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2015 CONFERENCE

Sharing ideas as BIG as Texas!

That's the official theme of the 2015 CSLA national conference at the University of North Texas (UNT) in Denton, Texas, July 29-31. We have BIG plans to give you an informative and fun conference at a very reasonable price.

In addition to the speakers we identified in the previous issue of Congregational Libraries Today, we have several workshops for all levels of librarians, three plenary sessions, four local authors and the preconference school for librarians who are beginning a congregational library or would like a refresher on the essentials.

Four of our workshops reveal the latest updates to our CSLA guides. These are *Basic Books* by Ellen Bosman, Fundamentals of Financing Your Congregational Library by Craig Kubic, Religious Books for Children presented by Jeri Baker and Evelyn Pockrass, and Disaster Management

in the Church and Synagogue Library presented by UNT Music Special Collections Librarian Maristella Feustle.

Two workshops will focus on the nuts and bolts of cataloging and classification. Scott Dutkiewicz will provide a refresher on the 3 R's of RDA (Resource Description and Access, the cataloging standard that replaces AACR2), with an emphasis on audiovisual material. Susan Snyder will demystify the use of the Dewey Decimal System tables.

Ralph Hartsock, conference cochair and senior music cataloger at UNT, will provide insight into cataloging sheet music, and Mechelle Sweeting of the Indiana Chapter will bring her passion for Pinterest to the national membership.

The plenary sessions are a bonus this year. CSLA President Cheryl Cutchin will take us behind the scenes of the

So consider some of those unwanted donations in a positive light. It means the congregation is aware of the library, they understand the importance of adding to the collection, and acknowledge that you know what is needed. 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PRACTICAL LIBRARIANSHIP

–the Preconference School

The pastoral residency program at Wilshire Baptist Church, first established in 2002, has become a nationally recognized model for excellence in clergy

preparation. Underwritten by the Lily Foundation and Wilshire's Pathways to Ministry Endowment, the two-year residency program offers recent seminary graduates the opportunity to learn the ropes of local church ministry in a safe and healthy practicum. The rigorous training afforded in seminaries and divinity schools focuses primarily on essential academic and biblical knowledge. What's missing is practical teaching about the work of the church or synagogue.

A familiar refrain heard among my professional colleagues when we first landed entry level positions was that "they didn't teach us that in library school!" As with other professional schools, what was lacking was practical hands-on skills. This is exactly the purpose of the CSLA Preconference School for beginning church and synagogue librarians. The interactive workshop guides the participant through the steps of composing a mission statement, selecting and processing materials, and marketing the resources to the congregation. While it is three hours in

length, not two years, the workshop provides a starting point from which the leadership for new or re-established congregational libraries may begin to develop an essential set of proficiencies and competencies.

The 2015 preconference school will be offered in Denton, Texas, on July 28. Contact Judy Janzen (csla@worldaccessnet.com) for registration information about the school. Can't make it to Denton? Please ask the CSLA office about the CSLA's correspondence school.

The alumni of the Wilshire Pastoral Residency, now numbering a total of 22 men and women, gather annually for a reunion. It is a very special time for both the former residents and the congregants. Prior to the 2015 reunion, alumnus Austin Almaguer, pastor of Vienna Baptist Church, Vienna, Virginia, wrote in the church newsletter, "As resident alumni return this week to laugh at old stories and share new ones, we remind ourselves that church isn't just a building you come to or depart from. It's the people and the relationships God has called together for a special purpose."

Congregational libraries are like that too. It is what makes library service to our congregants so special.

A recent release from author John Ortberg is *All the Places to Go... How Will You Know?* This book encourages the reader to "step out in faith and embrace all of the extraordinary opportunities that await." Curriculum based upon this book is also available as a DVD and participant's guide. Ortberg, a pastor, author and speaker, has written several other books that address spiritual formation. His other titles include: *The Life You've Always Wanted* (2002), *Faith and Doubt* (2008), *Who is This Man?* (2014) and *Soul Keeping* (2014).

For some individuals, embarking on a new journey or embracing a life change stimulates reflection on things of true importance. 

simple acts of kindness and includes space



DOING DEWEY

CLASSIFICATION NUMBERS FOR LITERARY MATERIALS







ost congregational libraries have some literary materials, such as poetry and plays. These materials are usually classified in the 800's, unless they are intended for devotional or liturgical use and classified in the 200's, or are folk literature and classified in 398. An example of this exception that is found in many congregational libraries is C. S. Lewis's *Screwtape Letters*, which could be considered a novella but which is normally classified in 248.4, Christian life and practice.

Techniques of public speaking (rhetoric) and storytelling are classified in 808.5.

Literary collections written in or translated from more than two languages not from the same language family are classified in 808.8. A second digit following the decimal point designates more specific types of collections. (See table.)

History, description, and critical appraisal of literature written in or translated from more than two languages not from the same language family are classified in 809. Materials about the Bible **as literature** are also classified in 809.

When Melvil Dewey created his classification method, he considered the language in which a work of literature was originally written to be its most important element. Therefore, individual literary works, literary collections, and works about literature originally written in only one language are classified by first considering the language in which they, or the literary works being discussed, were originally written. Dewey's American

slant can be seen by his assigning an entire division (810 – 819) to U.S. and Canadian literature and another division (820 – 829) to English literature written in other countries such as Great Britain and Australia. According to the instructions provided under 810, however, collections of and works about both American literature in English and English literature together are classified in the 820's with English literature.

Among other languages, Spanish literature is classified in the numbers beginning with 86, Russian literature is classified in the numbers beginning with 891.7, and Hebrew literature is classified in the numbers beginning with 892.4.

Unless there are other instructions given, classify collections originally written in two languages with the language whose number comes first in the main schedules.

After you have determined the language in which the literary work was originally written, look in the main schedules to see if there is an indication that you may use Table 3, which appears before the main

schedules. If you may use it, add the subdivision for the literary form. For example, when classifying American poetry in English, you would start with 81 for American literature in English, then add 1 for poetry, resulting in a classification number of 811. Table 3 also provides for adding 2 for drama, 3 for fiction, 4 for essays, 5 for speeches, 6 for letters, 7 for collected humorous poetry and prose, and 8 for anecdotes, epigrams, graffiti, jokes, quotations and riddles.

In most small libraries, the number 3 from Table 3 is used only for materials **about** fiction. Fiction itself is usually classified F, FIC, or FICTION and arranged alphabetically by author in a separate section of the library. This is for the convenience of the average library user, who normally does not care whether a novel is written by an Australian, an American, or is perhaps (like Eco's *The Name of the Rose*) an English translation of a novel originally written in another language.

Collections of short stories are usually either included in fiction or are classified SC.



Judaism's 10 Best Idea s: A Brief Guide for Seekers



Rabbi Arthur Green, the founding dean and now rector of the Rabbinical School of Hebrew College in Massachusetts, is known for his insightful,

philosophical books on Judaism. *Judaism's 10 Best Ideas* represents a departure from Green's familiar writings, which usually are presented on an academic level. This brief introduction to Judaism is accessible to the layperson as well as to the professional. Green has selected ten concepts vital to Judaism that have helped him maintain his faith.

Green starts with joy and happiness as part of the religious way. He proceeds to creation in God's image, walking in God's path (as a community of doers), repairing the world, Shabbat, returning (having faith in human change), education, accepting death/affirming life, and belief in one God. In each short chapter he provides the reason for the idea and relates stories, often from the Hasidic tradition, to explain his thoughts. In the chapter "The People and the Book," Green discusses the Torah and the concept of interpretation as a way of understanding what was written more than two thousand years ago and bringing it to life today.

Green has embarked on a lifelong journey of seeking God and understanding the deeper concepts of Judaism. This brief synthesis conveys his enthusiasm and may be helpful to other seekers as well. —*Evelyn Pockrass*



Convictions: How I Learned What Matters Most



The approach of his seventieth birthday prompted Marcus J. Borg to write *Convictions: How*

I Learned What Matters Most. In this volume, published months before Borg's death at the age of 72, the noted Jesus scholar and teacher focuses on memories, major changes of heart and mind, and the resulting convictions, or "the way I see things now."

Throughout this book, Borg applies the triad of memories, conversions and convictions both to the maturing of his own faith and to the growth of Christianity. He visits themes of God, salvation, justice and the poor, peace and nonviolence, emphasis (or lack of emphasis) on an afterlife, and differing thoughts on biblical inerrancy. Borg discusses the meaning of Jesus' death on the cross, the political relevancy of the Bible, and his belief that Jesus (and not, in all instances, the Bible) should be the standard Christians look to as their guide.

Notes on sources and a scripture index appear at the end of the book. Much of what Borg presents in *Convictions* will be familiar to readers of his earlier books; for readers new to Borg or those who wish to revisit his gentle and reasoned approach, this book will be a welcome find in the church library. —*Monica Tenney*



Exploring Our Hebraic Heritage: A Christian Theology of Roots and Renewal

Exploring Our Hebraic Heritage is packed with information in a reader-friendly format. People who are reluctant to tackle

books on theology will be pleasantly surprised by this one from Marvin R. Wilson, a professor at Gordon College in Massachusetts. One reason Wilson gives for writing this volume is to explore "theological, spiritual, and ethical themes [of Jewish scholarship] that more directly affect Christian understanding and experience rather than to explore specific, narrowly focused, highly theoretical, or abstract legal issues." In other words, here is an opportunity to explore the rich heritage of the Bible that Jesus read and where Christian faith finds its roots.

Chapters appear under broad headings of "Theological Sources and Methods," "People of God: An Abrahamic Family," "God and His Ways," "On Approaching God," and "Moving into the Future." The book includes a pronunciation key for transliterated Hebrew words, as well as indexes by scripture, rabbinic literature, author and subject. Exploring Our Hebraic Heritage is appropriate for clergy and will be an excellent addition to Christian history collections in congregational and academic libraries. Because each of the 14 chapters ends with questions, it is also an excellent choice for small group study. —Sharon T. Hinton




Writing in 14th-century Eng-

land, when Black Death and theologies of God's wrath were all around, Julian of Norwich uplifts today's readers with her portrayal of a God of mercy, grace, love, care and—ultimately—bliss. As with other volumes in this series, selections from the source text are on right-hand pages. Mary C. Earle's annotations on facing pages aid understanding of Julian's writings.

Julian received 16 "showings," or revelations, while suffering a near-fatal illness. In the 20 years following her recovery, she reflected on these revelations, writing a short text and later a longer version, *Revelations of Divine Love*. Themes include "Christ's Passion," "The Question of Sin," and "The Motherhood of God." Julian thinks in threes, with emphasis on the Trinity. Her sentences are characteristically long, so attention is required.

"All shall be well" is the statement for which Julian is best known. Her focus was love, and bliss was her hope and expectation. Little is known of Julian's personal life, though it was apparently a long life and one that may have included a time in seclusion.

The Way of the Wesleys: A Short Introduction

In *The Way of the Wesleys,* historian John R. Tyson examines Wesleyan theology as revealed in sermons, hymns and other

writings. Tyson illustrates his subjects' confidence in the accuracy of the Bible and how they were sometimes at odds with the Enlightenment thinkers of their time. He explains Wesleyan views on justification, sanctification and Christian salvation. He relates how the Wesleys, who held the Arminian view that salvation is available to all, disagreed with some other early Methodists who subscribed to absolute predestination—a controversy

that "sharpened and honed the Wesleys' theology of 'free grace' and 'everlasting love.'"

Tyson explains Wesleyan concepts: prevenient grace; spiritual disciplines ordained in scripture; and the view of Jesus Christ as fully human and fully divine.

Tyson traces the development of the small groups, or "class meetings," of the Methodist movement. He notes the Wesleys' tolerance of differing opinion and their ready acceptance of women as the spiritual equals of men.

The Way of the Wesleys quotes extensively from John's writings and Charles's hymn texts. There are questions for reflection and suggestions for further reading, a bibliography, and three indexes (name and subject, hymn titles and first lines, and sermons).

Hasidic Spirituality for a New Age: The Religious Writings of Hillel Zeitlin

Perhaps the best way to categorize this engaging book on Hillel Zeitlin is to consider it an introduction to a most interesting man. Raised as a Hasidic Jew, Zeitlin broke with his past and explored European philosophy and more. Later in life he returned to his Hasidic roots, this time as an outsider who had gained a worldly perspective. Believing the Hasidic world to be in decline, Zeitlin composed a manifesto calling for its renewal. Tragically, he was murdered by the Nazis during World War II.

Hasidic Spirituality for a New Age offers a sampling of Zeitlin's essays, translated with a commentary by Arthur Green. Readers encounter the call for a renewed Hasidism. The description of "The Fundamentals of Hasidism" is fascinating and useful; the discussion of esoteric matters is accessible. In the section on "Judaism and Universal Religion," Zeitlin's description of religious experience focuses on beauty and wonder. Finally, there is a separate section, introduced and translated by poet Joel Rosenberg, of Zeitlin's poems and prayers. The poems allow a glimpse of the experience he writes about in his essays.

Zeitlin's writings are lyrical, provocative and inspirational. — Rabbi Louis A. Rieser



Pastor Tom Hafer's Faith & Fitness, first published in 2007 by Augsburg Fortress, appears here in an updated edition. A refrain for Hafer, who started as a physical therapist but later entered seminary, is "We care for ourselves to better care for others." He rues the fact that affluent Americans spend millions on fad diets and exercise gadgets while much of the world's population is hungry. He hopes his readers will progress from a "need-to-lose-weight" to a "need-to-feed-others" mentality.

Hafer encourages readers to buy only what is good for the environment and their health; he advocates a vegetable and grain-based diet. He regularly invokes the Golden Rule, noting how its practice, reflected in all religions, is the basis for caring for one another and all creation as well as ourselves.

Hafer highlights the benefits of exercise, emphasizing that our bodies function better with regular use. He encourages respect for all faiths, recognizing the important role of spiritual health in wellness.

Faith & Fitness would have benefited from more careful editing. Even though textual errors sometimes distract, Hafer convincingly conveys his message. End matter includes notes on sources and a "Faith & Fitness Challenge," with forms for recording food intake, exercise, and "aha" moments. —Monica Tenney




Prescription for Life: Three Simple Strategies to Live Younger Longer

Dr. Richard Furman is a vascular surgeon and cofounder of World Medical Mission, a Samaritan's Purse ministry that places

doctors and other medical professionals in mission hospitals in Africa, Asia and elsewhere. He brings his own personal experience as well as experience working with patients for over thirty years into an easy-to-read book about living a healthier life to prevent disease and premature aging. Chapters cover the aging process, eating, weight loss, exercise, dementia, cancer, and erectile dysfunction, among other topics. While Furman's suggestions are medically sound and all of us would surely benefit from better health if we adopted them, some are stricter than many people are likely to follow.

Furman includes an extensive list of medical references and an index. *Prescription for Life* is appropriate for libraries with health and fitness sections. —*Sharon T. Hinton*



The Jewish approach to sexuality and marital life is distinct from that of general culture; in certain

ways it is more liberal, in other ways more conservative. It would be wonderful if its ethos were well known, but it is not, even within the Jewish community. Rabbi Avraham Peretz Friedman fills this information gap on the traditional Jewish approach to intimacy in marriage.

Marital Intimacy serves as an introduction to the subject, focusing on foundational beliefs rather than details. Friedman describes the positive Jewish attitude about pleasure, including sexual pleasure. The discussion of procreation waits until the end of the book; it is more important to speak to the obligations the husband bears toward his wife—love, attention, gentleness and pleasure. Friedman makes clear that the Torah understands sex as holy within the context of married life and with the inclusion of the Divine in the relationship. He describes how the physical and the spiritual merge, with God at the center.

Throughout the book Friedman cites his sources—Talmudic and later texts—to underscore and strengthen his points. His portrait of these traditions is well grounded. He succeeds at dispelling myths and presenting a clear picture of the distinct Jewish point of view. Highly recommended. —Rabbi Louis A. Rieser



The Way of Grace: Finding God on the Path of Surrender

When one receives a devastating diagnosis or suffers some other calamity, periods of denial


and depression may result. The author of *The Way of Grace: Finding God on the Path of Surrender* discovered this truth from personal experience. Glandion Carney, a vigorous pastor and church planter, went to his doctor in 2009 after returning from a trip to Africa. Carney's life turned upside down when his physician told him he had Parkinson's disease.

Carney chronicles how God's grace has led him on this torturous journey. The first and most difficult step was that of acceptance. About the second step, submission, Carney writes, "I believe that God gives us just enough grace to help us through everything that comes our way."

Carney also discusses compassion, simplicity, community and trust. He closes chapters with reflections on practicing the graces and includes brief prayers. The book concludes with the four verses of "Amazing Grace."

Richard J. Foster, who contributes the foreword, defines grace as "God's favor, God's gift, God's wonder-filled care for us." Although *The Way of Grace* will be especially meaningful for those with Parkinson's disease, it will be helpful to anyone trying to adjust to a serious problem. —*Beverly M. Bixler*


In this highly personal work,

Haviva Ner-David focuses on three traditional Jewish commandments for women. The Hebrew words for these commandments provide an acronym for the name *Chanah* (Hannah, biblical mother of Samuel) and refer to baking, purity and lighting observances.

Ner-David is a Modern Orthodox feminist who received ordination as a rabbi—a rare occurrence. She expresses her inner thoughts and rationalizations while seeking a

spiritual and meaningful life despite physical and other challenges. The ritual of baking *challah* (bread) takes on great significance for her, and she rhapsodizes about the process along with her women's spirituality group. Traditional Jewish rules about bathing are another important part of her life, and she delves into the process with great zeal. She brings her daughters into this ritual as well. At her congregation she provides the only ritual bath in Israel that is open to all, regardless of gender. Lighting candles becomes a vital part of her life, and the spiritual meaning of fire and light surround her. Ner-David, her husband and seven children live on a kibbutz in Israel.

Cathartic in its presentation, Chanah's Voice reveals the psychological and physical depth of the struggles Ner-David encounters within herself in order to achieve equality in traditional religious practice. —Evelyn Pockrass

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
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


These ambitious books present the teachings of a seminal Hasidic master in the context of the contemporary practice of mindfulness. It is a powerful blend. R. Levi Yitzhak of Berdichev was an early adopter of Hasidism. His reputation for compassion makes him a perfect choice for this pairing.

Rabbi Jonathan P. Slater has arranged evocative passages from *Kedushat Levi*, Yitzhak's major text, according to the weekly cycle of Torah readings. Slater preserves in his translation the rhythm and pace of the original as he guides the reader through the intricacies of meaning in his commentary. Slater then adds two sections that provide tools for understanding Yitzhak's teachings through the lens of mindfulness.

The highly recommended introduction serves multiple purposes. It introduces the practice of mindfulness to readers who are new to the idea. It also describes how Slater came to blend Hasidic teachings with a mindfulness practice. Further, it provides useful background into the Hasidic movement and the person of Yitzhak, and it provides guidance in reading Hasidic teachings.

This highly recommended two-volume set will prove useful to practitioners of meditation who seek Jewish sources with which to deepen their practice. Students of Hasidism who are looking for ways to apply their learn-

ing to their spiritual journey will also benefit. — *Rabbi Louis A. Rieser*

Margaret Bendroth, church historian and director of the Congregational Library in Boston, urges readers to honor the past in *The Spiritual Practice of Remembering*. She examines the tension between tradition, in which history is valued, and the cultural assumption that moving on is always better. How time is viewed—as a commodity, as leisure, or as source of wisdom—is an underlying theme and frames our views of tradition's value and how readily we disregard or destroy its reminders.

Both attention and intention are required for the six excellent but challenging chapters in this book. A chapter of particular interest is "The Communion of Saints," which presents the impact of the Reformation, history of views and rituals regarding death, and the assertion that "our present-day I ives are constantly echoing those of others." Bendroth reminds us of our responsibilities to past and future generations: "We live within a web of holy obligation." The last chapter calls us to remember God and follow with action, to travel lightly, and to notice, as in living with "unhurried awareness."

the soul. In *Finding Spiritual Whitespace* readers discover meaning in spiritual whitespace as well as biblical stories.


Readers will quickly realize that this book is also a memoir of Bonnie Gray's healing from post-traumatic stress disorder. She writes of childhood experiences with an

honesty and realism that will hold the reader to the text.

Twenty-six chapters are grouped into six sections. Chapters begin with a quotation and conclude with "Pull up a Chair—Share" questions, "A Whitespace Prompt—Try This," and "A Soul Conversation—Confide in Him." Gray offers practical applications in "Ten Prompts to Awaken Your Soul to Rest," along with "Whitespace Killers and Triggers."

Gray moves quickly from personal experience and biblical application to a new experience, verse or suggestion. Some thoughts are expanded; others come in short phrases. This style adds interest but requires focus.

Women with painful pasts may find parts of the book challenging, while others will find the comfort, encouragement and freedom intended by the author. Recommended for church libraries, individual or group study, and as a resource for counselors. —*Carolyn Egolf*



This collection bridges the broad liturgical heritage valued by many and satisfies longings for fresh, honest and creative ways to pray and praise.

Living the Life of Jewish Meditation: A Comprehensive Guide to Practice and Experience

Among the books that discuss Jewish meditation, this book stands out. As other authors do,

Rabbi Yoel Glick provides background information to help distinguish the Jewish approach to meditation from other systems. Glick goes further than most, however, in guiding the novice into a well-grounded practice. Moreover, he provides plenty of material to help more advanced students progress in their meditation.


Living the Life of Jewish Meditation begins with the basics: preparation for sitting, stilling the mind, and surrendering into the moment. Glick progresses through more demanding practices, such as visualization, the use of mantras, and deep contemplation. At each step he provides sample meditations and helps the reader define appropriate expectations.

Glick draws on the teachings of early masters to explain what makes this style of meditation Jewish. He includes teachings from Eastern masters and others to clarify, but there never is any doubt that his focus is on Jewish practice.

This book will deepen the practice of any meditation practitioner. Glick keeps his focus clearly on the ways meditation can help an individual or group not only be present but be in the Presence. Highly recommended. — *Rabbi Louis A. Rieser*


Peace seems elusive to many, particularly in tough times. Ken

Gire writes of the desired miracle of peace, suggesting it may come when we calm the storm or calm the soul within the storm. In the 13 chapters of *At Peace in the Storm* readers will find Gire's writing personal, soothing and practical. Each chapter focuses on a source of peace; among them are prayer, friends, strangers, music and service. Peace comes also from God's Word, a balanced brain, books and music.

Each chapter opens with a quotation, references scripture, and concludes with a verse or a prayer. The text is well organized and indicates Gire's wide scope of knowledge—this is his 25th book. Sincerity rings through; these read like the words of a friend. The variety and tone keep one reading, and while solace is found, Gire does not offer gloss or fluff but stays grounded in reality.

In "Peace From a Balanced Brain," Gire presents candid information about brain health, offering hope and practical tips. There is encouragement to rest and enjoy recreation in chapters that explore Sabbath and refreshment.



Life Together

The writings of Dietrich Bonhoeffer continue to help Christians define what it means to live in Christ, Bonhoeffer, the

Lutheran pastor and theologian who was executed by the Nazis in 1945, wrote *Gemeinsames Leben* in 1938 after leading a community of pastors-in-training. The English translation, *Life Together*, appeared in 1954.

In this treatise on the workings of Christian community, Bonhoeffer explains the importance of being physically present with other Christians; it is, he maintains, a joy, a source of strength, and a spiritual necessity. As Christians worship, pray and serve together, they are bound together as the body of Christ.

Life Together discusses aspects of Christian community, including the order of the day, reliance on scripture, prayer (free or formal), table fellowship, and work. Bonhoeffer explains the role of solitude and meditation. He identifies acts and attributes that serve as ministry within community: holding one's tongue, meekness, listening, helpfulness, bearing one another's burdens, proclaiming God's Word, and true authority. Finally, he discusses confession and the Lord's Supper.


Bonhoeffer often cites scripture to support his challenging but inspiring text. Present-day readers will note the male-centered language that was the convention of the author's time.

Life Together, along with Bonhoeffer's The Cost of Discipleship (Touchstone, 1995), is an essential volume for church libraries. —Monica Tenney

Some people have created foundations as tributes to their loved ones, and in doing so have brought about international impact. Others simply share tales of the way their own lives were personally shaped by beloved relatives or friends. A few of the stories come from people whose names everyone will recognize, but most are ordinary people. Most stories are about family members: parents, siblings and children. Other stories honor mentors, friends and others who created an impact. The accounts are brief, the impact more lasting.

There are inspirational stories in this collection. There is a wealth of material that will guide others who have



The Book of Forgiving a guide for people who need forgiveness or who need to forgive—a guide, in other words, for everyone. Following an opening section that defines forgiveness and introduces their "Fourfold Path," the Tutus explain the path in detail: "Telling the Story," "Naming the Hurt," Granting Forgiveness," and "Renewing or Releasing the Relationship." They draw on stories of forgiveness from their own experience, including from the years of apartheid in South Africa and the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. The murder of Mpho's friend and employee in Mpho's home provides multiple lessons in forgiving.

A final section, "All Can Be Forgiven," addresses guilt and shame, forgiving oneself, and helping to heal the wider world with restorative justice. Throughout the book, bullet-point summaries, meditations, journal exercises and rituals fortify understanding. The Tutus encourage people who have been wronged to accept the humanity of perpetrators and recognize that every person carries sorrow and struggle.

The authors provide endnotes and direct readers to further resources. The Book of Forgiving is recommended both for group study and for congregational libraries. — Monica Tenney

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



Creator. Following St. Francis presents John Paul's concerns on environmental issues such as water pollution, climate change, the greenhouse effect and nuclear energy. Building on the legacy of Saint Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology, John Paul expressed through encyclicals and in sermons and other addresses his feeling that following Christ includes being good stewards of the earth and all living things. The book includes a homily on the care of creation by the current Pope Francis.

Marybeth Lorbiecki skillfully addresses issues including poverty, oppression of women, parenthood, chemical and industrial pollution, environmental racism, and war. Her book is carefully constructed to guide readers through the recently canonized John Paul's statements and writings on each topic. Stolen: The True Story of a Sex Trafficking Survivor tells the story

of Katarina Rosenblatt, a victim of sex trafficking. In this heart-wrenching account, Rosenblatt demonstrates how her faith in Christ enabled her not only to survive but also to find hope for herself and for other victims.

This is a difficult book to read; many of us would prefer to think sex trafficking exists only in third-world countries and not in our own backyard. The book handles subjects of prostitution, drug use, sexual abuse and other abusive behaviors sensitively, without diminishing the devastation of young victims caught in the web of human trafficking.

Stolen can serve as an introduction in churches where members wish to help girls and women change their lives, as the author of this book did. Rosenblatt progressed from receiving her GED to earning a PhD, specializing in conflict analysis and resolution. She now works with law enforcement agencies to eliminate human slavery.



mothers; one was given away in exchange for a pickup truck. The single trait shared by most of the victims, viewers learn, is vulnerability. Victims come from homes where neglect, sexual abuse and violence are the norm. Typically, when young people run away to escape such homes, they are approached within 48 hours by predators who manipulate and coerce them, often beating and raping their victims.

On-camera interviews with experts from law enforcement and aid organizations inform viewers that human trafficking is now widespread throughout the United States. Lending hope and inspiration are interviews with citizens who, having discovered the problem, are dedicated to rescuing victims of trafficking and providing them with a safe place for healing, receiving vocational training, and experiencing genuine love. Viewers see "aftercare" programs in Baltimore, Nashville, Little Rock, Sacramento, Houston, and Dallas.

Many of the interviewees speak of comfort and guidance received from God. Even though its stories are heartbreaking, *In Plain Sight* will educate, inspire, and perhaps move viewers to help end the suffering. —*Monica Tenney*

Addison Hodges Hart believes

that Christianity frees us to explore and glean truths from other sources. In *The Ox-Herder and the Good Shepherd*, he connects Christ's teachings and Zen Buddhism via history, commentary, and the Ten Ox-Herding Pictures, a series of ancient poems and pictures that represent a seeker's progress toward enlightenment.

Introductory chapters explore the teachings and lead to the pictures, accompanied by poetry and observations by Kakuan Shien, creator of the original drawings. The set used here is by Japanese artist Shubun. Hart's commentary guides readers through the drawings of the ox, the boy and the man. Each is a step toward the goal of spiritual awakening (in Buddhism, enlightenment; for Christians, "the Kingdom of God"). An excellent summary of needs shared by Zen Buddhists and Christians includes becoming who we are, knowing God, mingling, relating to nature in wholesome ways, and becoming community.

For some, this may be a quick read, but most readers of *The Ox-Herder and the Good Shepherd* will require time and intentionality. Recommended for readers interested in Eastern religions. —*Carolyn Egolf*



Through Your Eyes: Dialogues on the Paintings of Bruce Herman

We bring to art preferences, education, interests, life experiences, and perhaps faith; what the artist presents flows from the same. *Through Your Eyes* makes real the many layers of meaning, seen through the artist's intentions and observers' interpretations, in the paintings of Christian artist Bruce Herman. Among the dialogues of the subtitle are Herman's descriptions of his paintings and commentary by theologian G. Walter Hansen, a friend of the artist.

Among themes in the 13 chapters are Rome, sacred imagery, and the Magnificat, with several series of paintings and altarpieces presented in full color. A section of particular interest is titled "Qu4tets." These paintings are the most realistic and relate to the four seasons in nature and life, centering on the passage of time. This section and a previous one rest heavily on T. S. Eliot's, "Four Quartets," with several portions of that work quoted.

The interweaving of faith and art prompt Hansen and Herman in the postscript to invite us to participate, suggesting "the reality that art is more than what the artist conceives and creates—can be experienced only by a participant, not by a passive consumer."

Suzanne Woods Fisher, one of the authors of the increasingly popular novels dealing with life

among the Amish, brings something new to the genre. In *Anna's Crossing* she fictionalizes the arrival in the new land of the first Amish and Mennonites from Europe. They crossed the Atlantic on the Charming Nancy in 1737. Fisher bases her story on fact, but historical documents and personal accounts of the era are inconsistent. As Fisher's interesting note at the end of this novel indicates, this presents authors and readers with more questions than answers.

Fisher weaves fact and fiction together to paint a picture of what such a voyage might have been like. Conditions aboard ships were deplorable; illness, greed, unsavory behavior and prejudices were rampant.


While life's circumstances change people, in a novel this often happens to characters too rapidly to be credible. However, such is not the case in *Anna's Crossing*. The relationship between Anna and Bairn, the ship's carpenter, begins in spite of obstacles and develops slowly, making the outcome plausible in spite of their different backgrounds. *Anna's Crossing* is an interesting addition to the Amish literature. —*Beverly M. Bixler*

Each of the main characters in *Mistaken* can appear innocent or guilty; the truth is not always clear. Laurie Burke, an attractive young woman who works as a telephone operator in Port Angeles, Washington, appears to be self-confident, but no one knows about her alcoholic father who spends most of his money on liquor or her brother Johnny who works in the mines and is a rumrunner. When Daniel Shepherd, Johnny's childhood friend, moves back to town to help his father run the local drugstore and soda fountain, Laurie thinks he is just another rumrunner. And when agent Samuel Brown comes to town to enforce the federal prohibition laws, Laurie is conflicted about whether to protect her brother or obey the law. Does she know the true motives behind the actions of each of the characters? Laurie needs to rely on her faith as she examines the situation carefully.

Author Karen Barnett combines solid characters with plenty of action and suspense. This book is a perfect blend of romance and mystery that will keep readers intrigued from the first page to the last. —*Mary Lou Henneman*

Selah Chavez is about to celebrate her 18th "Birth Remembrance," an important rite of passage in this society 150 years

after the destruction of the world as we know it. Wanting to prove her independent nature to herself and to her brothers, Selah comes across a Lander, a strange creature that sometimes bears a distinctive physical mark. Even though Selah captured the creature, her brothers claim the honor of selling him to those in power in "the Mountain." Why are these Landers worth so much to scientists?

Selah discovers she also bears the special mark of the Landers and suddenly becomes one of the hunted instead of a hunter.

Thunder, the first book in the Stone Braide Chronicles, is a thrilling good-versus-evil adventure set in a dystopian society. It addresses the question of who has the right to "play God." Readers who enjoy science fiction and fantasy literature will be glad to discover this book on library shelves. They will consider how their own beliefs would come into play in a futuristic society such as the one in *Thunder.*—*Mary Lou Henneman*

The setting of Sherwood Forest is both an escape and a beacon of hope for Marion Miller. She is running away from a life of conflict with her mother at home

in Northern Ireland and trying to find out more about her late father's mysterious life. Marion, in her mid-20s, finds herself in the middle of the Peace and Pigs trailer park, getting a job and becoming involved in the lives of some of the most diverse set of characters ever to appear together.

Author Beth Moran's tale is more than a simple romance. It is a character study that examines how individuals deal with issues of self-esteem and forgiveness. This is a good story with humor, romance, secrets and kind-

ness from strangers that will intrigue fans of lighthearted British fiction. Although the story mentions church and faith a few times, it cannot truly be classified as Christian fiction. It is still a good selection for church libraries (the main character works briefly in a small town library) where fiction collections include secular works. —*Mary Lou Henneman*

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
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multuous and emotional relationship begins when Roger gives Kay his Bible.

The Veterans of History: A Young Person's Guide to the History of the Jews



Writing history is always a matter of perspective. Mitchell Silver, acknowledging his bias from the outset, writes from a secu-

lar, progressive and non-Zionist (but not anti-Zionist) point of view. As principal of a private and secular Jewish school, he needed a history book that fit the school's outlook. Using a sixth-grade vocabulary, he wrote the book he needed. His book, *The Veterans of History*, is engaging and clearly presented.

This is a comprehensive history, ranging from the tribal era into the 21st century. Silver's secular outlook allows for a broad view of events in Jewish history. He devotes attention to the issues that make history complex: the social, economic and ideological tensions that are often omitted from introductory surveys. His description of the American Jewish experience, however, stops short of describing the variety of Jewish expressions that might be of the most interest and relevance to his young readers.

I found this to be a useful book, offering new ways of understanding eras of Jewish history that I had often approached through a different set of lenses. For a middle-school aged child this will be an accessible and readable survey of Jewish history. —*Rabbi Louis A. Rieser*




Crazy

It is through this beautiful novel in verse by Linda Vigen Phillips that readers get a glimpse into the very soul of Laura's character. The author's sensitivity to language is evident in the artful poetry that will engulf readers in Laura's emotions and struggles. The role of faith is brought into play, and questions regarding belief in God will inspire discussion. *Crazy* is highly recommended for teenagers and young adults. —*Mary Lou Henneman*

When Micah accepts an invitation to help with the planting on Zach's family's farm during spring break, their relationship takes many twists.

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


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

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
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
