

The Third Annual Texas Vocational Education Awards Program — which recognizes student excellence and exemplary business/education partnerships in the state's high schools and colleges — culminated with a February 9 banquet in Austin, attended by 180 people.

Hosted by the Texas Council on Vocational Education and Vocational-Technical Education Development Foundation of Texas, the banquet honored 6 winners and 18 finalists — selected from 115 nominations — in four award categories, said William E. Zinsmeyer, a San Antonio businessman who chairs T/COVE. Tonia Cooke — news anchor at KXAN-TV in Austin and graduate of a high school vocational program — served as Master of Ceremonies.

The awards categories were "Outstanding Student," "Outstanding Special Populations Student," "Business/Labor Involve-

ment," and "Vocational Education Advisory Committee." The student awards featured separate secondary and postsecondary divisions. Articles on the winners and finalists appear throughout the newsletter.

State Board of Education Chairman Monte Hasie, Lubbock; Commissioner of Education W. N. Kirby, Austin; Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board Vice Chairman Cip Guerra, San Antonio; National Council on Vocational Education Executive Director Joyce Winterton, Washington, D.C.; and T/COVE Awards Program Chairman Shirlene Cook, Beaumont, all brought congratulatory remarks to the awards recipients.

Winners and finalists received an award

and a congratulatory letter from Governor William P. Clements. Each student winner also received a letter from President George Bush and a \$500 savings bond.

Last fall, school districts and colleges in Texas that offer vocational programs were invited to submit nominations, with the winners/finalists selected in December. Students were recognized for their academic and vocational achievements, involvement in school and community projects, and extracurricular activities. Business, labor, and advisory committees were recognized for exemplary partnerships with schools and promoting instructional excellence in effective and innovative ways.

Hanners, Henson Garner Top Secondary Vocational Education Student Awards

Jennifer Hanners, a senior Home Economics student at Dimmitt High School, and Mark Henson, a junior Vocational Adjustment Class student at Klein High School were the 1989-90 winners of the Texas Vocational Education Awards Program "Outstanding Student" and "Outstanding Special Populations Student" Awards, respectively, for secondary schools.

Hanners, a high school "Who's Who" and honor student "top ten" for each of the past four years, is president of her local chapter of the Future Homemakers of America and a regional vice president in that organization. A talented musician and singer, Jennifer — a former cheerleader — is vice president of her student body.

Henson, considered a "model student and citizen" by his teachers, has received training in a variety of disciplines including Agriculture Science and General Mechanical Trades in addition to a current on-the-job training stint at Randall's Food Chain as a part of the special education VAC program. Mark plays on his school's football team and is active in the FFA.

Yezak, president of his local Business Professionals of America chapter, is an "A" student. He received "young scientist" awards in 1989 from the U.S. Army and Bausch and Lomb. He is also a member of the FFA. Nguyen ranks in the top two percent of her class of over 1,200. Diana — who receives on-the-job training at the HCA Medical Center in Plano — won the "national title" in laboratory assistant competition at the 1989 Health Occupations Students of America Skills Contests. She has earned outstanding student honors in English, math, and history at Plano High School.

Matthew Mamo, a senior at Oak Ridge High School in Conroe; Tonya Wiltz, a sophomore at West Brook High School in Beaumont; and Kenneth Wayne O'Neal, a Tyler High School

senior, were the finalists for the "Outstanding Special Populations Student" Award, presented to a handicapped, economically or educationally disadvantaged student.

Mamo, enrolled in a Coordinated Vocational Academic Education Building Maintenance program, is president of his local chapter of the Vocational Opportunities Career Clubs of Texas. He was instrumental in getting other school clubs — Art, Drama, FFA, and Math — involved in working with the United Way.

Wiltz, a Vocational Education for the Handicapped Food Production, Management and Services student at Beaumont ISD's Career Center, made the freshman "A-B" honor roll. Tonya has received awards in science and math and is treasurer of her local FHA chapter.

O'Neal, a CVAE Food Production, Management, and Services student is vice president of his local FHA/HERO chapter. Kenneth has won Gold Star awards in FHA at the national level.

Spring ISD, F.A.A. Win Top Committee, Business/Labor Awards

The Spring ISD Vocational Education Advisory Board and the Federal Aviation Administration won the 1989-90 "Vocational Education Advisory Committee" and "Business/Labor Involvement" Awards.
