Abelardo Lopez Valdez was appointed by President Carter to be Assistant Administrator for Latin America, Agency for International Development, in April 1977. As the chief A.I.D. official for Latin American programs, he supervises the programming and management of United States economic development assistance throughout Latin America at a level of approximately \$425 million annually. Mr. Valdez' appointment makes him the highest ranking Mexican-American in the Department of State.

President Carter appointed Mr. Valdez to be Special Ambassador on two occasions during 1978, while serving as a member of the U.S. Delegation to the inaugurations of the Presidents of Costa Rica and the Dominican Republic.

Mr. Valdez served as a White House military aide to President Lyndon B. Johnson from 1965-1967 and accompanied President Johnson to the Conference of the American Presidents at Punta del Este, Uruguay in April 1967.

Prior to his appointment, Mr. Valdez was a founding partner of the Washington, D.C. law firm of Purcell, Hansen & Valdez, and specialized in international trade law and the regulation of commodity futures markets. He served as General Counsel for the Inter-American Foundation from 1973-1975, and was an attorney of the Overseas Private Investment Corporation from 1971-1973. Mr. Valdez was a member of the faculty of the John F. Kennedy Institute of Politics at Harvard University in 1977, where he taught a seminar on Critical Issues in U.S.-Latin American relations

Notice to PASF Chapters: New Rules

The PASF Central Office has received several personal checks covering enrollment fees and Convention registration that have been returned by the bank because of insufficient funds. This situation creates many problems for the bookkeeping system of the Central Office as well as requiring additional time and phone calls tracing down these checks. Therefore, starting next school year, only money orders and school fund checks will be ac-

The PASF Central Office has cepted for payment of enrollment fees and Convention registration fees.

In addition, we have found many instances where a school has either underpaid or overpaid. It is not too difficult to calculate the exact amount a chapter must pay for enrollment or Convention registration. Therefore, starting this school year, any overpayment will be deposited in the general fund of PASF. There will be no more refunds. You are responsible to know what your chapter must pay. If your chapter underpays, your enrollment application or convention registration form will not be processed; instead, it will be returned to your chapter. Your chapter must send the correct amount of money in order for your forms to be processed.

Please comply with these regulations so that your membership and Convention registration forms can be processed quickly and effectively.

Ideas on Fund Raising Given By 2nd V-Pres.

One of the initial functions of the Pan American Student Forum (PASF) is to aid the chapters in their efforts to make a worthy contribution for the support of Pan Americanism. This assistance is furnished through suggestions and the participation of every chapter in the state projects.

The 1978-79 state projects are:

1. LA BUENA MADRE - It is a Catholic orphanage in Pachuca, Hidalgo, Mexico. This orphanage cares for 75-80 girls during the school year. It is a very worthy project.

2. MYRTLE L. TANNER SCHOLARSHIP AND EN-**RICHMENT FUND** - This is PASF's most important state project. By contributing to this fund, you enable PASF students and sponsors to continue their study of Spanish and Spanish culture.

3. AMIGOS DE LAS AMER-ICAS - A youth-led program of immunization and medical assistance in cooperation with the health ministries in eight Central and South American countries. The youth participants train in medical techniques, and the Latin American culture.

4. PESOS FOR BRACES - Is a non-profit organization in Guadalajara, Jalisco, Mexico, that buys orthopedic braces and artificial limbs for crippled children whose parents cannot afford them.

The PASF of Texas emphasizes and strongly urges consideration of the above-listed projects. The following projects may also be considered on the local level.

5. UNICEF — Contributes greatly to the children of 35 countries in the Americas by means of health services, nutrition, education and social services programs.

6. OPERACION NINOS - A program to help underprivileged children throughout Latin America. Program grants have been used to build day care centers, clinics and schools, provide teaching aids, and clothing for needy children.

7. LOCAL PROJECTS -PASF is also a community service organization. Each club should work on some social project such as adopting a family, building a community center, sponsoring child care programs or tutoring programs.



Finds Spanish A Challenge

LUBBOCK — A challenge! That is what Spanish was and is for me! I have a great reverence for this language. It has a musical sound to the ears. It is a vibrant manifestation of the people who speak it, a beautiful reminder of the history and land that they have occupied for centuries. This sense of beauty should be shared. The best way to do this is through a knoweldge of their language, Spanish.

One needs much patience to learn another language. Those who speak English and Spanish have considerable talent and deserve respect. I, for my part, always admire the Mexican-Americans who know two languages. I want to study Spanish because I can be an influence in the better understanding between our two races. Bilingual education is, in a certain manner, a key to peace. It can be a study with the object of understanding, accepting, and loving our neighbors.

The idea that a Spanishspeaking person is an inferior student because he doesn't completely forget his home language seems illogical to me. There are many bilingual persons who are excellent students, especially if instruction in both languages began at an early age. What we need is teachers well qualified in Spanish and very interested in adequate materials. Thus we would have fewer failures in school and fewer difficulties between the races. Knowing Spanish well helps in the study of English.

Here in the Southwest exist Spanish influences that are not generally recognized. We use Spanish words by the thousands in place names, ranching, food, customs, etc.

I desire a tranquil world for my children. I would like to help my country to become better. Therefore, I want good bilingual education. We would have the opportunity to know each other better, Mexican-Americans and Anglos. — Kayla Barnett, Roosevelt High
