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Welcome to this World Dance Alliance Global Assembly performance. The choreography you will see this week reflects the Assembly's theme Dance/ Diversity/ Dialogue: Bridging Communities and Cultures.

The World Dance Alliance was initiated in Hong Kong in 1990 with the founding of the Asia Pacific region to serve as a primary voice for dance and dancers throughout the world, to encourage the exchange of ideas, and to promote the awareness of dance in all its many forms. The Americas joined the Alliance in 1993, Europe in 1997, and an Alliance is under development in Africa.

Global Assemblies are normally held in alternate years, hosted by one of the three regions. Previous Global Assemblies have taken place in Seoul, Essen, Philadelphia, Tokyo and Dusseldorf. This is the first time a Global Assembly has been held in Canada. For this occasion, each region was invited to nominate four companies to perform during the Assembly. Canadian dance artists were solicited through an application process. During the week, you will have the opportunity to see a broad spectrum of dance forms performed by dancers representing a wide range of ages and physical abilities.

Through Global Assemblies, the World Dance Alliance facilitates international exchanges and encourages dialogue among all people in dance. Over 22 countries are represented by participants attending the Assembly, including dancers, choreographers, educators, researchers, writers, presenters, administrators, artistic directors, and others.

I hope you enjoy the performances and the opportunity to make new friends from around the world.

This duet uses a fundamental technique of Contact Improvisation (support and surrender) to explore and express the dynamic of caring for and attending to another individual's physical and emotional needs. It is inspired by the application of dance practices in areas of individual and community health and well being. It's a dance of love and listening.

Eryn Dace Trudell Dance Projects

Eryn Dace Trudell was born in London, Ontario and grew up in Toronto. She graduated from Claude Watson School for The Arts and earned her B.F.A. from the Juilliard School in New York. With a background in Graham, Limón, Taylor, ballet and jazz, Ms. Trudell's dance practice has grown to include the domain of "Alternative Techniques." She is a certified Skinner Releasing Technique Teacher and a Contact Improvisor. She has created an array of original choreography, including Grace, Heliotrope, My Private Venus, and Forced Horn; two-mixed ability, site-specific commissions: Real Wheels and Bizzy and Dizzy for Dusk Dances, and choreography for several new Canadian plays such as The Yoko Ono Project, and Quartet and operas such as Nonomiya and The Anxiety of Immortality. Eryn has had the pleasure of working with many local choreographers including Rebecca Todd, Susan Lee, Jessica Runge, Sarah Chase, Holly Small, Hope Terry, Kathleen Rea, Maxine Heppner, Deborah Dunn, Karen and Allen Kaeja, Andrew Harwood, Bill James and Peter Chin. She has been described as a "mesmerizing" performer.

Twist Twice

The duet *Twist Twice* is an expression of movement that starts with an inner motion that explodes into a natural and free flowing dance idiom. The dancers turn around their spines and try to free themselves from the floor as they tangle and attach themselves, wanting to show their own movement. One wants to overcome the other, only to learn that one is the other and that each is unique, with the moral that two are better than one and twice is better than once, so "Twist Twice."

Accademia Nazionale di Danza and Scenamobile (Italy)

Scenamobile, directed by Joseph Fontano, was created in 1989 and has a collaborative relationship with the National Dance Academy of Italy. Mr.Fontano is coordinator of contemporary dance for the degree program and teaches technique, choreography, movement analysis and performance. He is one of the founders of contemporary dance in Italy with over 35 years of dancing experience. The Accademia Nazionale di Danza is the only Italian dance institute with a degree program in dance. It was founded in 1949 and is in one of the most beautiful locations in the world, overlooking the Roman Palatin area on the Aventino hill. Today the institute is directed by Margherita Parrilla.

Producer: Mary Jane Warner

Mary Jane Warner is a full professor and chair of the Department of Dance, York University. She has taught courses in ballet, history, repertory, movement analysis and dance education as well as holding several administrative positions at York. She is the author of *Toronto Dance Teachers: 1825 – 1925*, and, with Selma Odom, she published *Canadian Dance: Visions and Stories*. She holds a SSHRC grant to document the work of several of Canada's senior contemporary choreographers through notation and videography. She is a member of the board for the World Dance Alliance Americas, and chair for this sixth WDA Global Assembly.

Artistic Coordinator: Darcey Callison

Darcey Callison is a choreographer and Associate Professor in the Department of Dance at York University. As a choreographer he focuses on the theatrical potential within the personal physicality of the dancers he works with. His choreography has been described as "screamingly funny" and "provocative." Artistic coordinator for York's Independent Dance Projects, he has brought such dance luminaries as Sara Chase and Claudia Moore to perform at York. Further research interests include popular culture, films and gender issues in dance.

Production Manager & Lighting Designer: Arun Srinivasan

Arun designs for dance, theatre, music, and special events. He has worked extensively in Toronto's arts and entertainment industry with various artists, including Robert Desrosiers, Danny Grossman, Peter Chin and Claudia Moore. A savage exploration of the raw relationship and connectivity between nature, the animal kingdom and humanity, *Pulse* was created from an experience that draws upon the philosophies, ideologies and structures of Traditional Blackfoot songs and how they were given to our people. "As I experienced an intense connection of energies between the wind, land, animals and other humans, it contributed to a natural rhythm that stuck with me which ultimately became a movement piece. I later discovered that I would translate this to a physical language of movement inspired by the experience. The elders from my tribe say that you receive a song from nature and the spirit world. This rhythm that I experienced while at York was lent by the birds, squirrels, wind, land and the other humans walking around. I wanted to explore this deeper and discover the harmonious connection that 'we' the living contribute to one another."

Troy Emery Twigg

Troy Emery Twigg is Blackfoot from the Kainai Nation in Southern Alberta, also referred to as the Blood Tribe. He is a performer, dancer, and writer who has worked in dance and theatre as an independent artist. He has trained with various artists from around the globe including Montreal's Bill Coleman and Laurence Lemieux, and Krystina Lhotakova and Ladislav Soukup of the Czech Republic. In Alberta he visits the Blood reserve and gathers knowledge of his people by spending time with elders and family. He has worked extensively with musician and composer Olivia Tailfeathers on several projects including *litaohkanaop'pi: The Meeting Place*. As an artist Troy primarily explores various disciplines to mold into a solid framework, generally exploring his heritage and identity as a First Nations person to the land.

Kaha: wi blends the strength, essence and philosophy of traditional Iroquoian song and dance with innovative contemporary music and movement. Three excerpts acknowledge the spirit of the natural world and Mother Earth. In Four Sisters: respect is given to the four directions, which unify into a continuous and harmonious circle; Young Woman's Dance: the young Kaha:wi begins her earthly journey while connecting to womanhood, earth and the moon; Our Minds are One: Kaha: wi embodies the strength and the beauty of the Iroquois people, that they continue to celebrate the cycles of Life.

Kaha: wi Dance Theatre

Kaha: wi Dance Theatre has operated since 2001, with Santee Smith as its artistic director. It officially incorporated into a not-for-profit organization in June 2005 and is poised to take its first major steps as an arts organization, by producing and creating cutting edge aboriginal dance productions. The company is a natural extension of Smith's professional training, performance and production work over the past 20 years. Its foundations are based in aboriginal perspective and aesthetics and embrace diversity and universality of artistic expression. Smith is artistic director for Living Ritual: World Indigenous Dance Festival.

Mi Young Kim Dance Company

The Korean Dance Studies Society of Canada was founded in 1987 in order to spread awareness and to provide instruction and training in Korean traditional dance to people of all ages and cultures. The Society's Mi Young Kim Dance Company encompasses the full range of Korean traditional dances from ancestral dances to modernized creations. Recent annual performances include *Sooryu Dance Festival 2004* and original choreographic works by the artistic director and choreographer Mi Young Kim. They have received numerous awards for their cultural contributions and achievements. Mi Young Kim is the recipient of the Republic of Korea's President Award (2002).

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
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






















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
