


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

Students, Faculty Honored

The Eighth Annual Honors Convocation was held on the campus of The University of Texas of the Permian Basin on April 24, 1984.

Keynote speaker for the event was Dr. Haskell Monroe, President of the University of Texas at El Paso. Monroe was previously on the presidential search committee that brought UTPB President Duane Leach to the Permian Basin campus.

Approximately 600 students were presented with awards during the Honors Convocation. The awards included scholarships from several Permian Basin organizations, among them the Permian Honor Scholarship

Foundation, the Jesse H. and Mary Gibbs Jones Scholarships, Ellen and Bill Noel Scholarships, and the UTPB Merit awards.

Forty-one UTPB students were listed in Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.

In his address, Monroe called on UTPB graduates to be examples of a quality education in the Permian Basin. "You bear a burden," Monroe said. "As one of the earliest graduates of this ten-year old institution, you are a pioneer, and have a responsibility to demonstrate the quality of this university."

Monroe called on the graduating

students to be active peacemakers in the Permian Basin. "I believe this campus can bring these two communities together more than any other force," he said.

Two members of the UT-Permian Basin faculty were also presented with honors at the convocation. Professor Mary Quinlivan of the department of history is the Piper Professor for 1984. Professor Yonina Cooper of the department of computer science was presented with the 1984 Amoco Outstanding Teacher Award.

Monroe was introduced by UTPB President Duane Leach.

U.T. Permian Basin alumnus Niles Foster has been accepted into Ross University Medical School. Foster is a 1983 graduate, who majored in life science. He was a member of the student senate, and is a former member of the U.S. Marine Corps.

Ross University is located in the Caribbean.

U.T. Permian Basin Student Pete Okonkwo received Honorable Mention in the International Underwriters/Brokers, Inc., Second Annual Scholarship Essay Competition. Okonkwo is attending the university from his home country of Nigeria.

Over 200 international students entered the competition, and O-

konkwo was one of ten who received Honorable Mention awards of \$50.

The essays were to be written on the topic, "Discuss the various ways in which educational exchange contributes to global understanding."

Michener Visits UTPB Campus

James A. Michener, the man who gave the world such novels as South Pacific, Hawaii, The Source, Chesapeake, and Centennial, as well as dozens of other stories that made the best seller lists, came to West Texas and U.T. Permian Basin to meet with members of the Permian Historical Society.

Michener came to help the organization celebrate its 25th anniversary during a luncheon in the student lounge.

Prof J. Tillapaugh, history, is president of the society. Michener made the trip as a part of his research on the Lone Star State. He is writing a novel on the history of Texas, and has been to the Midland/Odessa area "on five or six occasions."

"Everything I've heard about Texas is true," Michener said. "You really do eat barbecue, and there is nothing phoney about Texans." Then he added, after a moment's thought, "...some things here are ridiculous...but never phoney!"

Michener and his wife have lived in Austin for several months, and will remain there until his new story of Texas is completed. The book is expected to be published in time for the Texas Sesquecentennial in 1986.

Third Annual Summer Band Camp Scheduled

U.T. Permian Basin will host its third annual band camp this summer. The camp, which will offer instruction in both band and orchestra, is open to all instrumental music students from junior and senior high schools in the Permian Basin.

The summer band camp will feature two bands, two orchestras, private instruction, and a daily recreation hour.

A seminar for band and orchetra directors will be added to events during the band camp this year. Dr. Dale Kennedy, director of bands for the University of Missouri, will join Ken Leach from Permian High School as a featured clinician.

Each student in the camp will receive an hour of supervised section rehearsal with specialists in brass, woodwind, percussion, and upper and lower strings. A second hour will be spent in full band or string orchestra rehearsal, followed by a recreation hour at U.T. Permian Basin's recreational facilities. Among activities planned are racquetball, swimming, tennis, basketball, volleyball, and runs through

the parcours.

Each of the bands and orchestras will present two concerts. The first concert is scheduled for June 10, and the second will take place June 17. Guest conductors for the second concert will be Dr. Thomas Hohstadt, director of the Midland/Odessa Symphony, and Dan Gibbs, formerly director of the Monahans High School Band.

The summer band camp will conclude with a dance and party in the U.T. Permian Basin Student Lounge. All students, parents, and music camp faculty will attend. Outstanding students from each performing organization will be presented.

The band camp will begin June 6 and continue through June 17. Tuition for the camp will be \$30, however, students wishing to attend only one week of the camp may pay a tuition of \$20. Private lessons will be offered at \$4 per lesson.
