Awards we did not win was due to the fact we were not eligible because we had won them the previous year. **The foremost of the Awards earned are as follows:** 1) the Outstanding Chapter Award for Excellence in all area; 2) the Americanism Award for exceptional programming and recognition; 3) John Bruce Stewart Jr. Memorial Award for Outstanding Service to Veterans, (Frank Rohrbough, Chairman); 4) The Enhanced JROTC Award for our nominee Chris Lamoureux (Courtland Synder, Chairmen); 5) The Eagle Scout Scholarship Award for our nominee Roland Salatino (Bob Brady, Chairmen); 6) The Texas Public Service Award for presenting all four Texas Service Medals; and 7) The Texas State George and Stella Knight Essay for our nominee Nicholas Hewgley. Other Awards included our nominees for the Texas C.A.R. (Children of the American Revolution) Essay Award Morgan McMillian in 3rd Place and Honorable mention Roland Salatino; for Second Place in Division #2 for the Ross Shipman Newsletter Award thanks to Compatriot Frank Rohrbough our Editor; for Second Place in the TXSSAR Yearbook Award thanks to Compatriot John Orr. We received Stars for Steamer's for the John K Harrell C.A.R. Activities and Competition awards and a Star for Steamer for TXSSAR Flag Presentation Award, (John Orr Chairmen). **On individual Compatriot Awards:** The Reverend Doctor James Taylor was awarded to highly prestigious Patriot Medal. Other Awards include: Stephen Rohrbough, State Meritorious Service Award; Ed Butler, Aide de Camp Pin; Peter Baron, the first ever TXSSAR Color Guardsmen of the Year Medal. TXSSAR Silver Service Medals were awarded by President Jim Jones to Rev James Taylor, Peter Baron, Frank Rohrbough, Stephen Rohrbough, and George Harcourt. Dual Member Joe Dooley, Genealogist General, received the TXSSAR Bronze Service Medal. These are outstanding awards, and recognize the work of individuals going above and beyond in their Service to San Antonio SAR and TXSSAR. Yet without all your support as compatriots serving on Chapter Committees and individual efforts of many members none of these thing would have happened. I congratulate each compatriot for your support.

Now we can't rest on our laurels. We need to show the rest of Texas and National Societies why we were chosen the Outstanding Chapter Award for Excellence. TXSSAR'S PATRIOT MEDAL RECIPIENTS

As noted above in President Taylor's Remarks above, the San Antonio Chapter was well recognized for its many accomplishments and activities throughout 2010. Much of this was through the strong leadership of President Peter Baron. His dedication and service to the members of this Chapter and the Texas Society SAR set a new performance high that will challenge others who will lead us in the years to come. Much of work was done by the officers and Committee Chairman of our Chapter who were well recognized by President Baron in December and January at the end of his term of service. The most significant Awards came at the State Society Convention. They have been noted above by President Taylor. However, of special note are two of the most distinguished Awards—The Patriot Medal and the newly established Color Guardsman of the Year Medal. The Patriot Medal is the highest Award given by a State Society or the National Society. It is presented only once to a deserving SAR member. Only one in 500 members are eligible to receive this Medal. Because the Texas Society has over 2,500 member (the largest of any State Society, it can award up to 5 of its Societies' most deserving members each year.

Chapter Holds History Fair at Frank Tejada Middle School:

On April 2nd, we participated in the Annual School Fair speaking to interested students about Early American History and specifically about events of the American Revolution. More specifically, Compatriot Peter Baron focused on camp life and the personal articles used by the Militia and Continental Army in the 1770's. He spoke on a variety of subjects including the uniforms of the revolution and how they changed from the early years of the militia and the establishment of a standard uniform by General Wash-

ington during the winter encampment at Valley Forge in 1778. Compatriot Lewallen spoke on the Battle of King's Mountain and the unique characteristics of the flintlock rifle. (See **King's Mountain Article by Roland Salatino below**). The highlight of the program was the multiple firings of a replica of a 1770's British Musket (See **picture below**). Compatriots Taylor spoke on his ancestors role in the Battle of Concord while Compatriot Rohrbough spoke about Washington's Spies during the Revolution.

AN EXCERPT ON "EVALUATION OF WEAPONS AND TACTICS IN THE BATTLE OF KINGS MOUNTAIN"

A jewel often skimmed over or forgotten altogether in our classrooms and textbooks, the Battle of Kings Mountain in 1780 "was of mighty portent. History has done scant justice to its significance, which rightly should place it beside Lexington and Bunker Hill, Trenton, and Yorktown, as one of the crucial engagements in our long struggle for independence." The momentous defeat of the British-led and supplied Loyalist forces at the hands of a coalition of Overmountain militiamen (Patriots) had an incredible result: the battle at Kings Mountain stopped the British from gathering together all the southern colonists who still remained loyal to the crown, forming a huge army and crushing the rebellious Patriots. The rag-tag amalgam of angry Patriots snagged victory from the Loyalists thanks to two primary things: the difference in guns, and the difference in how those guns were used. A weapon, of course, is only as good as the hands that carry it and the Loyalists, trained for open-field, firing squad tactics, were poorly suited to defending an elevated, rocky, flat-topped hill. The Patriots, on the other hand, were accustomed to hunting small, fleet-footed animals for food and hiding behind trees for cover as they fought off Indian raids. The Patriots learned to fire with frightening accuracy before swiftly finding cover behind rocks and trees to reload. The Patriots lived by their rifles and knew them well. They knew, for example, that when firing upward, they had to compensate for the natural tendency to under-shoot a target; the hill-defending Loyalists had little clue as to why their .75 caliber lead balls hurtled harmlessly over the heads of the oncoming Patriots. The Loyalist bayonet charges did pose a threat, but the colonists were able to rely on their considerable skill with tomahawks to hold their ground. In the end, the Patriots' use of the American long rifle and better woodland fighting tactics allowed them to overtake the mountain and kill British Major Patrick Ferguson, setting a history-changing cornerstone in the formation of our United States.
