44th Annual PASF State Convention

The 44th Annual State Convention of the Pan American Student Forum (PASF) was called to order at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, March 28, 1987 by State President Cindy Rincón. The invocation was given by State Sponsor Daniel Tijerina who then led the delegation in the singing of "O Noble Pan America."

The presentation of the flags was performed by McCollum High of San Antonio.

Cindy Rincón, PASF State President, introduced the special guests which included: Mr. John Milanes, TAMOAS Coordinator, Mr. Charles Ijames, TAMOAS Assistant, Mrs. Margarita Berne and other representatives from Pesos for Braces.

Dr. Michael L. Lauderdale, Chair of the Good Neighbor Commission, then spoke to the delegates about the future of the Good Neighbor Commission and PASF's role in the promotion of relations and understanding with Mexico.

Mr. Jorge C. Garcés, Executive Director of the Good Neighbor Commission, introduced Lic. Enrique Dabdoub, representing the students from Mexico, who spoke to the delegates about the importance of youth and their future in world peace.

First Vice-President Troy Fields gave the membership report. School members for 1986-1987 totalled 7,343 members representing 126 chapters. Attending Convention were 1,912 delegates representing 101 schools from throughout the state. Participating in the Spanish Contests

were 495 students from 65 schools.

Second Vice-President Tracy Paricio then gave the state projects report. The contributions were as follows:

Tracy Paricio announced that \$10,218.00 had been contributed to the "SAVE PASF" project. She then presented Mrs. Connie Kunkel, Sponsor for the PASF Chapter at Cy-Fair High School in Houston, with a plaque for the chapter contributing the most to the "Save PASF" project. Total contribution of Cy-Fair High School amounted to \$638.80.

President Cindy Rincón then gave her speech in which she thanked the Pan American Student Forum and the Good Neighbor Commission for allowing her the opportunity to participate in the Student Exchange Program and broadening her understanding of the Americas.

After her speech, Pace High School sang the "Sing Song" accompanied by the entire delegation.

The delegates then heard from the candidates running for state office. This was followed by the reading of the PASF Bylaw changes by DeAnna Rodríguez, PASF State Secretary. After the non-voting delegates were dismissed from the Theater, the actual voting took place. The meeting was then adjourned.

Mexico City Students Visit Cy-Fair

In an attempt to strengthen relations between the citizens of Mexico and the United States, the Pan American Student Forum (PASF) and the Good Neighbor Commission (GNC) sponsored an exchange program in which ten students from Mexico City visited Texas.

The exchange students were hosted by PASF members in the Cy-Fair school district — eight of them being Cy-Fair students and two of them being students at Jersey Village.

"The purpose of the exchange program is for us (the Mexican students) to learn the way Americans live, learn, and transmit feelings to one another," said Sr. Dabdoub, one of the Mexican sponsors.

The exchange students arrived in Houston on the afternoon of

Tuesday, March 24, and were introduced to their hosts that evening.

The following day, they attended school for the entire day with their hosts, and that evening, there was a dinner held at Cy-Fair in their honor. At the dinner a cake was cut by a member from each country, signifying "that the blood that flows in each of us is the same." Also at the dinner, a candle was lit so that the lights of Mexico would shine in Cy-Fair.

"There are differences between your school and ours. Our classes last two hours, and here the classes last only an hour. The hours are very different, we have four terms, from 7 to 11, 10 to 2, 2 to 6, and the last from 5 to 9, and we don't have lunch-time. Also, we are free to come and go as we please from the classes. We do not have to have the permission

of the teacher as you do here," said Laura Rodriguez, exchange student from Mexico City.

"I think that Mexican students, at least the ones that I know, take school a lot more seriously than American students," replied Erica Inzunza, exchange student from Mexico City.

Thursday two Spanish teachers, Mrs. Connie Kunkel and Mrs. Karen Watson, along with some of the Spanish III and IV students, accompanied the exchange students on a tour of the city.

The group left at 9:00 that morning, and the first stop on the trip was the Galleria. The students were impressed with the mall, and some went shopping while others only looked. Many talked of the expensive prices and bad economy in Mexico.

Afterwards, they all went to the

P.A.S.F. Delegates In Washington, D.C.

Last December 12-14, 1986, five students from the Pan American Student Forum traveled to Washington, D.C. to represent the organization at the O.A.S. Workshop. The students were Craig Perry from Keystone High School in San Antonio, Lisa Fain from Cy-Fair High School in Houston, Chuck Ijames from Wylie High School, Pam Marshall from Denton High School, and Kofi Bruce from Midland High School.

The Organization of American States (O.A.S.) is the oldest international regional organization in the world. This organization of North, South and Central American countries seeks to promote, by cooperative action, their economic, social, and cultural development in an effort to strengthen the peace and security of this continent. These 36 countries provide a forum for political, economic, social and cultural cooperation among the member states of the Western Hemisphere.

The O.A.S., in an effort to educate young people about its workings, stages an Annual Model Organization of American States mock session. This moot conference composed of young people solves current problems that are also on the agenda of the O.A.S.

The students represented the country of El Salvador. One of them, Kofi Bruce, represented that nation in the Second Committee which deals with social and economic concerns. "Because of his exceptional ability in diplomacy, negotiating and in representing El Salvador, the Second Committee

voted him vice chairman of that committee for next year," she said. Kofi is the first Texan to ever be elected to a position in the Model Organization of American States and is the only sophomore to be elected to an office for the coming year.

Following are a few thoughts from Kofi about the trip.

"I must admit that at first the idea of traveling to Washington, D.C., ignorant of what my purpose there would be, made me apprehensive. All of my uncertainties were lifted, however, when we met the Puerto Rican delegation. The help they provided to my survival in committee sessions. Without the help of the Puerto Rican delegation, I would have been unsuccessful in the truthful representation of our delegation's country.

"The committee sessions forced self-improvement through development of diplomacy. More than any other aspect of the Model Organization of American States, diplomacy is important. I learned how to tactfully deal with disagreement, even in the face of personal attack. I was forced to interact with others, and I was forced to defend my arguments from opposing views. I also gained awareness of the world that living in the United States isolates me from. Most of all, I gained friendship. Ironically, my worst enemies on the committee floor became my best friends outside the meetings."

Woman Puts School's Club On Spanish-Speaking Terms

When Spanish teacher Dulce Berbarie taught in the Plano school system several years ago, she was a strong supporter of the Pan American Student Forum of Texas.

But while teaching in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., she wondered why Florida didn't have a student organization quite like the Texas model.

"I found it hard to believe that Florida didn't have a club like this when the Spanish language is as important as it is in Florida," said Berbarie, who is in her first year of teaching in Cedar Hill.

Sponsored by the Good Neighbor Commission of Texas, the club, which encourages the understanding of all nationalities in the Americas, began in 1949. Several Dallas area high schools have PASF chapters.

And now, Cedar Hill High School has one of the newest, thanks to Berbarie's efforts and co-sponsor Mary Westlake.

Club members say the organization is not a typical foreign language club. Its purpose is not only to entertain its members but also to teach students about neighboring countries.

Last week, the 35 members of PASF commemorated the founding with a tree planting in front of the high school. Students also placed a plaque near the tree,

which has been named "The Pan American Friendship Tree."

"Cedar Hill is a growing place. As a teacher for 16 years, I think the school does not have enough traditions. This tree should be a service to the school," Berbarie said.

Berbarie said another mission of the club is to help people in need. To this end, PASF members will donate \$100 to be sent to a project called "Pesos for Braces," an effort to raise money to help handicapped children at a hospital in Mexico.

"The \$100 will go to help pay for walking braces for at least two kids. They'll take pictures of the children, and the children will be asked to write letters back to us. It's going to be an emotional experience," Berbarie said.

A fall fund-raising effort in which PASF members sold posters and calendars netted about \$1,500, which will pay for a state convention this spring in San Antonio.

One member, Danny Ramirez, has set high goals for the chapter's first year. He plans to run for state vice president. Eleven other students and the sponsors will be there to cheer him on.

Another student, Stacey Eagan, a senior, has applied for two scholarships associated with the state organization. One of them is

observation level (64th floor) of the Transco Tower to look and to take pictures. There were many comments about the overall flatness of the city, which was clearly visible from the observation platform.

"Here there are less people, less traffic, and the pollution is not so bad as in Mexico City. There, the pollution is so bad that by 5:00 in the afternoon your eyes are aching — I do not feel that way here — the air is so clean," stated Rodriguez.

"Here most of the people live in the suburbs and drive many kilometers to work, which is very different from Mexico City where most of the people live in the city," added Inzunza.

On the morning of Friday, March 27, the exchange students boarded a bus with the PASF members and sponsors traveling to San Antonio for the annual PASF convention. Upon arrival in San Antonio, the exchange students were released to hosts from other schools.
