1983 Expected to Begin on Continuing Resolution

Barring a last minute breakthrough, it appears likely that federal funding for vocational rehabilitation programs in Fiscal Year 1983 will be provided, at least for a while, under a continuing resolution instead of a regular appropriation from Congress. As of Sept. 27, with only three days remaining in FY 1982, Congress had not taken action on a regular appropriation for vocational rehabilitation. Budget committees of both houses of Congress were working on recommendations for funding levels under a continuing resolution.

Normally, under a continuing resolution, programs receive the same amount as was awarded the previous fiscal year. If that were the case, basic support (Section 110) funding for the nationwide vocational rehabilitation program in FY 1983 would be set at \$863.04 million. However, funding under a continuing resolution can be increased or decreased if amendments calling for adjustments are introduced in Congress, passed by both houses and signed by the President.

As of this writing (Sept. 27) the full Senate

Appropriations Committee has approved a measure calling for a continuing resolution at level funding, or the same amount as was allocated in FY 1982 (\$863.04 million). While other domestic programs included in the resolution were recommended for increases in funding. vocational rehabilitation programs were not. Observers say this is due to the absence of two senators. historically supportive of the vocational rehabilitation program, when the measure was considered. During the final week of FY 1982, the prospect of introducing an amendment that would increase funding to the full level to the full Senate was under deliberation.

Meanwhile, the full House Appropriations Committee was expected to make its recommendation for funding for vocational rehabilitation programs on Wednesday, Sept.


IMPART Moves to Austin

IMPART (Innovative Matching of Problems to Available Rehabilitation Technology) is moving to Austin. On Oct. 1, the responsibility for supervising the program was transferred to Program Services Director John Wylie. By Nov. 1, the IMPART office, currently located in San Antonio, will be housed in the Central Office.

IMPART's mission is to use existing technology to assist handicapped persons in their vocations and daily living activities. Since 1977, the project has operated under a federal grant. That grant, however, expired on Sept. 30.

With expiration of the grant, the IMPART project might have ended. However, a committee of field and Central Office personnel determined that TRC needs an office responsible for coordinating the technological aspects of the rehabilitation process. With the information provided by the committee, administrators decided to fund the program and move it to Austin.

Wylie says any modifications to the IMPART program will primarily be administrative in nature and won't change the overall mission or function. Currently, Wylie is accepting applications from persons interested in working as program specialist in the IMPART program. John McNair, who coordinated the program in San Antonio, has decided against moving to Austin. Clerical Supervisor Lydia Arguello will transfer to the Central Office.

Staff Services Changes Hands

"It's just like jumping off the high diving board for the first time. You know you want to do it--you know you can do it--but, it sure looks like a long way to jump!"

That's how Janis Beard describes her feelings about the new responsibilities she has assumed as TRC's administrative officer in charge of staff services. Beard was promoted to that position on Sept. 1, when Jackson King, former chief of staff services, transferred to the Austin regional office to become regional director. In keeping with the Commission's personnel conservation policy, King's position in the Central Office was deleted when he transferred. Beard, however, has assumed many of the responsibilities that went along with the position.

No stranger to the system, Beard has worked in the staff services department for six of the nine years she has been with TRC. Previously, she was a stenographer in a Disability Determination Division reconsideration unit. As an assistant in staff services, Beard has handled almost all of the activities she is responsible for now-activities which include handling leasing requirements for TRC offices, maintaining contracts on office rental equipment (copy machines, postage meters, etc.), maintenance of TRC vehicles, building maintenance for the Central Office and supervision of the Central Office mail unit, switchboard and copy room.

"The job is pretty much of a challenge most of the time," Beard says. "It's something different all the time. I've always liked a job that had a lot of different things to do."

Beard carries out her duties with a no-nonsense, straightforward style, complimented by a keen sense of humor--characteristics which have earned Beard a reputation in the Central Office and field. Along with that, Beard has earned a reputation for getting the job done. As one colleague put it, "It doesn't matter if you're the commissioner or the cleaning crew, if Janis wants to get something done, you'd best move out of the way."




Approximately 300 DDD employees have packed up their desks and left their offices. But, they didn't go far. They are now stationed in new offices located directly across the parking lot from the Central Office.

Seven continuing disability investigation units, three initial/reconsideration units and all DDD administrative and support units now occupy four floors of the building at 158 E. Riverside. The purpose of the move was

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primarily to relieve overcrowding of the second floor of the Central Office where most of the DDD staff had been housed. Also, employees from another building, on South Congress, were moved because their lease expired at the end of Sept. Now, approximately 400 employees remain on the Central Office's second floor, and plans to redistribute the work area to make those employees more comfortable are underway.

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29. Earlier in the month, the House Appropriations Subcommittee had made its recommendation to the full committee. Though figures contained in the subcommittee's recommendation were not released officially, sources say there are indications that the subcommittee bill called for basic support funding at the full level authorized, \$943.9 million.

A dvocates of the vocational rehabilitation program spent the final days of the fiscal year contacting their representatives in Congress urging support of funding at the full authorized level.
