TIME FOR TOMATOES

June is peak time for Texas tomatoes. To find farmers markets or pick-your-own farms selling fresh tomatoes, contact the Texas Department of Agriculture, Box 12847, Austin 78711 (800/835-5832). Website: www.agr.state.tx.us/events.

Find greenhouse-grown tomatoes year-round at Cooper Farms, located one mile north of Fairfield on US 75 (903/389-2696; email--tkcooper@airmail.net). They also sell them with other seasonal produce at roadside stands along IH-45 from Ennis to Conroe. The Coopers offer greenhouse tours with two weeks advance notice. Tomato megagreenhouses in West Texas--Village Farms of Texas at Fort Davis (915/426-2301) and Village Farms of Marfa (915/729-3071)--offer educational group tours by prior arrangement.

Celebrate Texas' tomato heritage at two festivals--Yoakum's Tom Tom Festival (June 2-4; call 361/293-2309) and Jacksonville's Tomato Fest (June 9-10; call 800/376-2217). Jacksonville's festival offers tours of David Claiborne's tomato packing shed, located at 461 Alabama St. (903/589-0094). You can also buy tomatoes and other produce at the shed Mon-Sat 8-5 from May 20 to Sept. 30.•
