Why Join?

As each day passes the information leading us to our historical roots fades into obscurity. As our elders pass and records are misplaced, family history is lost. Membership will keep your family's participation in the founding of our nation alive and in a place of honor that is safe for all future generations to access.

Who Can Join?

The Sons of the American Revolution, SAR, is a male service organization with membership lineage requirements. This means each member has traced their family tree back to a patriot ancestor who supported the cause of the American Independence during the years 1774 to 1783.

NATIONAL SOCIETY, Sons of the American Revolution



In 1876 there were many celebrations to commemorate the centennial of the signing of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. As part of this patriotic fervor, a group of men in the San Francisco California area who were descendants of patriots involved in the American Revolution formed an organization called the Sons of Revolutionary Sires. Their objective was to have a fraternal and civic society to salute those men and women who pledged their lives, fortunes and sacred honor to the battle for independence from Great Britain. They desired to keep alive their ancestors' story of patriotism and courage in the belief that it is a universal one of man's struggle against tyranny -- a story which would inspire and sustain succeeding generations when they would have to defend and extend our freedoms.

Out of the Sires grew the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, which was organized on April 30, 1889, the 100th anniversary of the inauguration of George Washington as our nation's first President. The National Society was chartered by an Act of the United States Congress on June 9, 1906. The charter was signed by SAR Compatriot and President Theodore Roosevelt.

Texas SAR

On December 9, 1896 the Galveston Daily News announced the organization of the Texas Society of Sons of the American Revolution. organizational meeting there were men from Galveston, Austin, Dallas, Weatherford, Eagle Pass, Fort Clark and other Texas cities. They formed the Bernardo de Galvez Chapter and selected the Honorable Ira H. Evans as the first state president. The first annual meeting of the Texas Society SAR was held on February 22, 1897 with fifteen members in attendance. By March the membership was up to twenty. There have been sixty-six Chapters formed in the state of Texas with forty-six still active. In the past 120 years, membership of the Texas Society has grown from the original fifteen to over 12,750.
