I plan to complete the article hopefully this coming weekend; I can be more detailed then. But here is a basic guideline of photo topics. The prime event is the annual Cotton Jubilee, held in late October. The only problem is, it was rained out when I was there and they are still evaluating what to do this year. I'm sure, given the event's popularity, that they will figure something out. In 2002, they ended up moving it up a day and into the mall parking lot rather than the squishy grass area. We may have to play this one by ear.

I will say a lot about the Puddin Hill store; it is right off of I-30. It is a cute, down-home country kind of shop that is famous for its homemade breads and cakes. They may let you shoot them while baking. In particular, they have several chocolate attraction - a life-size carousel made of chocolate horses, for instance, and a large doll house.

I also took a downtown walking tour, which is marked by several historical plaques mostly along Lee Street. There also are many antique shops, etc. that I will mention.

Another main highlight is the Audie Murphy/American Cotton Museum. They have many artifacts that trace the history of cotton and World War II veteran Audie Murphy - both hometown claims to fame.
