o the general public, it was the education session, but there were also some important bills dealing with health and human services. For instance, the Legislature made some changes in the overall organization and delivery of the health and human services system. The HHSC Sunset bill addressed the operational authority of the HHSC Commissioner in specific areas, such as information and technology and federal-funds management.

Another important bill was TRC's Sunset legislation which continues this agency until the year 2011. Under this new legislation, the TRC Board will be more involved in publishing new rules on the VR program and will specifically address the monitoring and oversight of counselor decisions. The agency will also post more information, including performance data, on the TRC Internet web site. The legislation addressed important hiring and purchasing practices.

"TRC will continue to provide the same quality services to people with disabilities," says Commissioner Arrell. "As always, we will approach this new legislation in a spirit of cooperation and keep the needs of our clients the driving force behind everything we do."

Long-term care


The issue of long-term care in the Sunset legislation captured a lot of attention among consumer groups and the general public. Legislators decided to designate the Department of Human Services as the agency that will focus on long-term care programs. After Sept. 1, two TRC programs will be moving to the Department of Human Services — Personal Attendant Services and the Deaf-Blind with Multiple Disabilities Program.

"The concept of grouping long-term care programs together makes a lot of sense for the state. Again, the important thing is that there will be no disruption in services to our clients," says Arrell.

Appropriations

One of TRC's main goals in each legislative session is to ensure that our programs receive adequate funding to continue and/or expand needed services to people with disabilities. TRC was able to receive increased funding over the base budget submitted to the Legislative Budget Board in the Vocational Rehabilitation Program (VR), Independent Living Services and the Deaf-Blind with Multiple Disabilities Program. appropriations are tied with performance expectations, the Legislature set VR case closures at 25,127 for FY 2000 and 25,285 for FY 2001.

A Pay Raise!

Many employees will be pleased with the \$100 per month (\$1,200 per year) pay raise that was applied across the board to all state employees. You can expect to see the difference in your September paycheck (which you receive Oct. 1).

Taking vacation?

Before you go, here's a piece of legislation to consider. Now, unused annual leave can be used as credit toward retirement, much the same way unused sick leave has been used the last couple of years. And the really good news is you can take a lump sum payment of unused annual leave upon retirement, as well as it counting for credit.

HHSC Holding Local Planning Forums

n a series of 21 planning forums, customers of the Health and Human Service (HHS) system in Texas will get an opportunity to express their needs and how to improve the delivery of state-funded HHS in Texas. The Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC), in collaboration with United Way of Texas, Regional Councils of Texas and 12 HHS state agencies, plans to hold forums around Texas to involve stakeholders, consumers and local community leaders in developing the next HHSC Coordinated State Plan.

The forums are twofold with a morning session for public input and a facilitated afternoon session with invited participants. Discussion topics will include creating a continuum of care for families and individuals who need health and human services; providing efficient and timely delivery of those services; developing accountability and teamwork among the HHS agencies; and providing incentives that encourage innovation at local levels. Participants will be invited to provide feedback on responsiveness of current HHS services and suggestions on how we can provide those services better.

TRC Safety Program has a Silver Lining

TRC recently received the Silver Safety Award to recognize a 30 percent decrease in on-the-job injuries in FY 98. TRC Risk Manager, Wally Balzac accepted the award for TRC presented by the State Office of Risk Management.

"This is the second year in a row TRC received this award," reported Balzac. "We had 35 injuries in the workplace last year as compared to 44 in 1997." Balzac attributes the decrease in injuries to ongoing safety awareness training.

According to Balzac, the most common injuries are slips, falls and repetitive trauma injuries. Some safeguards for these injuries could be as simple as paying attention to your surroundings and practicing good posture at your computer.

If you experience an injury in the workplace, contact your supervisor immediately. Managers are encouraged to contact Balzac through e-mail or by calling him in the Central Office (telephone number 512-424-4216) for information on handling workplace injuries and safety awareness training packages that are available.

Independent Living survey has a new twist

he State Independent Living Council (SILC) wants to know what people with disabilities in Texas really need to live more independently. The SILC is sponsoring a caller-initiated telephone survey and a series of focus groups and public forums in selected cities around the state so effected people can voice their opinion on how federal funds should best be used in Texas.

"The call-in telephone survey is a new twist on survey methods," said Tim Bear, SILC administrative coordinator. "It is sort of like polling versus voting; the people most impacted and interested will respond. Generally, telephone surveys don't work because people resent being called at home and use technology to intercept those calls. But, by using the call-in survey, I believe we will get better input. We expect to hear from providers as well as people with disabilities and their family members and support systems."

The Independent Living (IL) program, a federal program carried out by TRC and the Texas Commission for the Blind (TCB), helps Texans with severe disabilities reach the highest level of independence possible. It also works with independent living centers around the state, concentrating on self-sufficiency and quality of life even though most consumers in the program may have very limited work potential. The SILC works with TRC and TCB to provide leadership and direction on independent living issues in Texas.

"It is important that we get the information out to anyone who has an interest in the future of IL services in Texas, particularly consumers," said Vernon Dement, TRC program specialist for the IL program. "The better the participation in the telephone survey and the forums, the more thorough the final assessment will be of independent-living service needs."
