AN ACT 2 relating to the certification of food service workers. 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 SECTION 1. Sections 438.046(b), (b-1), and (c), Health and 5 Safety Code, are amended to read as follows: 6 [A local health jurisdiction that requires training for a food-service worker shall accept as sufficient to meet the 7 jurisdiction's training and testing requirements a training course 8 that is accredited by the department and listed with the registry. 9 10 A food service worker trained in a course for the employees of a 11 single entity is considered to have met local health 12 jurisdiction's training, [<del>and</del>] testing, and permitting 13 requirements only as to food service performed for that entity. (b-1) A food service worker trained in a food handler 14 15 training course that is accredited by the American National Standards Institute or that is accredited by the department and 16 listed with the registry is considered to have met a local health 17 jurisdiction's training, testing, and permitting requirements. A 18 19 local health jurisdiction may require a food establishment, as that 20 term is defined by Section 438.101, to maintain on the premises of 21 the food establishment a certificate of completion of the training 22 course for employees of the food establishment. 23 A local health jurisdiction may not charge a fee or 24 require or issue a local food handler card for a certificate issued

- SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives

- 15 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 16 Act takes effect September 1, 2017.
