"We should all be proud of the volunteer spirit and commitment that is characteristic of Texas and Texans," quotes first Lady Rita Clements. As a long time volunteer herself, Mrs. Clements knows that there are no limits to what volunteers can do. And because of this first hand knowledge, the First Lady plans to put special emphasis on volunteer programs.

Mrs. Clements, rich in experience as a volunteer, acknowledges the importance of volunteer work. "Volunteers fill the gaps that government cannot and should not fill," said Mrs. Clements. She also emphasizes that volunteer involvement is more important now than ever before because of budget cuts.

Volunteer involvement is characteristic of the First Lady. She is past president of the Junior League of Dallas as well as former chairman of the board of the Special Care School. She has also served on the boards of the Hockaday School, the St. Michael's School, the Society for Crippled Children, Adventure Trails for Girls, Educational Opportunities, the Women's Council of Dallas County, and the Dallas County Heritage Society. Some of her current board memberships include the United Way of Texas, the United Way of Dallas, the Dallas Historical Society, St. Paul Medical Center Foundation, the White House Preservation Fund, and the Vestry of Saint Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church.

Mrs. Clements will be participating in National Volunteer Week to help give recognition to Texas volunteers. The First Lady is also chairman for the upcoming Volunteer Conference in September.

RUNAWAY HOTLINE HELPS THOUSANDS OF YOUTHS

For nearly 15 years, the Runaway Hotline has been serving as a telephone contact and message relay system for runaways in Texas and throughout the nation. This program, which was initiated in September 1973 by Governor Dolph Briscoe, assists young runaways to find shelter, food, medical help and counseling. Volunteers answer the toll-free hotline 24-hours a day, seven days a week, making every effort to see that runaways are kept off the streets.

The Hotline continues to receive strong support and emphasis within the Clements administration. Recently the Governor expressed his admiration for the program saying, "Of deep concern to me and to this administration is the fate of two million young Americans who run away from their homes every year. We wish to thank the thousands of concerned citizens who have volunteered to make this worthwhile Hotline system operate."

Program Director Mimi Correa is enthusiastic about what's ahead for the Hotline as she and her staff prepare goals for the coming year. Correa, along with Volunteer Coordinator Jennifer Reid and Administrative Assistant Renee Robinson, will be concentrating their efforts in three areas: the recruiting and training of volunteers, the development of public awareness, and the updating of resource information disseminated by the volunteers.

According to the Hotline staff, the implementation of an ongoing monthly program has been the most important step taken so far regarding the recruiting and training of volunteers. "Through this new program, our recruits will have the benefit of being trained in a

smaller, more personal group because session will be occurring on a more frequent and regular basis," says Correa.

The statistics continue to show that the Hotline plays an important role in our society. Volunteers receive over 185 calls a day from children as young as nine years old, with the average age being fifteen. These dedicated volunteers have made a tremendous difference in the lives of many runaway children and their families.

The Governor's Office of Community Leadership/Volunteer Services administers the program with funding provided by a grant through the Criminal Justice Division.

Governor Clements Selects Members of Women's Commission

Governor Bill Clements has announced that Ann Quirk of San Antonio will serve as chair of the Governor's Commission for Women.

"Ann has an excellent track record," Clements said. "She is well known and widely respected for her organizational skills and her ability to work with people."

Quirk served as executive director of the 1987 Texas Inaugural Committee, coordinating activities for the inauguration of Governor Clements and Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby. She has served as chair and president of the Texas Lyceum, and currently chairs the organization's Nominating Committee. Quirk was also a member of the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission for eight years and its chair in 1983.

The Women's Commission has many responsibilities, among them the duty of examining women's issues and submitting a report on its findings, activities and recommendations. The panel will also identify qualified women for consideration by the Governor for gubernatorial appointments.

Governor Clements, who continued the Commission in the first Executive Order of his second administration, has also appointed to the organization 28 other outstanding women from across the state. All 29 members shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor for a two-year term. The first meeting of the group will take place in early May. Ann Wallace, Director of the Governor's Office of Community Leadership/Volunteer Services, will serve as executive director of the Commission.

VOLUNTEERS AROUND THE STATE

From El Paso ...

The Volunteer Bureau of the United Way, directed by Cynthia Gongaware, and a local newspaper co-sponsor TIPS-Teens in Public Service, a program designed to increase the role of teenagers in the volunteer community. Through this program, teens receive recognition for their volunteer efforts in the newspaper and at an awards assembly at their school. What a great way to motivate young people to become active volunteers!

From Longview and Tyler...

The Volunteer Centers of Longview and Tyler, under the direction of Mae Dufour and Susan Sweatman, along with the Junior Leagues of Longview and Tyler and the television station KLTV, have been working well together as co-sponsors of the Volunteer Connection, a media-based project to recruit volunteers. This program, which piloted in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area in 1984, has been operating in Longview and Tyler since October. This partnership with the media has provided the centers with publicity in the form of television public service announcements.

The Volunteer Center of Longview also sponsors a program called "We Care," which provides telephone reassurance for the elderly.

From Dallas...

The Volunteer Connection has been a very successful project for the Volunteer Center. For three years, KXAS-TV/Channel 5 and other media sources have been working with the Volunteer Center to advertise volunteer services as well as specific volunteer jobs available at over 500 non-profit agencies.

According to Director Julie Thomas, the Center is also working with the Dallas County Probation Department to provide restitution opportunities for probationers. This positive program matches probationers who have been ordered to participate in community service by the courts with cooperative agencies where they may complete their required hours.

From Austin...

Marge Tripp, Director of the Volunteer Center, reported on a great new program that helps disabled citizens resume an active role within the community. This program finds volunteer opportunities for disabled persons who have reached a level of recovery which permits them to leave their sheltered environment.

The Volunteer Center has also established a Retiree Roundtable in order to recruit retirees into volunteering. Representatives from corporate and public retiree organizations meet regularly with the Volunteer Center to discuss means of reaching new volunteers. Using the resources of the Volunteer Center, the retiree organizations communicate the volunteer openings to their members and encourage their involvement.

From Odessa...

Volunteer Center Director Arleene Loyd reports that a survey of non-profits in Odessa is currently being done by a marketing class at the University of Texas at Permian Basin. Be sure to let us know of the results... The major fundraising event for the center—the Annual Benefit Golf Tournament— was held on April 3 in Odessa

From the Coastal Bend...

A variety of businesses are receiving valuable guidance from the Volunteer Center directed by Gilna Nance. The center has been promoting voluntarism among employees as well as providing management consultation to non-profit staff and volunteers.

From Tarrant County...

The Volunteer Center of Metropolitan Tarrant County, directed by Nancy Saenz, will be celebrating National Volunteer Week in grand style. For starters, there will be a proclamation of National Volunteer Week by over 25 of the county's 37 mayors. In addition, free certificates and volunteer logo pins will be available at a minimum cost to agencies for recognizing volunteers. Let's all join in the celebration of this important week!

From McAllen...

According to Director Jenny Cummings, the Volunteer Center has been hosting all sorts of fun-filled activities within the community including a Sports-A-Thon held with the Hildalgo County Youth Village, a Celebrity Auction and a Picnic in the Park benefiting McAllen House, a home for delinquent youths.

From Canyon Lake ...

The Volunteer Action Center should be praised for providing comfort to so many through their programs for the aged, ill and handicapped. Volunteers provide transportation to medical appointments, make reassurance phone calls to check on elderly shut-ins and provide an adult sitter service. Director Isabelle Coons also reports the center has been promoting health awareness among citizens by offering free

blood pressure readings and a Community Education course on arthritis.

From Plano ...

The Volunteer Center has been spreading words of wisdom on Voluntarism through its Speakers Bureau. This bureau consists of representatives from the Volunteer Center who make presentations to community civic groups and organizations.

This is just a brief look at the many wonderful programs run by the Volunteer Action Centers of Texas. The talented directors and volunteers at these centers have instituted these programs to respond to the unique needs of their community.
