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HOW THE WEST WAS FUN

LITTLE WONDER THAT GIANT IS OFTEN CONSIDERED TO be the national film of Texas. The Wild West's gallant answer to *Gone With the Wind*, the saga that envelops all that is right – and wrong – with what Texas was, still captures the imagination. The film, to say the least, was the biggest thing to happen to the state – and to Hollywood – when it was made 60 years ago on the wide-open spaces of Marfa's Presidio county. Now one can't pick up an insider's cultural guide without stumbling across the inevitable Marfa, yet then, in 1955 its dusty range served as a perfect milieu for what would become the multi-generational narrative of what most encapsulates this state's promise: drive, grit, verve, success, and yes, dreams that are sometimes challenged. The scope of how the patrician East got a little dusty when it mixed with Texas and Mexican blood is still poignant while viewing the film today.

Why re-envision the style of this classic film? The short answer: because we wanted to. The long answer is that the film's grandness still has a haunting relevancy to both the current essence of fashion, and really, does it get any better than seeing a refreshed version of Liz and Rock, as we now climb out of the post-*Mad Men* era? Shot not in West Texas, but reinterpreted in Taylor, Texas (a huge thanks to Wayne Mueller of Mueller's BBQ, Norma Jeanne Maloney of Red Rider Studios, Mayor Jessie Deby Lannen, and the town's other municipal leaders). Frankly, we wanted to share today's small town Texas with a refreshed perspective.

In the works for months and months, photographer Romy Suskin and stylist Megan Kyle Bennett, along with our team, went to work in

compiling myriad vision boards of how today's current fashions would translate into a period retrospective. It was a task we were prepared for: creating a rough-hewn backdrop matched with high-style clothes, full of imagination and dare we say it, apt to become a modern classic? The result, as you'll see, from the cover onward, is quite romantically spellbinding. Our other *Giant*-esque feature offers an intimate look at the actual making of the film, with insight from several who were there then in the mid-1950s, and might hold a few surprises for the film you think you knew so well.

Furthering this month's journey, we saddle up and head to San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, often considered as having almost as many Texan residents as those native to our friends south of the border. Accessory designer Minnie Baird's approach to the good life in her chic hacienda, with its five-star touches, will likely inspire your own décor. And speaking of decorative arts, if you're as much a fan of PBS's *Antiques Roadshow* as we are, you'll relish Dee Covey's truly insider look at the show with her feature on a guest who hit the jackpot with an objet d'art that many might have unwittingly tossed aside decades ago.

Along with a plethora of debutante balls, extravagant galas and our outlook on all things culturally glam these days, we welcome you to this issue as summer begins its warm descent upon us.






2. What do you look for in a "signature" accessory?

"OH MY GOD, UNCLE MICKEY GAVE ME A LICHTENSTEIN," marveled teenage Deborah Leeb when she received a vivid 1968 pop art pin as a high school graduation present.

That's what appraisers and producers of PBS's wildly popular Antiques Roadshow thought, too, when they featured the sparkly-eyed transplanted Texan and her museum gift shop keepsake on the January 26, 2015 show, shot at the Austin Convention Center last June.

"On a lark, we threw our name into the ring in April," says husband (and lively history professor) Dr. Robert Marshall, Deborah Leeb Marshall's

husband, about the first step in the gating process: Signing up for the online lottery to win a pair of tickets. "We thought a few hundred people would be there, tops."

Answering a cattle call of 7,000 lottery winners (out of an estimated 25,000 entries), the avid Roadshow fans were emailed to bring up to two items each for free expert appraisal. The Marshalls leapfrogged their best modern lithographs, and chose two pre-Columbian vessels, a Tao Kuang screen, and, luckily, the Roy Lichtenstein pin that sits on Deborah Marshall's nightstand.



SHOWING & TELLING

"It was a giant Show-and-Tell of stuff," Deborah Marshall said of the colossal weekend production to unearth fifty tantalizing treats for three hour-long Austin segments. The edge-of-your-sofa PBS reality show draws people from all social strata, eager to see whose junk drawer, trinket box or mantel yields hidden treasure.

About seventy-five appraisers sifted through over 10,000 wacky-to-wondrous heirlooms and objects d'art, ranging from an African fertility helmet (As a kid, "I remember runnin' around with it on my head," chuckled its owner) to a luminous Van Cleef and Arpels diamond tassel necklace pegged at \$125,000—originally bought for \$5,700 by the owner's parents in Abilene.


While the Marshalls snaked through efficient Disneyland-worthy sorting lines for specific categories—such as jewelry, paintings and sports memorabilia—a lucky few, such as notable architect Philip "Pepper" Paratore of Houston, scored a rare VIP ticket for swifter winnowing. "There's no way to predict what they'll want that day," says Paratore, who simply took one unusual curiosity he picked up at an estate sale. "Who knows what they've already seen?"

Volunteer appraisers fly in from all over the country on their own dime, to help PBS tell the story of our collective culture through attic booty and hand-me-downs. It's anybody's guess who will land on the sensational sweet spot between hope and history, now in its 19th season.


PINS & NEEDLES

When Deborah Marshall was suddenly cut from the diminishing herd, she sat down with expert Kevin Zavian from the prestigious Doyle Auctioneers and Appraisers in New York.

"Kevin lit up in two minutes," she said. To confirm his hunch, Zavian said little before whisking the polychrome enamel pin away to bone up online on background, details, authenticity and auction and insurance value, and confer with other experts. He returned beaming, with

(Appraisers compete for airtime, too, and pitch only the best candidates to producers. They hit gold when they come upon the one or two fascinating finds, and an owner who can quickly deliver an appealing personal back story.)

"My favorite aunt and uncle collected the best of California Contemporary art through the 70s," Deborah recalled, about Ruth and Murray Gribin of Los Angeles's Holmby Hills, who gave the fledgling U.C.L.A. art history major the pin as a special token of a shared passion. "All I knew was that they got it in New York on a buying trip."

By then, Zavian had plenty of tasty morsels about the artist, era and production details (Benday Dots, anyone?), which provide spice to Roadshow's must-see TV. Fortunately, Deborah was also wearing a lovely lens-friendly black top. (Note to future stars: Solid whites are a camera no-no.)

IT'S SHOWTIME

"You're on!" the female producer said before rushing off, and Deborah became one of the eighty people sent to makeup and filmed by a dozen cameras in several staging areas. Soup to nuts, the process only took an hour after the green light, she says.

The Austin shoot also included the charming Paratore and his swordfish and patriot-themed painted wood saber, which turned out to be an authentic 1870s-era folk art piece. "Man, you're a lucky duck," said auctioneer Ken Farmer of Charleston, when he pointed out its astonishing characteristics which made it worth at least ten times more than its owner paid for it.

While some are hustled to the quick take "Feedback Booth" to show off old maps, oils and dolls, Dr. Marshall had a more typical bubble-popping experience ("I was chopped liver," he jokes), but says he had a terrific time anyway. He got to view the whole shebang from a monitor backstage in the special Green Room.

In a single take, the Roadshow crew captured Ms. Marshall's delighted heartfelt reaction to Zavian's happy news that the original twenty-five buck Roy Lichtenstein memento likely hailed from the Museum of Modern Art, and would fetch a \$5,000 bonanza at auction.

"The whole team was excited and congratulatory afterwards. It was really fun." the former energy finance executive and successful entrepreneur said.

Like manyeparticipants, though, the Marshalls aren't really interested in selling her token of familial love, which Deborah wears for special occasions and enjoys daily. They simply wanted affirmation... and to see how the Antiques Roadshow secret sauce was made.

"It's fabulous to know my pin has a monetary value,' she says. "But to me, it's priceless."






I have always thought that the difference between the saints and us has to do with how they view what occurs in daily life. Saints see everything



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




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The Greatest Beach Party on the Texas Coast

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




AGIANT TIME

Like any legendary beauty past the half-century mark, the sweeping movie that put Marfa on the map and the Texas way of life on celluloid has aged superbly – *Giant* celebrates the 60th anniversary of its production, as *filmophile*

Lance Avery Morgan shares his insight on the exalted film

BIG? YEP. GRAND? YOU BET. GIANT? DEFINITELY. THE epic movie about Reata, a fabled 595,000-acre West Texas ranch and its inhabitants, changed the way the world viewed Texas, which both perpetuated and emboldened the stereotypes of Texans that still resonate today. Plus, there's no denying the vast impact of the myth, the film and the West Texas area where it was shot sixty years ago in 1955.

BROTH OF A BOOK

Inspired by real-life Texas oilman Glenn McCarthy, author Edna Ferber's 1952 best-selling book, on which the three-and-a-half hour epic movie is based, captured all that was right and wrong with Texas, and the United States, at the time. In fact, Reata, the fictional ranch in the book, was thought by some to be inspired by the expansive King Ranch in South Texas. Pulitzer Prize winning

Ferber was known to be a socially conscious author who wrote successful, multi-generational saga bestsellers that inspired film adaptations like *Show Boat, So Big,* and *Cimarron*.

In all her works, Ferber paints Texas in broad strokes; *Giant* is no exception. The men, tall and tough, and the independent women, just as robust, served as archetypes that are still firmly in place both within the state's borders and beyond. As Ferber wrote in the book, "It's fun telling you tall Texas tales. You always look like a little girl who's hearing Cinderella for the first time." The film, in retrospect, reflected the upward mobility of the masses just having recently survived the Great Depression and World War II with the fresh-scrubbed personalities of its young cast members Rock Hudson (age 29), Elizabeth Taylor (23), and James Dean (24). It was a magical

confluence of circumstances that made the film what it is today. At first, the whole *Giant* affair seemed ill fated. The book scandalized the myth we Texans tend to hold for ourselves. It also perpetuated it. The tome was skewered across the Lone Star State and beyond; even John Barkham, of *The New York Times*, described the book as "the biggest witch's broth of a book to hit the great Commonwealth of Texas since the revered Spindle blew its top." It was considered to be a parody, not a portrait, of Texas life. How would *that* translate to film?

According to Hollywood screenwriter Ivan Moffat, who adapted the screenplay, "The novel wasn't very popular among Texans to begin with. One Dallas paper claimed that if the film was shown in Texas, the screen might be shot full of holes." But it wasn't. Ferber approached George Stevens after reading the final version of the script and told him, "You know, I wrote this book twice already, and wanted to write it a third time and fill it out. But I think you've done it with the screenplay."

CLASS, GREED & JEALOUSY

Giant is a story that evokes a strong commentary on class, the dangers of greed and jealousy, and reflects four generations of Texans as tightly wound as a new lasso. But the movie almost didn't unravel the way we now know it. Grace Kelly vied for the role of Leslie Benedict until Elizabeth Taylor was awarded it, on loan from her frothy romantic comedies at MGM. James Dean almost lost the part of Jett Rink to decades-older film veteran Alan Ladd. But it was both Taylor and Dean who would end up sizzling onscreen when the film was shot in the fiery summer blaze of Texas heat. Set



amidst panoramic West Texas views, majestic and appreciative in its 35mm Warnercolor glory, the film is an homage to the American landscape that the state uniquely offers.

Director George Stevens knew his story and how to tell it with the right talent. In fact, he won an Oscar for it, while the film itself was nominated for 11, including nods for Best Actor (James Dean and Rock Hudson), Best Supporting Actress (Mercedes McCambridge), Best Costume Design, Best Music, Best Adapted Screenplay, and Best Picture.

Taylor once said that Dean's performance "had not only the training of method acting, but I think he was also instinctive." Rock Hudson, who played the cocky, young ranch baron Bick

Benedict, personified the evolution of the old way of life into the new. Mercedes Cambridge portrayed his independently dowager sister who created a vision of Texan women archetypical still today. Dennis Hopper, a teenager at the time, played the son who shirks his ranch roots to become a doctor and marry a Mexican-American. On the set Hopper became fast friends with James Dean and was mesmerized by his talents during the filming. He referred to his experience with Dean later in a television interview, "I was just astonished by him. I asked him, 'I gotta know what you're doing as an actor. I don't understand it.' And he said, 'Well, if you're smoking a cigarette, just smoke the cigarette, don't act smoking the cigarette... and you just go to a moment-to-moment reality.'"

THE NEW TEXAS

Even when viewing it today, with its references to racial inequality or Neiman Marcus representing the pinnacle of excess at the time, the film doesn't resort to the usual Texas stereotypes. Instead, it shows progress. The good ol' boy ways of doing business give way to women who commanded having their opinions heard. Segregation eventually gives way to integration. Tradition transforms itself to fit into a modern world: the film's main theme is that 'change is inevitable, so get used to it.' It was a romanticized version of the people who made Texas what it is today: the strong men and often times, even stronger women. "If it's freedom you want, come to Texas. No one there tells you what to do and how you have to do it," wrote Ferber in *Giant*.

Taylor, Hudson, Dean and its supporting actors weren't the only talent in the film. The Trans-Pecos area of greater Marfa and Pecos County, just 60 miles north of the Mexican border, became a character in its own right. Director Stevens encouraged the locals to visit the set, either to watch the shooting, visit with the cast and crew, or take part as extras, dialect coaches, bit players, and stagehands. This led to the familial spirit of the two-month shoot in which the Ryan family ranch and livestock were leased for the location fee of a princely sum of \$20,000. The Hollywood crew was indeed a far cry from the area's mainstay of ranching.

Marfa's local artist/rancher Boyd Elder, who recalls the filming as a child growing up in the town of nearby Valentine, says, "I'll bet



some of the movie was based on Sid Worth Evans, who owned the ranch near the location of the movie. He was the kind of guy who would buy a brand-new Cadillac and race up and down the road at 100 miles an hour." Elder continues, "Liz Taylor, of course, made a huge impression on me. She was like a goddess."

Joe Duncan, who bought the El Paisano Hotel in 2001 where the film's stars stayed during the shoot, said there had always been gossip about the film, saying, "At the time it was suspected there was a romance between Elizabeth Taylor and Rock Hudson. Taylor's husband then, actor Michael Wilding, showed up from Hollywood with their two dogs to investigate the rumor. He and Elizabeth had a blow-out fight in the main room that could be heard for miles."

Brit Webb, a Marfa native who as a young man worked at a local gas station when the movie was shot, also had fond memories of the film. "It was a big shot in the arm to Marfa. We were in the middle of a drought, so the money they brought in to spend sure helped us out." He went on to say, "Fans would come by the station and ask how they could see some movie stars. One day Liz and Rock were getting gas and the tourists didn't even recognize them in the next convertible over. The two stars motioned to me to not reveal they were there so they could have a little retreat from the admirers." He also recounted, "There was a man who drove in and said, 'Well, you folks are gonna be rich around here. I just saw an oil gusher.' He had no way of knowing it was just the scene in the film where Jett Rink discovers the first well of his fortune."

GROWTH AND PROSPERITY TAKE TIME

At a hefty running time of three hours and 32 minutes, the film, which spans 35 years, can at times seem as long as a drive from Texarkana to Marfa. But that's on purpose. Growth and prosperity


take time, as it is reflected in the film, from the area's first signpost and the expansive ranch location to the lonely, modest mansion dropped in the middle of it all... to the post-war private jets en route to Dallas for the opening of the grand hotel owned by Dean's playboy character.

When the highly anticipated film was released in 1956, it was Warner Brother Studios' biggest box office success, earning \$35 million in ticket sales during its original studio release. That record wasn't surpassed until *Superman* in the late 1970s. Standing up to the test of time, the film has been so influential that in 2005 it was selected for preservation in the United States Library of Congress, in recognition of its cultural, historical and aesthetic significance. Indeed, the pioneer spirit glorified in the film is alive and well in the region today, with some of its inhabitants betting on Marfa and its surroundings as an international art world player – even when your

average current Texan may never have made the pilgrimage west.

The film, like its home turf, is continually being rediscovered and discovered for the first time as a classic. An art installation in the mid-2000s, sharing the film's name in Marfa's The Ballroom gallery, tipped its Stetson to the blockbuster via found objects from the shooting location displayed in artful juxtapositions. It used objects that are perhaps inspired by the movie, or its era and beyond. As the 60th anniversary of the film's production is celebrated, the book's content and movie still remain relevant with their treatment of substantial social issues. Joe Duncan related that the filming of *Giant* has an impact even today, sixty years after its camera ceased filming the epic. "Thousands of people a year still visit Marfa to relive the movie filming." A fitting legacy to a grand movie... and to the mythical town of Marfa.




















THE SPORTING LIFE

San Antonio Sports Hall Of Fame Tribute's Black Tie Affair









FILMING TEXAS
