There are two places on the campus of Sam Houston State that have flags associated with the Texas Revolution. These are reproductions not originals. You did not mention which type you were interested in. One public place is in the Criminal Justice Building foyer. There are four or five flags including the "Come and Take It", the 1824 Flag, the white star on blue field with the letters TEXAS between the star points, and the Lone Star that looks similar to the Mexican flag with the star in a blue bar, a bar of white and a bar of red next to each other, and then the first version of the present flag.

The Sam Houston Museum has a display almost like the one above but is cased in a portable display of several panels. This display was sponsored by Ross Periot for a traveling exhibit. I guess it got tired of the road and someone let it retire at the museum. This display has a few more flags than the one above, I can not remember off hand what is included.

The Confederate Research Center at Hillsboro College has a few flags associated with that conflict but I do not remember how many or what they are.

Hope this will get you started.

Dixie is a good place to buy from, but certainly not the only one. I can't really recommend anyone in my capacity as an officer of VAST because other fine flag stores like Capitol Flag Co. here in Houston and Betsy Ross Flag Girls in Dallas are also active in VAST.

I will point out that the De Zavala flag offered on Dixie's site is a historical myth. Bob Maberry discusses this in his Texas Flags book, as do I in my "Flags of Texas" entry in The New Handbook of Texas. Also check out the entries I wrote for "Flags of the Texas Revolution" and "Seals of Texas" for general background information. As you probably know, the Handbook is available online (I forget the URL, but a Google search will turn it up).

If you plan to say anything about the Six Flags Over Texas in your article, you should be aware that the Texas Historical Commission adopted standard designs for those flags. The information (background text and pictures) is in the June 20, 1997 Texas Register, volume 22, number 46, pages 5959 to 5967. Back issues of the Texas Register are available online (go to the secretary of state's homepage at www.sos.state.tx.us and look for the link to the archives at the University of North Texas).

Because I am not in the commercial flag business, it's hard to answer your question. For better or worse, the best answer will be from retail sales of U.S. flags. I've taken the liberty of forwarding your question to a friend of mind who would know, but I do not know your deadline, and he may not be able to give me a timely answer.

Just from my personal observations both in Houston and the past week in New York City, flag usage is really, really high (but you already knew that). It seems higher to me than during the Gulf War. It's hard for me to say that current usage is higher that the 1976 bicentennial, though it well may be. The retail figures would tell the story.

I swear this is not the long answer.

Part of my job is determining usage versus preservation of the artifacts in the Museum collection. The flag is made of a substance that is very vulnerable to light (fading and cellular damage) so for preservation sake it is best to keep it in the dark. However, it has a story to tell so it should be on display. The compromise is that it comes out of the dark when the exhibit or research is compelling and the artifact will contribute to the story line. The flag will be on display with the current exhibit and then will go into storage until the next compelling opportunity.

Here are some points I want to make sure I've gotten accurately. Please check these statements:

The exhibit unfurls 31 historic flagsnot replicas, but the actual flags which flew over battles during the Texas Revolution, the Civil War, the Spanish-American War, and World Wars I and II. (i.e. were the ones on exhibit actually used in the field by Texas troops in the designated wars or are some simply representative of what was used; if so, which?)

These are the actual flags that were present during the events noted

All exhibited flags have been conserved recently, and most are on public view for the first time.

Thant is true for some. Others have not been seen for a hundred years, others only fifty or sixty, a few have been on display briefly in specail venues (eg. in the offices of some of the folks that gave money)

Four of the five existing Lone Star Flags from the period of the Texas Revolution reside in Mexico City museums. One is in the Republic of Texas Museum. (The Texian Flag in repository at the Heritage Society of Houston proved during conservation not to date to the 1830s.)

Actually there are three lone star flags in Mexico at this time and three other flags from the 1830s-40s. We do not have the final verdict on the Heritage Society flag. It may yet prove to be authentic.

The exhibit displays all six existing flags of Hood's Texas Brigade. That is correct Also, I understand that you are a dentist by profession but are also adjunct professor of history at TCU. How do you prefer to be referred to? Since my work with the museum began I no longer teach at TCU. I prefer not to hit the dentist thing too hard. I would rather emphasis my academic credentials
