RECORD DONATION MADE FOR RIGS TO REEFS PROGRAM

AUSTIN--Global Marine Inc. of Houston has donated \$385,000 to the Texas Artificial Reef Fund, the largest donation in the history of the Rigs to Reefs program.

The donation represents half of the company's realized savings from converting the offshore natural gas production platform into an artificial reef versus salvaging it on shore. The platform is scheduled for toppling in mid-August.

The mammoth structure - its height is about the length of a football field - will be toppled to the soft floor of the Gulf of Mexico, which typically lacks any hard structures upon which natural marine reefs might form. There it will attract and support hundreds of reef fish species, such as red snapper, as well as other marine life.

"This is a landmark day for the Texas Artificial Reef Program," said Andrew Sansom, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, which coordinates the artificial reef program. "One of the dominant themes in our work today is partnerships between government and private business and this is an excellent example of a highly beneficial marine conservation project that would be difficult, if not impossible, for us to undertake without private support.

"Donations of all sizes to the program are equally appreciated but this unprecedented level of support is undeniably exciting. It shows that the Rigs to Reefs concept is working. With proper oversight and management, the program is emerging as a win-win for anglers, divers, oil and gas companies and the marine environment."

Rigs to Reefs, the centerpiece of the 1990 Texas Artificial Reef Plan, promotes the conversion of oil and gas production platforms into permanent artificial reefs to enhance and conserve fisheries off the Texas coast. To date, the program has established artificial reefs involving 17 former oil and gas platforms and raised \$2.5 million dollars toward future artificial reef endeavors.

The enabling legislation that made the program possible was authored by Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown of Lake Jackson. The Texas Artificial Reef Act of 1989 was sponsored by Rep. John Willy of Angleton, co-authored by senators Chet Brooks of Pasadena, Carl Parker of Port Arthur, Hector Uribe of Brownsville and Ken Armbrister of Victoria and cosponsored by Sen. Eddie Lucio of Brownsville.

"The donation today is a huge boost for preserving and enriching Texas fisheries," Brown said. "I could not be more pleased with the outstanding success of this important program, which will benefit generations of Texans."

Offshore drilling rigs and production platforms are virtual living reefs, covered with barnacles, algae and coral. Their network of metal legs and crossbars, complete with plenty of nooks and crannies, provides important food and shelter for a great diversity of marine life.

Sport and commercial fishermen have long profited from marine life's affinity for the structures. A sampling of the catch abundant around a platform includes king and Spanish mackerel, red snapper, sand seatrout, grouper, spadefish, dolphin, sharpnose shark and amberjack.

Scuba divers also enjoy the benefits of "platform reefs. On any given day near an oil or gas drilling platform, divers may find sea anemones, sponges, bivalves, sea squirts, sea urchins, a variety of corals, angelfish, tangs, wrasses, spotfin butterflies, sea bass and barracuda.

More than 4,000 production platforms are located in the Gulf of Mexico, about 40 percent of which are estimated to become unprofitable by the year 2000.

The production platform from this donation was owned by Challenger Minerals, a subsidiary of Global Marine. It produced gas from a field about 100 miles southeast of Galveston for seven years. The option to transform the used platform into an artificial reef was seen as less expensive and better for the marine environment by company executives.

"I know business and the environment can coexist to the benefit of both," said C. Russell Luigs, chairman, president and chief executive officer of Global Marine. "It's satisfying to know that when our platform ceased production, we had a more attractive choice than simply towing it ashore to sell for scrap."

Global Marine is one of the oil and gas industry's largest international offshore drilling contractors with 23 mobile rigs deployed worldwide. The company employs about 1,700 people around the world.

PUBLIC ALLIGATOR HUNTS SET FOR FOUR AREAS

AUSTIN--The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will conduct public hunts for alligators on four departmental areas during September

Officials said completed applications from prospective alligator hunters must be received in the Austin headquarters by 5 p.m. Aug. 3. Applicants selected by drawing will be required to pay a \$50 permit fee. A \$35 alligator hunter's license (\$300 for nonresidents) also is required for each permitted hunter. An additional \$120 tagging fee will be assessed only to those successful hunters who choose to have their alligator tagged for commercial sale.

Last year, 1,719 people applied for the hunts and the 268 participating hunters harvested 128 surplus alligators. This year, officials expect to issue about 316 permits.

Hunts will be held on the Guadalupe Delta Wildlife Management Area in Calhoun County, J.D. Murphree WMA in Jefferson County, Mad Island WMA in Matagorda County and Sea Rim State Park in Jefferson County.

Applications are automatically mailed to anyone who applied for last year's alligator hunts. Those who did not apply in last year's drawings can obtain an application for this year's hunts at the J.D. Murphree WMA in Port Arthur or by contacting TPWD headquarters in Austin at 1-800-792-1112, ext. 4972, or (512) 389-4972.

WHITE-WINGED DOVE BREEDING POPULATIONS UP

AUSTIN--Population trend surveys by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists in South Texas indicate white-winged dove breeding populations are up.

"Recently completed call-count surveys in the lower Rio Grande Valley indicate that whitewing numbers are up about 20 percent," said Gary Waggerman, TPWD white-winged dove project leader "However, fall huntable populations will depend on production which so far this summer is significantly below average due to heavy rainfall during the peak of nesting."

In 1992, total whitewings taken during the special white-winged dove season increased by 250 percent. Total whitewings taken during the regular mourning dove season statewide increased 178 percent. The freeze of 1989 severely damaged nesting habitat in the Rio Grande Valley and the dramatic increase in whitewings over the past two years is a reflection of recovering habitat and improving nesting success.

Some hunters in north central Texas were surprised last year to find white-winged doves showing up for the first time in the areas they hunt for mourning doves. Whitewings have been expanding their breeding range northward in recent years. They have been identified as far north as Waco, Abilene and along the coast as far east as Port Arthur.

Hunters should remember that a \$7 white-winged dove stamp is required to hunt whitewings even if only one whitewing is taken while mourning dove hunting.

POLLUTION ADVISORY As a service to readers of the weekly fishing report, the following pollution report is published to help fishermen with their selection of fishing sites. This material is provided by the Texas Department of Health.

RESERVOIR,

FLOODWAY, ARROYO COLORADO AND ALL IRRIGATION CANALS IN HIDALGO COUNTY (Freshwater only) Persons should not consume fish from these waters until further notice because of PCB contamination of all fish species. LAVACA BAY near Point Comfort, rishermen may only catch and release fish and crabs from this area because of mercury contaminants.

TRINITY RIVER, between Dallas and Fort Worth, fishermen may only catch and release all fish species in this area because of chlordane contaminants.

ARROYO COLORADO, above Port of Harlingen, regular consumption of all fish species taken from this area should be avoided because of chlordane, toxaphene and DDT contaminants.

TOWN LAKE, Austin, consumption of all fish species taken from this body of water should be avoided because of chlordane contamination.

NECHES RIVER, south of US 96 near Evadale to the I 10 bridge, no more than 1 meal of all species of fish per month per person should be consumed. Women of child bearing age and children should not consume fish caught in this area because of dioxin contaminants.

BRAZOS RIVER, south of FM 521 to the mouth of the Brazos in Brazoria County, no more than 1 meal of all fish species per month per person should be consumed. Women of child bearing

and children should not consume fish caught in this area because of dioxin contaminants. HOUSTON SHIP CHANNEL and UPPER GALVESTON BAY north of a line drawn from Red Bluff Point to Five Mile Cut Marker to Houston
Point, no more than 1 meal per month per person of catfish and blue crabs caught in this area. Women of child rearing age and children should not consume any catfish or blue crab caught in this area because of dioxin contaminants.

BRANCH RESERVOIR, BRANDY BRANCH RESERVOIR and WELSH RESERVOIR RESERVOIR, all in northeast Texas:

Due to elevated levels of selenium in these three lakes: adults should eat no more than 8 ounces of fish per week; children 7 years of age or older should eat no more than a 4-ounce serving per week; children younger than 7, pregnant women or women who may soon become pregnant should not eat any fish from these

who eats fish from these lakes should not take dietary supplements containing more than

CHOKE: Main lake clear, 85 degrees, lake full; black bass are fair to 9 pounds with limits averaging 2 pounds on topwaters, Slug-Gos, spinners and plastic worms; best fishing is early and late; deep diving cranks or Carolina rigged worms are best baits; striper are slow; crappie are slow in 15-35 feet of water early and late on minnows; white bass are fair in the lower part of the lake near the dam with early and late schooling, topwater and small chrome cranks are best; catfish are fair and scattered, most suspended in deep water and are caught around 10 feet; fishing also good along the river channel just above and below 99 bridge with cheese bait and liver fished under a cork; trotline and jug lines are good in 5-10 feet of water on live and cut bait; gaspergou are good to 14 pounds on br near the bottom with live nightcrawlers in 10-30 feet of water along the dam in the afternoon and night.

COLETO CREEK: Water muddy, 72 degrees, normal level; black bass are good to 8 pounds on plastic worms; striper are poor; crappie are fair to 10 inches on minnows and worms; catfish are good in numbers on trotlines and live perch.

CORPUS CHRISTI: Water muddy, 83 degrees, lake full; black bass

are slow; striper are slow; crappie are fairly good off both state park piers on minnows and white jigs early and late; white white jigs early and late; white bass are fairly good in the main pool under the birds on chrome slabs and cranks; blue catfish are good to 24 pounds in the flats on trotlines baited with soap and shad; gaspergou and channel catfish are good below the dam on peeled shrimp and nightcrawlers; carp fishing is excellent to 32 pounds on Big Red Soda and bran. pounds on Big Red Soda and bran flakes.

FALCON: Water clear, 83 degrees, 9 feet low; black bass are good to 8 pounds on Bass Assassins, worms, Rattle Traps and spinners; striper are good through 15 pounds on Knocker Spoons and 1-2 ounce white snocker spoons and 1-2 ounce white jigs with trailers; crappie are slow; white bass are fair in number on slabs and jigs; catfish are good through 5 pounds on shrimp and shad.

MEDINA: Water clear, 82 degrees, 2 feet low; black bass are good to 8

pounds on topwaters early and Power Worms in the afternoon; striper are slow; crappie are slow; white bass are fair but no limits caught on chrome slabs in 15 feet of water; catfish are slow.

TEXANA: Water murky in the main TEXANA: Water murky in the main lake, clearing in the creeks and rivers; normal level; black bass are fair to 3 pounds in the Navidad River on Crawworms; crappie are fair on minnows; catfish are slow.

ARROWHEAD: Water degrees, normal level; black bass are slow; striper are slow; crappie are fair on minnows in 6-8 feet of water; white bass are fair on slabs and spoons; catfish are good to 3 pounds on minnows and worms.

GRANBURY: Water clear, 78 degrees, normal level; black bass are fair in the shallows on small spinners; striper are fair at the warm water striper are fair at the warm water outlet, most fish are small; crappie are good in the brush around 25 feet on small minnows; white bass are fair to good drifting Rattle Traps; catfish are good in 25-30 feet of water near the rocks on Mr. Whiskers Cheese Baits.

COASTAL

NORTH SABINE LAKE: Fishing has been slow; only a few fishermen out. Plenty of fresh water coming down the Sabine. down the Sabine.

SOUTH SABINE LAKE: Specks are beginning to move back into the south end reef from the ship channel; the flounder are good in the ship channel and around the causeway bridge and around Sabine Pass on mud minnows; redfish are hitting dead shrimp at the jetties, around the causeway bridge and along the Louisiana shoreline north of the causeway bridge; croaker are good sized and are hitting brown shrimp; live bait shrimp are scarce but some are available at \$11 per quart. GALVESTON: Water is brown and dirty as far as you can see; weather is hot; winds have been high all week. FREEPORT: Fishing has been good but weather keeps most fishermen away; good numbers of kingfish and snapper caught when boats can get offshore; live bait shrimp available at \$8-\$10 per quart. PORT OCONNOR: Fishing is slow due to high winds and fresh water; the Intracoastal is about like the Guadalupe River; a few fish caught around the big jetties, and also around Greens and Cotton Bayous; some fish caught in the surf; winds high midweek. MATAGORDA: West Bay has been producing good numbers of trout and redfish on Night Glow Hogies Swimming Shad; good numbers of flounder caught in both bays; good sized trout in East Bay caught by some fishermen on Jumping Minnows; surf fishing is slow due to muddy water; offshore fishing slow; winds range from 15 to 25 knots midweek; live bait available at \$10 per quart. shrimp PALACIOS: Fishing has been fairly slow due to high winds which range to 25 knots from the southeast; some redfish caught in Coon Island Bay on live bait; redfish and trout caught along the south shore line from Cullen Cut to Green's Bayou; live bait shrimp available at \$10 per quart; salinity is improving and fishing should be excellent when fishermen can get

ROCKPORT: Winds are high midweek, but are beginning to abate;

redfish and trout are caught around the shell reefs, around grass and around schools of working mullet; good numbers of fish caught in dirty water with artificials; pier fishermen are doing well under lights at night; good numbers of flounder caught; live bait shrimp available.

Back bay fishermen are catching redfish and trout in the channels; some flounder also caught; winds high in Corpus Christi Bay; live bait shrimp available at 15 cents

each.

PORT MANSFIELD: Rains left winds returned to the bay; fishing returning to pre Arlene levels although overall fishing is fair to poor; two snook caught on the south side of the East Cut of Port Mansfield; one caught Saturday caught by Jimmy Morrison on a tout caught by Jimmy Morrison on a tout while wading; the second was caught Sunday by his dad, Dick Morrison, using a soft topwater plug. Both fish were in the 3-4 pound range, fish were photographed and released. Some redfish caught on the 234 Bar photographed and released. Some redfish caught on the 234 Bar north of Port Mansfield and fair action on flats from the Saucer to Green Island; trout fishing is slow, a few good sized fish caught in the Saucer area; live bait shrimp is spotty at best; offshore fishing was slow due to rough seas; the gulf shrimp season opened July 6 which means that king and ling will have a floating lunch wagon. SOUTH PADRE: Good catches of trout and redfish with good numbers of oversized redfish off the Long Bar on the west side; a few 5 pound blacktip shark caught around spoil banks; black drum caught in the Gas Well Flats on the west side; live bait shrimp available. Winds have been strong all week which kept most offshore people at home.
