HEROISM AWARD GIVEN TO LOCAL SAN ANTONIO POLICE OFFICER



Officer Jolanda Sanchez is a fifteen-year veteran of the San Antonio Police Department and is assigned to the Patrol Division at the Central Substation. On the morning of Monday the 9th of September 2013, Officer Sanchez and other officers responded to a disturbance call at the Super 8 hotel in downtown San Antonio. While opening the door to the hotel room, an assailant opened fire on the officers. Officer Sanchez avoided being struck by gunfire as the rounds penetrated the door and wall around her. The assailant exited the room and continued to fire and struck another officer in the head.

Officer Sanchez acted with bravery as she assisted the larger officer from harm's way. She continued to encourage and protect him until he was driven from the scene for medical treatment. Her actions to protect her partner and prevent him from further injury were selfless and show the heart of a Hero.

We recognize Officer Sanchez for her honor and commitment to duty; these actions reflect great credit on herself, her family, the San Antonio Police Department and the Citizens of San Antonio. This year the Texas Children's Choir from the Greater San Antonio Area provided our Holiday entertainment. The Choir, under the direction of Dr. Thomas Hardaway (a Retired Colonel, US Army Pediatrician and Child Psychologist), provided a sterling performance of Christmas Music. Passionate about music and teaching it to children, Dr. Hardaway has trained and directed children's choirs for more than 40 years. Members, whose ages range from 8-18, attend local schools.

Nationally, the choir has provided the music for ceremonies commemorating D-Day at the National World War II Museum in New Orleans in 2003 and 2004. They sang for the combined White House and Department of Defense ceremonies at the National Cemetery on Normandy Beach for President Bush and the First Lady, as well as the French President Chirac on June 6, 2004.

Internationally, they have performed concerts at cathedrals in England and France. The children sang a special choral and organ concert for the American Ambassador to France and his wife at the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris, France. An Historical Review of The Bill of Rights

Dec 15, 1791: The Bill of Rights Becomes Law

On this day in 1791, Virginia becomes the last state to ratify the Bill of Rights, making the first ten amendments to the Constitution law and completing the revolutionary reforms begun by the Declaration of Independence. Before the Massachusetts ratifying convention would accept the Constitution, which they finally did in February 1788, the document's Federalist supporters had to promise to create a Bill of Rights to be amended to the Constitution immediately upon the creation of a new government under the document.

The Anti-Federalist critics of the document, who were afraid that a too-strong federal government would become just another sort of the monarchical regime from which they had recently been freed, believed that the Constitution gave too much power to the federal government by outlining its rights but failing to delineate the rights of the individuals living under it. The promise of a Bill of Rights to do just that helped to assuage the Anti-Federalists' concerns.

The newly elected Congress drafted the Bill of Rights on December 25, 1789. Virginia's ratification on this day in 1791 created the three-fourths majority necessary for the ten amendments to become law. Drafted by James Madison and loosely based on Virginia's Declaration of Rights, the first ten amendments give the following rights to all United States citizens:

- 1. Freedom of religion, speech and assembly
- 2. Right to keep and bear arms for the purpose of a well-regulated militia
- 3.No forcible quartering of soldiers during peacetime
- 4.Freedom from unreasonable search and seizure
- 5.Right to a grand jury for capital crimes and due process. Protection from double jeopardy, self-incrimination and public confiscation of private property without just compensation.
- 6. Right to speedy and public trial by jury and a competent defense
- 7. Right to trial by jury for monetary cases above \$20
- 8. Protection against excessive bail or fines and cruel and unusual punishments
- 9. Rights not enumerated are retained by the people
- 10.Rights not given to the federal government or prohibited the state governments by the Constitution, are reserved to the States... or to the people.



Famed Texas Compatriot Ted Fehrenbach Passes On



Compatriot T. R. (Ted) Fehrenbach -- scholar, author, soldier, businessman, linguist, conversationalist and master storyteller -- passed away on Sunday, December 1, 2013 at the age of 88. He was a member of the National Society Sons of the American Revolution and the San Antonio Chapter since 1966.

Ted was born on January 12, 1925 in San Benito, Texas to a pioneer Texas family in land development and agriculture in the Rio Grande Valley. He graduated from high school in Hollywood, California and later graduated magna cum laude from Princeton University in 1947. Ted and Lillian were married in 1951 and moved to San Antonio in 1954. He served in the U.S. Army in World War II and the Korean War, and retired as Lt. Colonel in the Active Army Reserves after over twenty years of service.

In 2002, Fehrenbach was honored at a Twilight Tattoo Ceremony on the Ellipse in Washington, D.C. before a crowd of more than five thousand soldiers and participants, and received that same morning the St. Maurice Award at the Pentagon in honor of his role as a writer in illuminating the Korean War and the lessons to be learned from the conflict.

His writings produced the definitive book of Texas history, "Lone Star -- A History of Texas and Texans", as well "This Kind of War", "Fire & Blood", "Comanches", "Swiss Banks", "Greatness to Spare" and many other books which are still read widely.

Ted was also a member of the Argyle Club, Conopus Club, **Sons of the American Revolution**, the Princeton Club of New York and was an Honorary Son of the Republic of Texas.

The public burial ceremony with full military honors was held at the Texas State Cemetery, 909 Navasota Street, Austin, Texas at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, December 5, 2013. (**Source:** Obituary at porterloring.com)
