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YGNACIO GARZA NAMED COMMISSION CHAIRMAN

AUSTIN--Preparing a new budget for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will be a major item facing Ygnacio "Nacho" Garza, new chairman of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Garza was named chairman of the commission by Gov. Ann Richards on Sept. 20, replacing Chuck Nash, who had been chairman since July 8, 1988. Nash will remain on the commission to serve out his term, which expires Jan. 31, 1993.

"I'm grateful to the governor for the confidence she has displayed in me," Garza, the mayor of Brownsville, said. "I'm looking forward to working as chairman and working with the other members of the commission on issues that are important to Texas."

One of those issues is the department's budget. Garza said department staff is preparing a budget for presentation to the commission's budget committee - consisting of Garza, Nash and Bea Pickens - prior to the Nov. 7 commission meeting. "The budget committee will look at what the staff comes up with," he said. "We have the ability to switch money from one area to another if we need to.

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"We think we know what we'll have," he said. "Once we get a handle on what the revenue will be (from license and stamp sales), we'll set our priorities, especially for capital projects."

Capital projects, those authorized by the legislature but with little or no funding available previously, include improvement of parks, purchasing more parks, building a new game warden training facility and jetty projects, Garza said.

Besides the budget, Garza doesn't have plans to make wholesale changes. "The Parks and Wildlife Department has operated in a positive direction in my time on the commission," he said. "I don't see any major shift in the direction the department is headed."

Gov. Richards named Garza, Terese "Terry" Hershey of Houston and Walter Umphrey of Beaumont to six year terms on the commission on Jan. 24. Garza's chairmanship will expire Jan. 31, 1993.

"Ygnacio Garza brings many years of experience as a sportsman and a strong sense of how best to preserve our state lands so they continue to serve as a source of recreation, while retaining their natural beauty and integrity," the governor said. "South Texas possesses some of the state's best hunting and recreational parklands, and as this region prepares for the impact of increased trade with Mexico, Nacho's experience as a sportsman and a public official will make his perspective on the commission invaluable."

Garza, 38, is a certified public accountant. He serves on the board of the Brownsville Economic Development Council, the Brownsville Convention and Visitor's Bureau, the Public Utilities Board of Brownsville and as a member of the United States Conference of Mayors Board of Trustees. He is a graduate of St. Edwards University in Austin.

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ALLEGED VIOLATOR FATALLY SHOT

CROCKETT--A Houston County man opened fire on a state game warden and a deputy sheriff with a 12-gauge shotgun on Saturday night and was fatally injured when a game warden returned fire.

Donald Thomas McKinney, 48, of rural Houston County. was shot one time with a 12-gauge shotgun by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game warden Billy Magee. Magee and Houston County chief deputy Jimbo Rains had gone to McKinney's residence to investigate complaints of poaching.

Ron Brownlow, a Texas Ranger from Palestine in charge of the ongoing investigation, said an inquest was done and an autopsy performed by Dr. James Bruce of Lufkin. The official cause of death was listed as shotgun wound caused from a pellet to the brain, Bruce said today.

According to Brownlow, the sheriff's office received several complaints of hunting violations allegedly committed by McKinney. Magee requested assistance from the sheriff's office and was accompanied by Rains.

The officers parked in McKinney's driveway with their lights on, knocked on the front door and identified themselves, Brownlow said. Rains went around to the side of the house and through the kitchen window saw McKinney loading a shotgun.

The officers returned to their vehicles, put on bullet-resistant vests and took cover he said. McKinney came through the front door pointing the shotgun at the officers and officers told him to drop the gun. McKinney fired once, hitting the game warden's vehicle. Magee fired one shot from his shotgun, killing the man.

'This is an unfortunate incident, said David Palmer director of field operations for TPWD's law enforcement division. 'The incident is still under investigation and we have no further comment at this time. The Parks and Wildlife Department is cooperating with Texas Ranger Brownlow and Houston County authorities that are handling the investigation.

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HUNTERS FOR THE HUNGRY READY FOR VENISON GIFTS

AUSTIN--Hunters can provide thousands of meals to hungry people across the state by sharing their deer and antelope with the Hunters for the Hungry program.

With the help of several public and charitable organizations, including the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, hunters can donate freshly killed deer and antelope that will be delivered to one of 18 food banks in the state.

The program is sponsored for the second year by the End Hunger Network-Houston. "This program gives Texas hunters an opportunity to participate in their sport while not wasting food, and provide the hungry in Texas with an excellent source of low-fat red meat," said Mary Keegan, president of End Hunger Network-Houston.

Hunters will be asked to contribute \$15 (tax deductible) to the meat processor to pay for processing and packaging. Two-pound frozen packages of meat will be picked up by representatives of the food banks around the state and distributed to the needy. More than 170 meat processors have volunteered to accept meat donations this year up from 70 last year

Although a late start in 1990 led to only 70 processors participating, 212 deer were donated, providing 7,411 pounds of meat for the program. This meat provided an estimated 22,233 meals for the hungry.

"We hope to do several times that this year—said Sister Francis Klinger executive director of the End Hunger Network-Houston.

COLORADO BEND PARK OPENS GORMAN FALLS

BEND--The Gorman Falls area of Colorado Bend State Park will be open to public day use on three dates this fall.

The gates to this previously unopened area of the park will be open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sept. 28, Oct. 12 and Nov. 9. Guided tours on a trail below Gorman Falls is scheduled for 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. each day said Park Superintendent Robert Basse.

Tours will begin from the Gorman Conference Center and will be limited to 15 people. Reservations are required for the tours. Reservations will be accepted 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and must be made with a member of the park staff, not on the answering machine, Basse said. The tour is a fairly rough hike so good footwear is recommended.

Because of the fragile ecology of the creek and falls area, a maximum of 30 vehicles will be permitted into Gorman at any one time, he said. Entrance to the Gorman area without tour reservations will be on a parking site availability basis. Also, no one will be allowed on or below the falls area unless they are participating in one of the tours.

In addition to the guided tours, there will be two self-guided primitive trails available, one up the Gorman creek drainage and one down the Colorado River to Gorman Cave. At Gorman Cave, Basse said, a member of the Texas Speleological. Association will be on hand to assist the public.

"Most of the Gorman area is in its natural state," he said. 'Trails and dirt roads are unimproved, and cactus and rocks are abundant."

Colorado Bend State Park is a primitive camping area located along the Colorado River. It is accessible by private road. The terrain is rough and not advised for travelers in recreational vehicles. There are 25 tent campsites with picnic tables only. Fresh water is available from two spigots and ground fires are not allowed. Reservations are required to camp here.

There is a \$3 day use entry fee into the park for each vehicle and \$2 per person activity fee.

Park officials also are looking for volunteers to help with the opening of Gorman Falls.

The park can be reached from the east by taking Highway 580 west from Lampasas to Bend, then following the signs to the park. From the west, take Highway 581 from Cherokee to Bend, then follow the signs.

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HUNTER ED STUDENTS GET CHANCE AT ESPN

AUSTIN--A young Texan could be one of four lucky teenagers who will be chosen to participate in a Thanksgiving weekend hunt that will be taped for 'Ultimate Outdoor Experiences," a weekly show on ESPN.

Four youngsters will be drawn from postcard entries to join the show's host, Wayne Pearson, for a two-day quail hunt in Georgia. Only youths under 18 years old who have successfully completed a hunter education course during 1991 are eligible for the all-expenses paid trip for the youth and a parent or guardian.

The winners, to be chosen from four regions, will be drawn on Nov. 1 and notified, said Terry Erwin, conservation recreation coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The winners will be flown to Georgia on Thanksgiving Day (Nov. 28), hunt Nov. 29-30 and return Dec. 1 The hunt will air on ESPN Dec. 21 The winners also will receive a Winchester Model 1300 shotgun.

Texas is in the south region, which includes 13 other states.

"This is a prime opportunity to get our youth involved in the educational aspects of learning outdoor skills, Erwin said. 'It is important to promote and recognize hunter education efforts and, in doing so, reach youth at an early age and encourage their participation. It's also paramount that we help youngsters learn more about wildlife stewardship and outdoor values and instill in them a sense of outdoor responsibility, ethics, safety and involvement.

The hunt is co-sponsored by the International Hunter Education Association; Winchester Division of Olin Corporation; Sunshine Mills; Walls Industries, Inc. Trebark Camo; P.S.E., Easton; and U.S. Repeating Arms Co.

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THREE SALTWATER
RECORDS CERTIFIED

AUSTIN--The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has certified three new state records in the saltwater category.

Bill Kirschner, Pflugerville, caught a 22-pound, 13-ounce bonnethead shark July 13. The 48-inch shark was caught seven miles offshore from Port O'Connor This is the fifth time the past two years that the bonnethead record has fallen, the 10th time overall. The first record, 2 pounds, 9.92 ounces and 27 inches long, was caught by Robert Curren Atkins of Temple in 1986, and the record has been continuously broken since. The previous record was caught by Lora J. Neans of Georgetown eight days before Kirschner's catch. It weighed 20 pounds, 12 ounces and was 47 inches long.

The second recent record to fall belongs to Vivian Butler of Columbus. She caught an 11-ounce striped burrfish Aug. 10. The fish was caught off Port O'Connor This is the first entry in the state record books for this species.

Juan DeLeon IV Port O'Connor has the new record rock hind. The 16 1/2-inch fish weighed 3 pounds, 11.25 ounces. DeLeon caught the rock hind Aug. 10, 40 miles south of Corpus Christi. The previous record was caught by Capt. Ricky Preddy on April 18, 1987 off Port Mansfield. Preddy's fish weighed 3 pounds, 10 ounces and was 18 inches long.

GALVESTON: Fishing was good until the front hit; good numbers of redfish mostly above the keeper size; good numbers of sandtrout with hugh strings from the beach front and in the ship channels; Spanish mackerel were fairly good along the beach front until the front came through about early Tuesday night; scattered trout and redfish caught in the bays; Sandtrout and croaker also caught in the bay; fairly good numbers of in the bay; rairry good numbers or jack fish caught from the jetties and piers; flounder are still being caught but no run started yet; live bait shrimp available from \$8.50 to \$10 per quart.
FREEPORT: Snapper fishing has been good, most fishermen catch limits

of fish in the 2-4 pound range, of fish in the 2-4 pound range, some up to 16 pounds; smaller grouper landed; a few kingfish, a few amberjack and dolphin also landed; most fishing has been around 40-50 miles offshore. PORT OCONNOR: Redfish are good in number and in size around the jetties and Grass Island; good numbers of trout caught around Grass Island and in the back bays:

Grass Island and in the back bays; best fishing is in the back bays because of the winds midweek; offshore activities are slow; good numbers of fish in the bays. live bait shrimp available at \$8.50 per quart; tides are low midweek.

PALACIOS: Fairly good sized trout showing up around the Baptist Encampment, fish are caught on strawberry, metal flake, white tailed Hogies Swimming Shad; good numbers of redfish and trout in Keller's Bay and were caught on gold spoons and Hogies smoke with chartreuse tailed Swimming Jacks; good numbers of redfish and trout were caught along the south shoreline of Matagorda Peninsula when weather permits fishing there, north winds will wipe out that fishing area; trout in all the bays seem to be increasing in size and greater numbers of limits seem to be caught; some live bait shrimp available.
ROCKPORT: Good Good numbers

oversized redfish forming up and migrating to the gulf, many in the Corpus Christi Ship Channel and Lydia Ann channel through last Sunday; weather was good late Tuesday, some trout caught in Aransas Bay in the Fulton area, some trout caught around Ransom Island in Redfish Bay; some live bait shrimp available at \$8 per

quart. PORT ARANSAS: Good numbers of specks in the 15 to 17 inch range caught around the wells in Corpus Christi Bay on live shrimp; some 2-3 pound trout caught along Lydia Ann shoreline; some redfish caught behind Hog Island and on the cust side of South Bay; offshore fishermen are catching blackfin tuna, dolphin; fishermen on the ends of jetties are catching good numbers of Spanish mackerel; some kingfish caught from the end of the jetties on Tuesday; live bait shrimp available at \$7.50 per quart. Offshore fishermen are quart. Offshore fishermen are catching snapper in the 2-4 pound range with a few in the 18-19 pound range from 40 to 45 miles offshore; some blackfin tuna in the 18-22 pound range in the same area; also some amberjack landed; a few dorado landed with an occasional kingfish.
CORPUS CHRISTI: Redfish are good most everywhere, many are oversized; some trout caught along oversized; some trout caught along causeway bridge; fishermen are looking for a blue norther to bring the trout in; live bait shrimp available at \$10.50 per quart or 15 cents each.

PORT MANSFIELD: Good numbers of

redfish south of Port Mansfield from the Port Mansfield Cut to Green Island; good numbers of fish in the landcut north of Port Mansfield; Good numbers of keeper Mansfield; some bait shrimp available at \$12 per quart.

SOUTH PADRE: North winds swept through Port Isabel around 3 a.m. Mednesday and fishing stopped. Before the front there were good numbers of redfish caught, many oversized; good numbers of trout landed but most were under 14 inches; some black drum caught in the 26-27 inches in the bays; surf the 26-27 inches in the bays; surf producing redfish, trout, drum, bluefish, croaker, whiting; live bait shrimp available at \$10 per quart; fairly good numbers of kingfish, bonito and black fin tuna caught offshore.
