Departing on Saturday, November 23,1985 , the group remained in Mexico for one week. The return trip to San Antonio took place on Sunday, December 1st. While in Mexico, the students followed a similar itinerary to that of previous visits. It included formal fact-finding visits with Mexican and U.S. officials in Mexico City and Cuernavaca as well as informal visits with Mexican students and citizens in the private sector. ## RULES FOR PASF CONVENTION

PASF chapters attending Convention will be expected to bring sufficient adults and chaperones to guarantee strict discipline among delegates. A ratio of 5 students to 1 adult is required. These adults will also be required to pay the $\$ 3.25$ registration fee. You must comply with these additional rules if you plan to attend Convention.

1. Convention attendance is considered a school function and as such, all local school board policies will apply to the respective school groups.
Seats will be assigned for all the functions in the theater. Each group will keep the same seat assigned during the duration of the Convention.
Wear your name tag at all times. Tags must be worn on the chest where they are easy to see. Students, teachers and
chairpersons not wearing their I.D. tags will not be permitted to enter this theate or participate in other PÁSF Convention activities.
2. It is important that teachers/chaperones be seated among their students. As determined by the size of your group, each adult should oversee five (5) students.
At the onset of the theater activities, students and teachers will be asked to remain seated for the duration of the theater functions
. If "matters of urgency" arrive during the performance, at the discretion of the usher, sturdents will be allowed to leave their seats one at a tim only. This will be monitored from the back of the auditorium by the ushers.
3. If a problem arises with students outside of your group:

Inform one of the ushers The teacher within whose group the problem exists will then be made aware of the situation and an usher will be stationed in the problem area
8. If the problem persists, the
offending party/parties will
be escorted from the prem ises. The principal of the school will then be informed of the problem encountered.
9. Assign a responsible student to be in charge of each room at your hotel.
10. Have a curfew and be strict on its observance

1. Get your students to stay in groups during their free time. Boys should accompany the girls for safety and an adult must be present.
2. Sponsors and adult supervisors should stay with their groups during all Convention activities.
3. One of the main reasons you attend Convention is to vote for the following year's state officers. Schools attending Convention that fail, without a valid excuse, to pick-up a ballot and vote will be re ported to their principal for appropriate action.
4. Teacher and principal will be required to sign a form making head sponsors and other adults responsible for student good behavior and participation in all Convention activities.

## CATCHING UP WITH THE FOREIGN LANGUAGE BOOM

This article on the new importance of Foreign Language in education appeared in the New York Times of Sunday, December 29, 1985

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In the last several years, many American colleges have reinstated foreign-language requirements, and a number of states are making instruction in a second language mandatory in public schools. Edward B. Fiske, the education editor of The New York Times, discussed the subject last week with J. David Edwards, executive director of the Joint Nationa Committee for Languages and of the Council on Languages and Other International Studies, which are umbrella organizations for about 30 foreign-language associations.

Question. Is there a revival of foreign-language study?

Answer. We have the highest number of high school students enrolled in foreign languages since 1968, which was the peak year in the last couple of decades. Today Virginia, for example, has more students in high school language classes than at any time since World War II. States such as New York, Florida, California and Louisiana are bringing back for eign-language requirements.

In addition, about 70 colleges and universities restored language entrance or exit requirements within the last two or three years
Q. Besides the current campaign for tougher educational standards, what has contributed to renewed interest in foreign languages?
A. Trade, for one thing. Recently, for example, the Southern Governors Conference talked about the importance of languages and internatinal education in getting such things as the Toyota plant that Illinois just got. In a way, Toyota is the Sputnik of the 1980's

Concern for national defense has also played a role. This grew, for example, after the Iranian hostage crisis, when it turned out that few people in the American Embassy spoke Farsi.
Q. What's new in the teaching of foreign languages?
A. There is more stress on speaking and less on grammar and correcting grammar. Teachers don't stop students in the middle of a conversation and correct their grammar and make them fee intimidated. There has also been a shift away from the emphasis on literature as a language teaching tool. It was discovered that many students focusing on "Don Quixote," for example, did not have the faintest idea how to speak Spanish.

Reading skills are being stressed, however, in the areas where they are needed, such as in the translation of Japanese journals.
Q. What has caused the change?
A. In part it was the pressure on a profession that was losing students. With the cry for relevance in the 60 's, a lot of colleges eliminated their language requirements, a change that also affected enrollments at high schools and elementary schools. One of the
things that motivates all of us is a fear of loss of jobs
Q. So the vocationalism that we talk about in other subjects has affected language study as well?
A. Very much so, and I think it's for the good. It addresses the things we're way behind in. For example, the people at the Library of Congress told me that they were about 10 years behind in their translation of Japanese materials. Language departments are trying to serve professional schools. This was one of the things that was addressed in the report of a Presidential commission in 1979. Popular courses are Spanish for trade, for example, or Spanish for hotel management. What we hear from business people is: "We don't need French majors, but give us an M.B.A. with French. Our company in Africa can use that skill.'
But languages remain an important part of any liberal arts education. What we're trying to get away from is the snobbishness of the past, the view that language learning is something elitist.
Q. Are more people studying Japanese in college?
A. From 1980 to 1983 the number of students taking Japanese in college rose dramatically. But we're talking about a small number of students: from 12,000 in 1980 to more than 16,000 in 1983. Still, the study of Japanese is a growing area. At the high school level, only a handful of districts offer Japanese

Q. What other languages are popular now?
A. Congress passed an education bill last year that discussed the importance of "critical" languages. The ones that were mentioned were Japanese, Chinese, Arabic and Russian. The enrollments in these languages are all way up.
But Spanish is still the most popular language at all levels, then French and German a distant third.
Q. The shortage of language teachers has been a problem in New York. Where are you going to get qualified instructors?
A. I don't know. The shortage is not just in New York.
The Michigan public schools have hired 200 new language
teachers over the last two years, and they've moved an additional 100 people out of other subjects into language teaching. In Louisiana, the state supervisor of foreign languages said schools there needed about 300 new teachers if the state is going to comply with new mandates on foreign languages.
We're not training them. Year before last, Montana, for example, produced only two foreign language teachers. If you take the high school coaches or math teachers who had Latin 20 years ago and make them Latin teachers, how much Latin are the students going to get? In some states the shortage of foreign language teachers may be worse than the shortage of math and science teachers.

# Why We Celebrate Pan American Day 

Reprinted from: Department of Public Information, Pan American Union.

April 14 - Pan American Day - is celebrated annually as a "commemorative symbol of the American nations and the voluntary union of all in one continental community," marking the anniversary of the day in 1890 when this union was established.
Each year Pan American Day and Week are designated by official proclamations throughout the Western Hemisphere as the occasion on which Americans of all ages and nationalities can strengthen the bonds of friendship and understanding that unite the peoples of the 21 American republics. Americans as widely separated as those of Alaska and Punta Arenas, Chile, come to know each other better through special obser vances, classroom projects, club programs, plays and pageants, parades and social events.

It is important to understand the interdependence of the American republics and how the organization which unites them - the Organization of American States, or OAS - works for the peace, security, welfare, and human rights of all our peoples. And it is especially important to understand how the inter-American community is striving to attain these goals under the Alliance for Progress, which is dedicated to securing a better life, under free dom and democracy, for presen and future generations.

## A COMMUNITY PROGRAM

A successful community program usually calls for a minimum of three key committees. They are the Organizing Committee, the Program Committee, and the Publicity Committee.

Local Resources - Canvass your own community for talent and materials appropriate to Pan American Day. If yours is a college or university town, you will probably find professors and students from some of ": sister American republics. Ask them to join your committee and take part in the program. Invite consular officials in your area to be guests of honor at public functions and to address your meetings. Recent travelers to Latin America and former residents of different countries can make a valuable contribution to your program by showing their movies, slides, or photos, and typical costumes and handicrafts.

## Public Functions

a) Proclamation of Pan American Day, a month or two in advance of April 14, by the governor of your state and mayor of your community.
b) Ceremony inaugurating the Pan American Week observances at City Hall or some other appropriate location.
c) Planting of a "Peace Tree" or "Peace Garden" to symbolize inter-American friendship.
d) A Pan American Day parade including a motorcade of 21 floats, each symbolic of an American republic.
e) A Pan American Festival, such as an annual week-long festival which features a different Latin American country each year and includes panel discussions, lectures, a student assembly, and films and exhibits.
f) A Pan American Day ball or banquet has proved to be a good windup for the week's activities.
Exhibits and Window Displays - Public buildings, places of public assembly, and stores lend themselves to attractive Pan American displays on many subjects.
Libraries - Exhibits of outstanding books on Latin America; an OAS exhibit featuring publications of the Pan American Union; an exhibit of Latin American handicrafts.

Churches - No more appropriate place exists for the commemoration of Pan American Day than the churches, synagogues, and Sunday schools of the American republics. The friendship of the American peoples is grounded in a deep sense of spiritual unity and brotherhood and a common concept of peace, justice, freedom and human welfare.
Clubs - Each year profesional, business, social, and service clubs make an important contribution to Pan American Day community celebrations and often salute Pan Americanism at one of their regular April meetings.
For many such clubs Pan American Day marks the windup of a year's study program or other inter-American project; it is the occasion for awarding prizes for essay, speaking, poster, or other contests on a Pan American theme, which they have sponsored in the schools or among youth groups of the community.

Many clubs sponsor special luncheons, receptions, or banquets with consular officials, professors, and students of other American republics as guests of honor or guest speakers. Speakers usually describe the progress and achievements of inter-American cooperation and the OAS in a field of special interest to the particular group. The entire community program is often spearheaded by such clubs.
Other Channels - Chambers of Commerce, travel agencies, banks, post offices, motor clubs, museums and art galleries, and drug, food, and department stores can also combine their special interests with exhibits featuring Pan American Week.

Schools and Universities
Schools and universities often take a leading part in community programs, especially members of Spanish Clubs or students of interAmerican affairs. A special assembly on Pan American Day is the most effective way of directing the attention of all students in a school, college, or university to the importance of the anniversary Assembly programs usually include a flag ceremony; brief talks on the meaning of Pan American Day and the Organization of American States; a musical program by the school band, orchestra, or choral club; a playlet or pageant by the dramatic club, and a movie on life or travel in the other American republics.
Presenting the OAS - History, political science, social studies, and language classes lend themselves most readily to study of the development and work of the OAS; but there is ample opportunity for other classes to make inter-American cooperation the theme of their work - and at any age level.
Many classes celebrate Pan American Week as the climax of their year's social studies or language course. All classes from art to zoology can develop an inter-American interest.
