THE GREAT SEAL OF TEXAS

Article IV Section 19 of the Texas Constitution designates the Secretary of State as the keeper of the Seal of the State, commonly referred to as the Great Seal of Texas. Under recently enacted legislation, the Secretary of State is not only the keeper of the Seal but is also collecting fees from persons selling products bearing the Great Seal of Texas.

Laws banning the commercial use of the Great Seal of Texas have been in the Texas statutes for over thirty years. Recent changes made by the last session of the Texas Legislature to section 17.08 of the Texas Business and Commerce Code (which became effective September 1, 1985) make it possible for a manufacturer to lawfully sell products containing the Great Seal of Texas if licensed by the Secretary of State. Any person who is not a state public official, under the express direction of a state public official, or conducting official state business must have a license.

Compliance with section 17.08 of the Texas Business and Commerce Code and the regulations of the Secretary of State, requires a prospective licensee to submit an application with the Secretary of State's office. An application fee of thirty-five dollars (\$35.00) is also required. A complete application must include a specific description of the intended usage of the Great Seal of Texas and be accompanied by a precise description of the actual product to bear the Great Seal of Texas. When an application is approved, the licensee is required to pay a licensing fee of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) and to execute a licensing agreement. A royalty fee of three percent (3%) of the gross receipts in excess of five thousand dollard (\$5,000) received from the sale of the licensed products must be paid, on a quarterly basis, to the Secretary of State. Products are exempt from the royalty fee requirement when a royalty is paid to the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission.

The manufacturer of a product bearing the Great Seal of Texas has the responsibility for obtaining the necessary license and for the payment of all required fees. Vendors or resellers are exempt from the licensing and fee requirements when the manufacturer of the product has obtained the required Great Seal of Texas license and the vendor or reseller, prior to resale, obtains from the manufacturer a certification of the manufacturer's license. A vendor or resaller who fails to obtain, maintain, or make readily available for inspection the certifications of the manufacturer's license is responsible for obtaining the necessary license and for the payment of all required fees.

State government agencies and officials who use the Great Seal of Texas in an official capacity have no application or fee requirement. However, state agencies and officials are encouraged to submit their intended uses and renditions of the Great Seal of Texas to the Secretary of State.

SECRETARY OF STATE BAROMETERS

Business and commercial data accumulated by the Office of the Secretary of State include total transactions, net additions to the business stock, and corporate charters granted by standard metropolitan statistical areas. The third quarter data reported in our continuing series are discussed in the following sections.

Total Transactions

The number of total transactions recorded by the Statutory Filings Division of the Office of the Secretary of State decreased during the third quarter of 1985, (Table 1). Transaction volume was 56,865, a decrease of 5,817 from the second quarter and 1,319 lower than the same quarter one year ago.

When compared with the transactions recorded during the second quarter of 1985, the data in Table 1 reveal both slower entry and exit rates. These entry and exit rates are demonstrated by the following date:

- Filings for new corporate charters decreased by 6% to 10,213 new charters.
- Filings for new certificates of authority decreased by 13% to 826 certificates.
- Filings for new limited partnerships decreased by 5% to 1,124 new partnerships filed.
- Dissolutions decreased by 46% to 1,344 dissilutions filed.
- Withdrawals decreased by 43% to 176 withdrawals recorded.
- Terminations increased by 6% to 106 terminations recorded.

The data in Table 5, however, also continue to reflect the stability in the Texas business structure noted in the April through June period as evidenced by the decrease in the change of registered agent and office of 14% to 5,325 and the decrease in reinstatements of 36% to 1,100.

When compared with the third quarter of 1984, the data in Table 1 show a 4% decrease in new charters granted, an 8% decrease in new certificates of authority, and a 5% decrease in new limited partnerships. Two exit rates are lower than those recorded in the same quarters of last year, withdrawals (22% lower) and dissolutions (19% lower). Terminations, however, were 34% higher.




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Net Additions to the Business Stock

The quarterly net additions to the business stock for 1983 through the third quarter of 1985 are shown in Figure 1. These data suggest that, while the slower growth in the Texas business community which began in the second quarter of last year continued through the most recent quarter, a modest increase in the growth rate has occured during the past six months. The 10,537 additions to the business stock in the July through September period represent a 4% increase over those recorded in the April through June period, but these net additions still are the third lowest recorded since the series began in 1981. If the net addition rate recorded during the first nine months of 1985 continues, Texas should expect some 40,000 net additions to the business stock this year.

The business stock includes all existing corporations, limited partnerships, and certificates of authority recorded by the Office of the Secretary of State. The net additions to the business stock equal the sum of new corporate charters, new limited partnerships, and new certificates of authority minus the sum of voluntary dissolutions, withdrawals, and terminations.

The absolute numbers of new charters granted in each of the Texas Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas for the first nine months of 1985 are shown in Table 2. These data show 9,314 new charters granted in Texas metropolitan areas from July through September, about 91% of all new charters granted. The 9,314 new charters granted in the third quarter represent a 4% decrease from charters granted both in the second quarter of this year and in the third quarter of last year.

The data in Table 2 show that the four largest metropolitan areas experienced decreases: Austin and Dallas-Fort Worth, 4% each; Houston and San Antonio, 6% each. Of the ten metropolitan areas which expedienced increases, three are along the Mexican border: Brownsville-Harlingen-San Benito, 2%, El Paso, 34%; and Laredo, 20%. Corpus Christi and Galveston-Texas City with 4% and 13% increases, respectively, were the metropolitan areas in the Gulf Coast region which noted increases in new charters granted. Other SMSAs which experienced increases were Longview-Marshall (18%) and Tyler (2%) in the northeast region, Killeen-Temple (12%) in the I-35 corridor, Lubbock (44%), and Odessa (22%).


Although increases in the new charters granted in the third quarter were confined to smaller SMSAs, Texas four largest metropolitan areas accounted for 82% of new charters granted in SMSAs. Dallas-Fort Worth with 3,368 new charters accounted for 36.2%; Houston with 2,948 new charters, 31.7%; Austin with 703 new charters, 7.6%, and San Antonio with 613 new charters, 6.6%. The breakdown of new business incorporations by metropolitan area for the July through September period is shown in Figure 2.
