

# DOING DEWEY:

# CLASSIFYING MATERIALS WITH CONTRIBUTORS FROM MORE THAN ONE FAITH TRADITION

I am writing about a situation that I encountered twice when looking over the recommended Dewey Decimal numbers for the pre-publication reviews in Congregational Libraries Today (CLT). One of the books being reviewed was about leadership, and the other was about the problem of suffering, but both included contributions or viewpoints from more than one faith tradition. In each case, for CLT, I recommended a number from the comparative religion section of the Dewey Decimal Classification. Because I was using the 23rd unabridged edition of Dewey, from which the 15th abridged edition is derived, I recommended numbers from the very beginning of the 200 class: 206.1 for the book on leadership and 202.118 for the book on the problem of suffering. I would have recommended the same numbers if I had been using the 22nd unabridged edition, from which the 14th abridged edition is derived.

However, if you are using the 21st unabridged edition, from which the 13th abridged edition is derived, or an edition earlier than that, you should not use these numbers. In these earlier editions, comparative religion was classed in the 291s. The number for the book on leadership would be 291.61, and the number for the book on the problem of suffering would be 291.2118 using these earlier editions.

The Dewey numbers that I recommended for these books are

the numbers that would also be used for them in a public library. I recommended them for CLT because the Church and Synagogue Library Association serves all faiths. Singling out one tradition for books with contributions from more than one tradition would have resulted in numbers that would not be useful to readers of CLT serving congregations from other traditions.

While using comparative religion numbers for materials written from more than one faith tradition is correct from the viewpoint of a Dewey purist, it is not absolutely necessary to do this in your own congregational library. You may decide that books about a specific subject, with contributions from more than one faith tradition, would be more useful if classed with the specific subject in your own faith tradition.

For example, in a Christian church library, the book on local congregational leadership would then be classed in 253, and the book on the meaning of suffering would be classed in 231.8. In a Jewish synagogue library using Dewey, the book on local congregational leadership would then be classed in 296.61, and the book on the meaning of suffering would be classed in 296.3118. These numbers have remained the same from the 21st unabridged (13th abridged) edition to the 23rd unabridged (15th abridged) edition. If you make a local policy decision of this type, record your decision for future reference.

# TECH TALK ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATION TOOLS (PART 2) by Marjorie Smink




nternet-based or electronic communication tools continue to ease the sharing of information between individuals and within groups. These tools can be helpful for congregational librarians as they work with library users and staff. Blogs, social networks and chat rooms are more examples of electronic communication tools.



A **BLOG** is an informational site that is published on the Internet. It is made up of specific entries or "posts" that are usually displayed in reverse chronological order with the most recent post shown first. The word *blog* is a truncation of the term "weblog." The majority of blogs are interactive; they allow visitors to leave comments and send messages. One well-known blog is Wikipedia.




There are many types of blogs which differ in content and delivery. A **PERSONAL BLOG** is a diary written by one person. A **GENRE BLOG** focuses on one subject such as music, art, health, politics, travel or congregational libraries. **A MEDIA TYPE BLOG** could be a photo, sketch or typecast blog. A **REVERSE BLOG** is created by users, not a single blogger.



A **MICROBLOG** is composed of posts of small pieces of digital content—photos, text, short videos. Increased functionality of this portable communication tool has increased its popularity. Friends, families and library colleagues use microblogs to keep in touch. Examples of microblogs are social media such as Twitter and Facebook.



A **SOCIAL NETWORK**, the grouping of individuals into a specific group, can be accomplished in person but is most popular online. The Internet is accessed by millions of people who want to meet others who share their interests in many subjects. Websites are used for social networking. Examples of networking communities are MySpace, Yahoo! and Facebook. Social networking sites allow users to share photos and comments with people in their network. Social networking services associated with these sites provide profiles and social links for each user as well as the means to connect by e-mail and instant messaging.

Definitely a fun and interesting way to end the summer!

#### VIRTUAL CHAPTER

Over a dozen interested CSLA members attended the Virtual Chapter breakfast meeting, held July 28, 2013 at the recent CSLA National Conference held at Lake Junaluska, NC. This chapter was initiated last year, with Dawn Domans leading the group.

All present agreed that everyone was interested in communicating with others in an online environment about the various aspects of congregational libraries, regardless of geographical



boundaries, and in providing support and fellowship to each other.

The dicussion centered on how best to communicate, and how often to "meet" as a group. It was decided to meet quarterly, with the first meeting to be held in late October/early November. Prior to the meeting, various communication methods will be explored. Think of the V.C. members as pioneers!

Well, the first "live" chapter meeting did happen on November 13, 2013. A handful of members met online via Skype, a service that allows you to conduct voice and video chats free with other Skype users, and do the same with cell phones or land lines inexpensively. (To learn more about Skype, go to http://www.skype.com/en/whatis-skype/.)

The group began with a discussion on distance learning options for librarians, a topic suggested by Sara Mansbach. Her work centers on a project to establish and develop a library in Haiti (photo at left). A librarian is in place but there is a need to provide additional training opportunities for that person,

primarily through online avenues. (Go to http://www.haitiliteracy.org/about/our-projects/village-library/ to learn more about this initiative.) It was mentioned that two libraries located in Cap-Haitien, Haiti, are supported by the Christian and Missionary Alliance: Emmaus Bible Seminary and Cowman International School. These schools may be able to offer some ideas on maintaining a library in Haiti.

In addition to CSLA's and the American Library Association's offerings, other suggestions for online education are:

MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses) sponsored by library schools such as Syracuse University's School of Information Science. Many are free at this time, if you are not seeking course credits. Other useful information from the group: Dorothy Lewis is teaching four-year-olds how to use computers in her children's library, and has found the software Boowa & Kwala (http://boowakwala.uptoten.com/kids/boowakwala-home.html) works well for this age group. There are lots of games to play in each four-part lesson, and everything is appropriate for a congregational library. (Some units are free, too!)

Of course, cataloging remains an important topic, and Pat Shufeldt mentioned the online list of cataloging tools that she has created and maintained: **Online Tools**



# PRAYER & OTHER SPIRITUAL PRACTICES



#### Fully Awake and Truly Alive: Spiritual Practices to Nurture Your Soul

Jane E. Vennard. Skylight Paths, 2013. 178p. \$16.99, paperback. ISBN: 978-1-59473-473-1. Available as an ebook. www. skylightpaths.com 204'.4 Spiritual life.

"The glory of God is the human person fully alive." These words of Saint Iranaeus form the foundation of *Fully Awake and Truly Alive*. Jane E. Vennard invites believers, non-believers, and those seeking but unsure


to enlarge their understanding of prayer and other spiritual practices.

Vennard focuses on eight practices: caring for your body, rest, silence, solitude, letting go, community, hospitality, and service. Each unit begins with a quotation and includes an invitation and guidelines for extended practice. She concludes with "The Fruits of Practice."

Vennard suggests reading her text by topic rather than in traditional linear style.

"The Practice of Letting Go" is worthy, with the theme broadened to include fasting, forgiveness, and nonattachment to outcomes as areas for letting go. In "The Practice of Service," the explanation of "hidden service," including compassionate listening, reminds us that everyone can serve purposefully.

Reading the text in its entirety provides broad perspective, and implementing the practices takes one far toward becoming a "nurtured soul." Recommended for church libraries and for readers interested in traditional and non-traditional spiritual disciplines. —Carolyn Egolf



#### Experiencing God's Presence: Learning to Listen While You Pray



Linda Evans Shepherd begins Experiencing God's Presence with this: "Today, I have a vibrant relationship with God, but this was not always the case . . . I knew I could talk to him in my

heart, but as far as I could tell, God either couldn't or wouldn't talk back." In a personal, easy-to-read style, Shepherd guides readers in an examination of various facets of God's presence in their lives. These include love, hope, healing power, and peace, among others. She uses her own experiences and those of other individuals to illustrate her themes.

Shepherd not only concludes each chapter with a prayer befitting its theme; she also provides prayers throughout her book. These are specific and personal, and they serve as excellent models to imitate. Each chapter also has a "Listening Prayer," passages of scripture that one is to read, then read again, and record one's thoughts in response. Shepherd suggests reading these thoughts to see whether God is speaking, noting that the exercise may need to be repeated before the answer can be discerned.

For Christians who feel dissatisfied with their prayer life, Shepherd's book will provide much help. —*Beverly M. Bixler* 



# On the Way to the Cross: 40 Days with the Church Fathers

Life works better when there are intentional rhythms, patterns, schedules, and disciplines. Lent is a time that

provides the focus for the rhythm of study—the cross of Jesus.

The devotional rhythm of *On the Way to the Cross* includes daily readings for Lent, each beginning with a

selected verse for the week, followed by a confession offered at the beginning and referenced regularly. Scripture readings, which are printed in the text, take the reader through the Gospel of John. Reflections from the church fathers are followed by a closing prayer—again from an early writer or from the Book of Common Prayer. Psalms are suggested for further reading.

Each entry takes only a brief time to read, but to ponder the texts and search one's soul requires time and discipline. The reward is a deeper, more introspective Lenten journey.

While designed for use during Lent, On the Way to the Cross provides valuable material for devotions any time of the year. Highly recommended for church libraries. —Carolyn Egolf





Most prayer anthologies offer something for everyone, and so do *Men Pray* and *Jewish Men* 

Pray. Both books present a wide variety of prayers written by men, one with prayers from many traditions, the other with prayers by Jewish men. These volumes are welcome for a variety of reasons. First, they contradict the "macho man" notion that men should hold their emotions in and be strong for others. Rather, these books demonstrate that a man can be vulnerable, generous, and more. Second, these books appear against the background of numerous collections of women's prayers, in itself a welcome phenomenon. These books for men add balance, reminding us of the different voices of male spirituality. Third, they help us connect traditional prayers and writings with contemporary ones. I appreciate that the editors chose to include prayers that span the ages. It reminds us that our prayer needs run deep.

Men Pray brings together a wide range of voices, and it is enlightening to see the way men from different traditions address similar concerns. The meditative selections that are included in this volume are worthy of attention.

Jewish Men Pray opens with a useful series of short essays on the purpose and structure of Jewish prayer. While the prayers included are not intended to serve in or replace the traditional liturgy, it is interesting as well to see how contemporary men have rewritten traditional prayers.

Both anthologies include brief background information on the contributors. The arrangement of prayers


Margaret is also confused about religion. Her father was raised Jewish; her mother, Christian. Their families disapproved of the mixed marriage, and Margaret's parents have not raised her in any faith. Margaret feels drawn to God but is unsure which religion to adopt. Most chapters end with Margaret's prayers; God is her confidant, her confessor, and her comforter.

First published in 1970, Are You There God? It's Me, Margaret is now something of a period piece. Teenagers had record players, not iPods; instead of texting, they talked with one another on their parents' telephones; and when Margaret and her mother shop in a department store for Margaret's first bra, a saleslady assists them. Yet the book is timeless; Margaret's voice as a questioning, perceptive but uncertain adolescent is just right.

Margaret misses the adult she trusts most—her Jewish grandmother. Young readers will see, as Margaret does, that God can be their truest friend.

Anything." To risk, allowing God to ask anything, is the challenge of this book. In its twenty brief units spread over three sections ("Everything Keeping Us from Anything," "Praying Anything,"

and "Living Anything"), Jennie Allen poses the question of readers: "What is your anything?"

The stance is evangelical, with appropriate scriptures and quotations. Stories of Bill Bright, Dwight Moody, and Jim Elliot exemplify themes of risk, effort, and impact.

The book's print is rather small, but its text will keep most readers engaged. Transitions happen quickly from story to scripture, quotation, and insight. Allen addresses the struggle between the American dream and God's call. She presents stories of people whose risk of "anything" meant adoption, service in Africa, and other "radical acts."

Despite the potential complexities of offering God "anything," and Allen's observation that doubts and disapproval are inevitable, freedom is the reward. Her enthusiasm and zest for living shine through. Her comforting reminder is to "Do your everyday and your ordinary. Godliness is found and formed in those places."





He offers strategies for dealing with hurt, fear, regret, guilt, anger, bitterness, and the "myth of normal." We must realize, Westfall maintains, that there are some things that happen in life that we will never get over. Westfall describes, however, ways to get past these as he cleverly draws biblical parallels into life. He intersperses anecdotes from his own experiences with many statements that will remind readers of the classic writings on positive thinking. Westfall also presents a concise overview of the four stages of grief from Elisabeth Kübler-Ross's On Death and Dying.



Anyone with doubts about people's innate will to live should read Lindsey O'Connor's memoir, *The Long Awakening*. In the early hours of August 30, 2002, Lindsey

and Tim O'Connor eagerly went to the hospital for the birth of their fifth child. A healthy daughter, Caroline, made her appearance that afternoon. Caroline's mother, however, was not as fortunate.

The Long Awakening is the riveting account of O'Connor's forty-seven days in a drug-induced coma and her hundred days in the hospital. An enormous loss of blood during delivery and two emergency surgeries left the new mother with oxygen deprivation and other problems. The extent of brain damage could not be determined until—and if—she emerged from the coma. O'Connor emphasizes that coming out of a coma is not like it is portrayed in movies. Although the process is different for each individual, it takes days, weeks, or months. It was an arduous path for her; even two years later, she was still experiencing aftereffects.

O'Connor lost part of herself forever, and for a long time she struggled with knowing who she was. By the time she wrote *The Long Awakening*, she had learned.



Mathias, a pastor at Four Winds Anglican Church in Spring Hill, Tennessee, and president of a group that ministers to preteens, accomplishes his goal as he tells of learning to follow Christ's lead in his everyday thoughts, words and deeds, especially with his family.

When Mathias's middle child, Bethany, became moody and withdrawn, he assumed the cause was merely teenage growing pains. Soon, however, Bethany's parents discovered a darker reason for the change. 



painting had been stolen from a Jewish art dealer, Lea Bondi, before her escape from Vienna. The video tells of the search for the painting and the decades-long legal struggle to have it returned to its legitimate owner. The story is a legal thriller but also an emotional roller coaster as the painting is found, then disappears, then comes into view again but is encumbered by a variety of lawsuits. In the end a settlement is reached.

The Rape of Europa tells the larger tale of plans that began even before the war. Adolf Hitler, the one-time art student, coveted the art of all Europe and schemed to take it all—from museums, from dealers, from collectors. He targeted not only Jewish dealers but also the grand museums, including the Louvre in Paris. Using newsreels and many interviews, this video tells the tale of Nazi plunder and the supreme effort that began after the war to recover and return works of art to their rightful places. The sheer size of this undertaking will leave viewers speechless.


# From Where I Stand: Life Messages from the Weekly Torah Reading

tions of the year. He is conversational and clear in his prose, using stories that are familiar and often humorous to make his point. It is refreshing that his insights have universal appeal and are not limited to a single approach to Jewish life. Indeed, Goldman's messages address our common human experience and should be of interest to all people.

Rabbi Shefa Gold has revived the art of Jewish chanting. Prayers and the Torah reading

are traditionally chanted according to set patterns, but Gold has developed a broader practice using passages from the Bible and prayers to promote spiritual growth and personal transformation. Her chants are well known and used in many synagogues across the country. In this user-friendly book, she teaches the reader the process she follows to develop her chants. She also shares the rationale behind a wide range of her chants, along with their musical notation.

I found the first part of the book the most useful; I have wondered how one can deepen the prayer experience and what is involved in taking one phrase from the common prayer book to make it my own. Others, more musically talented, may prefer the later sections, where Gold explains aspects of the particular phrases she has used and provides musical notation to help readers learn the chants.

Regardless of whether you look to this book for instruction in how to create your own chants or for expanding your appreciation of the popular chants developed by Gold, *The Magic of Hebrew Chant* is a gift. Highly recommended. —*Rabbi Louis A. Rieser*



When I saw this book's title, I sighed, expecting a dull listing of culturally significant books. Instead, I found *One Hundred Great Jewish Books* enthralling. Rabbi Lawrence A. Hoffman argues that the grand conversation among Jews throughout the ages is recorded

in our books and that these books, taken as a whole, present the long, complicated, sometimes contradictory conversation. Truly, the whole is greater than the sum of its parts.

An overview of a period of history or an approach to Jewish existence precedes each section of One Hundred Great Jewish Books. Because the books reflect not just the musings of one author but also mark a point in a larger chapter of Jewish life, each is presented in its full historical and cultural setting. Each book is important for its subject, its author, its time, and its point of view. The full spectrum of Jewish opinion finds voice in this collection—traditionalists and reformers, mystics and rationalists, and more.

This is a great read, a wonderful resource and, for the most ambitious among us, a stunning curriculum for understanding the grand arc of Jewish experience from the first call to Abraham to the present. Highly recommended. —*Rabbi Louis A. Rieser*



Most of the sermons are from the 1960s, yet they retain their importance for several reasons. They are the work of a master unveiling perennial themes within the holiday cycle. They occasionally offer glimpses of Lamm's views on the issues of the day. They address issues of psychology and interpersonal relations. They remind us that living a religious life is always a challenge. They serve as a model for good sermon writing, a genre of its own.


lated as grace or loving-kindness, is found in Torah as one of God's character traits and appears throughout the Kabbalistic tradition. Shapiro brings all of this and more to bear in describing a Judaism based on the idea of *chesed*.

Shapiro defines *chesed* as "God's unlimited, unconditional, unconditioned, and all-inclusive love for all creation." More simply, he describes it as God doing what God does—that is, being present and sending God-ness to all of creation constantly. If we all receive God's grace constantly, the only question is how we respond to that gift. Shapiro draws out the meaning and implications of this in his well-reasoned book.

Not solely theoretical, *Amazing Chesed* also includes two chapters on the practice of living gracefully. The theology comes to life in a daily practice of love and compassion.

This book will provoke discussion and reflection, and it may change your life. Enjoy. —*Rabbi Louis A. Rieser*


The Spiritual Danger of Doing Good provides a powerful wake-up call for Christians. Peter Greer, president and CEO of Hope International, urges readers to consider whether

they perform acts of charity for the wrong reasons. He reminds Christians to live a life that honors Christ rather than seeks personal reward or fame.

Greer realized the danger of doing good for the wrong motives when a friend took a picture of him on a mission trip to Africa. He saw himself smiling while surrounded by needy villagers. Greer recognized that

his focus was on others perceiving him as a good person, not on Jesus Christ. His response was to throw away the picture and change the way he was living his personal and professional life.

Each of this book's seventeen chapters demonstrates spiritual pitfalls and how to avoid them. 

What happens when people learn about the teachings of Christ and want to become Christians, but the words and actions of some Christians discourage them? Stumbling Blocks to Faith is an excellent

video for churches dealing with this tough issue. It examines how Christians do not always practice what they preach, and some are intolerant of people of other faiths and denominations. The video also covers such topics as the continuing debate between creationists and evolutionists, as well as the difficult reality that bad things happen to faithful Christians.

This study consists of five twenty-minute sessions, each led by pastors, scholars, or missionaries examining issues and using personal examples. The study guide provided is insightful and suggests resources for further reading.

Stumbling Blocks to Faith makes an excellent springboard for discussion by church members willing to consider whether their behavior encourages others to join them. —Mary Lou Henneman


Many Christians feel ill equipped to witness to their beliefs. When other Christians

or non-believers confront them with questions and

doubts, conversation can be difficult and even turn into an argument. Donald J. Johnson, president of Don Johnson Evangelistic Ministries, has degrees in Christian apologetics and theology. In *How to Talk to a Skeptic*, he provides readers with suggestions for discussing their faith. He teaches how to ask the right questions and how to listen to others before responding. With scripture passages and quotations from theologians, Johnson offers a guide for clearly communicating one's faith.

How to Talk to a Skeptic contains three sections that cover the framework for a conversation, a basic understanding of what skeptics need to know about God, and how to interpret the data. Johnson recognizes that even pagan cultures have some knowledge of God. He writes, for instance, that "Jesus is the fullest and clearest expression of God's truth, but other cultures and religions are not completely void of fact."

This is a good book for Christians who want to communicate their faith on a deeper level. The added notes are helpful for further study. —*Mary Lou Henneman* 





Temptation exists every day in various guises and degrees. How should Christians respond? Arnie Cole and Michael

Ross are both in leadership roles at Back to the Bible, a nondenominational Christian ministry based in Lincoln, Nebraska. In *Tempted, Tested, True*, Cole and Ross focus on practical strategies to help Christians recognize a variety of temptations and face those challenges. Their book's ten chapters address numerous topics including the four stages of temptation, dan-

gerous choices, control, self-esteem, fantasy, gossip, materialism, anxiety, pornography and sex, living with alcoholic and drug-addicted parents, and releasing past problems and moving on. Each of the chapters is divided into a basic discussion of the problem and a "nudge" section with selected scripture readings, reflections on the scriptures, a memory verse, suggested ways to respond to God's nudges, and a prayer. Tempted, Tested, True contains clear explanations of its main points, and there are insightful worksheets and notes for further study. The book makes a good ten-week study for Christian adult discussion groups. —Mary Lou Henneman



# Unveiling Grace: The Story of How We Found Our Way out of the Mormon Church

Lynn and Michael Wilder both grew up in nominally Christian homes. During their college years, they seldom went to church; they married in 1974.

The Mormon missionaries who knocked on the young couple's door captured their interest. *Unveiling Grace* is Lynn Wilder's fascinating account of her family's history with the Mormons.

While raising their four children, the Wilders were dedicated, active Latter Day Saints, first in their native Indiana. After they moved to Utah, Lynn obtained her doctorate and taught at Brigham Young University.

In 2006, the Wilders' youngest son became the first in the family to profess a belief in Christ of the Bible, rather than Christ as viewed by Mormons. Two years later, his parents requested that their names be removed from the church's rolls.

Part of the appeal of *Unveiling Grace* is the intimate picture Wilder paints of the beliefs of the Mormon Church and how it operates. According to Wilder,

#### Die Young: Burying Your Self in Christ



"To die young is to live for Christ and nothing else, to be set free from the bondage of sin and self, and to live a new kind of life." This opening passage from *Die Young* may seem like an oxymoron, but it

is not. What and who should be the most important concerns for Christians? Hayley and Michael DiMarco clearly explain how to make God, not money or fame, the focus of one's life. By using paradoxical statements ("death is the new life," "down is the new up," "weak is the new strong," and others) to headline each chapter, the DiMarcos make clear the importance of changing from old ways to focusing on what God wants people to do in all aspects of their lives.

The authors support their premises throughout with quotations from scripture and examples from their personal experience. *Die Young: Burying Yourself in Christ* is a powerful book for mature teens and adults who want to learn how to live as truly faithful Christians. Lincoln's Battle with God: A President's Struggle with Faith and What It Meant for America

The religious beliefs of most American presidents are, with a few exceptions, seldom discussed. In *Lincoln's Battle with* 

God, Stephen Mansfield seeks to uncover the back-

ground of Abraham Lincoln's faith. For such a public figure, Lincoln's faith was very private. His father was a frontier Baptist, but his son rejected much of Thomas Lincoln's faith. Mansfield suggests that physical abuse by the father may have played a role in young Abraham's turning from Christianity as he grew to manhood.


After his marriage to Mary Todd, Lincoln's life changed. He attended a Presbyterian church in Springfield, often meeting with its pastor, and continued to attend Presbyterian churches in Washington after becoming president in 1861.

Lincoln said little about Jesus and was known to abhor some aspects of church life. However, anyone who has read Lincoln's great speeches knows that, as president, he looked to God for guidance.

Mansfield has tried to be fair in his assessments, quoting friends of Lincoln who labeled him as unchristian as well as others who simply thought his faith was hidden beneath his burdens as a war president and as a father who had to bury two young sons.

Readers can learn much about the private Lincoln from this book, but much remains hidden. With footnotes, a brief bibliography, and several illustrations.

### The Reason for My Hope: Salvation



The Reverend Billy Graham emphasizes in *The Reason for My Hope: Salvation* that his message now is the same one he has preached for seventy

years. Humanity can be saved, Graham believes, if we accept Christ as Savior. The message has not changed, but Graham believes the need for it is increasingly urgent.

An interesting but disturbing chapter is "Defining Christianity in a Designer World." Graham writes: "Society today reflects the culture's craving for a designer world, one that suits every whim. We want things to go our way, according to our timeline, and at the pace of our own choosing." Our desire for "designer" elements in our lives includes even religion, and Graham discusses the so-called "designer religions." In these, he writes, "Social awareness has replaced the Spirit-filled life," and "people would rather put their energies into 'working for God' than actively 'believing in God and obeying him." Graham believes that such busyness is the devil's playground if we do not make Christ the priority in our lives.

While Graham's message may not be new, the situations he uses to illustrate his points come straight from contemporary life. A thought-provoking book awaits readers in *The Reason for My Hope*. —*Beverly M. Bixler* 



## Archbishop Justin Welby: The Road to Canterbury

This slender book introduces Justin Portal Welby, who in March 2013 became the 105th Archbishop of Canterbury. Andrew Atherstone, a faculty


member at Oxford University, writes of Welby's family history, including his parents' early divorce and his boyhood being shuttled between various relatives. As a youth Welby attended Eton College and spent six months in Kenya on an evangelical missions project. It was at Cambridge University that he committed to "lifelong faithfulness to Christ." He felt unsuited, however, to be a clergyman.

Welby went to work in the oil industry, where his talent for leadership and management flourished and his concerns about financial ethics grew. By his early thirties, Welby could no longer ignore the call to ministry.

Atherstone traces Welby's pastoral career as parish rector to Dean of Liverpool and Bishop of Durham. He highlights Welby's evangelical stance, skills in conflict resolution, close ties with Christians in Africa and elsewhere, and willingness to take risks. An epilogue recounts Welby's public statement as Archbishopdesignate in November 2012.

The book's print is rather small, but the text is thoroughly researched, footnoted, and indexed. Atherstone provides an excellent introduction to the man at the head of the worldwide Anglican Communion.



Huston Smith is a worldrenowned expert in comparative religion. He has studied and written about the world's major faiths, including Native American and tribal religions in Asia and Africa. Smith was the subject of a Bill Moyers PBS series, and his book *The Religions of Man* (now titled *The World's Religions*) was a standard college text for a generation.

Smith is now in his nineties. This volume is a compendium of articles, interviews, and book excerpts from the last forty years of his work. It is a book you can leaf through, read an interesting chapter, skip another, and then read more. Most of the chapters are short and cover topics like fundamentalism in a variety of faiths, prayer and meditation in Asian and Christian traditions, and the sacred dimensions of everyday living. The book also contains a biographical sketch of Smith and his views on current religious strife around the world. There is a bibliography and a list of Smith's writings.

The Huston Smith Reader will be a valuable addition to any library with a section on world religions. —Forrest D. Rice

As a former magazine editor, current minister to women in foreign countries, and the father of four daughters, J. Lee

Grady is well qualified to write about biblical women in *Fearless Daughters of the Bible*. In addition to the women traditionally featured in such studies, Grady includes lesser-known women such as Achsah (Caleb's daughter), Jehosheba, and the four daughters of Philip the evangelist.

Each of the fifteen chapters opens with a quotation and proceeds with a theme related to courage. Stories of women today, women in history, and biblical women are interwoven. The perspective is Pentecostal, and the tone provides elevation, encouragement, and exhortation. Grady cites Miriam, Deborah, and Esther from the Old Testament and Mary Magdalene, the Samaritan woman, and Priscilla from the New Testament as examples of women who accepted risks and took action, rising above traditions, false teachings, and the opinions of others. The call is for women of today to do the same.

Points of emphasis are well organized, with scriptures, quotations, and facts presented to support

Grady's positions. While readers may not agree with him on all points, Grady commands respect for his reasoning. Recommended for church libraries and for personal or group study. —*Carolyn Egolf* 




#### You'll Get Through This: Hope & Help for Your Turbulent Times

At the beginning of You'll Get Through This, Max Lucado tells of several conversations with people who have revealed their troubles to him. His response: "You'll get through

this. It won't be painless. It won't be quick. But God will use this mess for good . . . With God's help you will get through this." Wondering to himself how he can dare say this to someone who is suffering, he asks, "Where did I get the nerve?" He answers his own question: "In a pit, actually. A deep, dark pit. So steep, the boy could not climb out." The boy is Joseph of the Old Testament. Lucado applies his talent for combin-

ing, with great clarity, the biblical with the contemporary, weaving the story of Joseph with the stories of modern-day people. From the time Joseph was an arrogant teenager, abandoned by his jealous older brothers, until he became the second most powerful man in Egypt, he endured much, but he survived and succeeded. In *You'll Get Through This*, Lucado writes that Joseph's story is in the Bible "to teach you to trust God to trump evil. What Satan intends for evil, God . . . redeems for good." —*Beverly M. 


### Five Stones: Conquering Your Giants

Brad Martin, a retired business executive and former member of the Tennessee House of Representatives, use their personal stories to help others conquer modern giants. Each of five stones represents a different way to achieve the desired goal of overcoming a variety of problems: seeing a clear picture of the problem, using the right tools to solve the problem, making a plan, having the proper training to proceed, and having the strength to boldly act. The training manual provided includes weekly goals as well as daily scripture readings, training principles, questions, and prayers. This is a unique study; Stanford and Martin identify the sections they have authored and tell how, trusting in the Lord, they have fought their battles. 


Pettrey creates excitement for the McKenna family as they deal with past mistakes, present suspense, and hopes for future happiness.



Jolina Petersheim's *The*Outcast is told in alternating chapters from the points of view of Rachel Stoltzfus, the female protagonist, and of Amos King, who has recently—and unexpectedly—died. King was the father of Tobias, the main

male character, who followed his father as bishop in the Old Order Mennonite community. King was also the father of Judah, who is another important figure in the story.

Although she has been living with her twin sister and Tobias, her sister's husband, Rachel is now ordered by her brother-in-law to leave his home. When Rachel's son becomes seriously ill, the nature of the illness threatens to make it necessary to reveal the identity of the baby's father, which Rachel has previously refused to disclose. This news will bring more troubles for the sisters, the bishop, and, indeed, the entire community.

Gabhart slowly and methodically creates strong, credible characters—minor ones and protagonists alike. —*Beverly M. Bixler* 







Although most of us have read versions of the Creation story many times, how many of us ever wondered about the light of the first day in comparison to that of the

fourth, when God created night and day? Apparently some ancient rabbis did wonder about it, and now, in an innovative update of old myths and legends, Rabbi Sandy Eisenberg Sasso uses her imagination to propose what may have happened to that first light.

Sasso writes with a lyrical appeal to children's sense of wonder, and Joani Keller Rothenberg's illustrations are majestic. Young readers explore places where that first day's light may have traveled and where it is today. As Sasso poetically suggests, "It winks at you in a meadow full of memories."

Creation's First Light ends with a two-page section addressed to parents and teachers. Sasso notes the six biblical figures mentioned in the text and the decisions or actions they took. She asks relevant

contemporary questions and cites appropriate passages from the Bible. Each page in this book provides a spiritual opportunity for adults to talk with children. Recommended for families with children aged 4 and up.

#### Don't Sneeze at the Wedding



The audience asks her to say something and, to their delight, she responds with an expression she has heard her father use. The audience applauds, and Rifka takes an elegant bow. She knows now that she wants to become an actress!

This idyllic story, written by nonagenarian Betty Rosenberg Perlov, whose mother was a Yiddish actress, nostalgically depicts a bygone era. Whimsical illustrations by Cosei Kawa add to the dream-like quality of the tale.



Middle school readers will enjoy learning about Tanzania in this exciting fictional account by Katie Quirk in her debut novel. Shida's name

means "problem," and this reflects how the people in her village treat her. They are highly superstitious and believe she was the cause of her father's death. They also think that Shida's mother is a witch.

Shida is now thirteen years old and a healer. Her life changes when she and all the other members of her village move to the new community of Njia Panda. Their new village has a school, a health clinic, and a community center. Shida is especially excited because Julius Nyerere, the first president of Tanzania, has a dream to educate all children, including girls, in local schools. However, there is dissent among some of the people. Bad things begin to happen, and everything is blamed on how upset the ancient ancestors are with the changes.

A Girl Called Problem involves themes of education for all children and how natural remedies and modern medicine can work together. This is a good book for allowing young readers to see life in a very different part of the world. —Mary Lou Henneman







