TPWD USES DEMOGRAPHICS TO FIND CUSTOMERS

75901. Is that number a lotto winner? No, it's the largest zip code block of hunters and fishermen in the state, according to 1990 figures.

Where is it? It's not in Houston, Dallas, San Antonio or any other major metropolitan area. The highest concentration of hunters and fishermen in Texas live in Lufkin.

A zip code block contains about 2,320 households. Zip code 75901 in Lufkin has 9,491 hunting, fishing or combination license holders. That zip leads the state in combination licenses with 3,654; is first in hunting licenses with 1,719; and is second in fishing licenses with 4,118.

What does this mean? We don't know yet, said Bill Rutledge, director of conservation communications for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Maybe a combination license has more value in rural areas and those people have more time to use it. We don't know, but as part of our new marketing effort we're trying to determine where our customers live."

In an effort to wean itself from general tax support and function entirely on user-generated revenues, the TPWD will use geodemography to find out more about its customers. Geodemography is based on principles such as: people in similar communities share similar consumer patterns. Geodemographics will enable the department to pinpoint locations of people who reflect the ideal customer profile.

The department licenses about 2 million anglers, 1 million hunters and 600,000 boat owners each year. More than 400,000 people pay to camp in state parks and about 190,000 subscribe to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Magazine. These are the department's customers and little is known about them.

"We want to know where the people who buy hunting, fishing and combination licenses live," Rutledge said.

Do you know where they live?

Although 82 percent of all Texans live in large metropolitan areas, only about 30 percent of hunters and 40 percent of fishermen live there. The top 10 zip codes of sportsmen that have resident hunting, fishing or combination licenses in 1990 includes only one major metropolitan area (Houston) and two cities, Lewisville and Mesquite, close to another major area.

The top 10 zips and the number of license holders are 75901, Lufkin, 9,491; 77630, Orange, 8,245; 77901, Victoria, 7,643; 75067, Lewisville, 6,596; 77662, Vidor, 6,479; 77656, Silsbee, 6,393; 75149, Mesquite, 6,132; 75961, Nacogdoches, 6,002; 77520, Baytown, 5,912; and 77015, Houston, 5,792.

In addition to zip code blocks, the figures can be broken down into town and county for each type of license. The top five zip codes for combination licenses are 75901, Lufkin, 3,654; 77901, Victoria, 2,723; 75961, Nacogdoches, 2,597; 77656, Silsbee, 2,568; and 77630, Orange, 2,425. The top five towns are Houston, 52,971; San Antonio, 30,169; Dallas, 19,432; Fort Worth, 17,628; and Austin, 16,188. The top five counties for combination licenses are Harris, 82,292; Dallas, 48,779; Tarrant, 35,266; Bexar, 32,564; and Travis, 17,073.

The top five zip codes for hunting licenses are 75901, Lufkin, 1,719; 79109, Amarillo, 987; 77630, Orange, 970; 75961, Nacogdoches, 937; and 77662, Vidor, 892. The top five towns are Houston, 21,036; San Antonio, 12,877; Dallas, 7,992; Austin, 6,628; and Fort Worth, 6,135. The top five counties for hunting licenses are Harris, 31,692; Dallas, 17,690; Bexar, 13,807; Tarrant, 12,255; and Travis, 6,940.

The top five zip codes for fishing licenses are 77630, Orange, 4,850; 75901 Lufkin, 4,118; 77901 Victoria, 4,064; 75067 Lewisville, 3,937 and 75051 Grand Prairie, 3,742. The top five towns are Houston, 101,413; San Antonio, 51 169; Dallas, 37,882; Fort Worth, 30,404; and Austin, 24,654. The top five counties are Harris, 147,832; Dallas, 94,332; Tarrant, 61,553; Bexar 54,551 and Travis, 25,763.

The top zip code in Texas for residents purchasing saltwater stamps also provided a surprise to the department. The highest number of saltwater stamps per zip code is 77901 in Victoria with 5,177. The next four are 77630, Orange, 4,662; 78412, Corpus Christi, 3,866; 77520, Baytown, 3,807; and 78550, Harlingen, 3,654. The top five towns for saltwater stamps are Houston, 90,287; San Antonio, 38,649; Corpus Christi, 25,570; Austin, 12,253; and Beaumont, 10,141. The top five counties are Harris, 130,231. Bexar. 40,995; Nueces, 28,083; Jefferson, 20,882; and Brazoria, 19,623.

Trivia question: Do more hunting license holders live in El Paso County or Smith County in East Texas? Answer: El Paso County has 3,402 to Smith County's 2,709. Hmm.

'I think all this information means we probably had some misconceptions about where our customers were. Rutledge said. 'The fact that 60 percent of our fishermen lived outside the city was a surprise to me.

'The next step for us is to look at 1990 census data and look for similar patterns," he said. "Are the people that live in Lufkin the same demographically as people that live in Victoria? We want to find out. This will help us get our message out better—It will allow us to better use the money we spend on dispensing our information.

HUNTING WITH ARTIFICIAL LIGHTS PROHIBITED

AUSTIN--Texas hunters, especially archery and rifle hunters, are reminded that state law forbids the use of artificial light to hunt certain birds and other animals, including some equipment being sold at stores.

Under Section 62.005 of the Parks and Wildlife Code, it is unlawful to hunt any game animal or game bird at any time with the aid of any artificial light. This includes headlights, hunting lamps or any other artificial light used on or about the head or attached to a vehicle.

"There are a lot of hunting gadgets on the market today that may be illegal, said Chester Burdett, director of law enforcement at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "There are a number of sights for bows and rifles that may be illegal. If they use artificial light they are illegal for game animals. They may be lawfully used to hunt non-protected birds and animals and fur-bearing animals.

The artificial lights in question include lighted sights on bows, lighted rifle scopes, laser sights or anything that artificially illuminates sights or scopes, Burdett said.

'If the device is lighted up to aid the hunter that's why the law was passed, he said. 'This includes any device to facilitate the aiming at targets. Those particular lights are used about the head. Simply because a gadget is for sale doesn't mean that it's lawful for game animals and game birds.

"These things are perfectly lawful to hunt coyotes, rabbits, feral hogs and furbearing animals, but not game animals."

Hunting with artificial light is a Class B Parks and Wildlife Code Misdemeanor for the first charge, punishable by a fine of \$200-\$1,000, a jail term not to exceed 180 days or both. After the first conviction, the charge increases to a Class A Misdemeanor punishable by a fine of \$500-\$2,000, a jail term not to exceed one year or both.

OFFICIALS BREAK GROUND FOR HATCHERY RENOVATION

WICHITA FALLS--Area dignitaries and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials turned over new dirt during a ground breaking ceremony for phase one renovation of the Dundee State Fish Hatchery.

Speakers included Sen. Steve Carriker, Roby and Charles Finnell, Holliday Guests included Angus Thompson of the Wichita Falls City Council; Bob Laurik, president of the North Texas Field and Stream Association, the oldest sportsman's group in Texas; and Jimmy Banks of the Wichita Water Improvement District No. 2.

The total renovation project calls for 101 production ponds, water supply a 40,000 square-foot hatchery building, utilities and site work. Phase one consists of 42 acres of ponds, or 52 ponds. Total cost of renovation as estimated from preliminary design schedules is expected to be about \$15 million. Pond renovation is expected to cost about \$10 million.

The \$6 million price tag for phase one will not cost the TPWD any money said Gene McCarty director of fish hatcheries. Federal Wallop-Breaux Sport Fish Restoration Program funds will provide for 75 percent of the cost while the other 25 percent will come from in-kind contributions, which is existing property values.

The Dundee hatchery the largest of the state's six freshwater hatcheries, was built in 1927 second oldest after the Tyler facility built in 1926. The original hatchery had 44 ponds (32 acres of water), in 1977 it was expanded to 91 ponds (89 acres of water).

Dundee, located on FM 1180 below the Lake Diversion Dam in Baylor County annually produces about 4.5 million striped bass, largemouth bass and channel catfish, McCarty said. After renovation, the facility will focus on striped bass, Florida largemouth bass, channel and blue catfish. Renovation should increase production to 11.5 million fingerlings annually.

NON-TOXIC SHOT REQUIRED FOR WATERFOWL HUNTING

AUSTIN--For the first time non-toxic shot will be required statewide for hunting waterfowl and coots in Texas.

The state and U.S. has been moving toward nontoxic shot since 1987. As of Sept. 1 it is illegal to possess lead shot, either in shot shells or as loose shot for muzzleloading while hunting waterfowl and coots.

Bob Jessen, waterfowl program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said the entire nation is going to non-toxic shot to reduce losses to waterfowl populations from lead poisoning.

Lead embedded in the bird's body from being shot is not the problem. If the bird survives wounds from being shot, the lead is sealed off in the muscles and causes no further problems, he said. The problem occurs when a bird ingests lead shot while feeding. The shot grounds down in the gizzard where it is absorbed into the bloodstream.

With hunters using nontoxic shot statewide the number of waterfowl dying from lead poisoning will decrease. Lead that is now in the marsh bottoms will remain available to birds for years. Slowly, the heavy lead pellets will settle into the soil to a depth where birds will no longer encounter them while feeding. "It should subside substantially with time," Jessen said. "We're on the right track. We're going to save two to three million birds a year, nationally."

'The North American Waterfowl Management Plan is receiving tremendous support from hunters who want to restore waterfowl populations, said John Turner director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. "The elimination of lead poisoning is yet another way hunters can help in the effort to maintain stable, healthy populations of ducks and geese."

Goose season west of U.S. Highway 81 opens Oct. 12 and runs through Jan. 26. Goose season east of U.S. Highway 81 is Nov. 9-Feb. 16 for light geese and Nov. 9-Jan. 19 for dark geese. An extended Canada goose season will run Jan. 20-26 in the eastern zone.

Hunters in the High Plains Mallard Management Unit may hunt ducks, mergansers and coots Nov. 16-Jan. 5. The rest of the state may hunt Nov. 23-Dec. 1 and Dec. 7-Jan. 5.

The sandhill crane season is Nov. 9-Feb. 9 for Zone A, Dec. 7-Feb. 16 for Zone B; and Jan. 4-Feb. 9 for Zone C. Woodcock may be hunted Nov. 28-Jan. 31 and common snipe may be hunted Oct. 26-Feb. 9.

WARDEN ASSAULTS FEW IN TEXAS

AUSTIN--Fall and winter hunting seasons will soon be in full swing, keeping game wardens busy with deer, waterfowl and small game hunters as well as fishermen. This also is a time of year when many illegal activities are going on.

The potential for illegal activity is always available, but with legal and illegal hunters participating in one way or another, this time of year can be particularly dangerous for game wardens.

Fortunately, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has had very few game wardens killed or assaulted in the line of duty, much lower than the rest of the United States, according to figures provided by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Since the early 1900s, 12 TPWD game wardens have died or been killed while on duty but only three of those deaths involved murder. The first was Claude R. Murchison, who was murdered on the King Ranch in 1938. J.D. Murphree was murdered in Jasper County in 1963 and Ronnie Germany was murdered in San Augustine County in 1973.

"Our numbers are outstanding. It has to do with the training and a whole lot to do with the public," said Chester Burdett, director of TPWD's law enforcement division. "I think it's great. I think our people conduct themselves in such a manner that lessens confrontations."

Most of the people game wardens meet are armed, it's usually at night, wardens usually are alone, it's usually in the middle of nowhere and the warden usually is outnumbered. Therefore, game wardens have to exercise caution and non-confrontational procedures.

"The vast majority of the time the parties have weapons," Burdett said. 'Game wardens receive considerable training that enhances their ability to apply law enforcement efforts that are reasonable and acceptable. We don't want to have a confrontation with everyone we meet.

"Game wardens have been trained in the Texas Game Warden Academy since 1947 to provide an effective law enforcement effort and at the same time preserve the constitutional guarantee of the public."

All peace officers must be licensed. Game wardens go through firearms qualifications every year and at least 40 hours of in-service training every other year he said. "We far exceed both of those to give the best possible service to the public.

In 1989, Texas, with four assaults committed against 641 state and federal conservation officers, ranked 10th of the 34 states reporting assault rates to the USFWS. Texas' assault rate of .62 percent is far below Virginia's 8.02 percent and the next highest state, Louisiana at 3.23 percent.

Nationally in 1989, there were 8,102 state and federal conservation officers. That year there were 128 assaults, a 24 percent increase from 1988. There were no deaths but 23 of the assaults resulted in personal injury to the officer USFWS figures show. Most of the assaults, 48 percent, involved personal weapons (i.e. hand, fist, feet, etc.). Others included vehicle, 21 percent; firearm, 18 percent; and other weapons, 11 percent.

Texas' four assaults came during routine patrol or license checks. Three involved personal weapons and one was a vehicle. None of the wardens were injured. Texas' highest recorded year for assaults was 1987 with 12. There were seven in 1988, four in 1989 and four in 1990.

Two of the 1990 assaults involved confronting a violator at night, another occurred while confronting a violator during the day and another was termed other activities. Two of the assaults involved firearms and three involved personal weapons.

Burdett said, generally, a game warden's training earns the respect of the public, but there is always a segment of society that has no respect for the law.

"We're pleased that there have been so few assaults, but needless to say one is one too many." he said.

TOURS OFFERED AT WILDERNESS ISLAND

MATAGORDA ISLAND--Nature still rules at Matagorda Island State Park where beachcombing and whooping crane tours are set for October, November and December for Texas Conservation Passport holders.

"One day a month will be set aside for guided tours," said Ronny Gallagher park superintendent. "Our passenger ferry will leave Port O'Connor at 7:30 a.m. for an all-day trip to the island." Two tours are offered, a beachcombing experience on Oct. 26 and Dec. 14 and a tour of whooping crane habitat on Nov. 23.

The wilderness island park, 38 miles long, has always been isolated from the mainland by a six-mile stretch of open water making it hard to reach. In the late 1940s, it was found to be one of the few habitats where the endangered whooping crane was still establishing a winter home. Now the island is a protected refuge for whooping cranes and other wildlife.

The island adventures are:

Oct. 26 and Dec. 14, 7:30 a.m.-5 p.m. -- Beachcombing adventure featuring exploration of a remote beach area from the dune line to the water's edge. Led by an expert naturalist, visitors will scout for seashells, cast-off treasures from around the world and discuss small animals, such as sand crabs, that make a home on the beach. The tour is limited to 20 people and reservations are required.

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Nov. 23, 7:30 a.m.-5 p.m. -- Whooping crane day featuring a birdwatching tour of the winter habitat, led by Robin Doughty, geography professor at the University of Texas and author of, "Return of the Whooping Crane." Visitors should be able to see whoopers foraging in the marshes unless weather or other natural circumstances interfere. The tour is limited to 30 people and reservations are required.

Tour fees include ferry and bus or truck transportation and adult fees include the Texas Conservation Passport. Cost is \$39 for adults (or \$14 if you already have a TCP), \$14 for children 13-16 years old and \$7 for children 12 and under Payment in full is required to reserve a place on either tour. The TCP is valid for one year and enables holders free entrance to state parks, discounts on camping fees and allows access to other special department activities.

Once visitors board the ferry they must supply their own needs because there are no stores on the island. A day pack is recommended since you will have to carry your equipment. Trash is handled on a pack it in-pack it out basis, so carry a trash bag.

"Visitors love the truly native condition of the open beaches with rolling surf, sand dunes and wild coastal grasses, Gallagher said. There are no stores, cars, condos or other development on the 38 miles of beach.
