A TEXAS GIANT IS GONE. Standing only a bit over five feet, Margaret Harper was nevertheless a genuine giant in the Texas travel industry. At age 80, Margaret died November 16 in Amarillo. She leaves a record of 26 annual seasons of the largest outdoor drama in the United States, the "TEXAS" production in Palo Duro Canyon. It was Margaret who conceived the idea for an outdoor drama in Palo Duro, and who persuaded Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright Paul Green to write the rousing, colorful production that is seen by more than 100,000 people each summer. She received abundant honors from her peers, and those fortunate enough to have known Margaret personally speak in superlatives - "enthusiastic, witty, dedicated, genuine, untiring, and always gracious." She



personally hosted dignitaries including congressmen, governors, and foreign diplomats — clambering up and down the rocks of the huge stage set. Among her favorite "dignitaries" were young travel counselors from our Texas Travel Information Centers. "They're so enthusiastic," said Margaret — the same word others always used about her.

So a Texas giant is gone, but just think what Margaret Harper will be able to do with the kind of cast and set she has to work with now. TWO POPULAR TEXAS DESTINATIONS will be among outstanding RV vacation destinations featured on the Nashville Network's "Going Our Way," the only nationally televised RV travel show. Now in its second season, the show averages more than half a million viewers each week as it follows country music star Jim Ed Brown and his wife Becky traveling coast to coast in a variety of recreational vehicles. A telegraph operator and former nurse in Butte, Montana, she had stopped en route to Florida to visit the famous cattleman who bore the same surname. Corrinne found him seriously ill and stayed to nurse him back to health, before becoming his bride.

NEW TxDOT COMMISSIONERS. Gov. Ann Richards appointed three members to the Texas Transportation Commission created by the 72nd Legislature. Named to the Commission are David E. Bernsen of Beaumont, Henry R. Muñoz, III, of San Antonio, and Raymon C. Stoker, Jr., of Odessa. Governor Richards also designated Stoker to serve as Chairman of the Commission. Stoker will serve a two-year term expiring Feb. 1, 1993; Muñoz will serve a four-year term expiring Feb. 1, 1995, and Bernsen's six-year term will expire Feb. 1, 1997. The Texas Transportation Commission replaces the former Texas Highway and Public Transportation Commission.





FISHING AND BOATING ENTHUSIASTS are enjoying water activities at West Texas' new O. H. Ivie Reservoir. The 4,300-acre lake is about 80 miles south of Abilene. Both the Concho and Padgitt Recreation Areas provide boat ramps, but anglers shouldn't expect to land many lunkers since the lake was stocked only late last year.



The target date of May 21, 1992, for the opening of the new Hummel Museum in New Braunfels took another step toward reality November 4 with the acquisition of a substantial portion of the First Federal Savings and Loan Building.
