

1 AN ACT
2 relating to the creation of the Commission on Texas Workforce of the
3 Future.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

5 SECTION 1. Chapter 29, Education Code, is amended by adding
6 Subchapter Z-1 to read as follows:

7 SUBCHAPTER Z-1. COMMISSION ON TEXAS WORKFORCE OF THE FUTURE

8 Sec. 29.951. DEFINITION. In this subchapter, "commission"
9 means the Commission on Texas Workforce of the Future.

10 Sec. 29.952. COMMISSION ON TEXAS WORKFORCE OF THE FUTURE.

11 (a) The Commission on Texas Workforce of the Future is established
12 to engage business, state agencies, and local workforce system
13 partners in the efforts of state and local authorities to build the
14 state's workforce talent pipeline.

15 (b) The commission members shall provide reliable and
16 accurate data pertinent to college and career readiness,
17 industry-based workforce credentials, associate and bachelor's
18 degree programs, and high-demand industry jobs and careers.

19 (c) The commission is composed of 17 members as follows:

20 (1) five members appointed by the governor;

21 (2) four members appointed by the lieutenant governor;

22 (3) four members appointed by the speaker of the house
23 of representatives;

24 (4) the commissioner of higher education or the

1 commissioner's designee;

2 (5) a commissioner of the Texas Workforce Commission
3 appointed by the chair of the Texas Workforce Commission or the
4 commissioner's designee;

5 (6) the commissioner or the commissioner's designee;

6 and

7 (7) the chair of the Texas Economic Development
8 Corporation.

9 (d) The members appointed by the governor must have an
10 interest in the future of the state's workforce. At least one of
11 the members appointed by the governor must be a member of a
12 statewide labor federation. In appointing the members, the
13 governor shall consider appointing a business leader representing
14 each of the following industries:

15 (1) oil and gas;

16 (2) technology and manufacturing;

17 (3) health care;

18 (4) construction; and

19 (5) petrochemicals.

20 (e) The appointments made by the lieutenant governor must
21 include:

22 (1) two members of the senate;

23 (2) an administrator in a kindergarten through 12th
24 grade public school system or an elected member of the board of
25 trustees of a school district; and

26 (3) the superintendent of an adult education program
27 provided under an adult high school and industry certification

1 charter school program under Section 29.259 or the superintendent's
2 designee.

3 (f) The appointments made by the speaker of the house of
4 representatives must include:

5 (1) two members of the house of representatives;

6 (2) a representative of a high school dropout recovery
7 adult education program serving students who are at least 18 years
8 of age and not older than 25 years of age or a public school
9 superintendent who oversees a high school dropout recovery adult
10 education program; and

11 (3) an administrator of a public community or
12 technical college or a public university in this state.

13 (g) In making appointments under Subsection (c), the
14 governor, the lieutenant governor, and the speaker of the house of
15 representatives shall coordinate to ensure that the members they
16 appoint reflect, to the extent possible, the ethnic and geographic
17 diversity of this state.

18 Sec. 29.953. PRESIDING OFFICER. The governor shall
19 designate the presiding officer of the commission. The presiding
20 officer must be a business executive.

21 Sec. 29.954. COMPENSATION AND REIMBURSEMENT. A member of
22 the commission is not entitled to compensation for service on the
23 commission but is entitled to reimbursement for actual and
24 necessary expenses incurred in performing commission duties.

25 Sec. 29.955. ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT AND FUNDING. (a)
26 Staff members of the agency shall provide administrative support
27 for the commission.

1 (b) Funding for the administrative and operational expenses
2 of the commission shall be provided by appropriation to the agency.

3 Sec. 29.956. RECOMMENDATIONS. (a) The commission shall
4 develop recommendations under this subchapter to address issues
5 related to workforce development and the future of the state's
6 workforce, including:

7 (1) strengthening and supporting industry-led
8 public-private partnerships that connect people with careers and
9 match employers with skilled talent;

10 (2) improving regional coordination and alignment
11 between industry, the public workforce system, public schools,
12 higher education institutions, and community-based organizations
13 to create college and career pathways that lead to good jobs;

14 (3) attracting, educating, developing, and placing
15 workers in high-demand industry sectors;

16 (4) addressing the current and future skills gap
17 across the state economy and identifying statewide initiatives to
18 enhance cross-sector collaboration, communication, and alignment;

19 (5) identifying incentives to encourage cooperation
20 between sectors that fosters innovative approaches to meet the
21 current and future workforce demands;

22 (6) increasing the number of work-based learning
23 opportunities in this state and the availability of those
24 opportunities, including for persons experiencing barriers to
25 employment and who are historically underrepresented in
26 high-growth, high-wage industries, including in small and midsize
27 companies;

1 (7) developing a comprehensive plan for phasing in,
2 beginning with the 2021-2022 school year, an expansion of the adult
3 high school and industry certification charter school program under
4 Section 29.259 as a strategy for meeting industry needs for a
5 sufficiently trained workforce within this state; and

6 (8) recommending statutory changes to the laws
7 governing the public workforce system, public education, and higher
8 education to enhance career path options and ensure long-term
9 collaboration with industry.

10 (b) The commission shall establish one or more work groups
11 composed of not more than five members of the commission to study,
12 discuss, and address specific policy issues and recommendations to
13 refer to the commission for consideration. In establishing a work
14 group under this subsection, the commission shall ensure that the
15 membership of the work group includes at least two representatives
16 from the business community.

17 Sec. 29.957. REPORT. Not later than December 31, 2020, the
18 commission shall prepare and deliver a report to the governor and
19 the legislature that includes recommendations for statutory and
20 regulatory changes to enhance workforce development and
21 coordination and alignment between industry, public education, and
22 higher education, including any adjustments to college and career
23 pathway programs.


24 Sec. 29.958. PUBLIC MEETINGS AND PUBLIC INFORMATION. (a)
25 The commission may hold public meetings as needed to fulfill the
26 commission's duties under this subchapter.

27 (b) The commission is subject to Chapters 551 and 552,


1 Government Code.

2 Sec. 29.959. COMMISSION ABOLISHED; EXPIRATION OF
3 SUBCHAPTER. The commission is abolished and this subchapter
4 expires January 12, 2021.

5 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.



PROCLAMATION
BY THE
Governor of the State of Texas
41-3666

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 14, of the Texas Constitution, I, Greg Abbott, Governor of Texas, do hereby disapprove of and veto House Bill No. 3511 as passed by the Eighty-Sixth Texas Legislature, Regular Session, because of the following objections:

House Bill 3511 is redundant of the Tri-Agency Workforce Initiative, which is comprised of the Texas Workforce Commission, the Texas Education Agency, and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. Since 2016, those three agencies have worked to assess local economic activity, examine workforce challenges and opportunities, and consider innovative approaches to meeting the State's workforce goals. Together, they are implementing reforms that will improve the quality of education and the workforce in Texas. We need to give those changes a chance to succeed before we start adding bureaucracy and duplicating effort through creation of an expansive new commission.

Since the Eighty-Sixth Texas Legislature, Regular Session, by its adjournment has prevented the return of this bill, I am filing these objections in the office of the Secretary of State and giving notice thereof by this public proclamation according to the aforementioned constitutional provision.


