

Kurtz is 'old fossil' namesake

It's flattering to have something named in your honor--a building perhaps, a scholarship, or even a child. But one UTPB professor has the distinction of being the namesake of an "old fossil."

The professor is **Prof. Edwin B. Kurtz**, chairman of life science, and the "old fossil" is Kurtzipites, a fossil pollen.

The Kurtzipites story began in 1960 when a former student of Kurtz's discovered the fossil pollen. Discoverer Roger Anderson, named the pollen to honor Kurtz because of all of his help while Anderson was a graduate student at The University of Arizona, thus beginning the saga.

Kurtzipites, because it is a fossil pollen, was around long before Prof. Kurtz came into being. As a matter of fact, the Kurtzipites-producing plants seem to have become extinct at the end of the early Paleocene period.

Kurtz noted that even today little is known about the pollen. Even the plant from which it comes is not known, but Kurtzipites is known as a strong reference pollen.

"The pollen grain doesn't decompose for one thing. A rock can be dissolved and the pollen grain will still remain," Kurtz stated.

Since 1960, other researchers found a similar pollen, and not knowing that it already had a namesake, attached different names to it. Thus, it became known by several alias names. In 1961, the pollen was named Fibulapollis; in 1965 it took the name of Aenigmapollis. Another researcher in 1969 named the pollen Coriaripites, and later in 1970 it was named Aguilapollenites.

Kurtz stated that this was not unusual. "Researchers all over the world make discoveries and name those discoveries. In other words, one researcher would not realize that the pollen had been discovered by someone else," he explained.

Scientists reveal the little pollen known by so many names has made its mark on many parts of the world. According to the July 1981 issue of the "Journal of Paleontology," the fossil pollen has been found in Alberta and southern Saskatchewan, Canada; South Dakota, Montana, Wyoming, New Mexico, Texas, British Columbia and Arctic Canada. Outside North America, Kurtzipites has been reported from sediments of the eastern USSR and Japan.

With all this notoriety, would Kurtzipites retain its original name? Or would it lose its identity to one of the other namesakes?

The final job was up to taxonomy. Taxonomists took each discovery and weighed its similarities and differences in order to class the genus. Kurtzipites had top priority. It might be said it's the big daddy, or the head of the family. Kurtzipites is now classified as a genus. The other names are members of the Kurtzipites genus and will be classified as species under the genus of Kurtzipites.

Outstanding students, prof recognized at convocation

Students will have the opportunity this summer to once again combine study and travel. The final destination is Mexico City, after three weeks of study 5:30-8:30 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays, beginning June 1.

The course, Univ. 489.01, The Panorama of Mexico, can be taken for three hours of undergraduate or graduate credit in history or literature. The course can also be taken through ENCORE, the nograde option to learning.

'Friends' study underway

A study sponsored by the "Friends of UTPB" on how the university can best meet the needs of the area is expected to be complete by early June.

A. K. Barlow, Chairman of the "Friends of UTPB," an organization of Permian Basin residents who support four-year status for the university, said the two-man consulting team visited in the area during the first part of April to look at the total education picture in the area, including high schools, community colleges and the university.

"They are considering whether there is a need for four-year status, but that is not all they are studying. They are considering the demand for various educational programs and will make recommendations concerning alternatives to better meet the needs of the population. They are considering how the university can work in coordination with other educational institutions to provide a quality education here," Barlow said.

Members of the consulting team are Dr. Harold Enarson of Boulder, Colo., president emeritus of Ohio State University, and Dr. Paul Sharp of Norman, Okla., president temeritus of Oklahoma University.

"We wanted professional help of the highest credentials to help us in the planning for the future of UTPB, and after a great deal of research, we decided on these two men. They have vast experience in higher education and are well respected in this field," Barlow said.

He said the "Friends of UTPB" also are involved in other activities in support

of the university. "We are now in the process of soliciting a larger membership who will agree to support UTPB in a meaningful way. We are asking them to use their time, talents and influence on our behalf," he said.

"The 'Friends of UTPB' believe the university should be four-year because we think it will best meet the needs of the area as a full-curriculum university. To this end, we are working to gain support

of various groups," he added

He said several committees are now working within the organization to accomplish this support. Included are committees soliciting support of all communities in the Permian Basin, and committees for support of the UTPB ex students, community colleges, the UT System Board of Regents, the state Coordinating Board, the legislature, governor, and governor's task force on higher education among others.

The event is free to students, and staff with ID's and their



call for \$200,000 in initial improvements, with an additional \$176,000 to be spent during the following two years.

Regents previously approved a lease to Ector County for installation of softball playing fields. The new park will be located adjacent to the softball fields.

Regents also granted an underground pipeline easement to Getty Oil Company for the purpose of laying, constructing, operating and maintaining pipelines at the site of proposed State Highway 191. The area is located on the northeast side of the UTPB campus near Loop 338.

In addition, Regents approved a budget of \$245,887 for faculty salaries for the 1982 summer session budget, and approved an agreement between the state Coordinating Board and UTPB providing internships for UTPB criminal justice students.

The intern program, funded at \$2310 for the period of Jan. 11 - May 28, 1982, is under direction of Prof. J. L. "Ray" LeGrande, coordinator of criminal justice management. Under the auspices of the Texas Statewide Corrections Intern Program, it is an ongoing program at UTPB whereby criminal justice students receive practical training with area corrections agencies.

Colwell assumes dean's post

Prof. James Colwell, literature, has assumed duties as dean of UTPB's College of Arts and Education. He replaces Prof. William Tanksley, who resigned to accept a position as the dean of the School of Ministry for the United Church of Religious Science in Los Angeles, Calif.

Colwell was the founding dean of UTPB's College of Arts and Education, but stepped down in 1977 for health reasons and resumed full-time teaching. As the college's first dean, he has been with UTPB since 1972. He was involved in the planning stages of the university and recruited much of the arts and education faculty prior to the university's opening to students in 1977. He has served as chairman of literature since 1978.

Previously Colwell served as director of the Office of International Education at the University of Colorado; exchange professor for the College of Education, Goettingen, Germany; assistant director of the European Division of the University of Maryland; associate director and lecturer in American Civilization at Yale Foreign Student Institute; assistant command education director and base education advisor for the United States Air Force in Tokyo, Japan; and high school English and journalism teacher in Snyder and Sterling, Colo.

Colwell, a brigadier general in the Air Force Reserve, holds a masters and a doctorate in American studies from Yale University; a certificate and diploma in German civilization from the University of Heidelberg, Germany; a certificate in French civilization from the Sorbonne (University of Paris); a MA in English from the University of Northern Colorado; a BA in journalism from the University of Denver and additional study at the National University of Mexico and Sophia University in Tokyo, Japan.

He is listed in "Who's Who in the South and Southeast," the "Directory of American Scholars," and "Leaders in Education." He has been editor of the Permian Historical Annual and president of the local chapter of the Texas Association of College Teachers.


