Dear Blissful Traveler

Whether it's your sister, your boyfriend's brother, or your very best friend, a wedding gift is always expected - destination wedding or not. Use the wedding registry to select gifts from the couple's list that they truly need and will use. Feel free to be generous, but you don't need to break the bank.

Buy a gift that matches your relationship with the couple. You will naturally spend more on your brother than on your distant childhood babysitter. Friends of the bride and groom will know just where the couple is registered, or if they are seeking funding for the down payment on a new home or other large purchase. Stay within your financial constraints and budget.

Although it's tempting to present the happy couple with their gift face-to-face, it's more appropriate to arrange for gift delivery to the couple's home. This saves the bride and groom from shipping the gift back home and the risk of breakage.

ALL GROWN UP

From being a youthful seventh grader to the board of the school PTA, the mean girl spirit has no expiration date. Here's how to take the high road, according to our lifestyle expert Amy Edwards.



CIRCLE OF FRIENDS

While thinking about female friendships and its sometimes "mean girls" connotations, I immediately recalled the myriad ways that I have been wronged or hurt in friendships over the years. But then came a moment when I needed to ask a more important, reflective question: Had I ever been a mean girl? The honest answer is: yes. I've had moments when I knew I wasn't behaving as my best self. However, these scattered moments fizzled out as I got older. Or so I would like to think.

A few years back, I was in a fairly tight-knit girl-group. It wasn't until I was out of the group that I realized how exclusionary this group behaved. When I was "out" of the group, it was a complete shock to my system to no longer be included in friendships that had been at the epicenter of my social world. Not long after, I ran into a mutual friend of that group and I told her how I had become persona non grata within this particular circle, and she proceeded to confess that she had felt left in the dust for years by this group as well, all the while I had been a party to making a lovely person feel this way crushed me. My sentiments turned to realizing that I never want to make someone feel excluded or unwanted.

It's easy to feel anger and indignation toward those who hurt without thinking. In those situations, there's usually that one goal: for one person to feel like they are better than others, whether it's through exclusion, gossip, one-upmanship, or just carrying the newest, latest, most expensive Hermès bag out there. But it's quite possible that the older we get, the more complicated the underlying reasons can be for our actions. And in my case, I was simply not paying attention to what mattered.

Or maybe there are just "mean girls" out there. At my 40th birthday dinner with the same group, one girlfriend was intentionally left out. When I noticed she wasn't invited and suggested she be included, the hostess, who was always calling the shots in that group, said definitively, "No. It just needs to be our core group." But I knew my left-out pal was going to be hurt, of course. I agonized over it, but I had been told no and apparently, that was that, as I was not the host.

I was right. My friend who was excluded was very hurt. I know because I asked and I feel terrible about not standing up for what I knew was right in that instance—certainly at forty years old. I apologized.

As girls age, studies show that they learn to be more covert in their aggression, then hone those covert skills as we become adults. So, these girls grow into an increased reliance on relational aggression to control their own status. As researched by Ditta Oliker, PhD, in Psychology Today, the mean girl's M.O. is as follows: "Her friends do what she wants, she is charming when she wants to be, she's manipulatively affectionate, she takes no responsibility for hurting another's feelings, and defines right and wrong by the loyalty or disloyalty shown to her. She is usually the one who decides who should be the victim." Wow. All the wasted energy it takes for a girl to be mean.

OH, GROW UP

Grown-ups discuss, forgive, and get real. And while we can all have moments that aren't our finest, we can we also work to keep perspective when we are faced with these situations. For one, stay the grownup and don't be a mean girl. It is simply immaturity extended to adulthood. And it doesn't have to be the reality. Refuse it.

Second, don't fall in line. The followers are just as at fault as the one calling the shots. It's when I was an enabler that I helped fuel the fire. Keep your guard up, so you aren't worried about your own survival over kindness to others. I wouldn't want my daughter living off false stories they've created and telling lies to paint themselves a certain way. Whether it's in the workplace or on social media, they can tout their 'besties' all day, but don't fall into thinking that this is normal grown-up behavior.

And lastly? Include, include, include. Watch out for anyone on the sidelines. Reach out to include them, even when it might seem awkward at first. Compliment the woman who clearly tried to put her best fashion foot forward at the next gala but is sitting alone. While this sounds elementary, I can't tell you how many of my friends of all ages have expressed having their feelings hurt by being excluded just recently. The more the merrier is always true. And love? Love always wins.

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Nothing ventured, nothing gained, right? Weigh the risks versus returns and see how antifragility can strengthen your resolve, according to our dynamic parenting and relationship expert, Dr. Miranda Fernande Walichowski

THE ANTIFRAGILITY FACTOR

RAISE

Volatility specialist, intellectual, philosopher, and professor Nassim Nicholas Taleb challenges the concepts of "robustness" and "resilience" as aspirational markers of strong individuals, organizations, governments, systems, ideas, or people. Instead, he offers a concept that promises greater staying power because it leverages chaos, disorder, and uncertainty. "Antifragility," Taleb explains, "is beyond resilience or robustness. The resilient resists shock and stays the same; the antifragile gets better." In his book *Antifragile: Things That Gain from Disorder* he presents a compelling argument for how we should strive to be.

When something is fragile, it breaks. Taleb found that most people answer that the opposite of "fragile" is robust, "resilient" "solid," or something of the sort. However, his concept of antifragility goes beyond those words and purports that something or someone can benefit from shocks, stress, adversity, or trauma. The myth that he associates with antifragility is that of the Hydra. The hydra is a multi-headed, lizard-like monster. If someone decapitates it, it grows two heads where there was one. It becomes stronger with adversity.

Fragile things break or suffer under volatility, chaos, and stress. Returning to mythical reference, Taleb illustrates fragility with the Greek myth of the "Sword of Damocles." Damocles envied King Dionysus' power and luxury. King Dionysus allows Damocles to experience being a king. At first, the experience is something that Damocles relishes. All of a sudden, the responsibility and burden of power and success make the crown lackluster and threatening.

Resilience, on the other hand, is the capacity for recovery from difficulties or the ability to return to an original state. Despite volatility, stresses, and challenges, a resilient individual, organization, or system has the ability to return to baseline. The next level of resilience is the ability to grow strength from each challenging experience. We all want that, don't we?

ROBUSTLY RESILIENT

How does one become resilient? How does one leverage adversity, chaos, randomness, and stress to become stronger? Here are some ideas that Taleb poses for building antifragility.

Consider not relying on the advice of others if they, as Taleb suggested, "do not have skin in the game." We live in a knowledge economy, and we have become insatiable consumers of information. Many times people are officious in offering opinions about what we should do. However, these commentators do not have a vested interest in a favorable outcome of our decisions. It is easy for them to opine without thinking about the consequences of their opinions. Furthermore, we live in an era where not all research studies are successfully replicated, in which new knowledge surfaces daily, in which anyone can have a forum to speak as an expert. Taleb recommends we stop seeking guidance from others and instead use trial and error as a means to discover what is best for us.

Use "via negativa" as a counter to adding things to your life. Many times, individuals when confronted with the desire to enhance their lives, they will often default to thinking about things that they must add to make a better life possible. However, "via negativa" encompasses a contrarian philosophy. Instead of adding to one's life, it calls for reducing obstacles in one's life. For example, reducing time-wasting activities, reducing toxic relationships, and deflating obstacles are examples of being subtractive is one's approach to becoming antifragile.

Try the "barbell strategy." This strategy is a means to decrease the potential downside of things, rather than trying to increase the upside of things. It is a bimodal strategy in which one plate on the barbell represents taking high risk, and the other plate represents taking low risk. The bar of the barbell is the space in between the risk levels.

What about reducing interference? One of the greatest threats to fragility is the convergence of optimization and efficiency with randomness. The more we interfere to prevent and resolve problems that may not need solving, the more susceptible to fragility we become. A practical example of this would be to medicate a temporary ailment with a prescription that has worse side-effects or longer-lasting side-effects than the original condition. Sometimes, it is simply best to sit with the less-thanideal event and allow it to take a natural course.

It sounds counterintuitive to deliberately add stress into your life. You can add positive stress by doing things that challenge you. Taleb describes this as *mithridatization hormesis* which means giving yourself a little poison so that you can develop immunity from it. Instead of avoiding adversity or challenges, take them on with the idea that they will increase your antifragility.

In the end, what matters is that you can challenge your assumptions, biases, and limiting beliefs to make better decisions in your life. The triad of fragility, resilience, and antifragility can serve as a mechanism to understand how you, an entity, or system is functioning. Align your strengths with your responses to adversity, and you will gain enormous benefits from internalizing the concept of antifragility. **S**


- 1 pint of blueberries


- 1/3 cup honey


THE VIBE:

RUISING ALONG IN A SILVER ASTON MARTIN, taking in the full coastline of the stunning Côte d'Azur, we finally pull up to the grand

façade of the Monte Carlo Casino. Dressed to the nines in a tux and long fitted gown, we walk up the red carpet, get our photosw taken inside and make our way to the bar to grab a drink – shaken, not stirred.

Did I just describe James Bond's night out or my husband and I on his annual birthday trip? Every year, instead of a party, we take a trip together to celebrate. But choosing the right location for the perfect birthday trip can sometimes be a challenge. It needs to have the right blend of relaxation, sights to see – but not too many – and a place to properly celebrate. This year it needed to be even more special because my husband, Cameron, was turning another decade older and we needed to ring in his milestone birthday in style. The French Riviera delivered on all of these requirements — and more.



CRYSTAL BLUE PERSUASION

The only international airport in the Riviera is in Nice, France. As the largest city on the Côte d'Azur, Nice makes the perfect home base for your trip.

We arrived late in the evening and headed straight to our hotel, which overlooked the crystal clear water. There is nothing better than waking up to the soft sound of Mediterranean waves crashing upon the shore.

We began our first full day by enjoying coffee on our hotel room balcony, and then we strolled down the Promenade des Anglais on our way to Old Town. You could be forgiven for spending the majority of your time in Nice on the Promenade; the views are spectacular and it feels as though the ocean is actually calling to you. But there is so much more to see.

The Côte d'Azur is nothing short of inspiring with its unique architecture, stunning water, and fields of lavender, and we are far from the only people who felt that energy. Artists have flocked to the region for centuries, and the Riviera features more than 100 museums to prove it.

Twelve of these museums are dedicated to a single artist who worked in the Riviera, Marc Chagall. The Musée Marc Chagall houses the artist's most impactful pieces, including the 17 Biblical Message paintings. Henri Matisse is honored in the Musée Matisse, located near the artist's former Nice residence and the cemetery where he lays buried, which holds some of the artist's best known works.

After a day full of sightseeing and walking along the beach, we retired back to our hotel, where we indulged with in-room massages. Feeling relaxed and happy after a perfect first day on vacation, we looked forward to the next day of our adventure.

CUISINE CONSIDERED

If the first day of our vacation was about seeing

everything the Riviera had to offer, the second day was about experiencing its epicurean offerings. The French Riviera holds more than 50 Michelin stars spread amongst 38 restaurants, not to mention all of the adorable cafes and bistros tucked along almost every street. Good food is easy to find; the harder choice is narrowing your options. We let reservations and location help make this choice for us. A word to the wise – many restaurants in the Riviera are booked up months ahead of time, so if you have your heart set on a particular place, it helps to call ahead.

We managed to secure a seating at Jan, a popular spot located in a former motorcycle repair shop, not that you would ever know it thanks to the elegant décor. Every detail from the blue walls to the unique dishes was hand picked and adds to the restaurant's sophisticated, yet comfortable vibe. Jan has a worldrenowned reputation thanks to its South African chef and namesake Jan Hendrik.

The menu, a mix of South African and French cuisine made with all fresh ingredients from local markets, was inspired by Hendrik's grandmother. There is no option for a la carte; you must have the chef's selection – but rest assured, he won't steer you wrong. Even if the flavors sound like they won't work— *Cucumber Ice Cream, is this for real?*—you may just discover your new favorite dish.





CANNES DO ATTITUDE

The French Riviera is sometimes referred to as a playground for celebrities. In fact, the region has earned this reputation from the annual Festival de Cannes, the international film festival. The invitation-only festival previews new films of all genres from all around the world. This year the Festival de Cannes celebrated its 70th anniversary, with special events at the Palais des Festivals et des Congrès.

The Boulevard de la Croisette is the street on which the festival takes place; and this neighborhood offers a spot with just the right amount of star power. 'Five-star luxury hotels, luxury shops, and top restaurants line the famed boulevard. One such destination is the Intercontinental Carlton Cannes. The hotel was the setting for Alfred Hitchcock's *To Catch a Thief* and the hotel still pays tribute to this 1955 cinematic masterpiece. Guests can stay in suite 623 where the film was shot or in a suite named for the film's leading lady, Grace Kelly. The hotel also honored the brightest stars who have called the hotel home for a night or two, by naming ten Prestige Suites after them.

MONTE CARLO MYSTIQUE

The different flavors of each city on the Riviera are what make the area such a vibrant and exciting place to visit. Monte Carlo, though located in its own independent principality, is considered a part of the French Riviera and we dedicated our final day of the trip to exploring what this city had to offer.

When I think of Monaco I immediately think of Grace Kelly, so my first stop had to be the castle where

she lived out every girl's dream of being a real-life princess. Most know Kelly was an American actress who became the Princess of Monaco after

marrying Prince Rainier III in 1956. The Prince's Palace of Monaco is still the residence of the royal family, so it is heavily guarded, but you can still see the Renaissance-style façade and catch a glimpse of the view she must have had from her tower.

As we walked around and took in the view, there was one thing we couldn't help but notice. Beyond the architecture and the sea front, there are luxury cars as far as the eye can see. Ferraris, Buggatis, Maseratis, Aston Martins, you can find them all. Lamborghinis are basically the Honda Civics of Monte Carlo — commonplace and ubiquitous.

There is something about Monte Carlo that insists you step up your game to join the glamourous fun. It is the perfect place to celebrate a birthday, or indeed any landmark occasion.

For our final stop, we headed to the famed Hotel de Paris, a recognizable landmark from movies such as *The Red Shoes, Iron Man 2*, and *GoldenEye*, and stepped into the very lobby where Audrey Hepburn was discovered as a film starlet. With a marble staircase and a stunning chandelier, it oozed old-school allure.

Cameron chose the historic Salle Empire restaurant in the hotel for his birthday dinner and we were greeted at the entrance with glasses of champagne. Our threecourse meal was nothing short of pure decadence, from the cheese plate to the lobster to the Grand Marnier soufflé for dessert. The windows of Salle looked out over the Monte Carlo

Casino entrance and we grew more excited about the next stop of the evening as we watched men and women get out of their exotic cars and climb the red carpeted steps.

We soon followed their lead and found ourselves following in the footsteps of James Bond into the fabled casino. The slot machines were not kind to us, but we found our luck at the Roulette table. A few rounds in and it was like we hadn't spent any money at the casino at all.

We decided to leave before Lady Luck decided to favor someone else. After such a perfect vacation,
