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
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



# HOLIDAYS ON NICE

SOME OF MY FAVORITE HOLIDAY MEMORIES CENTER around setting the table in preparation for a family feast. When I was little, my mom would let me craft place cards for the Thanksgiving table; I'd use my best cursive and colored pencils to scrawl each guest's name and a little reminder of one thing we had to be thankful for. A few days before Christmas, we'd unpack my mom's china adorned with evergreen trees and reindeer, which seemed even more special due to its limited use. These days, I still get a rush from designing a holiday table that feels different than the year before; one that sends a rush of delight to family and friends the moment they lay eyes on the festive linen tablecloth, delicate vintage glassware or flickering candlelight. A beautiful table contributes to the magical feeling in the air and creates all kinds of anticipation for the feast ahead. This year, I incorporated shimmering touches and metallic accents to cast a warm glow over my holiday table, inviting guests to eat, drink and be merry until long after the sun went down.

**PALETTE:** Evergreen, ivory and burnished gold.

**LINENS:** In an effort to let the beauty of my vintage wood table shine, I topped it simply with a linen runner and a second "runner" formed from evergreen branches. During the holidays, I look for ways to incorporate as much greenery as possible — nothing's more evocative of a classic Christmas than pine, cedar and fir (and the wonderful scents that they impart!) No need to craft any kind of complicated garland — to achieve this look, simply cut branches to size and lay them artfully around the centerpiece.

**CENTERPIECE:** I've always had a bit of an obsession with croquembouches — the tree-shaped French confections consisting of towering stacks of cream puffs, "glued" together with caramel. Sure, you *could* spend hours in the kitchen making pastry from scratch and then methodically-assembling the tree... or you could order one from a great local bakery (my preferred route!) Either way, something this tall and dramatic is all the centerpiece your holiday table will need.

When there's no room for flowers on the table, I often consider adding a few blooms or branches in another spot, like a side table or buffet. For this look, my friend and floral designer Elizabeth Lewis from the Nouveau Romantics gathered simple bunches into mercury glass vases, and we arranged them on the mantle directly behind the table for a stunning display. These included ranunculus, tulips, winter berries and bay leaves.

**PLACE SETTINGS:** Since my everyday dishes are made of casual stoneware, the sheer sight of using fine china on the table transforms any dinner into a special occasion. The

woven pattern on these plates feels modern while the gold accents add glamour and sparkle, especially when illuminated by candlelight. I love the vintage vibe of the etched champagne coupes and mismatched silverware, adding a timeless touch that recalls Christmases of long ago.





**THE DETAILS:** A scattering of narrow brass candlesticks in varying heights appears to dance across the length of the table. I scooped these up at a thrift store recently and have been surprised by their versatility — they've been the perfect finishing detail on loads of different tabletop looks, and their slender silhouettes add a certain gracefulness.

On the first holiday I ever spent with them, Adam's British side of the family introduced me to the tradition of Christmas crackers. A cardboard tube gets filled with treats and wrapped in pretty paper then placed at each setting, ready to be opened at Christmas dinner. These play double duty as place cards, with each guest's name calligraphied across the front of the packaging.

**EAT, DRINK & BEMERRY:** 'Tis the season to eat, drink and be merry and as much as I love experimenting with new recipes and innovative flavors, there's something about the winter months that just calls for the comfort foods of childhood and the familiar flavors that always make an appearance on the holiday table. For me, Christmas morning goes hand-in-hand with my mom's fresh-from-the-oven almond kringle, and now that I have a daughter, I'm looking for ways to be intentional about creating some new family taste traditions of our own. Think about how you feel when you come in from the cold and are handed a steaming mug

of spicy cider, or sit down for Christmas dinner to a table groaning with roasted meats and bottles of red wine. Although I often can't help myself from adding one new item to the menu each year, I know that keeping these beloved traditions alive is sacred. And of course, one of my very favorite tastes of the season? Fizzy champagne as glasses clink on New Year's Eve! S





## JAM THUMBPRINT COOKIES

These are a holiday classic at our house, and I love that the flavors can be changed depending on your mood. I've filled them with all kinds of jam, honey and nut butters, swapped out the almond extract for orange or peppermint and even drizzled the tops with a sugary glaze. It's a great one to get kids involved in, since their little thumbs are perfect for stamping the dough. \*Makes 3 dozen cookies

# Ingredients:

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1 1/2 cups slivered
almonds, toasted
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoons kosher salt
1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, room temperature
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 large egg, room temperature
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1/2 cup raw sugar
raspberry jam and apricot jam

## Instructions:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper and set aside. In a food processor, pulse the flour with the almonds until finely ground. Add the baking powder and salt, and pulse to blend.

In the bowl of a standing mixer, beat together the butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg and both extracts, and beat for another minute until well combined. Add dry ingredients and mix on the slowest setting until just combined. Refrigerate dough for 30 minutes.

Place raw sugar on a plate. Scoop out 1 tablespoon of dough at a time, and use your hands to roll into a ball. Roll each ball in sugar, pressing gently to adhere. Place a couple inches apart on prepared baking sheets, then use your thumb to make a deep indentation into each ball of dough.

Bake cookies until golden, about 12 minutes. Halfway through, rotate baking sheets so they cook evenly. Remove from oven and let cool for a minute, then transfer to wire racks and let cool completely.

Use a small spoon to fill half of the cookies with raspberry jam, and the other half with apricot jam

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# Austin-based Resonance Repatterning practitioner Mary Schneider shares her expertise with how to expand and thrive during this transitional time of the season in a brief how-to guide

COMPLETION ALWAYS PREPARES THE WAY FOR A NEW beginning. As we end this year and move into a new year, why not bring the old one to a complete ending with the clear and thoughtful intention to let go once and for all?

A spiritual teacher spoke at great length of the virtues of celebrating endings – any kind of endings: the end of the day, a project, relationship, or any other human activity. The teacher suggested that engaging in some form of ritual, no matter how great or small, would imbue that ending with the blessings of spirit. Then, the next activity would be inculcated with the blessing of the former and therefore, would engender clarity from the start. More clarity allows for a pure intention and greater energy. This energy brings forth more excitement, enthusiasm and effectiveness to whatever we are doing. Enthusiasm comes from the Greek language and literally means *in God*.

### **BE STILL**

In our fast-paced culture today, we are frequently involved in any number of activities simultaneously. Recognizing and celebrating what we have completed and finished allows us to stop for a moment and contemplate. What we could use much more of in society is contemplation or stillness. Unfortunately, as a result, we have forgotten the importance and significance of ritual in our lives.

Not too long ago, ritual was an integral part of our everyday experience and in many cultures in the world it remains so. Mankind lived and worked according to the rise and fall of the sun and engaged in a great many rituals that signified the passing of time, the completion of an endeavor and the opportunity to begin anew. Life was much slower in those days and human beings were able to take the time to better plan for these kinds of remembrances.

If we take the time for small, little remembrances that mark the passages of what we have accomplished throughout the day or even the week, we open the space for a different experience in our daily lives – for a more *spiritual* experience. *Spi-ritual* means a ritual of hope and the engagement in the ritual of completion and endings injects hope into the fabric of our lives. It instills a deeper engagement with our inner selves. We then develop a greater and deeper relationship with our higher selves and our decisions come more often occur from that place. It is really likened to a little meditation that deepens our experience of life.

In the realm of energetic medicine, completion is an important by-product of a balanced earth chakra. In the Ayurvedic Chakra System, the earth chakra is located at the base of the spine and helps us to stay grounded in ourselves. When we are not given the opportunity to complete particular experiences or periods in our lives, the imbalance generated in the earth chakra makes it difficult for us to be able to let go and move into new beginnings with strength and flexibility.

In addition to completion, the earth chakra governs a whole host of significant aspects of the human experience such as home, family, tribe, transition, security, safety, nurturance, nourishment – and mother. The earth chakra is also involved in our relationship with Mother Earth even to the point of affecting how we assimilate particular kinds of food and nutrition.

For the beginning of 2015 consider celebrating the wins of 2014 -let go of your losses and disappointments. The celebration of the end of 2014 will help a great deal. That could mean a traditional New Year's Eve, along with something more contemplative to mark the end of the old and the beginning of the next year. We can celebrate the new year by re-introducing ritual into our daily lives by recognizing the blessed completion of another year as we approach life anew with more clarity, strength, flexibility, and purpose for a successful year ahead.



# VIRTUE AND POWER

In his new book, *Abusing Donor Intent*, Doug White reveals how complicated transactions between donors and charities can be, offering insight during this donation-heavy time of year

AS THE SEASON FOR PHILANthropic support hits its peak, donors might well be concerned about how their money will be used. While every organization is different, it may be instructive to take some lessons from the book, *Abusing Donor Intent*, the inside story of *Robertson v. Princeton*, in which readers are invited to look behind a charitable transaction, from 1961, to see what can go wrong.

From the book's introduction: It was the largest one-time amount – \$35 million – anyone had ever donated to benefit a university. Charles and Marie Robertson were

specific about the way the money was to be used. It was intended to help Princeton's Woodrow Wilson School for Public Policy and International Affairs focus on sending its graduates into those areas of the federal government concerned with international relations. "But the university," the son says, "was ignoring my parents' intentions." Furthermore, he maintains, Princeton's administrators were "harming the country as well."

The children of the donors filed the lawsuit. Bill Robertson, one of the sons, was the lead plaintiff.

The idea of honoring a donor's intentions is not new, but in recent years it has gained momentum in the public, regulatory and legal spheres. Although that momentum is still scarcely more than an uneven patchwork of laws and sentiment, charities are wise not to ignore their donors' wishes. This is true for all manner of gift: if a charity says the money will be used for a specific purpose, it had better honor the commitment.

In the Princeton case, part of the problem was a difference of opinion about whether the donors' instructions were being followed. Princeton did not see the issue the same way the son did.

Again, from the book's introduction: The people there say they not only assiduously honor the concept of donor intent for all its supporters, but that in this case they were particularly faithful to the donors' intentions. "Princeton," a top administrator once said, " has always used the funds given by Marie Robertson solely for the purpose for which she made her \$35 million gift in 1961." The university contends that the Woodrow Wilson School has been and continues to be one of the best



in the country for public administration and policy with an international orientation, and that it was unfairly disparaged.


By the time the lawsuit was filed in 2002, the corpus of the gift had grown to almost \$700 million, a sizable portion of Princeton's endowment. In addition to the sum of money at stake and the audacious, public challenge to a pillar of the most academically revered group of universities in the country, another, more important reason the world took note – and why all donors and all nonprofit organizations should never forget what happened – is that this dispute, at its heart, sharply raised the awareness of the need for trust and honor in the

sector of our society that most demands and depends upon those qualities. Princeton officials claim they fulfilled their obligations. The Robertson family claims Princeton made a mockery of them. No matter what the defendants might say, Robertson insists he wasn't the bad guy; he was just trying to protect the family's honor.

The settlement, which was reached after six and a half years of arduous litigation and the exchange of much bad blood, called for Princeton to pay approximately \$100 million dollars – \$50 million to establish a new foundation that would be run by the family, and the rest to reimburse the Robertsons for their legal fees.

The story is compelling. As one reviewer has said, "Informed by the slow burn of a decades-old frustration, not to mention the disposition of hundreds of millions of dollars and the reputation of one of America's oldest and most respected universities, *Abusing Donor Intent* is equal parts thriller and cautionary tale."

The cautionary tale, however, is not only for the wealthy. It is for all donors. Even though money, once donated, is owned by the charity – and the IRS is clear about that – the charity still must act responsibly and respectfully.



Everyone who supports a charitable organization has the right to know how his or her money is spent. When it accepts a gift based on a donor's expectations, the charity, through formal reports and written correspondence, must live up to its word. As the British poet and historian Thomas Babington Macaulay once said, "The proof of virtue is to possess boundless power without using it."

If nothing else, the nation's charities are uniquely created to serve society as beacons of virtue.  $\blacksquare$

She moved to New York City in 2005 to work as a professional actress. She's performed as Olive in the first national tour of *The 25<sup>th</sup> Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*| from 2006 to 2007; Clara in Adam Guettel's *The Light in the Piazza* at the Weston Playhouse in 2008; and she starred in *Cunegonde* at the New York City Opera in 2008. Worsham met her husband in 2009 at a party in the East Village. "He is a brilliant writer of film, TV, and theater and a musician," she said. "We fell in love immediately and have been married for three years. Sadly, he is not from Texas, but is from Ithaca, NY where his father is a professor of economics at Cornell University and his mother is a young adult non-fiction author. Oddly enough, both Kyle and I went to Yale University, but he graduated the summer before I matriculated so we missed each other by a hair."

Her success has been meteoric. Just how did Worsham learn about *A Gentleman's Guide*? She had previously been cast by her director Darko Tresnjak in a production of *Carnival* at the Goodspeed Opera House. After that production he asked her to come in for a workshop of a new piece he was working on and that turned out to be *A Gentleman's Guide* to Love and Murder. "I was not ultimately



### SOME ENCHANTED EVENING

Worsham fondly remembers the 68<sup>th</sup> annual Tony Awards. She wore an Hervé Léger reddish-orange dress with a plunging neckline. "Immediately after winning, the cast, creatives and producers who were in the theatre all came up on stage and we took a group photo," she recalls. "Then we were whisked away to another press room for more photos. Finally, we headed to the after-party. Our producers rented out the Summer Garden at Rockefeller Center where it is the ice skating rink in the winter. So there we were, under the stars, in the middle of Rockefeller Center, just dancing the night away. It was pure euphoria."

"Luckily, my parents were in town visiting and it was also their 35th wedding anniversary the same day as the awards. They partied with my husband and me until the wee hours and after the party we attended a party at the Carlyle Hotel, hosted by our press representatives, O&M. The party was surreal...every room had a piano player softly playing the standards. It was dimly lit and went on for many rooms and floors. Around 3AM a waiter started passing out hot ham and cheese omelets. Then we randomly stumbled upon a room set out for high tea, where a waiter poured hot water for tea upon a wave of the finger. It really felt like we'd stepped through the looking glass. We finally got home around 5AM. It was a wonderful night."

Worsham plans to stay with the *A Gentleman's Guide* through this fall and after that, many exciting concerts are in the works. "I will be singing the part of Magnolia alongside Vanessa Williams as Julie in the NY

Philharmonic concert staging of *Show Boat* in November," she shares. "I'll also be singing with the Collegiate Chorale, with the Prototype Festival, and with New York Festival of Song and *Dog Days*, in Fort Worth and LA. In addition to all of that, my band Sky-Pony will be performing gigs probably once a month."

# DAY BY DAY

Every performer has a hero to model and Worsham is no different. She admires Kelli O'Hara, Audra McDonald and Jefferson Mays, among others, but she always tries to be her best self, which requires discipline. "A typical day on the least stressful end consists of my waking up around 9:30AM and going for a run, or doing yoga. I then make breakfast and spritz around the house cleaning up. Around 4PM, I'll warm up, and around 6PM, I will head to the theatre, arriving at 7PM for an 8PM show. One of the most hectic days I've ever had consisted

of waking up at 8AM, warming up at 11AM, heading to theatre at noon for a 2PM show, doing a matinee, then rehearsing in between shows with my band, finally heading back to the theatre for an 8PM performance, which ends at 10:30PM. After getting out of hair and makeup and signing autographs, I usually get home at around 11:30PM and I am in bed after midnight. Wash, rinse, repeat."

Regarding her diet, she said, "I try to sing and speak healthily with supported breath and I try to avoid acid reflux foods, the bane of most singers. I don't drink coffee or red wine and sadly, I avoid spicy foods and alcohol."

Worsham always looks forward to her return visits to Texas. "I miss tacos and my parents and Texas in general." Her parents, Dennis and Belinda Worsham, reside in Austin, while her singer-songwriter brother, Parker Ainsworth, lives in Los Angeles. Her Texas ties run deep. She graduated from Westlake High School in 2001, ranked number three in her class. "I had many wonderful teachers starting with Ms. Wheeler in 5<sup>th</sup> grade who encouraged my extroverted personality and Mr. Erck, my choir teacher through all of middle school who helped me to fall in love with music," she states. "In high school, my choir teachers Ms. Couch and Mr. Snouffer helped me channel my voice into more focused training, while Mr. Harlan introduced me to the joys of theater,

while my extraordinary teachers Mr. Harper and Doctora Garza, who taught physics and Spanish, respectively, instilled in me a sense of work ethic, confidence and ambition."

# THE SOUND OF MUSIC

Lauren Worsham's work ethic and creative abilities are showcased on stage with her acting and singing, as well as with The Coterie, a group she co-founded with librettist Royce Vavrek six years ago to explore the importance of narrative story telling in opera and music theatre. She said she does not have one preference of style. "I love all music and all kinds of storytelling. That informs the direction I want my career to keep going...omni-directional."

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# BRAVURA INSPIRATION

Mario Testino's renowned Alta Moda exhibit comes to the Dallas Contemporary and our artfully inclined Molly Baymel learns more about the master photographer's eyes for Latin twist


WAIT NO LONGER. PHOTOGRAPHY AT ITS MOST robust is coming to the Dallas Contemporary, featuring the master photographer's Mario Testino's *Alta Moda* exhibition. Yearning for novel fashion crazes? Hanker no more. *Alta Moda* translates to *high fashion* in Spanish, and this show holds a strong truth to its name. Testino delivers the high fashion he promises throughout this exhibition, as he has done for years in his illustrious career.

From 2007-2012, Testino made numerous stays in Cusco, Peru and in doing so, attained bravura inspiration for the exhibition. When visiting Cusco, Testino marveled at the region's apparel. He began to document, as he says, "the Peruvian people wearing the traditional and festive dress associated with the mountainous region of Cusco." So, with influence from the latter, Testino was also profoundly encouraged to create *Alta Modal* due to the stunning success of one of the premier early to mid-twentieth century photographers of the native Latin Americans, Martin Chambi. To further incorporate Chambi's spectacular artistic touch in *Alta Moda*, Testino collaborated with Chambi's grandchildren and together they recreated some of Chambi's dazzling backdrops. The incorporation of those, in combination with the colors and textures of the indigenous Peruvian clothing, made for a captivating and well-received combination.

Testino's *Alta Moda* further classifies Testino as an artistic dynamo. Through this display, Testino effectively tells numerous stories, while simultaneously capturing the "tradition of ethnographic photography." As Testino shares, "I usually try to capture the moment, but with this series, I wanted to do something very different—not just with my own work, but also with the practice of photography. I tried to fit as much time and history into each frame as possible—from the traditional and festive clothing to the Chambi backdrops to the Peruvian people in them. *Alta Moda* is quite different from the portraits I am perhaps best known for."

Testino has triumphed at expanding his repertoire and the state is better for it while his work is here. *Alta Moda* displays until December 22 and for more information about this must-see exhibition, visit Dallascontemporary.org

FOR THOSE WHO GREW UP IN SAN ANTONIO IN THE 1950S THROUGH THE 1970S remembering the enchanted "Sunken Gardens" that we were allowed to run around wildly while our mothers drank tea in the Pagoda is a fond thought. We kids thought they were the biggest gardens we had ever seen and would beg to return again as soon as we left. Years later we took our own babies in strollers through the gardens for an outing to see all the fish. Now, since the restoration the place has become magical again: a 40-foot waterfall and the sounds of the gardens immediately relaxes, while bringing back those childhood memories.


# THE EARLY YEARS

In 1899, the San Antonio Water Works Company, through its president, George W. Brackenridge, donated 199 acres to the City of San Antonio for a public park. This tract comprises the largest portion of the park that today bears Brackenridge's name and officially opened to the public in 1901. There was still an operating rock quarry west of the park leased by the City to stone cutters since the mid-1800s. In 1880, Alamo Portland and Roman Cement Company (later called Alamo Cement Company) began to use the quarry, and when the company needed rail lines to expand production, it purchased a new site and closed its Brackenridge Park operation in 1908. Between the quarry and San Antonio River to the east was an 11-acre tract of land owned by Emma Koehler, widow of Pearl Brewery owner, Otto Koehler, and she donated it to the city in 1915 for a public park.

Its location adjacent to the abandoned quarry posed a challenge for City Parks Commissioner, Ray Lambert, who ultimately created a lily pond, which eventually became the Japanese Tea Garden. With plans from his park engineer, and little money, Lambert was able to construct the Garden. Between 1917 and 1918, he shaped the quarry into a complex that included walkways, stone arch bridges, an island, and a Japanese pagoda. The garden was termed the lily pond, and local residents donated bulbs to beautify the area. Exotic plants were provided by the city nursery, and the City Public Service company donated the lighting system. The pagoda's roof was palm leaves from trees in the city parks and when completed, Lambert had spent only \$7,000. In 1919 it was reported that "the city of San Antonio has recently completed a municipal lily pond and a Japanese garden which we believe are unique." In 1926, at the city's invitation, Kimi Enzo Jingu, a local Japanese-American artist, moved to the garden and opened the Bamboo Room, where light lunches and tea were served.

# **MODERN TIMES**

After Mr. Jingu's death in the late 1930s, his family continued to operate the Tea Garden until 1942, when they were asked to leave because of anti-Japanese sentiment during World War II. The Tea Garden was eventually renamed The Chinese Tea Garden, yet in 1984 the area was rededicated as the Japanese Tea Garden in a ceremony attended by the Jingu's children and representatives of the Japanese government. The



site is designated as a Texas Civil Engineering Landmark, a Registered Texas Historic Landmark, and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

By 2009, the Tea Garden was in a state of disrepair, with the Jingu House operating as a park concession stand and then as storage, so a unique public-private partnership was launched. Through a series of bonds, funds were raised for needed restoration. The San Antonio Parks Foundation, in combination with the city's Parks and Recreation Department, are responsible for the restoration of the gardens and the Jingu House. By the time of its recently completed renovation, more than \$6 million was spent on the project and according to most, every dollar well worth it for this "gem" located in the heart of San Antonio.


#### PARIS YOU LEARN WIT, in London you learn how to crush your social rivals, and in Florence you learn poise," wrote the American composer Virgil Thomson to friends at one time. Not much has changed since then in Florence, long known as the jewel of the Italian Renaissance, as well as the style capital of Tuscany.

Let's face it. When thinking about Florence three words come to mind: food, art, and leather goods. I didn't know it was possible for one city to be both culturally and historically enriched *and* have the most delectable cuisine on the planet, but Florence does, and in the chicest way possible.

This city is unique in every aspect, which is why it is one of the most enchanting places in the world. Although it seems impossible, *Firenze*, as Florence is known in Italy, has condensed 600 years of artful abundance into a 39 square-mile radius that is most easily navigable by walking its treasure trove of quaint avenues. That just gives you more reason to invest in a new pair of authentic Florentine leather bootsthis city's made for walking and each street you come across will be surpassed by a more beautiful one on the next block ahead.



Staying anywhere other than the St. Regis, Four Seasons, or the Hotel Savoy would be doing yourself a huge disservice, considering they are near the Arno river that winds through the city. Note that the Four Seasons has the best view of the city, and the best cocktails. If you're planning on staying in Florence for longer than a week, renting an apartment might be beneficial. The Portrait hotel is a newcomer to the game and is a lavish town house, and a true corner of paradise situated on the Arno. There is also Villa La Massa, a 16th-century Medici mansion, also on the banks of the Arno, which is an option for those who want to live, well, like a Medici.





Henry James noted, "Everything about Florence seems to be colored with a mild violet, like a diluted wine." Since Florence is at the center of wine culture in Italy, the choices for wine are infinite. Every restaurant and bar has an endless wine list, and if you're really serious about wine, you'll go on a wine tour in one of the Florentine vineyards. If you like beer, check out Kikuya, famous for their dragoon beers.



Because Florence is located in the heart of wine country, you could drink your way through the city, but then there would be no room left for its fine food. And you do want to leave room for food. Yes, Italy is known for its fantastic and unique pastas, but can other cities in Italy say that they are known for their blueberry steak and pear ravioli? You'll note that Tuscan bread is different – made sans salt – so the olive oils and pasta sauces are recommended to rescue its taste.

Dinner at La Giostra is a must. For the upscale food daredevils there is the famous Alle Murante. The menu changes quite often and ranges from duck liver to beef tartare; all while being located in an underground cave. Although you may want to try all of the Florentine delicacies, it is not physically possible to eat so heavily for every meal. While touring the city during the day it is quick and easy to pick up a panini at Antico noe, Pino's, or The Oil Shoppe. You will hear people talking in line about splitting a panino—don't. You'll end up wanting to order three more, they're that good. Although it is a hotspot for study abroad students, Gusta Pizza is one of the most famous restaurants in all of Italy, and it puts Chicago's deep-dish pizza to shame. Since it's hard to go anywhere in Italy without dessert, picking up gelato postmeal is a must. Try everything, eat as much as you can, and just make sure of one thing- never mix cheese and seafood.

The famous Ladurée has brought its nimble French touch to the food scene in the city. I love that it is painted in Ladurée's signature tone

of celery green and offers virtually pyramids of macaroons and their charming colored boxes. Il Borro Tuscan Bistro is where the Ferragamo family has put its stylish touch into what is both a cozy and elegant wine bar that turns scene-ish later in the evening. Venice's iconic Caffè Florian has opened an offshoot in Florence that serves delicious dishes in a hip, artsy ambiance that is decorated with paintings from the Florian artistic foundation. Eataly really is the temple of Italian food, has now opened in Florence. Located by the city's Duomo cathedral, the 22,000-square-foot space has a first floor that hosts a bookstore dedicated to food, and on the second level the "DaVinci" restaurant and store sells exclusive wines and beers, while the third floor hosts courses on food education for both children and adults. Although you may want to eat your way through Florence, it would be a crime to not leave time for the multitude of dazzling sites. Known for the Duomo, the David by Michelangelo, and the Ponte Vecchio, Florence was at the heart of the Renaissance era and has maintained its charm and love for the arts ever since. Every sculpture or painting in the Uffizi or the Accademia will have you entranced for hours, and there are enough beautiful and intricately designed churches within a three mile radius that could keep you enthralled for weeks. Because of Florence's popularity, it is important to reserve tickets ahead of time if you want to avoid standing in line. Your hotel concierge can handle those details for you.

The only time you may want to consider standing in line is to mentally prepare yourself for the 436 steps to the top of the Duomo. The climb will help you work off the previous night's dinner, and the view from the top is a spectacular reward. What could be better than a 360-degree view of the entire city? The red-tiled rooftops and a view of the Arno leading to the mountains are worth every single step.



As we all know Florence used to be a fashion capital of the world. Via de' Tornabuoni keeps couture alive in Florence and is full of designer boutiques and dedicated shoppers at Gucci, Ferragamo, Cavalli, and all the usual favorites. You can find the rest of the dedicated shoppers at the San Lorenzo leather market perusing thousands of handmade leather purses, wallets, and hats of all shapes and sizes.

There's nothing like true Italian leather, which means you can't leave Florence without a new leather jacket, boots, bag, or just about anything of the fine hide. While you're at it, nothing goes better with Sergio Rossi boots than a pair of diamond earrings from the Ponte Vecchio. Although crowded during the day, the Ponte Vecchio is an incredible spot to watch the sun set over the Arno river, and it has the best view of the stars once night comes and the shop owners close up and go home.

The thing that continues to make Florence feel so special is its hidden gems. Of course it has its famous restaurants and boutiques, but it also has thousands of less famous, perhaps even unknown places. Take a walk, pop into a random store, and more likely than not it will be a diamond in the rough.

Less populated streets are filled with vintage clothes and antiques, ranging from Chanel buttons from the 1950s turned into necklaces, to jewelers that hand-sculpt one-of-a-kind gold jewelry stamped with the Florentine emblem. For you night owls, stay awake and around 2 a.m. your nose will lead you to one of the three secret bakeries in Florence. Their location is unknown, but their steaming chocolate croissants are worth the wild goose chase.

So, no matter what you do, see, eat, or drink, your next visit to Florence will have you planning another trip there to discover more wonders than one trip could possibly allow. **S**

## WHIMSICAL, MAGICAL & SURREAL

ANARTE GALLERY IN SAN ANTONIO RECENTLY hosted acclaimed photographers Eduardo Berdegué, Thomas Dodd, Aubra Franklin, and Trish Simonite for the 2014 FotoSeptiembre exhibition, *Whimsical, Magical, Surreal.* The reception for it gathered photography, artist talks, DJ music, and a performance by local band Antique Sunset.

As AnArte proprietor Ana Montoya states about the show, "Each photographer creates an otherworldly universe that evokes the dream and the unconscious mind." And, as artist Eduardo Berdegué says, "My *Emerging Markets* series is a collection of images of produce markets in my native Bolivia. Through lowspeed shooting and forced-speed shooting and forced-processing techniques, I attempt to capture and convey not only light, but also sounds, scents, temperature, even the ancestral mix of fatigue and pride of its subjects." Thomas Dodd whose work was prominent, stated, "I have always been fascinated with the hidden forces that propel us through life and which have been codified and represented in countless cultures through myths and legends. Using photo-editing software, I stack, layer and blend different photographs together to create a final image that looks much more like an oil painting than a photograph."

Artist Aubra Franklin noted, "For me photography is about capturing a mood, a feeling. In my *Lavender Dreams* series I try to understand the layers of light and shadow within nature, what I call Soul Light. I look for moments of magic, when the structure of a landscape is in tune with the light cast upon it." Photographer Trish Simonite shared her point of view on the exhibit by noting, "Much of my recent work has focused on the history of the landscape. The images from this series *Beauty And Blood* were taken while working on a project on the Moorish gardens and architecture of Andalucía in Southern Spain. In this time of conflict between radical Islam and the contemporary secular and Christian world, I wanted to explore the idea of these two ancient religions coexisting in the landscape."
