During Second Annual Awards Banquet

OUTSTANDING PARTICIPANTS IN VOCATIONAL EDUCATION HONORED

The Texas Council on Vocational Education recognized outstanding secondary and postsecondary vocational education students and exemplary education/private sector involvement during an awards banquet held February 2 at

the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Austin.

The winners and finalists in the six categories, selected from nominations from public school districts. community colleges, and techniinstitutes throughout Texas, were honored for their achievements in vocational education by approximately 220 attendants at the banquet.

Student winners and finalists were selected for excellence exhibited in classroom

and on-the-job performance, involvement in school and community service activities and leadership abilities. The Business/Labor and Advisory Committee nominees were judged on their assistance to schools in planning and implementing programs, curriculum, and instruction, modernizing equipment and facilities, and providing career guidance, training, internships, and job

placement.

The program began with slide/audio show which introduced the awards recipients to the audience. Each of the winners and finalists received a framed certificate of award and a personal letter of congratulations from Texas Governor William P. Clements. Also, the winners and finalists were presented official copies of House Resolution Number 47, sponsored by State

Representative Robert Earley of Portland, recognizing the awards program. A Senate Resolution was sponsored by Senator Bill Sims of San Angelo. Many state legislators provided letters of congratulations for the winners and finalists from their district.

In addition, the five student winners were presented with a letter of congratulations from the President of the United States, George Bush.

Media personality Cactus Pryor served as Master of Ceremonies for the event. Chairman of the State Board of Education Monte Hasie and Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board Vice Chairman Cipriano Guerra brought greetings from their respective boards.

During the ceremony, State Representative Bill Carter and Bobby Weathers, President of the Vocational-Technical Education Development Foundation, assisted Council members in presenting the awards for the evening.

The awards program was established to publicly recognize those individuals who have responded to the call for excellence in the classroom to meet the growing and changing demands of the Texas marketplace. ####

Outstanding Student in Vocational Education (Secondary)

Outstanding Postsecondary Special Populations Student

After escaping a physically abusive relationship with her ex-husband, Christine began course work at Austin Community College (ACC) in the fall of 1987 as a single parent with little money and no training. Today as a sophomore, Christine is earning her Associate of Applied Science Degree in Human Services and maintains a 3.8 GPA. She has been an enthusiastic and committed volunteer in a number of settings. Christine has helped with the ACC Women's Center, assisting other returning women students. In a television program for the Center, she was interviewed as an example of a woman student who has achieved success in her college and professional goals. Also, Christine has been a legal volunteer for the Austin Battered Women's Center, accompanying women to court who are seeking protective restraining orders or divorces. Because of her strong commitment, the Battered Women's Center selected her to attend the Texas Council on Family Violence Conference. As part of an internship, Christine served as a volunteer at the Pebble Project, a child abuse prevention center, where she gave classroom presentations on sexual assault to children at the K-12 level. She has been very active in her daughter's education and was given the "Parent's Volunteer Award" by her daughter's school.

The General Motors Training Center (GMTC)-Dallas received the "Exemplary Business/ Labor Involvement Award" for its commitment to developing a model industry/education partnership in automotive training with Brookhaven College in Dallas, San Jacinto College in Pasadena, St. Philip's College in San Antonio, and numerous school districts throughout Texas. The Training Center offers these institutions the General Motors Automotive Service Educational Program, which prepares students to become entry-level technicians in General Motors dealerships throughout the State. General Motors dealerships sponsor all students accepted into the program from their point of entry into college until graduation when they are employed as full-time technicians. Aside from offering many instructional opportunities for students, GMTC-Dallas has assimilated a cooperative work experience into the program. Paired with dealer technicians, students are able to work for four ten-week periods, alternating with class instruction. The General Motors Training Center-Dallas sponsors various orientation sessions, and provides late-model vehicles for instructional use, special tools needed for instructional training support, all technical service bulletins and other General Motors publications involving GM service information, and "carte blanche" access to the Training Center for their automotive instructor update training. Accepting the award, on behalf of GMTC, is Bill Szelag and Mike Deanovich.

1989 Exemplary Vocational Education Advisory Committee

The Corrosion Technology Advisory Committee for Kilgore College in Kilgore received the "Exemplary Vocational Education Advisory Committee Award" for designing, implementing, and continuously fine tuning the first Corrosion Technology Associate Degree in the country. The Committee has worked to develop a four year degree program in which the two years of the Corrosion Technology program at Kilgore College are teamed in a "2 + 2" articulation structure with courses at the University of Texas at Tyler. In support of the program at Kilgore, the Committee has helped design curriculum, develop laboratories for instruction, and has been instrumental in getting needed equipment and supplies. It has established a scholar-ship fund for students majoring in Corrosion Technology and has played an active role in placement of students, in both summer internships and permanent employment. To inform high school students of the educational opportunities in corrosion technology at Kilgore, the Committee developed a student outreach campaign. Accepting the award is Nahum Tate, Committee Chairman.
