# NON-CIRCULATING DOCUMENTS COLLECTION VLB housing interest rate drops to all-time low

The Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) recently reduced its interest rate on home loans to 7.25 percent — the lowest rate offered by the VLB since the home loan program started in 1984.

"Lowering our interest rate to 7.25 percent makes our home loan program far and away the best deal in today's market for a veteran looking for affordable housing," said
Texas Land Commis-

sioner Garry Mauro, who chairs the VLB.
"It places us below the VA, below FHA, and below conventional rates."

Mauro said that
for veterans looking to
buy a house, the VLB's new
rate is the best deal available.
He urged veterans thinking
about a home loan to call the

VLB and take advantage of the reduced rate.

The interest rate had been 8.5 percent. The new rate, which is effective immediately, means substantial savings for Texas veterans. For example, the 7.25 percent rate means the monthly payment on a \$45,000 home loan decreased from \$346 to \$307 (principle and interest) - a savings of \$39 a month. That savings amounts to \$14,000 over the life of a 30-year loan.

In addition to saving money because of the lower interest rate, home buyers using the program will save money in closing costs. That's because there are no discount points charged on the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program (VHAP) loan.

Thanks to a new law, the maximum loan amount for the VHAP more than doubled from

\$20,000 to \$45,000 in September, 1991. However, veterans are not limited to homes in that price range. Veterans who want to buy a home costing more than \$45,000 can combine their VLB loan with a Federal Housing Administration (FHA), Veterans Administration (VA) or conventional loan.

In most cases, a Texas veteran can buy a home with no down payment by combining a federal VA loan with a Texas VHAP. Veterans who have used all their federal VA benefits are still eligible for their state veterans benefits.

Texas veterans can also use the \$45,000 loans to bid on hundreds of available Resolution Trust Corp. (RTC) and Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

properties that fall into that price range.

All VHAP loans must be originated by an approved lender or the VLB. When the VLB originates the loan, the interest rate will be 7.425 percent because the board does not provide private mortgage insurance.

# Texas ranch honors POW-MIAs

On a lonely stretch of highway just north of Benavides, Texas lies America's Last Patrol Ranch. Founded in 1985, the ranch is dedicated to the memory of American prisoners of war (POWs) and those listed as missing in action (MIA).

Mini-camps, built by various veterans groups from towns such as Premont, Mathis and Robstown, are scattered around the 10-acre ranch. Each camp is named and all were built in honor of people killed in action. There is also a small chapel built into the side of an old caliche pit where passersby often leave pictures and mementos of their loved ones.

The ranch, run by America's Last Patrol Association, promotes public awareness of the 2,453 Americans, including 147

Texans, still listed as missing in action from the Vietnam War. It also serves as a reminder of the Americans from other wars who are still listed as MIAs. They include 8,177 from the Korean War, 78,773 from World War II and 3,350 from World War I.

In addition, the ranch benefits the local community. Thanks to help from the City of Benavides, the ranch is home to the only helipad in Duval

County. Life-flight helicopters can land there to pick up and transport the seriously injured to Corpus Christi. Law enforcement officers use the shooting range to keep their pistol and rifle certifications current.

The ranch hosts three major veterans ceremonies a year—Veterans Day, Memorial Day and Pearl Harbor Day. During last year's Persian Gulf War, when several of the locals were dispatched to the Middle East, numerous candlelight vigils were held at the ranch.

The ranch is home to two memorial walls. One is dedicated to military personnel killed or missing in action, and the other is dedicated to every person who has served in the United States Armed Forces. Names are added to the wall during each ceremony, and it is the association's hope to eventually have the memorial walls surround the ranch.

"While in so many ways we are tied to the local community, we are not really a local organization. America's Last Patrol Ranch Association has members scattered across the country," said Arturo Pecos, Adjutant of the association and Director of Financial Aid at Texas A&I University.

"The organization is very active in veterans issues," said Commander Eran Gutierrez. "And one of our main goals is to get our government and the governments of other countries to address

the POW and MIA issues. We want them to account for all those still missing."

The ranch and the association started out with 10 founding members. They came up with the idea when they joined 20 other veterans in a 235 mile run from McAllen to San Antonio to call attention to the POW/MIA issues.

Originally, membership in

the nonprofit organization was open only to Vietnam veterans. However, over the years it has developed into an association for all military veterans. Even non-veterans can join the group as associate members.

Today America's Last Patrol Ranch Association has more than 125 members. 

### **Board extends special financing**

The Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) has voted to extend the sale of selected forfeited land tracts at reduced interest rates. Eligible Texas veterans can purchase these tracts at an interest rate of three percent. The interest rate for the general public is four percent. These special low rates are in effect through August 31, 1992.

There are more than 550 tracts of land eligible for the special financing. They are listed in the Tex-Trax II Handbook dated

Located in 113 counties, these tracts are part of the Tex-Trax II program which gives real estate agents and brokers the exclusive right to market certain forfeited properties. These tracts have previously been offered for sale exclusively to Texas veterans but were not sold. The VLB has sold more than 700 tracts of land totaling more than \$13.3 million through the special financing offer since it began in March, 1991.

No down payment is required, and the board will finance the entire loan amount. All offers that meet or exceed the minimum bid will be considered on a first-come, first-served basis.

"The terms of this sale make owning land well within the reach of most Texans," David Gloier, Deputy Commissioner of the VLB said. "For example, the payments on a \$19,000 tract financed at three percent with nothing down for 30 years would be \$83 a month. That's a financing package that's hard to beat."

Gloier emphasized that the land program foreclosure rate is only 1.9 percent and that prudent lending and investment practices mandated by the board made the lower interest rates possible.

"The board's decision to continue to offer the lower interest rates on our older foreclosed properties allows us to accomplish three things. It reduces our non-performing assets, places these properties back on the local tax rolls, and allows us to pass substantial savings on to Texans looking for land," he said. All offers to the VLB must be made through local real estate

There is no maximum sales price on a home purchased through the program, and loans are available in 15, 20, 25 or 30-year terms. The program cannot be used for refinancing.

In other action, the board also reduced the interest rate on a veterans home improvement loan from 10.5 to 9.25 percent interest. The home improvement program enables Texas veterans to borrow up to \$17,500 at 9.25 percent interest (plus FHA insurance) for up to 15 years to make improvements to an existing home.

## Regional loan offices serve Texas veterans

In addition to its headquarters in Austin, the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) has seven regional loan offices to assist veterans with housing and home improvement loans. Located throughout the state, these offices were established to make the VLB more accessible to veterans and to make housing and home improvement loan transactions easier. All land loans will continue to be serviced out of the Austin headquarters.

"With the housing interest rate going down to 7.25 percent and the home improvement rate dropping to 9.25 percent, these offices are now more important than ever," said David Gloier, Deputy Commissioner of the VLB.

In addition to accepting housing and home improvement loan applications, these offices can accept applications from local contractors who want to be certified to participate in the home improvement program.

The Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program lends eligible Texas veterans up to \$45,000 at 7.25 percent interest.

However, when the Texas Veterans Land Board originates a housing loan, the interest rate will be 7.425 percent interest because the board does not provide private mortgage insurance.

The Texas Veterans Home Improvement Program lends eligible Texas veterans up to \$17,500 at 9.25 percent interest (plus FHA insurance) for up to 15 years. The minimum loan amount is \$4,000. If the loan amount is less than \$7,500, the maximum term of the loan will be 10 years. No down payment is required and all home improvement loans are FHA insured.

Improvements must be made to an existing home that is the principal residence of the veteran. Condominiums, townhomes, duplexes and fourplexes that are at least five years old are eligible for the program.
