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Committees Hear TRC Budget Request

The Texas Rehabilitation Commission's budget request for the 1984-85 biennium passed through two more phases of the state budget process in early February when two legislative committees heard the Commission's rationale for its request. Members of the Senate Finance Committee and the House Human Services Subcommittee heard testimony from Commissioner Max Arrell concerning funding requests for all programs operating within the Vocational Rehabilitation Division.

Members of both committees had already received a recommendation for TRC's budget from the Legislative

Members of TRC's Consumer Consultation Committee were among the dozens of disability consumer advocates who attended budget hearings before the Senate Finance Committee and House Human Services Subcommittee.

Budget Board. Generally, speaking, the committees must determine if the LBB's recommendation is, in fact. appropriate. The committees will forward their recommendations to the appropriate legislative bodies. The Senate Finance Committee will make a recommendation to the Senate. The House Human Services Subcommittee's recommendation will go to the House Appropriations Committee which will, in turn, make a recommendation to the House of Representatives.

Disability consumer advocates made a strong showing in support of the TRC budget request--meeting rooms

for both hearings were packed to overflowing. The majority of the consumers were present to show support for the Commission's budget request for independent living pro-The Commission has grams. requested a total of \$1.5 million for each year of the biennium to support the independent living program. The LBB recommendation was far below the Commission's request--\$159,000 for FY 1984 and \$169,000 for FY 1985. A number of advocates for the independent living program, including directors of several of the existing independent living centers, testified in behalf of the full amount of funding requested by the Commission.



Deputy Commissioner Doyle Wheeler was among the dozens of co-workers and friends who gathered in Wichita Falls recently to celebrate Marjorie Booker's 40 years of service to TRC. Booker, supervisor of the Wichita Falls Field Office, retired at the end of January. Booker joined the Commission in 1943 as a secretary. She has worked for every commissioner or state director who has served the Commission since the Vocational Rehabilitation Division was created in 1929. Upon retirement, Booker had more tenure with TRC than any other employee now working.

Joellen Flores Simmons has been named the new executive director of the Governor's Planning Council for Developmental Disabilities.

A former special education teacher, she has spent the past nine years with the Texas Education Agency. Her most recent position was as a fiscal specialist for special

education programs.

The new executive director has a Bachelor of Science degree in elementary education from Texas Women's University and a master's degree in special education from Texas Tech with additional studies in the areas of learning disabilities, educational diagnostics, psychology and mental retardation. She has done post graduate work at the University of Texas and has attended as an undergraduate student Our Lady of the Lake College in San Antonio, Southwestern Louisiana University in Lafayette, La., and the University of Heidelberg in Germany.

Simmons, 35, replaces Kathy Sandusky who left in June to attend law school.

Simmons and her staff will be moving from the current DD headquarters to the TRC Central Office April 1.

Creamer Keeps on Truckin'

Jack Creamer has a new truck to drive on his trips around the state, carrying items to and from the TRC warehouse.

It's a new Ford diesel LN 8,000 with a 20-foot box and a 3,000 pound lift. The \$39,696 vehicle replaces a 1978 Ford that had 200,000 miles.

"They'll be no more breaking down out in the middle of nowhere," said Creamer, who remembers a three day wait for repairs when the old truck stopped running in Three Rivers.

He estimates he will put about 50,000 miles on the new truck this year.

truck which has an AM-FM radio and a comfortable air seat.

TRC Employees Receive Home, Work Safety Tips

Texas Rehabilitation Commission employees received copies of two booklets dealing with safety in the past month as part of a Commissionsponsored program.

The first book issued to employees, "Being Safe," provides a variety of safety techniques for personal protection at work or home. The second publication, "Warning: Hotels Could Be Hazardous to your Health," provides information on what to do in case of a fire. The booklet was written by a captain of the Los Angeles County Fire Department.

"The purpose behind the booklets is to alert employees to the many dangers they probably do not think of. We are attempting to focus on the total environment of the employee, both at work and home," said Mike Mericle, personnel director. "We hope that the publication on Hotel Fire Safety will be especially

helpful to TRC employees who must travel. I wish to recognize the cooperative spirit of the Southland Corporation for making this information available to us."

TRC expanded its safety program one-and-a-half years ago when the responsibility was placed under the direction of the Personnel Services Division. Linda Dryden, the Commission's safety coordinator, is currently working, in conjunction with staff development, on safety training programs to be presented to employees this fiscal year.

"Commission employees are most fortunate to have the Commissioner give his full support to a safety program. Many agencies have little or no safety programs and training. The purchase and distribution of these booklets is a good example of TRC management's concern for employee safety," Mericle said.

Gravenor Returns to Work After 30 Years at Home

Electric typewriters, modern Dictaphone machines and the pay all took Sally Gravenor by suprise seven months ago when she started as a stenographer in Disabilities Determination Division Unit 12.

She discovered that each had changed drastically over the past 30 years since she decided to leave the work force and stay home as a full-time wife and mother.

"I was a whiz on the manual typewriter when I worked before, but an electric typewriter is much different. It took me time to get used to it," Gravenor, 55, said.

Gravenor quit her job with the State of Texas 30 years ago when she discovered she was going to have her first baby.

Four children later, with her youngest ready to start college, she decided it was



time to go back to work.

"I came to the TRC to take a typing test and found they were using electric typewriters. I tried and did badly," Gravenor recalled.

On her third try she passed the test and after her fourth job interview was hired by Ralph Cearley, supervisor of the Initial/Recon Unit.

"She convinced me that she was there to work and that she wouldn't take absences. I took a gamble on her and it worked. Most people wouldn't touch someone who was out of the labor force for that long," Cearley said.

Gravenor said that, besides different typewriters and other modern equipment, the pay had also changed over the past three decades.

When she started her first job at the age of 17, she was earning \$25 a week and thought that was a lot of money. Today her income is considerably higher.

Gravenor, who lives at her family's ranch in Henly in Hays County with her husband and 17-year-old daughter, said since she has started working, she has found she has a hard time keeping up with her interests.

"I have a garden, do oil paintings and make most of my clothes. Between that and work, my day is not long enough," she said.

Tax Information for Disabled People

A booklet that outlines federal income tax rules of interest to disabled people is now available through the Internal Revenue Service.

IRS Publication 907, "Tax Information for Handicapped and Disabled Individuals," provides general information on deductions, credits and taxable income. For example, it specifies rules which allow taxpayers to exclude certain disability payments from income, to deduct medical expenses and to claim a credit for disabled dependent care expenses.

Poster Campaign Aimed at Client Contact

A few months ago, while he was painting his house, Dallas Regional Director Bob Marx struck upon an idea he hoped would help correct a problem at work.

The problem: Informing TRC clients of the need to stay in close contact with their vocational rehabilitation counselors and reminding counselors to document their contacts with clients.

The solution: Sponsor a poster contest.

Marx sent word of the contest throughout Region VI. By the deadline, the walls of the conference room in the regional office were covered with entries--69 posters in all. Each poster, in one way or another, addressed the importance of client contact. Kaye Beneke, Information Specialist, and Lindy Ward, Illustrator, were called in as judges to select the two posters which most effectively communicated the message.

One of the posters created by Dorothy (Dottie) Taylor of the Dallas East Field Office was selected as the first place winner. Sherry Williams of the Texarkana Field Office took second place. The winners were recognized in person at the January meeting of the Region VI supervisors.

Marx says the contest itself raised awareness of the importance of client contact. "Everywhere I traveled in Region VI during the contest," he says, "people were talking about client contact and their poster ideas."

Now that the contest is over, small groups of the posters are on display at each field office in Region VI. Marx says the posters will be rotated between offices ever so often and will hopefully serve as constant reminders of the need for clients and counselors to stay in touch.
