8	(b-1) and (b-2) to read as follows:
9	(b) Under the pilot program, the department shall:
10	<u>(1)</u> [may] enter into a contract with <u>any</u> [a] person
11	<u>qualified</u> to provide driver record monitoring services, as
12	described by Subsection (c); $[\tau]$ and
13	(2) provide certain information from the department's
14	driver's license records to the person as provided by this section.
15	(b-1) A person is qualified to provide driver record
16	monitoring services $[-7]$ if the person:
17	(1) has submitted an application to the department;
18	<u>(2)</u> [(1)] is an employer, an insurer, an insurance
19	support organization, an employer support organization, or an
20	entity that self-insures its motor vehicles; and
21	(3) [(2)] is eligible to receive the information under
22	Chapter 730.
23	(b-2) The department may not limit the number of qualified
24	persons participating in the pilot program.

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(j) The department <u>shall accept and consider applications</u>
[may establish a reasonable deadline by which a person must apply]
to enter into a contract with the department under this section
<u>until the conclusion of the term of the pilot program [and may not</u>
enter into a contract with a person who fails to apply before that
<u>deadline</u>].

7 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 8 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 9 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 10 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 11 Act takes effect September 1, 2017.




