Dealey Plaza

Dealy Plaza Historic District is on the western edge of downtown in Dallas' West End Historic District. It includes Dealey Plaza and encompasses an area bounded by Pacific, Market, and Jackson Streets and a railroad right of way. The district's main attraction is The Sixth Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza, 411 Elm St., Dallas 75202-3308 (747-6660; www.jfk.org), site of the Kennedy assassination. Take IH-35 to the Commerce St./Reunion Blvd. exit. Go east on Commerce 2 blocks to Market St., turn left, and go 2 blocks to Elm St. Turn left on Elm, and go 2 blocks to the museum. Hours: daily 9-6 (closed Christmas Day). Admission: \$7, \$6 ages 6-18 and 65+, free under 6. Add \$3 each for audio tours--available in English, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Portugese, and Spanish (English only for ages 6-12). Artifact collections (more than 20,000 items) and archival materials are available for research by the public.

Fair Park

Fair Park is five minutes east of downtown at 1300 Robert B. Cullum Blvd., Box 159090, Dallas 75315 (670-8400; www.fairparkdallas.com). Take IH-30 E to 2nd Ave. and follow the signs. General park hours: daily 9-5.

Highland Park Village

Highland Park Village is at Mockingbird Ln. and Preston Rd. in Highland Park, approximately three miles north of downtown Dallas. Take IH-35 (Stemmons Fwy.) north to Mockingbird and go east to Preston. Or take US 75

(N. Central Expwy.) north to Mockingbird and go west to Preston. Hours: Mon-Sat 10-6, Thur 10-8, and Sun 12-5. (Restaurants and the movie theater, plus some retailers, have extended hours.)
