

- Fourth Annual Awards Banquet Theme

The Fourth Annual Texas Vocational Education Awards Program — which recognizes student excellence and exemplary business/education partnerships in the state's high schools and colleges — culminated with a March 9 banquet in Austin, attended by 236 people.

Hosted by the Texas Council on Vocational Education and Vocational-Technical Education Development Foundation of Texas, the banquet honored 8 winners and 24 finalists — selected from 115 nominations — in five award categories, said William E. Zinsmeyer, a San Antonio businessman who chairs T/COVE. Tonia Cooke — news anchor at KXAN-TV in Austin and graduate of a high school vocational program — served as Master of Ceremonies.

The awards categories were "Outstanding Student," "Outstanding Special Achievement Student," "Outstanding Non-Traditional

Student," "Business/Labor Involvement," and "Vocational Education Advisory Committee." The student awards featured separate secondary and postsecondary divisions, except for the non-traditional awards. Articles on the winners and finalists appear throughout the newsletter.

Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board member Larry Jenkins, Austin; State Board of Education member Will Davis, Austin; and T/COVE Chair Zinsmeyer brought congratulatory remarks to the awards recipients.

Winners and finalists received an award and a congratulatory letter from Governor Ann Richards. Student winners also received a letter from President George Bush. Savings bonds were presented to the student winners.

Last fall, school districts and colleges in Texas that offer vocational programs were invited to submit nominations, with the winners/finalists selected in February. Students were recognized for their academic and vocational achievements, involvement in school and community projects, and extracurricular activities. Business, labor, and advisory committees were recognized for partnerships with schools and promoting instructional excellence.

Kucherka, Arredondo Selected as Top Secondary Vocational Students

Diana Kucherka, a senior Office Administrative Systems student at Seguin High School, and Norma Arredondo, a junior at Fabens High School who attends Office Education classes at the El Paso ISD Technical High School were the 1990-91 winners of the Texas Vocational Education Awards Program "Outstanding Student" and "Outstanding Special Achievement Student" Awards, respectively, for secondary schools.

Kucherka, an honors student, carries an overall "A" average and ranks in the top ten percent of her senior class. She is state historian for the Business Professionals of America

Finalists for the secondary division outstanding student award were: Brent Allmon, a junior Health Occupations student at Westfield High School, Spring ISD, Houston; F. Garrett Condel, IV, a senior Drafting student at MacArthur High School, North East ISD, San Antonio; and DeLeah Lockridge, a junior Health Occupations student at Waco High School.

Arredondo, who was told four years ago that she could never do anything in life because she is only three feet tall with fingers no more than one inch long, has learned to type better than 60 words per minute with


