PREP-ARAZZI

The True Prep World of Lisa Birnbach

Preppie is a state of mind way beyond the requisite pink, green and everything classic. Author Lisa Birnbach has reinvigorated the Prep Movement and here she dishes on the Kennedy's style, preppie charities and why she considers Texas to be Prep Heaven

LET'S FACE IT: LISA BIRNBACH IS A POP culture icon. She is charmed when I tell her I felt it was like the shot heard 'round the world when The Official Preppy Handbook appeared in 1980. It's so true. The book's debut was like the New New Testament to those hungry for great style after the leftover hippy-dippy 1970s. And, it was long overdue. She made TOPH grow up and didn't allow it to be stuck in a time warp. The Official Preppy Handbook had revelations recalibrated from the 1950s and early 60s Mid-Century cool, much like the TV series Mad Men has done over the recent years... and helped to capture a forgotten style that ended before its prime. Heck, it was a guidebook for a country that needed guidance after the fuel shortage, Vietnam ending and lame Presidents. It became a beacon of things stylish after the decade of yellow shag carpeting, too much tie-dying and bad polyester endeavors.

Recently, Birnbach, along with fellow Prepster designer and co-author Chip Kidd, has given new life to old ways and updated the venerably classic book, *True Prep*, and has made it new and fresh again. It's almost like finding that cashmere sweater, all laundered and smelling wonderfully clean, after you thought you left it on a plane, never to be seen again.

Actually *True Prep* is a right-now take look at the old school of substance; things like all natural-fiber clothing, hardy cocktails like a Manhattan or Gin & Tonic, and the like. What's not to love about that? The book is filled with Birnbach-isms... including the Prep attitude towards money (ambivalent), schools (good investment), wardrobe (now your clothes fit), work (some careers will never be prep), decorating (ask mummy), scandal (including rehab and prison), and food and drink (with some classic recipes for both). She also looks at weekends (and what to do to get asked back), entertaining, sports



(including sailing and shopping), weddings, etiquette, the Internet and electronic gadgetry, political correctness, reality TV, and . . . polar fleece. And, last but not least: a do-it-yourself eulogy."

Now that's some good quality information in this book. When we made contact, I couldn't help but ask what Birnbach's favorite things were, included in the book or not. Cocktails seem to be the Preppie's greatest accessory. "In the 30 years since I published the first book, I have found a new favorite drink — a vodka gimlet with fresh lime juice," says Birnbach. "However, I have become a fan of tequila. In Texas, they make that Mexican Martini that's quite good."

When asked about what place can be defined the best Preppie destination, Birnbach is quick to answer. "That has to be Charleston, South Carolina. To me Charleston is a kind of gem – like Venice – it's cute and adorable – yet is scaled so manageably. Then there's Bermuda, Nantucket, and Capri before it gets crowded in summer." We discussed why traveling for weddings is so popular these days, and I wanted to know what the best Preppie destination wedding venue? "For me, it's reading wedding pages of The New York Times. I've been addicted to that for years," she admits.

Dressing for a wedding is crucial as it is with other occasions. Let's be frank, clothes are a part of the Preppie persona. The best women's Preppie outfit for day according to the author, "For years when I was in my 30s it was long sleeve T-shirts by Anges B. I had children throwing up on me (my own), so it was my uniform. I think women look great in man-tailored shirts, unbuttoned a tiny bit... sort of boyish. I love stripes, bright colors and oversized gingham, too." She goes on to say, "The best basic look for day is a button down shirt, straight jeans, and perhaps a cardigan when it is cool. It's forgiving on any



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size. I am going to dress this way the rest of my life. It may not be the sexiest, but it's the chicest."

Speaking of arms, I ask her, what sport best encapsulates Preppiedom? "Croquet. It's not my sport, but is so Preppiespecific because of its presentation, wardrobe and community. I mean, really, you can't just walk over and pick up a croquet game. Men who are crazy for croquet are confident in their manhood. They love it." She also observes, "Preppies love tennis, too. Sailing is a great sport – it encompasses the fact that Preppies love water and boat shoes, yet there's the chance of windburn and expensive equipment that breaks down."

Moving onto more cultural pursuits, I tell her I feel that Preppies love to give back and ask her what is the favorite way Preppies love to give to charity? "Preppies love their art museums as well as conservation societies, which are both about preserving that which is old. It's also a way to

give without being reminded there are people suffering. Giving to the mentally disabled is a big one – look at the Kennedy's with creating the Special Olympics, as an example."

One can't mention the Kennedy's without wondering who was the most Preppie president. "It was JFK for sure," Birnbaum states emhaptically. "Actually, I think that most presidents are preppies because of their family and schooling, Also, because they are the President, they usually have a big bank account and a big personality. And, really, it's easier when you are a legacy – just look at FDR, John Quincy Adams, and the Bush's." She muses, "In modern times, the White House Kennedy's were the most vibrant, attractive and vivacious couple. And, elegant. The Kennedys were attractive, confident, and sporty, too. They didn't invent touch football on Thanksgiving, but they own it. And, yes, we now know things that show their imperfections." And they had tremendous style, too, I note to her. "What Jackie wore is as relevant today as when she was alive and First Lady. The Jack Rogers sandals, Capri length pants, oversized sunglasses. I've seen very early pictures of her and it didn't seem like she was striving as a young woman. In fact, she looked like she was quite comfortable in her own skin."

When I speak with Birnbach about *True Prep* and how it came to fruition and has been received over the years, she's very candid. "I was relieved it was well received, but I didn't want to do the sequel. When the book was coming

out, the critics hated it, but it was some of the readers who anonymously posted things here and there; like how dare I talk about Barak Obama as a Preppie? How dare I open it up to people of various ethnic and racial groups - they were so ugly. The Internet is un-Preppie because it is a license to be anonymously mean. I find that disappointing." She shares, "Look, I'm Jewish – I've never hidden that. I'm not ashamed of it now because I was Jewish in 1980 also. It's important to be who you are. Plus, somebody who is an 18th generation WASP would never be able to appreciate it from the outside like I have. I mean Jewish people are like Preppie people in New Canaan, CT. There is no adjustment – no self hating. It is what it is.


I asked her if that was the reason that the first book happened. "I've always had a sense of humor because I had a really funny father. A sense of humor was highly valued in my family of origin. To me funny is one of the most flattering things to be called - besides being thin. Plus, I knew the Preppie

world from the inside and the outside. It has helped insiders feel more inside and has allowed people to understand more. I am a social observer and majored in Semiotics [every cultural phenomenon can be studied as communication], which is about what things represent. I didn't try to change anyone's life, or make it over with *The Official Preppie Handbook*. I didn't want to be famous.

Lisa Birnbaum has her ties to Texas and loves it. "I love Austin. I've vacationed there – unwittingly I'm a New Yorker, so when it comes to The BBQ Question of who has the best, I can't answer it. But, I am an American, so I love BBQ." I asked her if she experienced Austin with *The Original Preppie Handbook* and she replies, "I knew about it in the 80s – the music, food, culture. I spent time in Austin this Fall with Chip Kidd, the art director of the book. We were there for the Texas Book Festival. It was so amazing; walking home late on a Saturday night on Sixth Street. It was like time had stopped. People were meandering, almost like it was a mellow music festival with the locals enjoying the city."

In a reflective mood, Birnbaum gets sentimental about the 80's and her book that created a resurgence in the Preppie point of view. "Thinking back, for our moment in time, it was big. What I didn't know in the intervening 30 years was that it was still big. People are so proprietary about what Preppie means to them. Plus, I want to be happy and make the world a happier place." We feel that she has with her vast talents in telling the Preppie story.

Holiday Cards

It may seem silly, but getting a jump-start on your holiday card and gift list is a must. To be thorough, look at your lists from the previous years. Make sure to separate people into categories (family, friends, coworkers, teachers, doctors, trainers, etc.) so you don't miss anyone. Take the time to confirm all of the addresses, spelling, and proper suffixes. It will save you time in the end and make the entire process effortless. Don't wait until the last minute. Design and order or make cards early. If you are using a photo for your card make sure to schedule the photo-shoot in advance (2 to 3 months)

When sending out your holiday cards, timing is key. The ideal time to send your cards out is in early December. After that, everyone will be bombarded with other holiday cards. Or, if you want to make a statement don't send out a Christmas card. Send out a card in January wishing everyone a Happy New Year.

Holiday Shopping



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
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




Buster Tells It All Cover by Eric Cash

The story has a purpose, too. Carolyn wrote the book in response to the tragic loss of her young niece Becca in an automobile accident just a few years ago. Like Carolyn, Becca was passionate about fostering a bond with wildlife. In addition to aiding in caring for the animals at Pony Creek Ranch, throughout her youth, Becca dedicated much of her time volunteering for Operation Kindness, one of the oldest and largest non-profit no-kill animal welfare organizations that cares for homeless cats and dogs.

Becca always displayed compassion, loyalty, trustworthiness, and honesty in her daily life because she spent so much time caring for the animals that surrounded her. "The honesty given by an animal shows us who they are.

Their trust, when earned, stirs our compassion and reminds us of our own humanity," says Berry. To honor Becca's humanity and the compassion she shared with others, Carolyn wrote this children's book that she hopes is the first of many in a series about Pony Creek Ranch experiences.

Peace, Love & Happiness

We all want to live more fullfilled lives, but just how do we find it? Here Austin-based enlightenment expert Mary Schneider shows how to end your year on a high note, with a little added insight from Eckardt Tolle, Byron Katie and Oprah Winfrey...

What do you do when you get into a heated discussion with a family member or a friend? How do you respond in a way that communicates how you feel and doesn't annihilate the other person? In the last issue we talked about expressing our feelings and stating our needs. There are also ways, however, that enable us to moderate our strong, negative feelings so that we can create the space for the state that we are all trying to attain – the state of inner peace.

External peace is also a highly-valued state of being and is directly proportional to our internal level of feeling it. I think that the way to peace in the world is first finding peace in our hearts. There are really two very significant ways to peace. The first one is to accept reality for exactly what it is. And, love that reality. Byron Katie, the great enlightened teacher, says that when you fight and argue with reality, or what is, "You lose. Only 100% of the time."

Accepting reality as it is... is a spiritual practice. It takes vigilance and clear intention to recognize that the way God, or whatever Source is for you, runs the world is far superior to how we think He should. It means that even though things may look as if God is nowhere to be found, we trust there is a higher reason we are not privy to for why things are happening the way they are. And, that this is perfect. Piece of cake, right?

In a serious and stressful situation when the mind overtakes our ability to sustain a state of peace, accepting reality as it appears is extremely challenging. We attach deep meaning to the thoughts surging through our brains and we become completely convinced that they are, in fact, true. When these thoughts are stressful and agitating, the attendant emotions engendered are difficult, at best, to handle. At times, we engage in all manner of outside activities to try to avoid the negative and uncomfortable feelings that arise because of these thoughts.

Author and enlightened expert Eckhardt Tolle says that these thoughts are our ego and we need to tell our egos to step aside and instead allow the feelings we are avoiding to surface. We will always be able to process them because God never gives us anything we cannot handle. In addition, he says that our divinity within is wholly capable and equipped to deal with these feelings. He says to just allow yourself to feel them. In my own experience, when I remember to engage in this practice, those agitating, uncomfortable feelings are replaced by a state of peace in a relatively short period of time just by allowing them to be.

I think that what really happens when we engage in this practice is that we bring ourselves back into the present moment. And, being present is all about empowerment. Being present and feeling empowered often creates a state of peace.



The second significant path to peace is just as challenging. It can also be as rewarding. In this practice we learn to recognize that we do indeed create our own reality: it is that the world is actually just a reflection of our own internal state. If our internal state is that of peace, peace is what we will experience out in the external world and vice versa. What we see "out there" is what we experience inside, too.

For example, if our partner is constantly irritating and annoying us because of their critical, judgmental behavior, we need look no further than our own critical, judgmental tendencies. We ask ourselves, "Where am I being critical and judgmental myself? Is it my partner (this is the first place I go); my children; my boss?" If these don't become the obvious targets of our criticism and judgment then it might be helpful to see where we are being critical and judgmental of ourselves. As Oprah Winfrey aptly declares, "You spot it; you got it!"

When we engage in the practice of this recognition with the intention and full awareness that we are being shown something valuable and important about ourselves, a lesson if you will, it will become very obvious what is being mirrored back to us. This practice is a humble form of pure surrender and is no walk in the park. I was working with a client applying this type of technology to one of their family issues and they just looked at me and said, "Oh no! We don't have to go there, do we?" We did and they found a place of peace. Making everything be about the other is usually really not what's happening and it's disempowering to both of you.

Simply put, recognizing that the world is a mirror enables us to see the source of these negative, agitating feelings within and to heal them and let them go. If we are in the midst of an argument or heated discussion with another person, remember to try not to point the finger at them. When we point the finger, it just turns around and points back at ourselves. Try to stay away from "you" statements. Generally, when using "you" in a conflict situation there is blame involved. It's best to just talk about ourselves and what we are feeling and experiencing. This helps us to see our own responsibility in the situation.

In every practice where peace is the ultimate goal, it's always about letting go. And, healing. Ultimately it's about contributing to peace in our hearts and peace in the world to end the year on a high note and approach next year with the best frame of mind possible. §



"Yes, that's right. And, we want to be a part of it," Alexandra gushed on the speakerphone.


"Geez, I don't know what to say, except yes and thank you. It sounds amazing. What can I do on my end?" I offered.

Regardless of value or intent, tonight no stone goes untracked by hired eyes.



Following the sunny dedication ceremony was an exclusive oceanfront cocktail party held the same evening at the private residence of the Henry's.





An Austin home near downtown is as close to being a restful retreat as it gets in the city. Join us as we venture into a respite filled with art, collectibles and many memorable times with guests.










To an outsider, it may seem easy to exude style when you are immersed in it on a day-to-day basis like Jose Buitron and Bill Pitts, owners of Jose Luis Salon in Austin. But in reality, it's tough work when you are styling hair at the go-to salon in town, celebrity stylist Oribe calls you to travel to Paris and Milan to style the couture fashion shows for Giorgio Armani, and then running a successful business. It would seem like an overly full-time job to most, yet this fashionable couple still has time to enjoy their chic lifestyle and use their house as a vessel to display their travels, art and many years together. Built

in the heart of urban Old West Austin, the house radiates a sense of calmness, coolness, and serenity despite the hustle and bustle of the downtown life. With the creative license to build their home, the couple focused on a transitional style with contemporary pieces mixed with established elements of the house. 

HIPSTER, MEET OLD WORLD

Looking for something a little more contemporary? That's easy. Venture to the emerging Smichov neighborhood to see what's next. The Meet Factory is a vast industrial building that has been converted into a center for contemporary art, with gallery and performance spaces, as well as an art café and nightclub. Then, check out the FUTURA Center for Contemporary Art, a three-floor exhibition space showcasing both international and Czech artists. Don't miss the new Artel Design Shop in the Mala Strana district, for the latest in contemporary Czech design, too.



As terrific as these spaces are, it's not necessary to stay indoors to see amazing works of art. The quantity and caliber of serious public art in Prague already rivals its western counterparts. Provocatively engaging installations are sprinkled liberally throughout the town, each positioned for maximum impact or surprise effect, from the ever- evolving, block-long graffiti art ode to John Lennon, to the giant bronze baby sculptures of David Cerny that crawl along the banks of the Vltava.

So much is happening in Prague right now, that one starts to wonder what is beyond the city limits. With the city becoming such a popular destination, it was inevitable that people would start to venture outside the city, into what the old-timers call Czechlands, a beautiful, bucolic setting of rolling hills and charming villages.


Three hours south of Prague, in the southern Bohemia region, is Cesky Krumlov. A UNESCO World Heritage site, Cesky Krumlov is a fairytale village built along the banks of a winding stretch of the Vltava, its narrow, winding streets echoing the river's twists and turns. Dominating the bluff above town, Krumlov Castle stands watch over the sea of red tile roofs below.


As you walk through the village, you could be forgiven for thinking you were on the back lot of a major movie studio. The buildings are covered in a signature style of trompe l'oeil, which, from a distance, does trick the eye. Upon closer inspection, you realize that these daunting stone façades are actually beautifully crafted, detailed works of art.

MASKED BALL

The perfect time to visit is late June for the annual Chamber Music Festival, held at the Krumlov Castle. If you've ever wondered what it would be like to be royal, the Festival's Baroque Night is your chance. Imagine stepping back in time and attending a party at court. Masked partygoers in period costumes fill the castle's ballrooms. Baroque chamber music guides the uninitiated through a court dance











lesson, as servers in full livery pass flutes of champagne and delicious canapés. The worries of the 21st Century seem miles and miles away.

But that is just Act One of this fantastic party. Soon, the "royals" have decreed that the dancing is done. After giving you a moment to catch your breath, you are ushered through the castle into a most spectacular small, court theater for a performance. The theater is an exquisite example of baroque architecture, perfectly preserved, complete with the original mechanics and scenery. This yearly performance draws the best operatic voices in the Czech Republic. You would expect nothing less from a command performance.

After the final curtain call, you take the secret passageways of the castle to the private royal gardens, where there is more music and merriment, with an enormous selection of desserts to satisfy your sweet tooth. The night is brought to a dazzling conclusion with an enthusiastic display of fireworks.

As the last, dazzling report starts to fizzle, you gaze down at the village below you, the ribbon of river glowing in the moonlight, and you can, for a moment,

feel what's it's like to be royal.

How do you follow that act, you ask? Why, return to your royal fantasy the next night for a performance at The Revolving Auditorium. Located at the opposite end of the royal gardens from the castle, this is a theater where the scenery doesn't move. The audience does. Set on an oval riser, the seating area actual twirls around slowly, revealing different scenes being acted out in different parts of the park-like gardens. The operatic performance truly comes to life in the three-dimensional setting while the beautiful grounds give the staging a much more vivid, real, feel than just sitting in an enclosed space, watching through the fourth wall.

Afterwards, stroll through the moonlit gardens down the hill to the village proper, cast aside your Royal Persona, and drop into Cikanska Jizba, a local pub. Known in these parts as a Romany bar (it's not polite to call them Gypsies) this tiny, out of the way watering hole offers lively music in the Romany tradition well into the night to remember. You may find that being a commoner has a lot to offer, too. §




Guests arrived at the Parman family cabin just north of San Antonio for a benefit dinner that raised funds for the new







By MoJo was created to develop a new era of entertaining in Austin, turning events into experiences and memorable nights," says By MoJo founder and event co-host Monica Burcham. 



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
