

# Vinners Tell of Summer at UDLA

When I first learned that I had received the UDLA Scholarship I was very excited. Mostly because I had the honor of receiving a scholarship that was going to look good for my school, Cy-Fair, as well as helping me in my future years at college. After the initial excitement wore off came the anxieties. Am I going to like the unversity? What is the university like? Will I be able to handle being away from home for so long and in a totally different culture? What classes should I take? Will the other students accept me as a friend? What should I pack? The list goes on and on. I received information from the university and from PASF on the courses offered, expenses, etc. So with this I prepared myself as best I could for my adventure.

The day of my departure, June 9, was probably the most nervous day of my life. I was so worried - mainly about forgetting something important - like money. I knew that I would have a good time and make friends once I got settled in at the university. When I arrived at the Mexico City airport there were teachers and administrators from the university waiting there to help out. There were other students coming in that day from other parts of the U.S. so we met each other and got acquainted on the bus ride to the university. When we got to UDLA, we were assigned our rooms and got settled in. We met a couple of Mexican students then but I did not meet my roommate, Laura, who is from Mexico, until the next day.

On Monday the 10th of June we went to orientation. There we met people from the university and other students from the U.S. and other countries. I became better acquainted with Ellie Boundy from Midland, Texas and Theresa Fishler from Wisconsin. We three became great friends over the weeks.

The next day I registered for my classes. I took advanced intensive Spanish and archeology. Both classes were neat but I really enjoyed archeology and my teacher, Z. Green, was very interesting and informative.

The weeks that followed were packed full of different experiences and side trips to other cities in Mexico. During the course of our stay, my archeology class took two field trips. One to Tlaxcala and Cacaxtla and one to Teotihuacan. Both of these trips were very fulfilling. The class began with studies of the different tribes that were in Mexico and progressed to studies of the great civilizations, such as the Maya and the Aztec.

In the Spanish class we not only learned the language but we also learned of the culture of the Mexican people today. Through these two classes I learned of the heritage and the rich history of Mexico.

The dorms that we stayed in were pretty nice and the university setting was beautiful. Each morning as we walked out of the dorm building we could see the two volcanoes, Popocatepetl and Iztaccihuatl, and the pyramid of Cholula with the cathedral on top. Seeing this beauty started each day off perfect.

While there we did the things and went to the places that other college students did. We went to the same restaurants, the same shopping malls, the same markets, and every Thursday night we went to the rock center. So it did not take long for the people to get used to seeing us and we quickly made friends. It didn't take me long to realize that the friends I made were my best teachers. They corrected my Spanish, taught me the "latest" popular phrases, and took me to the places so that I could see life outside of the college.

One reason I believe that I made friends and loved Mexico so much is that I went there with an open mind. I knew that it wouldn't be like back home in Texas and I expected differences. I had a great time living in a different culture and I learned how to get along with people other than Americans. What I think I liked most about the culture was that the people are very traditional, and being traditional is not something that is often seen in the U.S. One aspect of their culture that was at first hard for me to get used to was that they aren't as concerned with time and schedule as Americans are. That when I returned to the U.S. it was difficult for me to return to having a schedule during a day. I also found that it is much more of a challenge to go to Mexico to live for a while than to just go for a week or two vacation. I learned more by living there, even though it was only for seven weeks, than I could ever learn in a classroom.

But I must admit that there was a part of the trip that I did not like. The worst part of the trip was coming home. I wish that I could have stayed longer or maybe have gone for a regular semester. Everything else was terrific and I had the greatest time. I made friends that I still keep in touch and I made a load of great memories. I will never forget my stay in Mexico and I feel that the experience I had will help me cope with being an incoming freshman at any college in the U.S. I hope to someday go back for a longer
