same job until he was shipped back to the States. In December, 1945, he returned to Venezuela and his old job as Material Supervisor for the Gulf Oil Co. In May, 1947, he returned to the States and went to work on the Harvey Canal and lived in New Orleans, Louisiana. He worked there until June, 1961, when he retired early, and moved to Bandera, Texas, where he built his home and currently resides. In September, 1965, he enrolled in the McNay Art Institute, San Antonio, as a Stoneware Pottery Student, and at the end of twelve years he is still a student in the same school and enjoys it more every day. He joined the Methodist Church when he was fifteen and worked on the farm and at several different jobs. He broke horses for other people, and cowboyed for awhile while he worked on a ranch between Ozona and Del Rio for a Mr. West. There were more than one hundred sections originally in the ranch. During round-up time, it was rough. Each hand had five horses and there were eight of us. They worked the old cowman's way, nothing modern. In 1927, he moved to Pecos, Texas, as they were starting to drill for oil and worked for some time in the oil fields. Later he did carpentry work, which paid one dollar an hour. The depression hit and this eliminated carpentry work, so he got a job called the Pick and Shovel Road Gang. putting the road through from Fort Davis to the McDonald Observatory. This work for the State Highway Department continued until they were within three or four miles of the observatory, when he gave his thirty-day notice and went back to stock farming. He did a hitch in the army and then returned to stock farming, which he has continued to the present time. For the last fourteen years, he has been raising registered Polled Herefords, located about 2½ miles SW of Briggs. He descends from Revolutionary War Patriot John Ottinger of Pennsylvania.

The Pace family began in America with the arrival from England of Richard Pace, who settled in Jamestown, Virginia, in 1607. Some of his descendants are: William Pace (1794-1814) his great, great-grandfather; Edward Pace (1790-1874) his great-grandfather; William Alexander Pace (1823-1889) my grandfather; Julian Barton Pace (1870-1936) his father.

In the oldest church in Jamestown, Virginia, there is a plaque covering half a wall honoring Richard Pace and Chanco, his Indian servant, for saving the lives of many settlers in Jamestown in the March Massacre.

The Virginia Historical Society placed a marker at Pace Paines, the plantation home of Richard Pace across the James River from Jamestown. This is the inscription on the marker: "Pace Paines" "This place 7 miles North was settled by Richard Pace in 1620. On the night before the Indian Massacre of March 22, 1622, an Indian Chanco revealed the plot to Pace who reached Jamestown in time to save the settlers in that vicinity."

William Pace assisted in the establishment of American Independence by entering the Revolutionary War in 1777 and was discharged November 3, 1783.

He fought in a number of battles at: Brandywine, Germantown, Monmouth and others. Because of his bravery and valor on the field of battle he was chosen to be one of the 200 Guards of General Washington.

William Alexander Pace (1823-1889) was born in Scott County, Virginia. He married Sarah Jane Hankins (1826-1894) on June 10, 1842. They moved to Salado, Texas in 1854. He served in the Confederate Army and was wounded in the hip. The Pace State Park at Salado, Texas was named in honor of him.

Julian Barton Pace (1870-1936) was Jarrette's father and was born at Salado, Texas. He married Mary Susan Boyle (1863-1934) on October 16, 1895.

To this union the following children were born: Julian Clark (b. 10 May, 1897; d. 6 May 1898); Ava Loraine (b. 20 November, 1898, m. Roy Leslie Crawford on January 14, 1917; d. 18 September 1973); Jarrette Boyle (b. 30

May, 1901, m. Beulah Baggett on December 21, 1930); George Rankin (b. 17 May, 1907, m. Laura Kittrell on November 4, 1950).

He was born June 12, 1890, upstairs in the Stuart Female Seminary, a Presbyterian school for girls founded in 1876 by his grandmother, Mrs. R. K. Red, and conducted by his parents, Mrs. Lel Red Purcell and the Rev. John McLeod Purcell. The infant arrived in the bedroom over the stage during commen-

cement exercises; and the news, "It's a boy", was whispered excitedly around the assembly. The Purcell family closed the seminary and moved to a farm near Lockhart on October 25, 1899, because Mrs. Purcell was in poor health and desired to raise her three boys away from the temptations of the city. She taught her three children and five neighborhood children. Since Stuart received such good training at home, he attended public schools for less than two years — part of the fifth grade in Lockhart and a few months of the eighth grade in Dallas. Although he did not have a regular academic record, he was admitted to the University of Texas as a probationary freshman in 1911 and obtained his B.A. degree in 1916. He entered law school in the fall of 1916, but his formal education was terminated by U.S. entry into World War I on April 6, 1917. Purcell volunteered on April 8 but was not called up for several months. Meanwhile, he was married on June 12, 1917, to Mabelle Umland, a young woman he had met at a combined Latin class and Sunday School picnic on San Jacinto Day (April 21)

As an Army volunteer in 1917, Purcell trained at the officers training camp at Leon Springs, Texas, where he was awarded a first lieutenant's commission in the Infantry. Wishing to become a flier, however, he traded this for a second lieutenant's commission in the Signal Corps, military parent of the Air Corps. It turned out that his age and marital status prevented his flying — he was 27 and married — so he became an adjutant. As such, he assisted Major G. H. Bonnell in organizing the 147th Aero Squadron, First Pursuit Group. A. E. F. (American Expeditionary Forces), a sister squadron to the 94th commanded by Captain Eddie Rickenbacker. After his discharge from the Army, Purcell moved to Robstown with his family and operated large farms in Nueces County until the Great Depression of the 1930's wiped out the family estate. He and his wife worked as professional free-lance journalists, writing articles for six major Texas newspapers, until the family moved to Austin in 1938. When World War II broke out, Purcell was too old for active military duty. However, the Aedes Aegypti mosquito, the only carrier of yellow and dengue fevers, threatened an invasion of Texas more deadly than soldiers. Brownsville had a breeding index of 85 percent, the worst in the nation. Purcell, working with the U.S. Public Health Service and the Texas State Department of Health for five years, reduced their breeding index to one percent - one house out of a hundred — and it was ten years before their numbers increased enough to be a possible health hazard in that area of the Lower Rio Grande Valley. accomplished this feat partly by use of a song about mosquito prevention written to the tune of an old Tampico, Mexico ballad by Americo Paredes, then a reporter for the Brownsville Herald and now a professor of the University of Texas at Austin. Purcell had this song recorded in Spanish and English and saw to it that the children in the schools became familiar with the words and tune so they could sing it as they played their games. Purcell's uncle, William Stuart Red, D. D., owned a large old home located on Academy Drive in Austin, and built at about the same time as the State Capitol. Dr. Red died in

July of 1933; and his wife, Rizpah Bowers Red, died in June of 1938, leaving the property to their son, Dr. William S. (Bill) Red, M. D., of Houston. At Dr. Red's request, the Purcell family moved there in 1938. At that time, three of the four streets bordering the home were unpaved; and the lot covered more than two acres. Dr. Red had the idea of building rent houses around the block, but he wanted to preserve the old home if possible. However, his lucrative medical practice in Houston and the growing demands of his young family prevented his coming to Austin to work on either of these projects. The rent houses were never built, but the Purcell family, including the three children, did a considerable amount of repair and restoration work on the home and a great deal of landscaping work on the lot, which was a veritable jungle of brush and trees when they moved in. Mr. and Mrs. Purcell bought the house and lot from Dr. Red when he decided to dispose of the property in 1946. On November 21, 1974, the Purcells were awarded a Certificate of Commendation by the Austin City Council designating the Red-Purcell house at 210 Academy Drive as a Historical Landmark. It is now the oldest house originally located in south Austin and is only slightly younger than the Tips' home that was recently transplanted to that area by Franklin Savings Association. cells received this certificate in June of 1976 from Mayor Pro-Tem Jimmy Snell. Fluent in Spanish, Purcell translated Spanish manuscripts into English for his uncle's book, The Texas Colonists and Religion, 1821, 1836, by William S. Red. D. D. Purcell also served as an interpreter on numerous occasions while living in Robstown and Brownsville and even a few times after his retirement in Austin. He taught Spanish and English to Spanish speaking adults in Robstown for about a year and has contributed to several Spanish churches, including El Buen Pastor Presbyterian Church in Austin. He has established a scholarship in the name of his grandmother, Mrs. R. K. Red, at Presbyterian Pan American School in Kingsville. In view of his family background, it is not surprising that Purcel has always been a deeply religious man, devoting considerable time to the service of his church. He served on the session and taught Sunday School in Presbyterian churches in Austin, Lockhart, Robstown, and Brownsville; and he has served as a lay leader both in Austin and Robstown, on occasions when an ordained minister was unavailable. During his retirement years, he has continued to write occasional articles for the newspaper and has traveled widely over the United States with his wife and grandchildren. He and his wife are the principle authors of a book called This is Texas, which was published in 1977. He is now nearly blind due to cataracts but continues to take an interest in life and do what he can around the house and vard. Stuart and Mabelle Purcell have three children: Stuart M. Purcell, Jr., of Pleasant Hill, California; Becky Grimmer of Austin, Texas; and Martha Lel Hawkins of Austin, Texas. They also have six grandchildren and (at last count) seven great-grandchildren. Stuart Purcell is a descendent of Revolutionary War Patriot Lt. William Stewart of Pennsylvania.





He was born May 28, 1894 three miles south of Burnet, Texas and shortly thereafter his parents moved to the community of Oatmeal where he attended school in the one-room rock schoolhouse which was built of stone in the year 1865 at the cost of \$80.00. The building at present is used as a Church. He graduated from this school in 1909 and entered the Bertram School and in 1915 graduated from the Bertram High School and shortly thereafter he attended Southwestern University in Georgetown for a short time. He then attended the University of Texas one full term in the latter part of 1915 and finally attended Nixon-Clay Commercial College in 1916 in Austin, Texas. His paternal grandfather migrated from the southwestern part of Tennessee shortly after the Civil War in the late 1860's and prior to his coming to Texas he knows very little, but does know he moved to Nixon, Texas, where he married a Margaret Carpenter, after that he later moved to Burnet County, Texas. His maternal grandfather migrated to Texas from Troupe, Georgia and settled in the region of Central Texas near where the town of Burnet is now located in the first part of 1840, and was the first white man to settle in this part of Texas. He was one of the organizers of Burnet County. At the time my grandfather settled in this section of Texas only Comanche Indians roamed the country. His grandfather's first son was the first white child born in the County and his first wife was the first grave in the Oatmeal Cemetery which was in 1854. The Comanche Indians wintered in the cedar breaks in what is now San Saba County, and in the summer, the Indians would migrate to Hornsby Bend in Travis County to spend the summer and then return to San Saha for the winter. His grandfather settled at what is now known as Holland Springs on Hamilton Creek, three miles south of the new town of Burnet. He built his home on this tract of land in about 1845 of solid rock with very small windows for protection from the Comanche Indians and there were frequent raids by the Indians stealing horses and other livestock. Back of this rock home, which was

built with negro slaves, was a rock building known as the "powder house" which was used by frontiersmen to protect the settlers. This home has the Texas Historical Marker at the roadside. The home is in existence and structurally sound. The last Indian was killed by his grandfather at now known Mormon Mills, which was formerly owned by him. He formerly owned what is now known as Granite Mountain from which the stone was used to build the Texas State Capitol. This Granite Mountain, which was solid stone, was traded by his grandfather for a mule, since it would not grow grass. After killing off this Indian at Mormon Mills, the Indians left the territory and it was reported they migrated to the Indian Territory which is now the State of Oklahoma. The descendants of his maternal grandfather were from Virginia and John Holland was in the Revolutionary War with the Continental Army and he was a Wagonmaster. His career has been rather varied, sometimes enjoyable and sometimes sorrowful. He is the last survivor of his family, even though he was the oldest child of the family. In conclusion, for the record, most of this information came from his grandfather who survived until he was an adult and they had discussions on various matters. He was married three times, first to Mary Schott (first grave in Oatmeal Cemetery), then to Clara Thomas, who was his maternal grandmother, and to Molly Penny. In all Samuel E. Holland raised 17 children in Burnet County and gave each child at marriage \$10,000 cash or a farm, and the farm on which he was reared was the farm Samuel E. Holland gave his mother on her marriage to Wm. H. Smith. His paternal grandfather served in the Texas Legislature as flotorial representative in the 1880's. He has served the Government in the Quartermaster General Office, as a census enumerator and he entered private business as an Accountant and Tax Consultant as well as several businesses in which he was interested and made investments. He is now retired and lives in Lakeway Village.

He was born in Jacksboro, Jack County, Texas on April 18, 1911, the son of Rev. C. C. Young and Julia Ada Wallace Young. Rev. Young, being forty years ahead of his time conceived the idea that there should be some place for the elderly other than the County Poor Farms. He took a leave of absence from his pastorate (then being Tyler Street Methodist Church in Dallas) to establish a church sponsored retirement home for the aged. His untimely death came as he was nearing the completion of this project in 1921. Other dedicated men took up his task and, upon completion, named it in his honor. His widow, with her three 6 to 10 year old sons, returned to her family home of Kyle in Hays County. Texas. During the next ten years Charles was employed in a diverse assortments of endeavors. Other than being a paper boy and a Saturday grocery clerk, he held summer employment as a yard boy at the lumber yard, farmer, Coke bottle washer, carpenter's helper, assistant to the Railway Agent, yard man, magazine salesman and loader of baled cotton into box cars. He graduated from Kyle High School, the school system in which his mother spent all her grammar and high school days and from which his grandson will soon be the fourth generation to graduate. In 1932, Young graduated from Texas A & M College with a degree in Mechanical Engineering.
