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### NASH, GRAHAM NAMED TO FOUNDATION BOARD

AUSTIN--Former Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission members Bill Graham and Chuck Nash have joined the board of trustees of the Parks and Wildlife Foundation of Texas Inc.

Graham of Amarillo, owner of a real estate investments firm, served on the commission from July 1983 through January 1989. He replaces Bob Armstrong, a former Parks and Wildlife commissioner now serving with the U.S. Interior Department in Washington, D.C.

Nash, a car dealer from San Marcos, completed a six-year term on the commission in March. He served as chairman of the commission for two years. Nash is replacing C. Patrick Oles Jr. of Austin, president of a real estate company and involved in several conservation efforts.

The Parks and Wildlife Foundation of Texas Inc. is a tax-exempt, nonprofit corporation chartered by the state. Established in May 1991, the foundation is designed to provide private support for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Foundation members raise funds and provide resources to the agency and supplement its needs where use of public funds is either prohibited or restrained by lack of funding. Most notably, the foundation is involved with the building of the Freshwater Fisheries Center in Athens and the newly named Share A Lunker Inc., the state's program to accept largemouth bass weighing 13 pounds and more for study and spawning.

Nash and Graham will join other board members Perry R. Bass, honorary chairman, businessman from Fort Worth and chairman emeritus of the Parks and Wildlife Commission; Edwin L. Cox Jr., chairman, businessman from Athens and a former member and chairman of the commission; Reed Morian, chairman and chief executive officers of DX Holding Company in Houston; Ed Rainwater of Freeport, vice-president of Dow North America, Texas Operations; Martin F. 'Bubba' Wood of Dallas, operator of a wildlife art gallery and publishing company: and Andrew Sansom, exofficio member, TPWD executive director

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#### 39 GAME WARDENS GRADUATE FROM ACADEMY

AUSTIN- Thirty-nine game warden cadets joined the ranks of more than 500 game wardens across Texas during graduation ceremonies for the 43rd Game Warden Training School on April 9 at the state capitol.

The cadets began their six-month training program Oct. 1 in Austin. The graduates came from an original list of 1,369 people who took a written test in February 1992. They received about 1,100 hours of law enforcement training.

The new wardens studied game and fish laws, the penal code, water safety, fish and wildlife habitat identification and firearms training as well as several other subjects. Each cadet also completed a 40-hour course in first aid, CPR and emergency rescue training.

"Texas is changing, and today's game wardens are required to know more and do more than ever before," said Charles Hensley, law enforcement director at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. 'Our cadets must learn not only the complete regimen of standard law enforcement basics, they also must acquire specialized expertise in wildlife management, game law, water safety law, public education and more."

The new game wardens bring the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's total field law enforcement strength to 539 officers across the state. The new officers will begin working at their new stations in May.

#### LLANO TO HOST BIG GAME AWARDS BANQUET

The Texas Big Game Awards program is designed to recognize quality deer and pronghorn antelope, the hunter and the land manager of owner up whose land the animal was taken as well as hunters harvesting their first animal.

The Texas Big Game Awards program, sponsored by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Wildlife Association, received 1,317 entries, 1,031 scored entries and 286 entries for first harvest.

The Edwards Plateau received 95 typical whitetail entries, 15 non-typical whitetail entries and 73 first hunter entries. The top five entries for Region 4 in each category are listed below.

#### WHOOPERS MIGRATING NORTH TO CANADA

AUSTIN--Endangered whooping cranes have begun departing their Texas winter home for their nesting grounds in Canada, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said.

Lee Ann Linam of TPWD's endangered species program said the first whoopers departed Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Gulf Coast the last week in March to begin their 2,500-mile migration north to Wood Buffalo National Park in the Northwest Territories.

A total of 136 whooping cranes, including 121 adults and 15 young, the only wild breeding population in the world, spent the winter on the Texas coast. State and federal biologists had anticipated as many as 145 whooping cranes might have arrived at Aransas last fall, but losses apparently occurred late in the nesting season in Canada and during migration.

In contrast to some recent years, no whoopers died during their wintering period in Texas, a success attributed to good habitat conditions on the wintering grounds, Linam said.

This past winter also marked another step forward in the recovery of the species with an attempt to reestablish whooping cranes in Florida, she said. During January, 14 young whooping cranes raised in captivity were introduced into wetland habitats in the Kissimee Prairie of Central Florida.

"It is hoped that the whooping cranes will establish a non-migratory flock such as once existed on Louisiana's coastal wetlands," Linam said. "If this initial release is successful, then plans are to release additional whooping cranes at the Florida site in future years. Members of the Whooping Crane Recovery Team feel that additional populations will help ensure the continued existence of the species."

Whoopers leaving the Texas coast now will travel through Central and North Texas, Oklahoma, Nebraska, South and North Dakota and the Canadian provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta. They may remain overnight in wetland areas along rivers, lakes or ponds and may feed briefly in grain fields and wetlands.

Anyone spotting a whooping crane in Texas is asked to report the time, place and other details to the department's endangered species program at 1-800-792-1112 or (512) 448-4311 or to other wildlife officials.

Adult whooping cranes are white with black wingtips and a red forehead. In flight, the bird's long neck is held straight forward and long, black legs extend beyond the tail. The adult's wingspan may be more than 7 feet, and when standing, they are as tall as 5 feet. Juveniles have white and rusty brown body feathers and black wingtips.

Linam encourages Texans to help safeguard this unique bird. Also, disturbance of the bird during feeding or roosting can lead to injury or harm.

"Despite its recent population increases, the whooping crane, whose only natural population winters in Texas, is still a highly endangered Texas treasure," she said. "It is only through the cooperation of Texas residents that we can effectively ensure its safe travel through its migration route."

Other benefits of the passport include entry to some currently undeveloped park lands, discounts on some department items such as the Texas Parks and Wildlife magazine and news of special outdoor programs.

The Texas Conservation Passport is sold at all state parks, TPWD regional law enforcement offices and through two vendors, Whole Earth Provision Company in Austin, Dallas and Houston and REI (Recreation Equipment Inc.) in Austin.

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#### ANTELOPE HARVEST, NUMBERS INCREASE

AUSTIN--About 68 percent of pronghorn antelope hunters successfully harvested a buck during last fall's nine-day season in the Panhandle. Antelope numbers also continue to rise statewide, according to results from 1992 surveys.

Twelve Panhandle counties were issued 295 pronghorn buck permits by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in 1992, up from 226 in 1991 Biologists said 134 antelope were harvested by 198 hunters. Statewide, 652 bucks and 13 does were harvested by 741 hunters, a 90 percent success rate.

Pronghorn antelope occur in three regions of Texas, the Panhandle, the Trans-Pecos and the Permian Basin, said Calvin Richardson, TPWD district wildlife biologist in Amarillo. In 1992, 73 percent of the antelope were in the Trans-Pecos, 20 percent in the Panhandle and 7 percent in the Permian Basin.

Aerial surveys in June and July - 292 hours of flight time - led biologists to estimate the pronghorn population at 24,342 statewide, 28 percent bucks, 51 percent does and 21 percent fawns.

The Panhandle population was estimated at 4,876, an increase of 15.5 percent over 1991, Richardson said. The herd makeup included 1,067 bucks, 3,254 does and 555 fawns. The buck:doe ratio was 1:3.05 and fawn survival was 17 percent. Despite a slight increase in antelope numbers in the Panhandle, fawn production and the proportion of bucks in the herd continues to be low compared to other pronghorn herds in Texas.

In the Trans-Pecos, the 1992 fawn crop was 47 percent and there was a buck:doe ratio of 1.1.7 The Permian Basin herd had an excellent 84 percent fawn survival and a buck:doe ratio of 1.1

BELTON: Lake clear, rivers murky, 62 degrees, 7 feet above normal level; black bass are good to 8 pounds, 6 cunces on jigs and spinners; striper are slow; crappie are good on minnows and jigs in 2-12 feet, most caught by bass fishermen, ite bass are slow; carfish are good in the Leon slow; catfish are good in the Leon

and Cowhouse on worms.

BROWNWOOD: Water clear, 58
degrees, 2 feet below spillway;
black bass are fair to 5 pounds,

BUCHANAN: Water clear, 64 degrees, 2 feet low; black bass are good to 8 pounds, 12 ounces on purple worms in shallow water; striper are excellent to 15 pounds on live shad in 25 to 30 feet of water with some topwater activity water with some topwater activity early; trapple are slow; white bass are good around Garrett Island and up the river; catilish are good on trotline baited with fresh shad.
