ADDENDUM A ORGANIZATION OF THE TEXAS ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE COMMISSION (458) For the Fiscal Year Ended August 31, 2018

Created as the Texas Liquor Control Board by H.B. 77, 44th Legislature, 2nd Called Session (1935), this Commission was organized and began functioning on November 16, 1935. The Texas Liquor Control Board remained the Commission's name until January 1, 1970, when H.B. 379, 61st Legislature, Regular Session (1969), became effective, re-designating its title to Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (the Commission).

The Commission is charged with the administration and enforcement of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Code. As described in Title 2, Chapter 5, Subchapter B of the Alcoholic Beverage Code, the powers and duties of the Commission are as follows:

"Sec. 5.31. GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES. The Commission may exercise all powers, duties and functions conferred by this code, and all powers incidental, necessary, or convenient to the administration of this code. It shall inspect, supervise, and regulate every phase of the business of manufacturing, importing, exporting, transporting, storing, selling, advertising, labeling and distributing alcoholic beverages, and the possession of alcoholic beverages for the purpose of sale or otherwise. It may prescribe and publish rules necessary to carry out the provisions of this code."

Article IX, Section 5.09 of the Appropriations Act adopted by the 83nd Legislature authorizes per diem for Commission members consisting of compensatory per diem at \$30 per day; actual expenses for meals and lodging at the rates specified in the Act for state employees; and transportation reimbursement at the rates specified in the Act for state employees.



The Deputy Executive Director for Business & Revenue Operations oversees the agency's revenue generating divisions—Licensing, Tax & Marketing Practices, Ports of Entry, Education & Prevention-- and it's Training Division. Key Service efforts and accomplishments for each of these divisions are described below.

LICENSING DIVISION

The Licensing Division investigates and processes applications for all phases of the alcoholic beverage industry, including the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, storage, and distribution of alcoholic beverages. The division must ensure that each applicant qualifies to hold such license/permit and adheres to all applicable regulatory requirements. Over the course of FY 2018, the Licensing Division processed a total of 90,872 original, renewal, and supplemental applications and issued a total of 76,105 licenses and permits. The state revenue from agency licensing fees and surcharges was approximately \$70,096,923.

TAX & MARKETING PRACTICES DIVISION

The agency's Tax & Marketing Practices Division consists of three units— Excise Tax Reporting, Marketing Practices, and Label Approvals & Chemical Analyses.

Excise Tax Reporting

The Excise Tax Reporting unit is responsible for processing and reviewing excise tax payments and reports as well as other reports that are periodically due from members of the wholesale and manufacturing tiers of the alcoholic beverage industry. In FY 2018, assigned personnel processed \$236,426,959 in gross excise tax revenues and reviewed 61,911 tax and non-tax reports during the fiscal year. These reviews were conducted to verify the accuracy of the reports received and resulted in the collection of \$187,645 in tax underpayments and late fees.

Marketing Practices

The Marketing Practices Section aids in the enforcement of laws regulating the marketing of alcoholic beverage products and marketing relationships among alcoholic beverage retailers, wholesalers, and manufacturers. During FY 2018, as part of her duties, the Marketing Practices Supervisor reviewed 492 advertising proposals submitted by various members of the alcoholic beverage industry and approved 312 of those proposals.

Label Approvals & Chemical Analyses

This unit processes and approves applications for product label approval and conducts product chemical testing as required for evidentiary purposes. During FY 2018, agency personnel reviewed and took action on product label applications as follows:

PORTS OF ENTRY DIVISION

Personnel of the Ports of Entry Division monitor compliance with the personal importation laws of the State of Texas along the Texas-Mexico border and at cruise ship terminals in Galveston. Taxpayer compliance officers with the program verify that persons importing alcoholic beverages meet all legal requirements regarding importation for personal consumption and collect the appropriate fees and taxes due. Through an agreement with the Comptroller of Public Accounts, Ports of Entry personnel are also responsible for determining compliance with the state laws governing the personal importation of cigarettes and the collection of any taxes due on these importations.

During Fiscal Year 2018, Ports of Entry taxpayer compliance officers stamped and collected taxes and fees for 2,262,637 alcoholic beverage and cigarette containers. In the course of these duties, tax compliance officers also disallowed and observed the destruction of 16,194 alcoholic beverage and cigarette containers that were determined to have been imported in violation of state law. The containers were disallowed for the following reasons: Attempted importations by persons under 21 years of age, attempted importations by intoxicated persons, importations in excess of the legal limits, refusal to pay the taxes and fees owed on the alcoholic beverage and/or tobacco products imported, or when the product is illegally packaged or otherwise illicit.

Also during FY 2018, Ports of Entry taxpayer compliance officers conducted a short-term pilot test at Austin-Bergstrom International (ABI) Airport to test methods and to gather data for a possible expansion of the Ports of Entry program to international flights arriving at the state's major airports. While pilot test results were positive, an expansion of the nature contemplated would require additional staffing and could not be undertaken without legislative support. Consequently, no action beyond the pilot test has been undertaken by the agency.

Program staffing is currently maintained through seven Ports of Entry district offices, which, in turn, monitor 28 international crossings along the Texas-Mexico border and 2 cruise ship terminals servicing Galveston Bay. Personnel are assigned to the Galveston Seaport and 21 major border crossings. The remaining 7 border crossings are either strictly commercial/commuter traffic or considered low-volume and are monitored on a random basis to determine if traffic volume has increased and if full time staffing is warranted.

ADDENDUM C.1 CONTINUED

Employees collect an administrative fee of \$3.00 per container on personal importations of alcoholic beverages in addition to the excise taxes due on the alcoholic beverages imported. This administrative fee totaled \$5,565,744 for the 2018 fiscal year. Total gross revenue for the fiscal year from all fees and taxes collected for the personal importation of alcoholic beverages and cigarettes was \$7,357,936.

EDUCATION & PREVENTION DIVISION

The agency's Education & Prevention Division consists three operating units—Grants, Program Development, and Seller Training,

<u>Grants</u>

The Grants section finds, secures, and manages grant funding for the agency's law enforcement, public information, and prevention education initiatives. During FY 2018, the Grants section developed and submitted five grant proposals, secured \$615,981.33 in awards as a result of two of those proposals, and oversaw \$548,839.94 in spending for grant related programs.

Program Development

The Program Development section creates the materials and curriculum used in the agency's public information/education initiatives. In FY 2018, 65 different promotional and educational items were created which resulted in 406,623 pieces being distributed statewide.

Seller Training

The Seller Training section oversees the activities of 68 private seller/server training schools that provide agency approved instruction to retail clerks and servers. In FY 2018, unit personnel reviewed and approved six new seller training programs, licensed or relicensed 28 training entities, and oversaw the delivery of instruction to 417,322 Texas retail clerks and servers. FY 2018 revenues from the agency's seller training program totaled to \$849,850.

TRAINING DIVISION

The Training Division is responsible for enhancing the professionalism within the agency by providing ongoing training and education to all employees. All employees are encouraged to participate in a wide variety of courses ranging from customer service training to legislatively mandated law enforcement classes.

The Deputy Executive Director for Enforcement oversees the operation of the agency's Law Enforcement Division and its Special Investigations & Financial Crimes Unit.

LAW ENFORCEMENT DIVISION

The Law Enforcement Division is agency's largest and most visible operating unit. Staffing consists of a Chief of Law Enforcement, five majors, and 218 additional commissioned peace officers. The division's primary mission is to detect and deter administrative and criminal violations which can occur licensed premises that pose a threat to the safety of patrons and the general public.

Organizational Structure

For the purposes of law enforcement operations, the LE Division has divided the state into five regions. Each region is supervised by a major who oversees all law enforcement operations within the region. Two or more lieutenants, a number of sergeants, and in some regions, a captain assist the major in the day-to-day management of regional operations.

Other personnel are assigned to each region on the basis of need, with need largely defined by the number of licensed premises located within the geographic confines of the region.

Listed below are the agency's Law Enforcement Regions, the counties that are served by each, and the offices from which those counties are served.

Region 1 - Lubbock

Enforcement Agent Activities in FY 2018

During the course of FY 2018, enforcement agents conducted 68,752 inspections in order to verify compliance with the state's alcoholic beverage laws. Of these, 16,181 were either minor stings or some other form of undercover operation, and more than half (35,601) targeted priority locations, retailers that were either within the first two years of operation, or that were, at the time of the inspection, the subject of an investigation involving allegations of public safety offenses, or that had a history of past public safety offenses. In addition to inspections, agency enforcement personnel also conducted and completed 5,909 complaint investigations involving 9,018 alleged violations of state alcoholic beverage laws. The allegations investigated came from the general public, elected officials, other public agencies, law enforcement agencies, agency licensees, and even the agency's own employees.

Administrative Enforcement Actions Initiated By Enforcement Agents in FY 2018

Enforcement agents issued 476 warnings, initiated 39 protests of original or renewal license applications, and filed 2,193 cases for administrative violations of the Alcoholic Beverage Code in FY 2018. Of the cases filed, 1,932 have been docketed to date (October 15, 2018). Of the docketed cases, 94 cases are yet to be resolved and 658 have been "restrained" as per the requirements of Section 106.14 of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Code. As for the remainder, 1,122 have resulted in suspension of licensing privileges or payment of civil penalties in lieu of suspension, 23 have resulted in cancellation, and 35 were dismissed. Civil penalty payments received to date as a consequence of the administrative cases filed by Enforcement agents in FY 2018 total to \$1,544,400.

Criminal Enforcement Actions Initiated By Enforcement Agents in FY 2018

Enforcement agents issued 231 criminal warnings in FY 2018 and filed 1,684 criminal cases.

FY 2018 Still Seizures

Enforcement agents seized two stills in FY 2018.

The first still was seized on December 14, 2017, in Williamson County and had a cooker capacity of 10 gallons. In addition to the still, five gallons of mash were seized and destroyed at the site, and approximately one gallon of moonshine whiskey was confiscated and then destroyed at a later date.

The second still seizure occurred on June 26, 2018, in Cherokee County. The seized still, which was inactive at the time of the seizure, had a cooker capacity of approximately 4 gallons. While no mash was found at the site, 0.72 gallons of moonshine whiskey was confiscated and later destroyed.

SPECIAL INVESTIGATIONS & FINANCIAL CRIMES UNIT

Twenty-nine peace officers and an analyst are assigned to the agency's Special Investigations and Financial Crimes Unit (SIU/FCU). SIU/FCU personnel are strategically stationed in various agency offices across the state and work together, often in conjunction with local, federal, and other state law enforcement agencies, to investigate allegations of organized criminal activity with a nexus to the alcoholic beverage industry.

The SIU/FCU team reports to a Major, who in turn reports directly to the Chief of Law Enforcement.

SIU/FCU Law Enforcement Activities

In FY 2018, SIU/FCU investigators completed and closed 158 long-term investigations involving allegations of drug trafficking, human trafficking, money laundering, and street gang control of licensed businesses, and in conjunction with local, state, and federal law enforcement partners, conducted 718 joint operations to gather evidence and execute warrants, with the majority of the activities occurring in Texas counties bordering Mexico and/or the Inter-coastal waterway.

ADDENDUM C.2 CONTINUED

Administrative Enforcement Actions Initiated by SIU/FCU in FY 2018

In FY 2018, SIU/FCU law enforcement personnel issued two warnings, initiated 4 protests of pending license applications, and filed 103 administrative cases for violations of the alcoholic beverage code observed and documented during the course of their investigations and joints operations. To date (October 15, 2018), seven of the administrative cases filed by SIU/FCU investigators in FY 2018 have resulted in license cancellations. The others remain open pending final disposition.

Criminal Enforcement Actions Initiated by SIU/FCU in FY 2018

SIU/FCU investigators filed 23 criminal cases in FY 2018, most involving felony offenses such as money laundering and the sell or possession of narcotics or other dangerous drugs.

ADDENDUM C.3 SERVICE EFFORTS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS – CHIEF OF STAFF For the Fiscal Year Ended August 31, 2018

The agency's Chief of Staff, who is also a Deputy Executive Director, oversees the operation of the Audit & Investigations Division and most of the agency's support services divisions, including Business Services, Innovation & Technology, Human Resources, and Policy & Performance.

AUDIT & INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

Agency auditors conduct tax, financial, and investigative audits; inspections of licensed and proposed licensed locations; and applicant interviews during the initial phases of the licensing process. They also monitor cash law and credit law compliance, deal with local marketing practices issues, and often assist enforcement agents with their investigations. In addition, Auditors are also in large part responsible for the delivery of the agency's educational programs for licenses and permittees, high school and college students, and the general public. In addition, auditors manage the seized liquor and evidence rooms in agency field offices.

Organizational Structure – Audit & Investigations Division

Audit operations are managed by the Director of the Audit & Investigations Division, aided by an Assistant Director, and five Regional Audit Supervisors.

The Regional Audit Supervisors oversee division activities in their respective regions. As seen below, these regions cover the same geographic areas as the agency's Law Enforcement regions, and auditors share many of the same offices occupied by the agency's enforcement agents. At the end of FY 2018, there were 48 budgeted field auditor positions, and they were allocated to the various the regions based on the geographic distribution of auditable accounts and other licensed businesses.

In addition, to the auditors who work under the direction of regional audit supervisors, there is also a specialized six auditor Marketing Investigations Unit (MIU) that investigates complaints involving three tier violations within the alcoholic beverage industry. These investigations are often highly complex and involve in depth analysis of accounting and financial records, contracts, and related business records. The unit includes a supervisor/team lead who reports directly to the Director of Auditing & Investigations.

Auditor Activities

Auditors perform a wide range of activities to fulfill the division's goals. During FY 2018, auditors conducted 25,110 inspections of licensed or proposed licensed locations, performed 1,575 audits, and recovered \$33,114 in delinquent fees and taxes. In addition, auditors also provided information or instruction related to the Alcoholic Beverage Code to 60,912 persons.

Auditor Administrative Enforcement Actions

During the course of their duties in FY 2018, auditors issued 1,603 administrative warnings and filed 334 administrative cases for various violations of the Alcoholic Beverage Code and Rules. 177 of the administrative cases filed by auditors in FY 2018 have been docketed to date (October 15, 2018). Of the docketed cases, ten cases are yet to be resolved and one has been "restrained" as per the requirements of Section 106.14 of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Code. As for the remainder, 159 have resulted in suspension of licensing privileges or payment of civil penalties in lieu of suspension, five have resulted in cancellation, and two were dismissed. Civil penalty payments received to date as a consequence of the administrative cases filed by auditors in FY 2018 total to \$148,700.

BUSINESS SERVICES DIVISION

The Business Services Division (BSD) is responsible for all fiscal operations of the agency, including revenue processing, accounts payable, payroll, time and leave accounting, maintenance of the general ledger, research and planning, as well as preparation and oversight of the agency's legislative appropriations request, annual financial report, and performance reports. Other responsibilities assigned to the division include purchasing, contract management, coordination of the agency's historically underutilized business (HUB) program, management of the agency's property inventory, facilities leasing, and mail center operations

The division is managed by a Director with the aid of an Assistant Director and has a staff of 24, including the three managers.

In FY 2018, Business Services personnel processed almost \$318 million in revenue and expenditures totaling to more than \$49.3 million.

INNOVATION & TECHNOLOGY DIVISION

The Innovation & Technology Division (ITD) develops and maintains the agency's core technology applications and infrastructure. It is also charged with the responsibility of identifying new technologies that might solve existing and future agency business problems and determining how those new technologies can be best applied. The division has 22 budgeted positions, including its Director and Assistant Director.

In FY 2018, ITD personnel assisted with the implementation of DocuSign's web based digital signature solution, outsourced the printing of Licenses/Permits to the State of Texas Data Center Service Print Mail contractor, and assisted with the redesign of the award winning <u>2young2drink.com</u> website.

HUMAN RESOURCES DIVISION

The Human Resources Division (HRD) manages employment-related activities, including recruitment, selection, benefits and compensation, employee relations, classification, risk management, and implementation of the agency's equal employment opportunity program, and also ensures compliance with HR-related reporting requirements. The division has a staff of seven, including its director.

During FY 2018, HRD oversaw the hiring of 108 new agency employees, facilitated the departure (voluntary or otherwise) of 80 employees, and processed 21 Workers' Compensation Claims. Its personnel also participated in the development and delivery of employee training programs involving specific HR topics

OFFICE OF POLICY & PERFORMANCE

The Office of Policy & Performance reports to the Chief of Staff and provides advice, analysis, and recommendations to TABC leadership to improve the agency's efficiency and performance. The office also plans and manages strategic agency projects requiring cross-divisional collaboration and oversees development and periodic review of agency policies and procedures. In FY 2018, the Office of Policy & Performance managed the agency's Sunset review and made a multitude of recommendations to TABC leadership, such as improvements to the agency's planning, coordination, and communication processes.

OFFICE OF THE GENERAL COUNSEL

The General Counsel provides legal advice related to agency business to the agency's commissioners and executive team, oversees the development and adoption of administrative rules and administrative rule revisions, manages the agency's response to open records requests, and directs the operation of the TABC's Legal Services Division. The Office of the General Counsel is based at the agency's Austin headquarters and consists of the General Counsel, a Deputy General Counsel, two additional attorneys and three legal assistants.

LEGAL SERVICES DIVISION

The Legal Services Division is responsible for negotiation, preparation and prosecution of contested administrative cases that are not settled by Field Enforcement, Auditing, and Licensing Supervisors. The Division also reviews protests submitted and provides legal advice regarding the Alcoholic Beverage Code and Rules to local county and municipal authorities, members of the industry and the general public.

Legal Services personnel are stationed at the agency's Austin headquarters and in its Houston and Arlington regional offices. In addition to a Deputy General Counsel, the division's staff consists of eight attorneys, three legal assistants, and one legal secretary.

A summary of the contested administrative cases and protests referred to the Legal Services Division in FY 2018 is found on the following page.

ADDENDUM C.5 SERVICE EFFORTS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS – EXECUTUVE DIVISION OFFICES For the Fiscal Year Ended August 31, 2018

Three specialized offices within the Executive Division report directly to the agency's Executive Director, and in the case of the Office of the Inspector General, report both to the TABC's Commissioners and to the Executive Director. In addition to the Office of the Inspector General, these include the Office of Communications and Governmental Relations and the Office for External Affairs.

OFFICE OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL

The Mission of the Office of the Inspector General (OIG), formerly the Office of Professional Responsibility (OPR) is to detect and prevent fraud, waste and abuse as well as to promote efficient and effective use of public resources in order to safeguard public trust in our agency.

The OIG is led by the Inspector General (IG). The directorate is comprised of the office of Internal Affairs (IA) and the newly established office of Oversight & Review (O&R). § 5.58 of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Code specifies the powers and duties of IA.

Throughout FY 2018 IA received a total of 79 complaints against agency personnel. As of August 31, 2018, 51 of these had been closed and 28 remained open and under investigation.

The OIG provided training to the executive staff covering the topic of complex ill-structured problem solving through a formalized collaborative process. The IG works directly with the Director of Policy and Performance to improve and codify the agency's planning process.

Additionally, the OIG provided training to the executive staff covering strength, weakness, opportunity and threat (SWOT) analysis and the use of 'Futuring' to help drive strategy development.

Throughout the year the IG worked to strengthen the partnership between the commission and the Texas Department of Emergency Management (TDEM) during heavy rain and wide-spread flood events. Finally, the OIG continually strives to improve the agency's internal processes and vigilantly investigate allegations of employee misconduct.

OFFICE OF COMMUNICATIONS & GOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS

The Office of Communications and Governmental Relations includes three employees who interact with the media, the Texas Legislature, Governor's Office, and numerous other state, local, and federal agencies. The office fields information requests from reporters, legislators, and industry stakeholders including but not limited to, reports on agency activities, license application status, and fiscal notes.

During a Legislative session, the Governmental Relations Director and Legislative Liaison track any and all proposed legislation with a direct or indirect impact on the Alcoholic Beverage Code and agency operations. They ensure agency personnel are made available to testify or meet with legislators; respond to questions on legislation throughout the process, and oversee the development of analyses for legislation. During the interim, the office produces and edits a revised version of the Alcoholic Beverage Code, coordinates the production of the agency's Strategic Plan, and is involved in the development of numerous other statewide reports and activities such as the Sunset Self-Evaluation Report.

ADDENDUM C.5 CONTINUED

The office includes a Public Information Officer (PIO) who serves as the public face of the agency and is responsible for all interactions between TABC and members of the public, particularly the news media. The PIO writes, edits and publishes all agency press releases and media materials and is made available for interviews with the press across a variety of platforms such as print, broadcast and online. The PIO also oversees the agency's external communications policy and provides training on media interactions for public-facing employees.

OFFICE OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

The mission of TABC's Office of External Affairs is to ensure the agency takes a coordinated approach to appropriately engage all of its external stakeholders. External Affairs' mission is accomplished by collaborating with all divisions of the TABC to develop and execute outreach initiatives for the alcoholic beverage industry, operating as a liaison for stakeholders on agency and legislative matters, and representing the TABC at external events.

FY 2018 Highlights

- Industry Roundtables TABC began hosting meetings in various locations around Texas to bring together local alcohol industry and legislative representatives to discuss policy and process improvements.
 - Conducted 11 roundtables in 8 cities.
 - These events were attended by 171 representatives from the alcohol industry and 84 representatives from the Texas Legislature.
- Industry Newsletters TABC publishes industry articles on current events, agency initiatives, and FAQs as they arise in order to better inform industry and explain agency actions.
 - o Produced 6 industry newsletters.
- TABC Talks an education program that began in August 2018 in which a TABC division will conduct
 a live online lesson during the lunch hour each month on a topic relevant to stakeholders. Each lesson
 is recorded and placed on TABC's YouTube channel so that industry stakeholders can also view the
 lessons at their own convenience.
 - Conducted 1 lesson (August 2018).
- Human Trafficking Training Initiative TABC is training alcoholic beverage industry personnel who
 frequently enter TABC licensed and permitted locations in which human trafficking could occur. The
 training informs industry on how to identify and anonymously report suspected human trafficking
 activities.



ADDENDUM E LOCAL OPTION ELECTIONS For the Fiscal Year Ended August 31, 2018

Thirty-five (35) local option elections were held for thirty-five (35) jurisdictions in FY 2018. Twenty-nine (29) of the election issues passed. Six (6) failed to win voter approval. Of the jurisdictions holding elections, eight (8) became "wet" for the first time as a result of the elections, twenty-one (21) expanded the area of alcoholic beverage sales or authorized additional sales, and six (6) retained their previous wet/dry status. Issues for which elections were held included "the legal sale of beer and wine" (1 ea.), "the legal sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption only" (7 ea.), "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption only" (6 ea.), the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages" (18 ea.), the legal sale of mixed beverages (1 ea.), and "the legal sale of mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverage certificate holders only" (2 ea.). A summary of each election held and its outcome is provided below.

Elections Held November 7, 2017

An election was held for the City of Rogers, Bell County, on November 7, 2017, on the issue of "the legal safe of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages." The issue PASSED by a vote of 25 FOR and 7 AGAINST. The City of Rogers, Bell County, was "wet" only for the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption before the election and after the election is now "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages.

An election was held for the City of Mont Belvieu, Chambers County, on November 7, 2017, on the issue of "the legal sale of mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverage certificate holders only." The issue PASSED by a vote of 441 FOR and 90 AGAINST. The City of Mont Belvieu, Chambers County, was "wet" only for the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption before the election and after the election remains wet for such sales, while also "wet" for the sale of mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverage certificate holders.

A countywide election was held for Clay County, on November 7, 2017, for a countywide election on the issue of "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages." The issue PASSED by a vote of 726 FOR and 370 AGAINST. Clay County was "wet" in part for all alcoholic beverage sales including mixed beverage before the election and after the election is "wet" throughout for such sales, except in the City of Petrolia which remains "wet" only for the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption due to a previous municipal election.

An election was held for the City of Jolly, Clay County, on November 7, 2017, on the issue of "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages." The issue PASSED by a vote of 30 FOR and 29 AGAINST. The City of Jolly, Clay County, was "dry" for all alcoholic beverage sales before the election and after the election is now "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages.

An election was held for the City of Sachse, Collin and Dallas Counties, on November 7, 2017, on the issue of "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption." The issue PASSED by a vote of 883 FOR and 404 AGAINST. Before the election, the City of Sachse, Collin and Dallas Counties, was "wet" only for the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption and for the sale in mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverage certificate holders. After the election, the City of Sachse, Collin and Dallas Counties, is now "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption only as well as and for the sale in mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverages in restaurants by food and beverages in restaurants by food and beverages consumption only as well as and for the sale in mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverages in restaurants by food and beverages.

A countywide election was held for Collingsworth County on November 7, 2017, on the issue of "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages." The issue FAILED by a vote of 37 FOR and 42 AGAINST. The City of Savoy, Fannin County, was "dry" for all alcoholic beverage sales before the election and after the election remains "dry" for all alcoholic beverage sales.

An election was held for the City of Tioga, Grayson County, on November 7, 2017, on the issue of "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages." The issue PASSED by a vote of 46 FOR and 14 AGAINST. The City of Tioga, Grayson County was "wet" only for the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption before the election and after the election is now "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages.

An election was held for the City of Galena Park, Harris County, on November 7. 2017, on the issue of "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages." The issue FAILED by a vote of 277 FOR 488 AGAINST. The City of Galena Park, Harris County, was "dry" for all alcoholic beverage sales before the election and after the election remains "dry" for all alcoholic beverage sales.

An election was held for the former City of Houston Heights as it existed on February 19, 1918, Harris County, on November 7, 2017, on the issue of "the legal sale of mixed beverages." The issue PASSED by a vote of 1,479 FOR and 960 AGAINST. The former City of Houston Heights as it existed on February 19, 1918, Harris County, was "wet" only for the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption before the election and after the election remains "wet" for such sales while also "wet" for the sale of mixed beverages.

The issue PASSED by a vote of 106 FOR and 44 AGAINST. The City of Bangs, Brown County, was "dry" for all alcoholic beverage sales before the election and after the election is now "wet" for the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption.

An election was held for the City of New Summerfield, Cherokee County, on May 5, 2018, on the issue of "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption only." The issue PASSED by a vote of 29 FOR and 8 AGAINST. The City of New Summerfield, Cherokee County, was "wet" for the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption before the election and after the election is now "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption.

An election was held for the City of Sunnyvale, Dallas County, on May 5, 2018, on the issue of "the legal sale of mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverage certificate holders only." The issue PASSED by a vote of 1,210 FOR and 536 AGAINST. The City of Sunnyvale, Dallas County, was "wet" for the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption and after the election is now also "wet" for the sale of mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverage certificate holders.

An election was held for the City of Tom Bean, Grayson County, on May 5, 2018, on the issue of "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption only. The issue PASSED by a vote of 78 FOR and 32 AGAINST. The City of Bedias, Grimes County, was "wet" for the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption before the election and after the election is now "wet:" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption.

An election was held for the City of Keene, Johnson County, on May 5, 2018, on the issue of "the legal sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption only." The issue FAILED by a vote of 194 FOR and 516 AGAINST. The City of Keene, Johnson County, was "dry" for all alcoholic beverage sales before the election and after the election remains "dry" for all alcoholic beverage sales.

An election was held for the City of Knox City, Knox County, on May 5, 2018, on the issue of "the legal sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption only." The issue PASSED by a vote of 25 FOR and 13 AGAINST. The City of Knox City, Knox County, was, for the most part, "wet" for the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption before the election and after the election is now "wet" throughout for the sale of beer and wine for off-premises consumption.

ADDENDUM E CONTINUED

An election was held for the City of Bay City, Matagorda County, on the issue of "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages." The issue PASSED by a vote of 299 FOR and 81 AGAINST. The City of Bay City, Matagorda County, was, for the most part, "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages before the election, and after the election is "wet" throughout for such sales.

An election was held for the City of Fate, Rockwall County, on May 5, 2018, on the issue of "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages." The issue PASSED by a vote of 494 FOR and 200 AGAINST. Before the election, the City of Fate, Rockwall County, was "wet" for the sale of beer and wine off-premises consumption and the sale of mixed beverages in restaurants by food and beverage certificate holders only, and after the election it is now "wet" for the sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages.
