TELLING OUR STORY: Grace Baptist Church Library

Ric's story of the Grace Baptist Church library will resonate with many CSLA members. Technological and demographic changes have affected the library's circulation, but the commitment to serve its congregation remains firm.

THE CONGREGATION SERVED

Grace Baptist Church is in the town of Santa Maria, which is located on California's Central Coast about halfway between Los Angeles and San Francisco. The town has slightly over 100,000 residents. We have a medium-sized congregation with over 200 financially-giving members, and the church facilities are all under one roof.

THE COLLECTION

The focus of the collection is on

items not commonly found in most public libraries. We cannot afford to duplicate the offerings of local public libraries. Also, we maintain very few items of a secular nature. Thus the aim is to keep it a *church library*. That is what our patrons expect when they walk into the room.

church membership has changed. We have lost a good number of older adults who were major readers. The trend toward e-books has impacted circulation as well. Fortunately, we have become a far younger congregation with lots of children who enjoy our library. It is a happy and welcoming place for them.

Since fewer adults are utilizing the library, we are focusing our attention on strengthening the teen and children's collection. However, we have realized that with the influx of technology, smartphones, etc. our teens are not checking out as many DVDs and music CDs as in the past. Also, we recently divested the collec-

tion of most VHS items since there is very little call for them anymore.

We do have a good selection of Bible commentaries used especially whenever an adult class focuses on a specific book in the Bible. We maintain a wide selection of Christian

and missionary biographies. DVDs are generally "Dove approved" for family interest.

Teens really like the Imagination Station series as well as graphic novels. Our Tomo graphic novels have worn out and we recently purchased new ones. The Red Rock mystery series gets chosen often.

Children have become our largest group of patrons lately. The DVD series What's in the Bible? is popular. The Lion series covers the Bible in 52 hardcover books. The Cul-de-Sac mysteries are also utilized. The newer Berenstain Bears Living Lights series has become extremely popular. Since they are easily damaged, I've placed a harder cardstock backing inside the front and back covers. It takes time and effort but they are holding up well considering their usage. The everpopular Help Me Be Good series (also known as the Let's Talk About.... series) by Joy Berry is secular in nature but teaches good manners, which makes the adults happy whenever their children select them. They may be hard to purchase.

Just compiling this summary makes me realize how many items we have added over the years that seldom or never were utilized. We thought they would or should be read. They weren't. So we try to purchase what will circulate.

Our church library is utilized because we get a huge amount of support from our church. We are granted an adequate budget yearly. The children of our pastor, associate pastor and youth pastor use and enjoy what we offer.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: LIBRARIES CHANGE LIVES

DIGITAL INCLUSION—LIFELONG LEARNING— SOCIAL INCLUSION

Each January marks an increase in the use of the word "change." Articles in newspapers, blogs and magazines emphasize making New Year's resolutions for areas of your life that you wish to change for the better. And for many of us, that wave of enthusiasm to improve ourselves often wanes by the end of that month as our regular routine settles back in. (I'm sure that this is due to the influence of winter weather—perhaps resolutions should be made in the spring!)

Studies have found that people tend to embrace and sustain changes when approaching them in small steps or mini-goals, or by concentrating on one thing at a time instead of trying to accomplish everything all at once. Learning new habits takes time (experts disagree on the exact amount) but can be done with perseverance.

Organizations have similar problems with change and often have a more difficult time in achieving a successful outcome. Why is that? Simply put, an organization consists

of many individuals working toward a common goal, developing a distinct culture unique to that organization. Sounds good, right? This is true, until other factors or changes begin to impact the organization, often out of its control: less demand for current services, newer products found elsewhere, or finding itself becoming irrelevant and obsolete. A larger group of people with a long-term culture requires more energy and effort to embrace change.

At this point, you may have guessed where I am heading with my essay. CSLA has been and still is a wonderful organization with a true purpose in inspiring and serving those who work with congregational libraries. This has been CSLA's mission for the last 50 years, and has been appreciated by all who have had experience with it. But for a number of years, membership has continued to lag, though a few new members are attracted each year. Why is that? Many reasons: an aging membership, a decline in attendance for most congregations, congregational

libraries being disbanded due to lack of funds, and lack of strong and sustained marketing efforts in promoting CLSA to wider audiences.


DOING DEWEY

CLASSIFYING LIBRARY MATERIALS IN GRAPHIC FORMAT

Some time ago, a reader of this column suggested that I write about whether and how to classify library material that has a graphic format. Graphic format material is very popular and an increasing number of congregational libraries include at least some in their collections.

Many libraries recognize three basic types of material in graphic format: comic strip books, graphic novels and graphic nonfiction. Comic strip books are collections of daily installments of a comic strip that have appeared previously in newspapers.

These may be classified in 741.5, the Dewey Decimal

number for "Comic books, graphic novels, fotonovelas, cartoons, caricatures, comic strips." The Dewey number 741.5 may also be used for books about all types of graphic format library materials.

Graphic novels are extended fictional narratives in graphic format. Although the manual section of the Dewey Decimal Classification recommends using 741.5 for graphic novels, remember that the Dewey Decimal Classification also provides classification numbers for fiction (within the 800s), but that public

26.8 (parables in the Gospels) may be used instead of 741.5 to give shelving preference to subject matter over format (The Parables of Peanuts, Robert L. Short, HarperOne, 2002).

libraries usually shelve fiction alphabetically by author rather than by Dewey number. As with conventional fiction, assigning a Dewey number to graphic novels is rarely done except by college and university libraries. Common alternatives to using the 741.5 number are:

1 Shelving graphic novels alphabetically within the regular fiction by the last name (or the first one-to-three letters of the last name) of the author/illustrator or creator.

2 Placing them in a separate section of the library. The spine label may read "Graphic Novel" on the top line and below that could be the creator's last name or one or more letters of the last name.


3 Some libraries may choose to shelve their graphic novels by series, especially if the series has multiple authors. If so, the first important word of the series title would be used in place of the creator's last name. A volume number, if applicable, could be included on the third line of the spine label.

Graphic nonfiction presents a



factual narrative or information in graphic format. Library materials of this type may be classified with the Dewey Decimal Classification

This tween graphic novel series may be shelved with conventional juvenile or teen fiction or in a separate graphic novel section. (Child of Destiny, Jim Krueger, Tomo Bk.3, Zondervan, 2008.) number used for library materials on the same subject in conventional



format. For example, *Maus: A*Survivor's Tale and Maus: My
Father Bleeds History, both by Art
Spiegelman, tell the story of the
holocaust experiences of the author's
father in graphic format. Library of
Congress assigns 741.5 to both books.
The CIP (cataloging in publication)

number differs slightly for each book and for various editions of the books, but generally uses 940.53 with extensions. However, to keep different editions together and also shelve them by subject matter rather than format, many libraries prefer to place all the editions in the Unabridged Dewey number that is specifically for works on the holocaust – 940.5318.

If the library chooses to shelve the nonfiction graphic novels with its conventional nonfiction, remember that the cataloger has the option to add numbers from the Dewey tables for greater clarity. For example, 022 from Table 1 may be added to the Dewey number of a graphic nonfiction work to indicate "Illustrations, models, miniatures." If the author of graphic nonfiction is using humor to express a serious

Book truck without a use became a LIBRARY ON WHEELS

A while ago the Youth Ministry gave the Parish Library of my church, All Saints Catholic Church, a brand new book truck for which they apparently had not found a use. The library volunteers and I immediately decided to use it as an outreach tool to expand awareness of the library and its collection. We would load it with new or topical items of interest and park it in a heavily trafficked area.

The Welcome Center near the main sanctuary seemed to be the ideal spot. However, as soon as we placed it there other groups in the parish requested equal rights to use the small available space. The Administrator told us to remove it.

So now we move it around as we see opportunities to promote the library collection. On Sunday mornings we place it at the entrance to the library so that people can browse its contents without having to

come into the library lounge. Items have been borrowed from it, and it calls attention to the existence of the library.

Whenever there is a program with a speaker such as RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults), or Women's or Men's Club meetings, we fill the truck with items relating to the topic being presented. A very simple self-checkout process is available on the top shelf of the truck. Patrons do not need to come into the library to borrow items after the program.

Between visits to program locations the book truck rests in the library lounge where it promotes new acquisitions along with the original New Additions book truck and a revolving rack. We add a lot of new materials every month, and it is nice to have three places now where we can highlight them.

If your library has or can obtain an extra book truck, consider adding a "library on wheels" to promote your collection.

point of view, 02 from Table 1 for "Miscellany, including humorous treatment" may be added.

Graphic novels and graphic nonfiction can spark interest in a library's collection, especially among teens. Consider the best placement for optimum impact and "findability" and catalog accordingly.

Any reader of Doing Dewey is welcome to send me a question to address in a future column. These questions are especially welcome now that I have completed my "tour" of the Dewey Decimal classification.



Visit CSLA on Facebook—and be sure your library is there, too

Social networks have become a norm for communication in the past few years, led by Twitter and Facebook. To participate in Face-



book, one must register by creating a user name and password. Registering with Facebook also requires supplying various personal data, for instance, supplying one's birthdate to insure the registrant is an adult. There is a place to edit privacy settings to limit who may view one's Facebook page. One may post text, photos, videos, etc., on one's own Facebook page and view and respond to material that is posted on the pages of friends.

Remember that the Internet holds all posts, even if deleted by the original poster. Despite security settings, assume that anything that is posted could end up being viewed by strangers, one's employers, or scam artists trolling the internet. A recent issue of *Time* magazine showed that Facebook is among the safer of the social networks, with fewer trolls. Anonymity is minimally allowed.

Church and Synagogue Library Association members are encouraged to "Like" the CSLA page (https://www.facebook.com/cslainfo/), to "Like" posts, and even to comment. Members may also post as visitors. Most of these posts will be converted to the full CSLA Facebook forum. This is where members can help each other. For instance, a member may ask for help with a difficult reference question, with cataloging questions such as assigning subject headings and call numbers, or to find suggestions for authors and speakers.

In line with the 2016 conference in Ohio, the Facebook administrators

invite members to share their story. To do so, send pictures (preferably jpg files) and a prose essay about one's library to Ralph Hartsock (ralph. hartsock@unt.edu). These will be edited for size and posted to the CSLA Facebook page. Besides engendering greater communication between members, CSLA members can get ideas for what works, inspiration for trying something new, and the assurance that theirs is not the only library facing certain situations.


Institutions as well as individuals may become Facebook members and have their own pages. (Obviously, or CSLA would not be able to have its own page!) This means one's own library may join Facebook. To register a church library with Facebook, the library must have its own website or, ironically, a Twitter account.



In the meantime, Mikhail Dobrescu, his two young sons and a 20 year old woman arrive from Romania and take over the Sawyer house. Mikhail claims that the house was bequeathed to him by his uncle, a former owner. When the Sawyers find out, they are infuriated and a court case to decide ownership is initiated. Missing drawings, the Dobrescus' relationship to the cultivation of roses and the slowly growing romantic attraction between Libby and Michael, as he now calls himself, complicate the situation. Included are a few other problems, and the reader begins to wonder whether Camden can solve them.—Beverly M. Bixler


This novel, originally published in 1848 in response to strongly anti-Catholic fiction, tells the

The Divine Mercy devotion, originating in the early part of

the last century from St. Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun, and popularized by St. John Paul II, is not unlike the devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. That is, it provides a very concrete way of focusing on the vast panoply of the faith through a particular lens and concrete actions that holds the rest of the Church's teaching and practice in focus. In this case, there is an image of Divine Mercy, chaplet of Divine Mercy (using rosary beads), a church-wide feast of Divine Mercy (the Sunday after Easter) along with writings by Sister Faustina. The book's chapters cover an introduction to St. Faustina, developing trust in Jesus through the Divine Mercy devotion, showing mercy to neighbors, corporal works of mercy, spiritual works of mercy, and Mary, Mother of Mercy. There are also prayers, a description of the use of the chaplet, and a thirty day retreat. While probably for more conservative Catholic parishes and certainly aimed at mothers, this could be an interesting introduction to a relatively new movement in U.S. Catholicism.—Larry Creider



Calvin Campbell is a washed-up former baseball player who has a strained relationship with his teenage daughter. Jobless, Calvin moves aimlessly through life, drinking and hanging out with his buddies. During his trips to the grocery store to buy liquor, he meets a young man with Down syndrome known simply by his job title—Produce. Attracted to Produce's positive attitude, the two men strike up a friendship. Over time, Calvin gives up drinking and even attends church with Produce. A tragedy brings them closer and provides the means for a surprise ending.

This film earned a PG-13 rating because of the drinking, sexual innuendo involving the teenage daughter, and for a scene in which the daughter's boyfriend tries to force himself upon her. Sprinkle addresses difficult questions regarding homosexuality, including

"Does God make people gay?" "Is male-female sexual difference necessary for marriage?" "Would Jesus condemn homosexuality?" "Can someone be gay and Christian?" "Can gay people change?" To situate the answers to these questions, he begins with an exploration of homosexuality in Greco-Roman culture and then turns to the Bible passages which address homosexuality. He provides thoughtful analysis of each of these areas, looking at interpretations of various

words and stories. He complements these with stories of gay Christians, including those who disagree with the traditional interpretations of the biblical proscriptions against homosexuality. He comes to several conclusions, such as the story of Sodom and Gomorrah is not about homosexuality, and Jesus would not find homosexuality acceptable, but he would love the individual. He believes one can be gay and Christian so long as one does not engage in sexual behaviors. On other questions, such as "Does God make people gay," he admits he cannot come to a definitive conclusion. One thing is certain: Sprinkle says the church must make a concerted effort to love gay people and to have open, real conversations with gay people rather than outright condemning people.


Sprinkle's style in tackling these tough questions is accessible to laypersons. His conclusions regarding homosexuality are affirming of the traditional Christian views. Overall, a suitable, one volume exploration of a tough topic.—*Ellen Bosman*





Nonetheless, even those who know a good deal about scripture can learn a lot more about it and about the relationship of scripture to Catholic liturgy and doctrine. Highly recommended for congregations, especially for those involved in religious education.—



Bogart, an expert knitting teacher and author, will inspire you in her powerful book of 52 devotions. Each one begins with a scripture reading from the Bible, followed by a personal experience and a prayer. She shares both her successes and struggles as she tackles each project while keeping focused on her relationship with Christ. Each of us needs inspiration in our lives and Christian knitters will find it here. This is the perfect book for those making items for family, friends or working on projects for outreach ministries. Knitting groups can also use her amazing patchwork of devotions for discussion in their weekly meetings.— Mary Lou Henneman

It takes a brave person to

completely reorganize a spiritual classic along various themes. Instead of the four books of the Imitation of Christ, a fifteenth century devotional classic used by Catholics and Protestants alike, James Watkins has divided his selection of quotations into Part I, Imitating Christ and Part II, Imitating Christ's Character. The second section takes up most of the book and is further divided into sections on loving, teachable, wise, trusting, obedient, self-sacrificing, humble, gracious, forgiving, patient, peaceful, pure, disciplined, self-controlled, and eternally minded. The selections are taken from all four books of the original text, although the last book, which deals with the Eucharist, is severely short-changed. There are questions about the way the book represents or misrepresents the original of Thomas à Kempis; certainly some themes of the original are downplayed or ignored. This book is perhaps for people who have found Watkins' other books helpful.—Larry Creider






Sacred Reading: The 2017 Guide to Daily Prayer

This is a devotional guide for every day of the 2017 Catholic Church calendar. The sections follow the major divisions of the liturgical calendar, with

appropriate feast days. The approach provides a model for daily *lectio divina*, an ancient meditative way of reading and responding to the Scriptures. This might be compared to the evangelical concept of "Quiet Time." Each day has short sections titled, "Know that God is present with you and ready to converse," "Read the gospel" (this is year A of the common lectionary, so most of the gospel sections are from Matthew), "Notice what you think and feel as you read the gospel," "Pray as you are led for yourself and others," "Listen to Jesus," and "Ask God to show you how to live today." Using this book for the better part of a year will deepen anyone's spiritual life. Recommended.—*Larry Creider*




Praying the Bible

Does your mind wander when you pray? Do you feel that you have "said the same old things about the same old things"? Most people experience these feelings whether they pray regularly or sporadically. In

Praying the Bible, David S. Whitney, associate dean and professor of biblical spirituality at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky, says those two problems result in prayer becoming boring. He continued, "... and when prayer is boring, we don't feel like praying. When we don't feel like praying, it's hard to pray, at least in any sort of focused, heartfelt, way."

According to Whitney, there is a solution: pray the psalms. One reason for doing so is that the psalms contain every emotion known to man. Pick one psalm and read it verse by verse, turning each verse into a prayer with whatever thoughts come to mind. You will be sharing ideas with God and not praying the same old thing. Whitney also explains how to use the method to pray other sections of scripture. This is a gem of a book and proves that good things come in small packages. —Beverly M. Bixler

Dangerous prayer is risky. Do we mean "use me," "send me" or


"here I am Lord"? Fuller uses words well, having written over 40 books. In 20 stories plus a summary chapter, risky prayers and the ways God chooses to answer them provide insightful and challenging reading.

Stories include those of women from scripture, such as the Samaritan woman; from history, such as author Hannah Hunnard; and the present day. A two-to-three word prayer may have set a new direction, caused an individual to reach far more lives than ever imagined or led to a life of difficulty, discouragement and a realistic, if not hoped-for, ending.

Being "living sacrifices" (Romans 12) is shown in the story of Gladys Aylward, a missionary who saved children in wartime, and in the author's own story of how her "send me wherever" prayer continues to be answered in her speaking and writing ministry.

Readers are challenged with questions and reminders of the intrinsic reward of prayer, for instance, "being used by God" and "making a difference."

Stories are currently promoted as one of the best ways to inspire and teach. In this text, all are done well. Recommended for church libraries.—Carolyn Egolf

Readers will find the blend of lectio divina (sacred reading)

and visio divina (theology of line and color) instructive and inspiring. Lectio divina, a long-standing discipline in Western Christianity, is enhanced by icons from Eastern traditions.

Christ's life and the Pentecost are portrayed in eighteen units, and the two additional units on Mary's dormition and coronation will resonate with Catholics. Each unit has six "movements." In order these are:

lectio—the biblical text plus commentary; visio—icons plus explanation; meditation—reflection questions; oratio—a prayer to be completed by the reader; contemplio—resting in God; and operatio—applying the message.

Kasper and Poikans in their icons share remarkable insights. The more the reader looks, the more there is to see, and the more time invested in both text and artwork, the greater the enrichment. Scripture is referenced often, and parallels are drawn between biblical stories.

Font is easily readable, icons are in color and the units patterned alike. This book is a pleasure. Recommended for libraries in Catholic and Orthodox congregations, as well as in other church libraries where readers can enlarge their perspectives.—Carolyn Egolf

Much has been written in recent years concerning the influence of Hellenistic, Roman, Sasanian, and Persian culture on the formation, growth, and direction of rabbinical Judaism. Visotzky writes for a non-academic but serious audience. He argues that the rabbis who salvaged a core of the biblical tradition destroyed when the Jerusalem Temple was burned in 70 C.E., and who created the religion we call Judaism, were fully integrated into the Greek-speaking culture of the Roman Empire and adopted and adapted its norms, forms,





and aesthetics—including its language(s), rhetorical styles, stories, art, architecture, prioritization of wisdom and literary cultural foundation—in sculpting a new expression of the Jewish covenant. Visotzky's witty narrative takes the reader on a tour of rabbinic legends, discussion of values, art and architecture (illustrated with photographs from archaeological finds) in its attempt to claim that Judaism is a thoroughly western religion. Surprisingly, he does not discuss the commonalities of Roman law and rabbinic law, which would have bolstered his argument, and does not venture beyond Dura Europos on the eastern border of the Roman Empire, thereby ignoring Eastern Persian-Sasanian influence on the Babylonian Talmud.—Amy Scheinerman





According to the author, "God is encountered in wonder." In sixteen chapters, Brown expands the reader's concept



Beginning with Genesis, readers are guided through the Old Testament concepts of "Cosmic" and "Grounded Wonder" in Genesis, "Playful Wonder" in Proverbs and "Mindful Wonder" as Job is given a cosmic tour of creation.

Additional chapters lead to the New Testament, where "Incarnation" and "Resurrection Wonder" are themes in John, and intriguing parallels are drawn between wisdom in Proverbs 8 and Christ in Colossians 1: 15-20. Readers are brought full circle when "river of life" and "trees of life" as found in Revelations 21-22 are linked to the Garden of Eden.

"Wonder is calling...in and for God's changing world" and in that spirit readers should come to the text with intention due to the in-depth vocabulary and surprising insights. Readers will be rewarded and renewed with a greater awareness of the many ways God sees and meets us in wonder.


