

# **TOP LEADERS SET FOR CONFERENCE**

Outstanding leaders in business/industry, government, and education are lined up and ready to take part in the "Business and Industry Speak" statewide conference February 12-13 in Austin. Participants will take part in both the general sessions and the seminars.

General session participants from the private sector include Jack Miller, president of Sanger-Harris Company; Maurice Frasier of Motorola; Chuck Nielson of Texas Instruments; Mike Shapiro of Belo Broadcasting Corporation; and Diane Sullivan of Rockwell International.

Government officials scheduled for the general sessions include Daniel Dunham, Deputy Commissioner of Education, and Charles Knapp, Assistant Deputy Secretary of Labor, both from Washington D. C.; Thomas Westfall, Mayor of El Paso; and Bill Clayton, speaker of the House of Representatives. include Alton O. Bowen, Commissioner of Education; David Alders, president of Texas Future Farmers of America; Beatrice Reubens of Columbia University; Joe Kelly Butler, chairman of the State Board of Education; and Charles Whiteside, president of the Texas Association of School Boards.

Registration for the conference begins at 11:00 a.m., February 12, in the Austin Municipal Auditorium, and adjournment will be at 2:00 p.m. on February 13. During this time, there will be four general sessions (including two meal functions), and two sessions of the 12 seminars on employment by career clusters.

LABOR DEPARTMENT PROJECTIONS AVAILABLE--To assist educational planners and vocational counselors, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has prepared their latest <u>Occupational Projections</u> and Training Data.

The 119-page booklet is an effort to relate future job openings in 291 occupations with expected entrants into these fields. It also provides information on enrollments in public vocational programs.
