Menaka Thakkar Dance Company

Dr. Menaka Thakkar is an internationally renowned dancer, choreographer and teacher working in three classical forms of Indian dance: Bharatanatyam, Odissi and Kuchipudi. She is the founder and artistic director of the Menaka Thakkar Dance Company, which is the oldest East Indian dance company in Canada and the Canadian Academy of Indian Dance, which was the first school of Indian dance in Canada. Dr. Thakkar teaches Indian dance in residency at the National Ballet School and is an Adjunct Professor of Dance at York University. Her work has been recognized with many awards and honours, including an honorary Doctor of Letters (D.Lit) from York University, the Indo-Canada Chamber of Commerce President's Award and the Toronto Arts Award in the category of Performing Arts.

Mary Jane Warner is a full professor and chair of the Department of Dance, York University. She has taught courses in ballet, history, repertory, movement analysis and dance education as well as holding several administrative positions at York.
