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### Monumental Men

It promises to tell the story of post WWII like no other film has. Dallas resident Robert Edsel, author of the book on which the new film, *The Monuments Men* is based, weighs in on Clooney and the heroic rescue missions of priceless works of art.

### SET AMONG THE RUINS OF WORLD WAR II ROBERT EDSEL'S

nonfiction book *The Monuments Men: Allied Heroes, Nazi Thieves, and the Greatest Treasure Hunt in History* reads as much like a spy caper as it does a historical book. Goerge Clooney and Grant Heslov adapted Edsel's book for film and it's already being considered as an Oscar contender for next year. Clooney has said he wanted to make an ensemble cast film a la *The Guns of Navarone* while the sure-to-be blockbuster was filmed in Germany and England earlier this year. But the movie had to start somewhere.

Standing alone on the Ponte Vechio Bridge in Florence, Italy, Robert Edsel was moved. So moved, in fact, that he felt the need to try and fully understand how the art treasures of World War II survived the wreckage that befell Europe.

Part sleuth and part art aficionado, Edsel has the personality of a man who takes action. He set out to find the long overdue answers to questions that have beleaguered the cultural world for over seventy years...where were the treasures hidden, how were they returned, and for those pieces not returned, what happened to them?

During World War II, Hitler and his troops were known to have pillaged hundreds of cities across Europe. Why did Hitler want to obliterate cultures as if they never existed after he and his army pillaged through the best of the best. Modern culture has recounted, through many terror-filled books and movies, the millions of lives that were taken away, and with them, expensive possessions. The Monuments Men film is a a visual journey detailing Hitler and the Nazis' unimaginable plundering of Europe's greatest works of art. It is the story of the heroic search and rescue conducted by a seemingly unknown group of Allied soldiers known as The Monuments Men. These were the enlisted soldiers responsible for finding and saving all the priceless treasures that had been stashed away. All of these factors compelled Edsel to write this unforgettable story that has significantly contributed to the upcoming film based on his book.

"The United States did something valiant during World War II to protect the greatest cultural

treasures of the world," says Edsel. "Our country did not take a single work of art as war booty. On the contrary, it made every effort including more than six years {after} the close of the war to return to victims their belongings," he reveals.

In his book, he takes us to the past with vivid detail and when Robert Edsel speaks, people listen. As a lecturer and author, he travels around the world to tell the story of the looting of these art gems. "I had to let go of what I was familiar with so I sold my business and started again from the ground up. By being in Florence and Paris so much, I became interested in art even more," Edsel states. 
the books benefited from that."

In a conversation, Edsel told me what the process of writing this book has meant to his life and to those of us who are deeply affected by art. "I didn't choose this project: it chose me. It has demanded every ounce of my energy, resources, and creative thought. It really continues to provide me with amazing experiences as we get closer and closer to identifying all 400 or so of the Monuments Men and women. I hear over and over again how important it is that we honor these heroes and bring attention to their deeds and service. Leaders today must have an appreciation of and respect for the cultures of other countries and do all within their power to protect that heritage."

He goes on to say, "The Monuments Men were all a part of rescuing irreplaceable art...the basis of our cultural world. You have to remember that millions of documents - the ones that run our society - were lost to the war, but found thanks to these men. You know, these guys built the cultural country we know today — in the United States, especially. Remember that the U.S., before WWII, was considered a cultural backwater compared to the rest of the world. But after the war, these Monuments Men became the directors, curators, art historians, and leaders of the greatest museums we know today."





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### Stationery

How does your personalized stationery really reflect you? Whether your approach to formal correspondence is simple, elegant, bold or colorful, **our Ms. Modern Manners Sharon Schweitzer** shares tips on stationery for your special day and beyond.

THE AGE OF SOCIAL MEDIA HAS NOT SABOTAGED THE ancient art of handwriting on personalized stationery. Just as your hair, shoes, and watch make a personal style statement, so does your stationery wardrobe. Eons ago, personalization began when knights wore special colors with insignia into tournaments and battle to obtain full credit for their heroism. These colors and insignia were called "coat of arms." The full coat of arms, or just a part called the crest, were embossed or engraved on stationery.

Communication today has surpassed the once limited choice of pen and paper as we engage in instant messages, texts, email, blogs, social media, and more. Frequently I am asked, "Do I have to send a handwritten note to every host or hostess? May I just send an email since it is faster?" My response is, "No, it is best to remember that people delete email and save and treasure personalized notes and invitations."

Luckily, modern conventions have surpassed the quill and ink well, along with the confines of white, ecru and gray paper. Today's stationery wardrobes are filled with beautiful choices of bright papers, numerous inks and creative designs. You may personalize your own stationery via numerous choices at your local paper source, on-line stores, or on your own computer. To get started on the new you in the New Year, begin by considering the impression you plan to make. Your personal stationery reflects your personality. How to decide?

**Notepaper and Style.** Are you kinesthetic? Touch the paper and feel it to determine quality and softness. Paper may be made from wood or cotton (usually more soft and rich) and it will feel different to the touch. Notepapers may come as correspondence cards, fold-over notes, informals and letter sheets. These notepapers are each designed for different purposes and preferences. When writing invitations, thank you notes, acceptance and regrets, and business correspondences you'll have to choose the best fit for the occasion.

**Correspondence Cards.** These tend to be more casual with a wider variety of paper and design. Single, flat sheets of a heavy paper stock and are designed to be used as a quick note for business or personal reasons. Make sure to write only on the front of these increasingly popular note cards.

Fold-Over and Informal Notes. Another more casual style also for business or personal reasons, but used for a longer note. These range from thank-you notes and informal invitations to short messages to friends and acquaintances. Often your monogram or name may appear on these notes. For informal notes, resist the urge to be fooled by their name as they are the most formal of the notecards. Usually small, white or ecru fold-over notes engraved in black ink and may have a paneled frame.

**Letter Sheets.** Single sheets folded in half used for longer letters or business correspondence. Three main types that differ in size, from smallest to largest: social letter sheets are for social and personal writing, monarch or executive letter sheets can be



used for personal or business casual letters, business letter sheets are for more formal business correspondence or company letterhead.

### **PAPER CHASE**

Age-old techniques and modern technology allow numerous choices for style and budget.

**Engraving** is the oldest and most costly. Beautiful process for reproducing three-dimensional images on paper in exquisite detail. Engraving from metal or copper plate. Ink is deposited on a raised impression. A "bruise" may be felt on the back. **Embossing** is popular with monograms, where an image is pressed onto paper creating a three-dimensional look. Blind Embossing: identical process as engraving without the ink. Debossing is the process that depresses the image below the surface. Remember for weddings, until the couple is married, there is no monogram with both the bride and groom's initials, only a duogram.

Letterpress is the historical method with a recent return into style involves raised type on blocks to press ink into paper surface leaving an indentation. Thermography is less costly than engraving, resin powder melted with heat over flat-printed ink and may create a small rise. Sometimes referred to as "raised printing." Flat Printing is also known as lithography. Process applies ink directly and flatly to paper with no raise. Very contemporary clean look. Laser Printing is, of course, digital printing using toner. Handles type and graphics better than inkjet printing. Quick and easy, but the process also limits paper-weight and thickness. Remember to be cautious with ink color. In the US, red indicates anger and displeasure. In Asia and other parts of the world, Buddhists write the name of the dead in red. Think carefully before you finalize and approve the print color on your personalized stationery.

### TREND WATCH

For men, according to Crane & Co., today the most popular choice for a man's personal stationery is the correspondence card. For women, informal stationery notes are currently considered the most popular stationery item for women. Some of the top stationery trends in 2013 include a vintage look with nostalgic designs. Monograms are back and a unique and sophisticated way to add a personal touch with your initials. Create your own design with anything from initial block monograms to interconnecting script monograms. Letterpress is becoming increasingly popular while remaining rich and elegant. Mixing typestyles is a big hit. Combining large script letters and clean block letters gives a custom look to typesetting. Various shades of blue and green paper have been popular...and in 2014 looking forward to tones of red paper.

Personalized stationery includes choices of colorful design, paper and print style. Make a statement as unique as your wardrobe and appearance. Your choice of stationery is a reflection on you and your style, so ring in the New Year with a new you of connecting.



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### THE TEXAS HILL COUNTRY HAS LONG BEEN A MAGNET TO

families in search of a quiet escape from the city, luring visitors to hike its winding canyons, wade bubbling creeks, or scale a rocky outcropping to witness the spectacular colors of sunset over oak-strewn hills and valleys. Yet until recently, there were few opportunities for a newcomer to enjoy Hill Country living without sacrificing the comforts, services and refined luxury that wealth affords in Texas' larger metropolitan areas.

Boot Ranch fills that void with a unique combination of elegant ranch living, world-class golf and outdoor adventure. Just five miles north of historic Fredericksburg, the growing community offers a variety of avenues to property ownership as well as non-resident club memberships. Members gain access to fishing and canoeing on spring-fed lakes, trap and skeet shooting, tennis and sport courts, and a resort style four-pool swimming complex with designated adult and family pools. Clubhouse amenities include a golf shop, fine and casual dining, a spa and fitness center, and lavishly furnished men's and women's locker rooms complete with steam rooms and cocktail lounges. Two member lodges in the Clubhouse Village offer a total of 10 one-bedroom guest suites, each with its own fireplace, flat screen television, Jacuzzi tub, coffee bar, private balcony and Wi-Fi connectivity.

Launched in the spring of 2006, Boot Ranch was still in its early development stages when the 2007 recession slowed sales of its residential lots. Rather than mothball the master-planned community, the developer continued with construction of a 55,000-square-foot Clubhouse Village and other infrastructure. This year alone, the developer invested more than \$1 million to replace all of the grounds keeping equipment with the latest John Deere vehicles and machinery.

Thanks to those investments to bring the full range of planned amenities on line and up to a world-class standard, lot sales are brisk and accelerating this year, according to Sean Gioffre, director of real estate sales and marketing at Boot Ranch. "We currently have six homes under construction and by this time next year, I expect we will have a minimum of 10 to 15 additional homes under construction," he says.

Golf at Boot Ranch is nothing short of exceptional. Rated among the top 10 new golf communities in the nation by Golf Digest and selected by the Dallas Morning News as one of the three best courses in Texas, the links exhibit the finest work of designer and PGA legend Hal Sutton. The course complements the landscape that inspired its design; from the rushing waterfall that forms a backdrop to the 10th hole, to the distant ridgeline rising beyond the Clubhouse







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Village, the links embrace and blend with the rolling Hill Country. More than a recreational feature, the course also serves as an open-air classroom, thanks to a partnership between Boot Ranch and the Fredericksburg Independent School District. Young golfers learn nuances of the sport both on the links and in the 34-acre Practice Park that stretches just below the Clubhouse Village. The Practice Park provides multiple hitting areas where golfers can spread out and practice their full shots in all wind directions. There is also a short game range and an executive par three course. And in a commitment to reduce demand on the City of Fredericksburg's water system, Boot Ranch irrigates its golf course and landscaping with clean, freshly treated water from the local wastewater treatment plant rather than relying exclusively on municipal drinking water to keep the Bent Grass greens green.

Boot Ranch spared no expense on its 55,000-square-foot clubhouse. Echoing the National Park Service Rustic style of architecture seen in many state and national park structures constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps during the 1930s, the clubhouse combines sturdy limestone walls and huge, rough-hewn cedar timbers arching overhead, accented by heavy wrought iron fixtures and niches built into the walls. On cool winter evenings, fires blaze in massive stone fireplaces throughout the clubhouse buildings and on patios and decks overlooking the lakes and golf course.

Though decidedly Texan and in harmony with the local Fredericksburg style of stone and timber construction, the clubhouse's soaring ceilings, dark hardwood paneling, and rustic antler or wrought iron light fixtures conjure and air of European castles, an atmosphere reinforced by rustic leather-upholstered furniture and the trophies of wild game mounted to the walls. The castle sensation grows stronger for those visitors privileged to descend the narrow, spiral stone staircase to the wine cellar, dug into the hillside below the kitchens. The sommelier stocks award-winning vintages from many of the local vineyards, as well as fine wines selected from around the world.

Boot Ranch offers vertical memberships that extend club privileges to parents and grandparents, children and grandchildren, enabling extended families to share the full range of experiences that the community has to offer. Being able to provide opportunities for children and their families to enjoy a Boot Ranch getaway is important to members like Peter Wareing of Houston, a charter member of the golf club. "The family membership concept creates more of a family atmosphere, rather than a corporate type club," said Wareing, who is a member of four golf clubs across the country. "Boot Ranch is developing more of a family DNA and a community DNA, more like a country club. It's a great, welcoming place to be." The Wareings own a farm outside Fredericksburg, so the

family opted for a club membership without purchasing or building a home in Boot Ranch. Club members can also reserve rooms in the lodge for weekend stays at the ranch.

Residents can purchase club memberships at discounted rates, and Boot Ranch offers several housing options. The most affordable is to purchase a partial ownership in one of several enclaves, dubbed the Sunday Houses as a nod to the small homes that area settlers built in Fredericksburg for use on their visits to attend Sunday services in town. Each Sunday House is actually a five-building complex clustered around a central courtyard, with four individual bedroom suites and a freestanding great room with kitchen.

The newest homes at Boot Ranch are the Overlook Cabins, built in the Fredericksburg style and combining indoor and outdoor living. Designs are modular, so a buyer can chose elements such as bedrooms, office, great room, or indoor or outdoor kitchen to include in a cabin design. One recently completed cabin measures approximately 2,900 square feet.

The majority of Boot Ranch's residential units are single-family homes built on estate lots. Plans are subject to approval by a design review committee, but a buyer may use their own architect and builder. The chief stipulation on design is to follow the Fredericksburg style. The custom homes in Boot Ranch range in size from 2,500 to as much as 15,000 square feet. Although Boot Ranch offers the seclusion of ranch style living in the county, it is near enough to Fredericksburg to offer municipal services including underground electricity connections, city water sewer, and natural gas, as well as good reception for mobile devices and residential high-speed Internet access.

Most of the homes at Boot Ranch overlook the golf course from scattered hill-tops and ridges, harkening to the secluded ranch homes that dot the surrounding Texas Hill Country. Under utility agreements with the City of Fredericksburg, Boot Ranch is limited to approximately 400 water customers at full build-out of its 2,050 acres. To meet its financial goals from such a finite number of lot sales, the developer must sell home sites in the large bites that only estate lots of four or more acres can provide.

What that means for residents and golf club members is that Boot Ranch will never crowd conventional, suburban-sized home lots alongside its greens and fairways. The community is built around the beauty of the Hill Country, and is designed to preserve that natural setting for generations to come. "This will always be a high-end, low-density, private golf community," Gioffre says. "It is truly a one-of-a-kind place for families."

As one of the most famous almost-household-name event dynamos on the planet, Cowie's goal in business is simple. He says, "I strive to guide others in their quest to live fabulous lives, and of course, in throwing the perfect shindig."

With all of his successes Cowie has a plethora of advice for those planning to throw an unforgettable event in the near future. Muse no more.


- 1. When hosting a party, follow suit with the time on the event invitation.
- 2. Be as punctual as possible, so guests aren't forced to linger.
- 3. Keep cocktails to 45 minutes.
- 4. Try to serve the meal in an hour and a half so that the fun part, dancing, lasts much longer. This

way both the hosts and the guests can get a little more enjoyment out of the party, pleasing everyone.

Not only is Cowie interested in satisfying his clients, but he also is apprehensive about being environmentally aware in this business. He confides, "Wedding trends change from year to year; however, I want the "eco-chic" trend to stay for the long run. The wedding industry can be wasteful." 
### **Divine Design**

Shelby shared that Shonda Townsley and John Burks from Townsley Design, Sarah Miller and her assistant Anita Pruendaare, of Caplan Miller, and the Driskill's Linda Poole were extremely creative and brought many incredible ideas to the planning table. According to David Kurio, "From my very first meeting with the Krauses it was very apparent, as she arrived with rolling luggage filled with inspiration, that they had done their homework. Sheri and Shelby had a very clear vision for decor and flowers for the wedding. It was our role to make their vision a reality."

No detail was overlooked for the reception. Shelby and Travis wanted different vibes in different areas, so they had a champagne and caviar bar on the Brazos balcony that was enclosed and pumped with an extra 10 tons of air conditioning. Kurio created champagne flute chandeliers, with 600 champagne flutes hanging from ribbons, which served as "crystals" for the chandeliers that were cut by the waiters to serve the champagne.

On the 6th Street balcony, Travis dictated the décor, which included the UT Tower groom's cake by Simon Lee Bakery of Austin, bolstered by a base of fresh pomegranates. Also on hand was a cigar roller with personalized cigar bands







for the occasion and a smoking lounge with a whiskey bar. The bar and décor was done in dark hardwoods and in the Citadel club, there was a sushi and saké bar, with an ice-carved bar. This was the couple's cool, contemporary area with coffee tables made out of Lucite and TV screens that showed streaming video of the dance floor in the main ballroom. The couple chose Big Blast and The Party Masters from Atlanta for their main stage band, while the Lucky Strikes from Austin played Rat Pack-type music in the charcuterie room.

The cuisine included smoked meat and oysters cooked to perfection, African prawns that were 8 inches long, charcuterie including truffle pates aged cheeses and house-made sausages and salamis. Lamb lollipops, beef and venison tenderloin, a trio of salads including lobster, beet and blue cheese, crab cakes and grilled scallops and Russian caviar also complemented the spectacular culinary feast. Crystal and silver pieces from the bride's mother's and grandmother's collections were used as the serving pieces. Each

food area had special china and silver that was selected to correspond with the particular food being served. To further make each food area special, a different specialty table linen was selected to differentiate each area, which took six different rental companies to accomplish. In fact, over 3000 monogrammed linen napkins were used at the bar and food service areas that had 20 chefs to plate each item individually.

Dallas-based Frosted Art's Bronwen Weber created the majestic cake, and according to her it was originally to be eight feet tall, but ended up at 10. "It was three different flavors: classic hummingbird, silver pound raspberry petit four, and orange blossom," says Weber. "It was every bit as delicious to match its stunning presence and there were thousands of hand-made flowers in shades of blush pink, and miles of intricate piping. The cake took hundreds of hours and considerable planning to get it up the stairs, as it didn't fit in the elevators." The effort was worth it because of the wow factor in the middle







of the foyer that it created in tandem with the rest of the stunning venue envisioned by the Krauses.



The ceremony had both a classic and vintage feel to it, with elements of "something blue." Designed by Rosa Clara, Erin's ivory and lace A-line silhouette gown







terpieces featuring crystals and red roses.


