- 2 relating to the sale of certain state property in Brazoria County by
- 3 the Texas Board of Criminal Justice.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. (a) Not later than June 30, 2018, the Texas
- 6 Board of Criminal Justice shall sell the real property described by
- 7 Subsection (d) of this section if the board receives a bid for the
- 8 fair market value of the property.
- 9 (b) The Texas Board of Criminal Justice shall sell the
- 10 property as provided by Section 496.0021, Government Code. The
- 11 General Land Office shall negotiate and close a transaction
- 12 involving the real property described by this section on behalf of
- 13 the board using the procedures under Section 31.158, Natural
- 14 Resources Code. The sale shall exclude the mineral interests in and
- 15 under the property, and the deed shall contain a provision
- 16 expressly reserving the state's interest in and right to remove all
- 17 oil, gas, and other minerals in and under the real property
- 18 described by Subsection (d) of this section.
- 19 (c) In this section, "proposed reservoir tract" means the
- 20 2,200 acres sold in Brazoria County by the Texas Board of Criminal
- 21 Justice in 2011.
- 22 (d) The Texas Board of Criminal Justice shall sell the real
- 23 property described as follows:
- 24 Approximately 22 acres, more or less, along the un-named tributary

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to Oyster Creek within the 2,682 acre tract or parcel of land 1 2 conveyed to the Prison Commission of the State of Texas as recorded 3 in Book 145, Page 307 of the Deed Records Brazoria County, Texas lying within the Stephen F. Austin League No 8, Abstract 25 in Brazoria County, Texas near the City of Angleton, Texas. 5 approximate boundaries of the 22 acres are: starting at 6 the confluence of the un-named tributary to Oyster Creek and the Oyster 7 8 Creek channel which is located approximately 673 feet north of the 9 proposed reservoir tract, extending north approximately 3,660 feet 10 along the un-named tributary to Oyster Creek and extending east and 11 west of the centerline of said tributary approximately 130 feet; 12 And, approximately 274 acres along Oyster Creek, more or less, 13 being part of the 2,682 acre tract or parcel of land conveyed to the Prison Commission of the State of Texas as recorded in Book 145, 14 15 Page 307 of the Deed Records of Brazoria County, Texas lying within the Stephen F. Austin League No. 8, Abstract 25; and the Stephen 16 Richardson League, abstract 122; and the William Harris League, 17 abstract 71 in Brazoria County, Texas near the City of Angleton, 18 The approximate boundaries of the 274 acres are: from the 19 Texas. confluence of the un-named tributary to Oyster Creek and the Oyster 20 Creek channel, located approximately 673 feet north of the 21 northeast corner of the proposed reservoir tract to the northeast 22 corner of the proposed reservoir tract and extending east and west 23 of the centerline of the Oyster Creek Channel approximately 220 24 feet; from the northeast corner of the proposed reservoir tract to 25 the intersection of the center line of Oyster Creek with the eastern 26 boundary of the old railroad grade road, lands that extend from

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- 1 approximately 220 feet east of the center line of Oyster Creek,
- 2 westward and southward to the proposed reservoir tract; land
- 3 extending south and westward from the intersection of centerline of
- 4 Oyster Creek and the eastern boundary of the old railroad Grade
- 5 road, south through points defined by latitude and longitude
- 6 coordinates:
- 7 Latitude: 29.260925°, Longitude: -95.527633°;
- 8 Latitude: 29.260682°, Longitude: -95.526219°;
- 9 Latitude: 29.259672°, Longitude: -95.525333°;
- 10 Latitude: 29.259409°, Longitude: -95.523467°;
- 11 Latitude: 29.259481°, Longitude: -95.521911°;
- 12 Latitude: 29.259356°, Longitude: -95.521045°; and
- 13 Latitude: 29.258961°, Longitude: -95.520931° with the southern
- 14 boundary being formed by the southern limits of contiguous land
- 15 conveyed to the Prison Commission of the State of Texas.
- 16 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 17 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 18 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 19 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 20 Act takes effect September 1, 2017.

Fiscal Analysis

The bill would require the Texas Board of Criminal Justice to sell real property, as described in the bill, in Brazoria County through the General Land Office (GLO) if the Board receives a bid of at least \$740,000.

Methodology

Assuming a sales transaction occurs, there would be a one-time General Revenue Fund gain of \$740,000 or

more to the Department of Criminal Justice. For purposes of this analysis the sale of property is assumed in fiscal year 2018. Any costs associated with the sale of the property could be absorbed within existing resources.
