It shall be the duty of the legislature to provide for collecting, arranging and safely keeping such records, rolls, correspondence, and other documents, civil and military, relating to the history of Texas, as may be now in possession of parties willing to confide them to the care and preservation of the State.—Constitution of Texas, Article 16, Section 45.

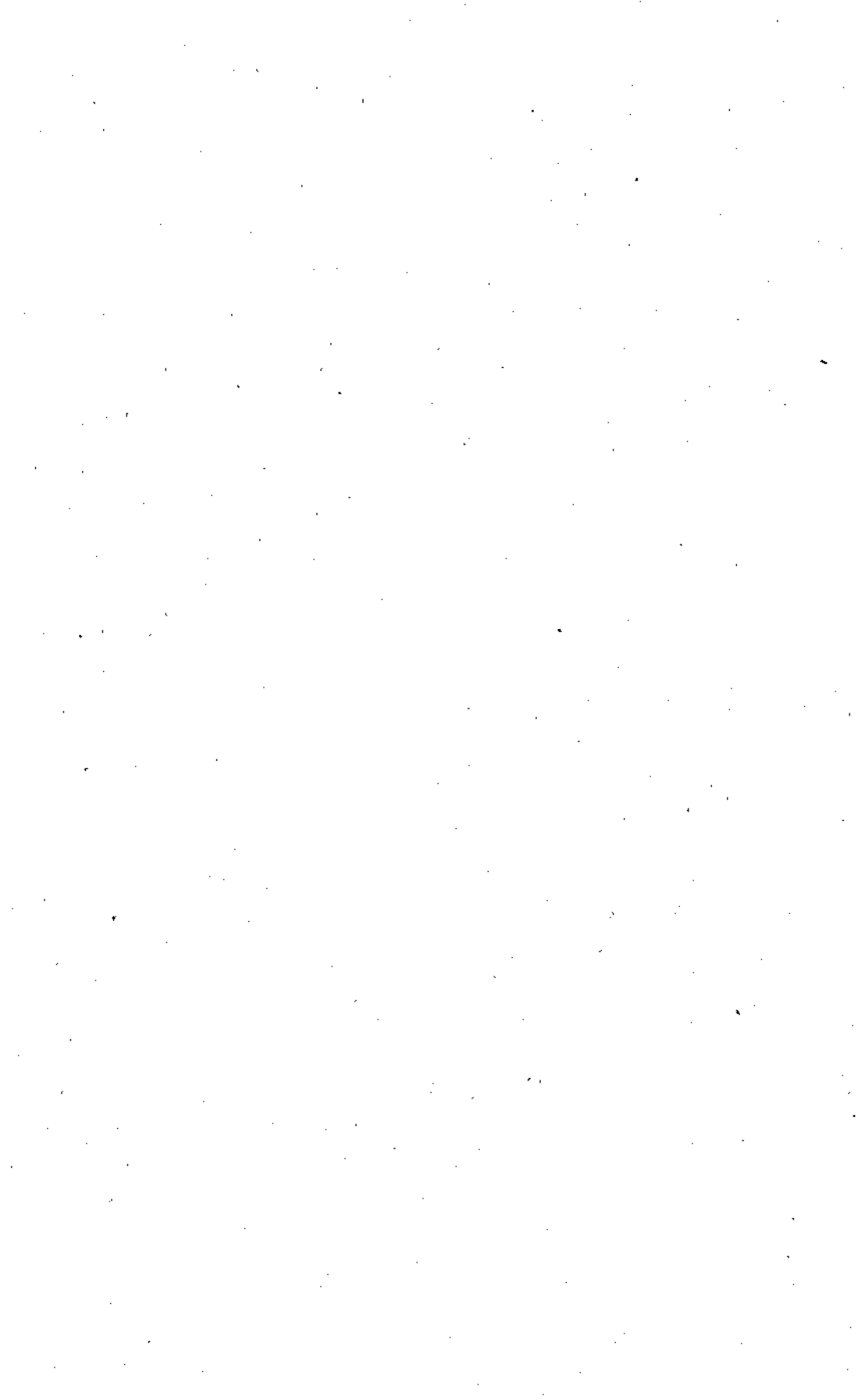

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS

His Excellency, Hon. O. B. Colquitt, Governor of Texas.

DEAR SIR: In obedience to Article 5609, Revised Civil Statutes, 1911, we have the honor to submit to you the second biennial report of the Library and Historical Commission.

DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION.

The law governing the Library and Historical Commission may be summarized as follows:

- (1) To control and administer the State Library.
- (2) To encourage historical work and research.
- (3) To collect, classify and publish the historical archives.
- (4) To aid those studying the problems to be dealt with by legislation.
- (5) To aid and encourage libraries, and
- (6) To have conducted library institutes.

This comprehensive statute combines the several different forms of State Library work under one administrative board. Owing to want of funds, some of the lines of work marked out for the Commission have not been touched. A brief statement of work accomplished during the past biennium will be found in the summary of the Commission's proceedings and in the Report of the State Librarian transmitted herewith. Particular attention is directed to the estimate of appropriations (pages 8-9) recommended for the next two years.

SUMMARY OF THE COMMISSION'S PROCEEDINGS.

Four meetings of the Library and Historical Commission were held during the period covered by this report. The last meeting of the retiring Commissioners met December 8, 1910. An order was placed for a set of the 11th edition of the *Encyclopaedia Britannica*, and the publication of Bulletin No. 1 of the Legislative Reference Section was authorized.

The new Commissioners held their first meeting February 2, 1911. Permanent organization was effected; the various standing committees were appointed; and the staff of the State Library elected. A committee was also appointed to look after the appropriations asked for the next biennium.

At the meeting on September 19, 1911, the resignation of Mr. John B. Kaiser was accepted. Miss Octavia E. Rogan, of the Rosenberg Library, Galveston, was elected Assistant Librarian and Cataloguer. Miss Elizabeth H. West, of the Division of Manuscripts in the Library of Congress, was elected Archivist. The third Thursday in March was designated as the date for the annual meeting of the Commission, required by law.

No quorum being present on March 21st, the regular annual meeting was held March 27, 1912. Resolutions on the death of Hon. Walter Tips were presented by the committee appointed at a former meeting.

Rules supplementary to those in force were submitted by the book committee and approved. The publication of the volume of archives was carefully considered, and the *Journal of the Secession Convention of Texas*, with related documents, was selected. The Commission voted to unite with the Texas State Historical Association in a petition to the senators and representatives in congress from Texas requesting proper administration and a modern archive building for the records of the federal government. A resolution was adopted inviting the co-operation of the University of Texas in establishing and maintaining the efficiency of the legislative reference division in the State Library. The University authorities have generously acceded to this request in a very liberal manner.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee on August 16, 1912, orders were placed for additional shelving for the State Library.

COMMENT ON THE APPROPRIATIONS

State Library

Salary of State Librarian.—The recommendation for an increase made in the First Biennial Report is renewed. The work of the State Library

has grown rapidly in extent and importance, as an examination of this report will show.

Salary of General Assistant.—The State Library does not need a porter, but it does need a general assistant able to do difficult tasks accurately without much supervision. Information, intelligence, reliability are prerequisites.

Gathering Historical Data.—During the past year the State Library and the Universities of Texas and California co-operated in having transcripts made of historical documents in the archives of Mexico. Each party paid one-third of the expense. Since three typewritten copies can be made for very nearly the price of one, the economy and desirability of such an arrangement is apparent. The increase asked for in this appropriation will enable the State Library to continue to participate in such an arrangement.

Legislative Reference Division

This is the first time a separate appropriation is asked for this division of the State Library's work. The work is new in Texas. An effort was made to carry it on during the Thirty-second Legislature with the regular library staff. Experience showed that unless the library staff was increased it would be impossible to continue this line of work. Through the generous co-operation of the University of Texas two persons have been furnished for this work during the session of the Thirty-third Legislature. But still the work is greatly handicapped for want of help and funds.

Before this session of the Legislature adjourns, every member will have experienced the need of accurate special information upon topics on which he will have to act. Such data never comes to hand ready made. But since it is necessary to legislation, some State agency should provide it. The Legislative Reference Division is such an agency. It is to the interest of all the people to promote good, intelligent legislation. The Legislature should provide for the systematic collection and organization of the facts upon which its acts are to be based.

Salary of Legislative Reference Librarian.—To conduct the work of this division along intelligent and efficient lines, a very competent man will be required, and the salary asked is the lowest that will secure such a person. In other States the salary ranges from \$1500 to \$5000.

Salary of Stenographer.—The necessity for a stenographer need not be argued to business men. The success of this work depends upon the volume of correspondence, compilation, copying, etc., it can handle promptly. During the session of the Legislature, and several months before, the number of stenographers and research assistants will have to be increased very considerably.

For Conducting the Legislative Reference Division.—The material required for this work is sometimes difficult to obtain, and even more difficult to administer. Numerous copies of pamphlets, magazines, reports, etc., will be required. The purchase of this material does not properly belong to the fund set apart for the purchase of books. Books are permanent acquisitions, and can be readily checked up. The material for legislative reference use is more or less temporary; the very latest superseding anything of earlier date. The purchased material must frequently be put in usable form. The legislative reference librarian of

Indiana recently said: "In a short experience of four years, I think, outside of those references to legal works, to law periodicals and law books, we have not been able to do one-tenth of our work from books or from published materials. Most of the work, the real work, which has been done by the legislative reference department has been done through work which we have prepared, which we have drawn off from the general material scattered here and there in obscure sources and from letters which we have written to experts outside. I say scarcely one-tenth, and I do not know but that is too liberal; one-tenth of the questions we have been able to answer from published material." (*Special Libraries*, September, 1912, page 147.) The legislative reference library is distinctly for the use of persons who do things. To make the facts collected available, the publication of bulletins will have to supplement the work of the stenographers.

Division of Library Extension

While one of the reasons for establishing the Library and Historical Commission was to encourage the establishment of libraries throughout the State, the Commission has never had funds with which to carry on this work. There was never greater need for this work nor better opportunity for doing good than at the present time.

There are fifty cities in Texas having a population of 4000 or over; less than half of these cities have free public libraries.

The State contributes to the maintenance of about thirty institutional libraries. Some of these libraries need attention very much; proper guidance would do much good.

During the scholastic year 1910-11 there were 9043 white country schools, and 546 independent school districts with 150 or more scholastics. Sixty-nine counties reported not one volume in school libraries; 15 reported less than 50 volumes per county; 36 reported having between 50 and 150 volumes per county. Every one of these 120 counties had insufficient facilities in the way of school libraries, and many of the schools in the counties reporting a larger total number of books were likewise handicapped.

One expects better conditions in the towns and cities, but 112 independent districts reported no library; 74 reported less than 50 volumes per district; 98 reported having between 50 and 150 volumes per district. The library facilities in over half of the independent school districts do not equal one book per child.

Salary of Assistant in Charge of Library Extension.—A trained person with experience in school and library work, with model school libraries, with a lantern and the necessary views, could do a great deal to awaken the people to the advantages of proper library facilities in city and school. By visiting teachers' institutes, cities where library campaigns are being planned, by visiting the libraries of the State institutions where help is needed, by publishing a small bulletin, and in many other ways, this person could do much to benefit the State.

Books for Traveling School Libraries.—As the schools are, perhaps, in greatest need of aid from the State, an appropriation for books for traveling school libraries is recommended. This is the most desirable, as well as the most economical, form of State aid; a better quality of books is insured, and the object lesson afforded will stimulate many schools to

provide their own libraries. Virginia and Tennessee have had very satisfactory results in this work.

Miscellaneous Items

Preparing for Press, Etc., Two Volumes of Archives.—The importance of continuing the work of publishing the archives of Texas will appeal to the thoughtful. An examination of the volume published during the past year will show that the work will be done accurately. By selling the volumes at 25 per cent above cost of printing, the State will be reimbursed in part for the amount appropriated.

Copying Rolls of Confederate Soldiers from Texas.—These rolls were not allowed to be copied until March of the present year. Already several of the Southern States are making copies of these rolls for their States. The Texas rolls number about 6500, exclusive of the parole lists, which should also be copied. The copying, wherever possible, is to be done by photographic process, since this method insures absolute accuracy and costs only about one-third as much as typewritten copies. The archives of Texas contain a list of the Union soldiers from Texas, made during the Reconstruction days. Now that it is possible to obtain a copy of the rolls of the Confederate soldiers, we confidently believe the Legislature will appropriate the necessary funds.

Purchasing Portraits of Ben Milam and P. W. Grayson, Etc.—Authentic portraits of Milam and Grayson exist in Kentucky, and copies, if not the originals themselves, could be secured, and thus fill the gaps in the roster of distinguished Texans who helped to found the Republic of Texas. A marble bust, by Hiram Powers, of General Memucan Hunt, minister to the United States, 1837-38, and Secretary of the Navy, 1838-39, is now offered the State by the widow. A plaster cast of Gustav Schleicher, at present in the State Library, should be cut in marble.

Shelving for Books, Newspapers and Manuscripts.—Four different sections of shelving must be provided at once: (1) The second tier of the book stack needs to be completed; (2) a newspaper stack needs to be erected; (3) special quarters need to be fitted up for the State's archives that are now being transferred to the Library; (4) additional space must be provided with suitable shelving in the basement of the Capitol. These improvements are necessary at once; the sums asked are very moderate. An inspection of the library quarters is suggested.

TRIBUTE TO WALTER TIPS.

This short report cannot be closed without making a brief reference to the loss of a strong and competent member in the death of Walter Tips on April 20, 1911. His experience in public life as State Senator and as member of various administrative boards, together with his fine business ability and public spirit, fitted him for service of great importance to the State on this Commission.

REPORT OF THE STATE LIBRARIAN

Dr. Eugene C. Barker, Chairman of the Library and Historical Commission.

DEAR SIR: In accordance with the provisions of Article 5606, *Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1911*, I have the honor to submit to you the second biennial report of the State Library since it came under the control of the Library and Historical Commission. The report covers two years ending August 31, 1912. -

In accordance with a further provision of said Article, I have the honor to accompany this report with a calendar of the Lamar Papers, prepared by Elizabeth H. West, Archivist. This calendar will open to the public this very valuable collection of manuscripts as nothing else short of their publication in full could do; it will at the same time save from useless handling these documents, many of which are in a very fragile condition.

I. THE STATE LIBRARY.

"The State Library," to quote the words of one of the foremost among librarians in the South, "is a business institution with a missionary spirit. It is the outgrowth of what has become known as the library movement during the last thirty or forty years. It seeks to extend the benefits of great and well classified collections of books to the greatest number of people and to encourage them to take advantage of the knowledge thus to be obtained. It should have charge of the legislative reference work for members of the State Legislature. It should maintain a system of traveling libraries. It should send out library organizers to hold library institutes for the stimulation of interests in libraries and to assist in the training of librarians."

IMPORTANT ACCESSIONS.

a. Books.

The State Library has hitherto from necessity confined its purchases within certain rather narrow limits. The amount appropriated for its support, on the one hand, and the demands made upon it by those whom it was intended directly to serve, on the other, determined the limits. A good reference collection was a prime necessity. The laws of the several States are required. American history and biography is needed. Books, periodicals, pamphlets, etc., on a great variety of subjects had to be provided for the Legislature. An effort is made to obtain everything in print relating to Texas and Texans. Some of the most important purchases were the *Encyclopaedia Britannica*, eleventh edition, 28 vols., *New International Encyclopaedia*, 20 vols., *Jewish Encyclopaedia*, 12 vols., *Dictionary of National Biography*, 22 vols., *National Cyclopaedia of American Biography*, 14 vols., *Early Western Travels, 1748-1846*, 25 vols., *Library of Southern Literature*, 15 vols., *Medina, Biblioteca Hispano-Americana, 1493-1910*, 7 vols., *Minutes of the U. C. V., 1889-1910*, 6 vols., *Minutes and Proceedings of the Texas Traffic Association*, July

15, 1885, to January 13, 1888, 3 vols. The books and pamphlets purchased relating to Texas number over 150. Among them is the manuscript of General Marcus J. Wright, entitled "Texas in the War, 1861-1865."

b. *Newspapers.*

Since the files of Texas newspapers in the State Library at the time of the burning of the Capitol in 1881 were all destroyed, the task of procuring files for the period prior to that date has been a subject of particular solicitude. Some notable additions were made during the period covered by this report.

1. Mrs. Wells Thompson, of Bay City, presented to the State Library a file of the *New Orleans Weekly Delta*, covering the period from October 18, 1847, to February 1, 1862. This is a very valuable paper for the period to which it relates.

2. Mrs. Thompson also presented to the State Library a fairly complete file of *De Bow's Review*, beginning January, 1846, and extending to 1870. "This review was to commerce, manufactures, agriculture, internal improvements, and industrial activity in any line, what the *Southern Literary Messenger* was to literature, while in history they met on common ground. Its field was the south, west and southwest; it undertook to defend their rights, develop their resources, collect and preserve their statistics, and during much of its existence made these subjects superior to the questions of national politics."*

3. By purchase the library acquired files of the *San Antonio Tri-Weekly Herald* for the period from August 29 to November 11, 1865, and of the *Daily Herald* from November 14, 1865, to December 30, 1866.

4. The following Houston papers were also acquired by purchase: The *Semi-Weekly Star*, April 2 to July 9, 1866; the *Evening Star* (daily), April 2 to July 14, 1866; the *Daily Telegraph*, June 6 to December 31, 1867; the *Houston Union* (weekly), September 2 to December 26, 1868; the *Houston Tri-Weekly Union*, January 6, 1869, to February 26, 1870; and the *Houston Daily Union*, March 10, 1870, to March 30, 1872.

5. The following Austin paper was also purchased: *Daily State Journal*, February 1 to December 31, 1870, July 1, 1871, to March 30, 1872.

c. *Manuscripts.*

The additions of manuscript materials during the past two years includes some important accessions, and the activities along this line are very encouraging. The material falls under the head of original manuscripts and transcripts.

1. (a) On February 18, 1911, the John H. Reagan Papers were added to the State Library by purchase. These papers cover the period from 1846 to 1905.

(b) On November 28, 1911, the George W. Smyth Papers were placed in the State Library, a gift from the widow of George W. Smyth, Jr., and the grandchildren of George W. Smyth, Sr. The collection numbered eighty-five pieces and relates chiefly to the survey of the eastern boundary of Texas.

(c) A small collection of nine letters was purchased from Mrs. A. W. Yates, of Smithfield, Texas. The majority of the letters relate to the expenses incurred in sending Santa Anna to Washington in the winter of 1836.

(d) Judge W. S. Holman of Matagorda county presented to the State Library a copy of a letter written by Stephen F. Austin to Oliver Jones and dated "En Inquisicion, Mexico, May 30, 1834." The copy was probably made in 1834, and since existence of the original is not known, is of importance.

(e) "Notes of Travel made by Geo. H. Sweet, of San Antonio, Texas, on his trip through Mexico," is the title of a manuscript volume purchased from a bookseller in Brooklyn in October, 1910. The continuation in another volume was bid in at a book auction in New York in June, 1912. Volume one covers the period from July 6 to September 16, 1866; volume two covers the period from September 17 to November 28, 1866.

(f) Under the law, making the State Library the custodian of all historical manuscripts no longer required in the current work of the various State Departments, over 100,000 manuscripts were transferred to the State Library from the Comptroller's Department by the Archivist. See page 17.

2. (a) Transcripts from the British Public Record Office.

(1) Joint resolution passed in secret session on the subject of establishing amicable relations with Mexico. See page 26.

(2) In April, 1837, Joseph T. Crawford, British vice-consul at Tampico, visited Texas to investigate the civil and political condition of the country and report to the British government. His report was of importance in determining the relations of Great Britain and the Republic of Texas, but it had remained inaccessible to students of Texas history until recently. See page 27.

(3) The State Library and the Texas State Historical Association shared the cost of having transcripts made of letters in the British Foreign Office hitherto unpublished, covering the years 1840 to 1845. These letters were written by Charles Elliot, British chargé d'affaires in Texas, 1842-1845, William Kennedy, British consul, and others, and they throw much light on the political, social and industrial conditions of Texas, as well as upon the activities of British agents here during that period. A list of the letters appears on pages 27-46.

(b) Transcripts from the Mexican archives. The State Library and the Universities of Texas and California co-operated in making transcripts of historical documents in the Mexican archives. Instead of making one copy, the copyists made three copies, and in this way it was possible to exchange copies and obtain three times the amount of material at little more than the cost of one copy.

(1) The archivist of the State Library, Miss West, superintended the copying of about 1800 pages of transcripts in the archives of the Secretaría de Fomento, Mexico, D. F., of material relating to the colonization of Texas during the years 1820 to 1836. For a list of the transcripts, see pages 46-52.

(2) The professor of Spanish-American history in the University of Texas, Dr. Manning, superintended the copying of documents in the archives of the Secretaría de Relaciones Exteriores, Mexico, D. F., relat-

ing to the diplomatic relations between the United States and Mexico during the years 1820 to 1830. For a list of the transcripts received, see pages 52-57.

(3) Mr. W. E. Dunn, for the University of California, supervised the copying of historical documents in the Archivo de Gobierno, Saltillo, Coahuila. These documents relate to the history of Coahuila and Texas during the years 1699 to 1824. For a list of the transcripts received, see pages 57-63.

d. Portraits.

The State Library received during the past two years the following portraits of interest to Texas:

1. Dick Dowling. Presented by Mrs. Adèle B. Looscan of Houston.
2. William P. Hardeman. Left to the library by will of Mrs. William P. Hardeman.
3. George W. Smyth. A gift from the grandchildren of George W. Smyth.

CATALOGUING.*

The purpose of cataloguing a library is to render more available the material it contains. The catalogue is to the library what the index is to the book, and the more thoroughly a library is catalogued, the more serviceable it is to the readers. The catalogue is a piece of machinery which makes possible one hundred and fifty candle-power results in a library. Upon the accuracy, the completeness, and the scope of the catalogue and upon the skill used in classifying the volumes and in bringing out by appropriate subject-headings the topics treated, depends very largely the effective service of a library. Every volume catalogued is entered under author, subject or subjects treated, and title, if anonymous or distinctive. These entries are printed or typed on cards, which are filed in alphabetical order to form the catalogue. By consulting these cards it is possible to find: (1) What books the library contains by a certain author, for instance, Woodrow Wilson; (2) whether the library has a particular book, as, *When Men Grew Tall*; (3) what material the library has on a certain subject, as, Economic Conditions of the South; and (4) where each of these books is on the shelves. The catalogue also meets many technical needs of the special student and the library staff.

The cataloguing of the Texas State Library was begun in October, 1911, and has proceeded along two lines: (1) Reclassifying and recataloguing the sections in history and biography, and (2) classifying and cataloguing the new volumes, which are continually being received. Up to the present date 3128 titles have been classified and catalogued, totaling 4190 volumes. Classes other than history and biography are represented in the catalogue by titles formerly classified in history and biography and by new books. Library of Congress cards have been secured for most of the titles; 9051 of these cards having been filed in the catalogue and shelf-list together. The cost of these cards has averaged a little over one cent per card. The Library of Congress depos-

itory catalogue at the Texas University Library has been used extensively in making up the orders for these cards. Cross references to and from subjects have been made in pencil, but they will be typed as soon as the allied sections in economics and political science have been catalogued. Analytics have been made where there seemed to be present need of them. The Dewey Decimal system of classification, the Library of Congress subject headings, supplemented by the American Library Association "Refer froms," and the Cutter table numbers are being used.

The mechanical preparation of the books, incident to cataloguing, as the stamping, plating, labeling, etc., has consumed about one-fourth of the janitor's time. All the new books have been put through these processes, and a large majority of the old ones have been put through at least one of them. Lack of shelf room has made the arduous task of shelving the books still more arduous, as frequent shifting of the same books has been necessary to make room on crowded shelves for reclassified volumes that formerly stood on adjoining shelves.

The accessioning has been greatly facilitated by the change from the accession book to the duplicate voucher system. In this system, as used in the State Library, a number for each volume is stamped upon the duplicate voucher, and there is saved the time and labor involved in redescribing the volume in the accession book. As the accessioning had to be suspended from July, 1910, to October, 1911, the new system includes all material acquired since July, 1910. Gifts and exchanges are accessioned on cards. Only one series of numbers is used for the old accession book, the duplicate vouchers, and the gift and accession record.

While as yet the catalogue represents only a small proportion of the books in the library, it is, however, available to all readers.

ARCHIVIST'S REPORT.*

History is studied from documents. Documents are the traces which have been left by the thoughts and actions of men of former times. There is no substitute for documents: no documents, no history.—*Langlois, ch. v.*

The official activities of the Archivist began September 25, 1911, and have been divided between (1) increasing the library's collection of unpublished historical material, and (2) rendering more accessible the material in the possession of the library.

The accessions effected by the Archivist's agency have been partly original documents, partly transcripts. Under the statute authorizing the transfer to the library of departmental files no longer needed for administrative purposes, 1149 file boxes, containing approximately 100,000 documents, have been transferred from the Comptroller's basement to the library.

Of these documents the groups which promise to be of the greatest general interest are those dealing with military service, 1836-1875, including the State police and frontier forces; the Navy, 1836-1845; customs, 1836-1845; the financial operations of Toby, Bryan & Hall, and McKinney & Williams; letters, 1836-1875; the general postoffice; the

General Land Office; the State Geologist; the Santa Fé Expedition; the State Engineer; Treasurer's reports, 1838-1873; Edwin Waller, government agent; sales of lots in Austin and Galveston, 1839; boundary commission; President Sam Houston; Memucan Hunt; pensions, including a list of the men who stormed Béxar in 1835; the beginnings of the present public school system; various State institutions; railroads, etc. The group dealing with Toby, Bryan & Hall, and McKinney & Williams has already proved useful in the preparation of a University thesis for the Master's degree. The military service group has also been used by readers, and several other groups to a lesser extent.

The transcripts added are from the Archives (Section 6) of the Secretaría de Fomento, México, D. F., typewritten by Mexican copyists under the personal supervision of the Archivist. The documents copied consist of official correspondence, reports, petitions, etc., bearing upon the Texas revolution in 1835, ranging in date from 1821 through 1836. All were selected from the *Ramo de Colonización* as given in Bolton's *Guide to Materials for United States History in the Archives of Mexico*, now, however, included in the *Ramo de Colonización y Terrenos Baldíos*; the entire collection having been reclassified and catalogued by the present Chief of Section 6, Señor Maximiliano M. Chabert. Three copies were made of each document with a view to exchanging with the Universities of Texas and California. So far as was possible, duplication of transcripts already made or of material already accessible to the library in manuscript or in print was avoided. For a list of the transcripts see pages 46-52.

Total number of typewritten pages, approximately, 1612.

Total number of map-tracings, 15.

The work of increasing the accessibility of the library's collections has been comprised in the strictly chronological arrangement of the Reagan, Smyth, and Lamar compilations, the partial arrangement of the transferred material, and the compilation of a calendar of the Lamar Papers, which accompanies this report.

The space available for the manuscript collections has been completely filled with the material transferred from the Comptroller's Department. As there is much more yet to be transferred from that department, and as there are large quantities of manuscripts in other departments that need to be transferred to the library, it is imperatively necessary that a room be properly equipped for the manuscript material at the earliest date possible.

TEXAS ARCHIVES.

Under the appropriation made by the last Legislature the Library and Historical Commission selected and published the journal of the *Secession Convention of Texas*, accompanied by the Reports of the Committee on Public Safety and the Election Certificates of the Delegates. The preparation of the copy for the printer and the reading of the proof sheets consumed much of the State Librarian's time.

The work of printing the manuscript records of the State, or at least such as have an intimate connection with the State's history, is of so great importance that the work should be continued. The sale of these

volumes of archives should be regulated by law. By charging a small per cent above actual cost of printing the State would be reimbursed to a considerable degree.

BINDING.

Since much of the material received by the State Library is in the form of periodical literature, the item of binding is an important one. The work of the Archivist made it necessary to provide a large number of portfolios in which to place the manuscripts transferred to the library.

EXCHANGES.

By reference to pages 71-73 it will be seen that the State Library receives a large number of books and pamphlets from other States without cost; even the express charges are prepaid. This material includes session laws, court reports, legislative journals, department reports, etc. While it is not of general interest, it is of importance to those who care to study the problems of State government in the light of the experience of other States. Hitherto Texas has not reciprocated these gifts as fully as is due; department reports have not been distributed to the other States. This matter is of such importance that it should be provided for by law.

SHELVING.

Over half of the sum appropriated by the Legislature for shelving was vetoed by the Governor. Out of the remaining sum there were purchased two cabinets for filing pamphlets in the legislative reference section, a metal, roller-shelf cabinet for bound volumes of newspapers, and 867 feet of book shelving, which completes a portion of the second story of the stack begun two years ago. These additions made room for current additions, but fell far short of providing the shelf room required by the library. More shelving is needed at once for books and for bound newspaper files. The second story of the book stack, at least, should be completed. A similar stack should be built for the newspaper files; the present newspaper shelving is not satisfactory enough to warrant additional purchases of the same kind.

ADDITIONAL ROOM NEEDED.

It is hoped that the request made by the Adjutant General for an appropriation with which to erect an armory at Camp Mabry will be granted. The State Library needs very much the rooms adjoining its present storerooms in the basement, but now filled with the equipment of the Adjutant General's Department. These rooms will need to be fitted up with shelving to accommodate the large number of Texas newspapers now received by the library (see pages 69-71), and for the storage of duplicate Texas department reports, journals, etc.

II. LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE DIVISION.*

In proportion as the structure of a government gives force to public opinion, it is essential that public opinion should be enlightened.—*George Washington*.

This report covers the period from August 1, 1910, to September 20, 1911, when Mr. Kaiser resigned.

THE PROBLEM.

A legislative reference bureau attempts to aid in the improvement of legislation by furnishing to those responsible for it adequate data as a basis for their work. Some go further and revise the original draft of a bill from the standpoint of a legal expert in matters of legal form, or, on demand, prepare the original draft and subsequent amendments. In all this the viewpoint is strictly non-partisan and the object scientific accuracy. The material used is the published experience of others who have solved or are solving the same problems of legislation. This may be in the form of statute or legal treatise, political science text or popular discussion—pamphlet, magazine or book.

ORGANIZATION.

The statute creating this section of the Texas State Library (Art. 5608, Revised Civil Statutes, 1911) authorizes and directs the Library and Historical Commission "to maintain for the use and information of the members of the Legislature, the heads of the several State departments, and such other citizens as may desire to consult the same, a section of the State Library for legislative reference and information. The Library and Historical Commission shall appoint an assistant Librarian competent to conduct the work of said legislative reference section. Said assistant Librarian shall have available for use explanatory checklists and catalogues of the current legislation of this and other States, catalogues of the bills and resolutions presented in either branch of the Legislature, check lists of the public documents of the several States, including all reports issued by the various departments, boards and commissions of this State, digests of such public laws of this and other States as may best be made available for legislative use. Said assistant Librarian shall give the members of the Legislature such aid and assistance in the drafting of bills and resolutions as may be asked."

WORK DONE.

Active work in this section was begun August 1. Since that time the books on sociology and political science have been classified, labeled, and shelf-listed. The collection of session laws and statutes has been inventoried and listed; missing volumes of recent session laws and statutes were sought from the Secretaries of State of the various States; duplicates to the number of several hundred were removed from this collection and exchanged with one of the prominent law book firms for the

latest compilations of statutes which the State Library lacked and could not receive in exchange from other States. When this exchange was completed the library possessed the latest statutes with session laws to date of forty States and Territories, in addition to the session laws for a long series of years, but without the latest compiled statutes of practically all the remaining States and Territories.

From the limited funds of the State Library expenditures for books and periodicals have been made largely with a view to increasing the serviceability of this section of the library. The list of periodicals received is comparatively short, but aims to be representative. It includes literary, scientific, economic, historical, political, legal and municipal journals and some of the popular general periodicals. About fifty insurance journals are turned over to the State Library by the Commissioner of Insurance.

New books added to the library tend to make the collection of political science material representative of the best and latest thought on questions of current and increasing prominence. The resources for book purchase, however, are lamentably small. Some of the subjects covered at present are penal reform, employers' liability, labor, race question, immigration, industrial education, railroads, juvenile courts and allied subjects, socialism, woman's suffrage, conservation, municipal government, political parties and citizenship.

VERTICAL FILE.

In addition to the books on the shelves classified by the Decimal system there is a vertical file of pamphlet literature occupying a specially constructed filing cabinet. Several hundred valuable pamphlets, bulletins and reports are here kept and the collection is rapidly growing. In this manner are kept together, easy of access, compilations of laws on a particular subject, official reports of State officers when of special moment, special investigations—discussions of every kind, in fact, of all administrative and legislative problems.

The value of this vertical file is constantly enhanced by closely watching library lists, bibliographies, and other sources for items desired and these are requested from the issuing office usually with the result that they are sent free of charge.

EXCHANGE OF LEGISLATIVE BILLS WITH OTHER STATES.

During the session of the Thirty-second Legislature the printed bills of other Legislatures in session were received from Michigan, Kansas, Indiana, and New York. Bills from here were sent to the first three of these States in exchange. The facilities here proved inadequate to handling this mass of material to the best advantage but some use was made of bills on a few subjects.

PUBLICATIONS.

For the purposes of making the book resources of this section of the library known as "Finding-list of Books on Political Science, Law, and Allied Topics," was issued February 1, 1911, as Bulletin No. 1. In

addition to handling a large amount of correspondence and working directly with individual inquirers an endeavor has been made to keep the work of the library before the public by occasional newspaper items. The material gathered for use in preparing the civil service bill formed the basis of a Bibliography of Civil Service Reform later prepared and published in "Special Libraries" for May.

USE.

During the January-March session of the Thirty-second Legislature the library was used more than ever before and was kept open evenings for the special benefit of members. In addition to the resources at hand being constantly in use special material was several times secured for the legislators from other legislative reference libraries and elsewhere.

If the legislative reference library cannot furnish the desired information it stands ready to secure it from whatever source it is available. If the expert who can furnish the data is within telephone call he will be called. If the request can be answered by communicating with a library, institution or individual in another city the communication will be sent by mail or telegraph as the occasion demands.

BILL INDEX.

Another feature of this work is to index and bind the bills and resolutions of the Legislature. Those for the session ending March 11, 1911, were indexed and sent to the binder a few weeks after that date and those for 1907 and 1909 are bound in numerical order but without index.

WHEN THE LEGISLATURE IS NOT IN SESSION.

It is sometimes asked what is done in the library when the Legislature is not in session. The general library is always busy purchasing, classifying, cataloguing and making available the purchases, carrying on the general work of administration involving innumerable records, and in answering the host of inquiries from individuals and through the mails, this latter a function of library work which the uninformed often underestimate as to its importance and quantity.

The legislative reference library if alive to its duties is likewise busy during the absence of the Legislature. At the close of the legislative session the bills and resolutions and other documents must be collected, one set filed, another bound and indexed. The literature that has accumulated during the session, bills from other States, reports, pamphlets and books must be taken care of and if the session has been a particularly busy one the amount of material needing attention at its close is often great, and there is but one person to attend to all the matters.

Further than this, the library must always be on the alert to secure material of value for the next session. Laws passed and bills proposed by recent Legislatures, past messages of Governors, current campaign speeches, the demands of labor and other organizations and of political parties, and replies to direct inquiry of members themselves give us a clue to some of the subjects an approaching Legislature may be expected

to consider and hence furnish us with subjects on which to secure literature and various data in whatever form they will be of service to members in preparing bills on these subjects.

And it must be remembered that the members of the Legislature form only a portion of the total users of the library and even of its legislative reference section. Our clientele includes high school and university students, especially the debaters who are awake to the questions of the day to a remarkable degree and must be furnished with the most up-to-date literature of all current topics; the officials of the State government to whom we desire to be of increasing service; and the public at large represented by the local resident and by the citizenship of the State outside the capital which must resort to the mail as its intermediary and to which it does resort with constant and increasing persistence.

NATURAL LINES OF DEVELOPMENT.

Development will be along two general lines: (1) The extension of work already begun, and (2) new departures suggested by the work in progress in other States.

1. *A. The Means for the Acquisition of Desirable Material Should be Increased.*—The legislative reference section was created without any maintenance fund other than the salary of the one in charge. The limited funds of the State Library have been compelled up to the present time to bear the financial burden of the new work. This is unfair. Either the resources of the general library for books, supplies, postage, express and incidentals should be materially increased or a separate appropriation should be made for the use of this section.

B. The Facilities for Handling the Material Acquired Should Be Increased.—The time of one person, if he understands his work, can be fully occupied in acquainting himself with the output of literature, past and present, accessible and fugitive, of use in this work and in securing this for the library at the least cost of time and money; in answering inquiries and in compiling laws, statistics and bulletins on current questions, and in general administrative work.

At least one additional member of the staff should be available who is trained in classification and cataloguing, bibliographical work and general library routine. There is not even a stenographer at present.

C. There Should Be an Analytical Catalogue of the Present Resources of This Section.—The general library is also without an adequate key to its collections. A catalogue of this would disclose the presence of much material of value in legislative reference work. This work could be done by the staff members mentioned in the above paragraph. A cataloguer for the general library is greatly needed.

D. The Facilities for Exchanging Bills with Other States Should Be Increased.—The State Printer should be authorized to deliver to the State Library at the time he delivers to the Legislature in session sufficient copies of all bills, resolutions and daily journals to establish an exchange service with other States. Transportation charges should be furnished.

E. A Cumulative File of and Index to Bills of Previous and Future Legislatures Should Be Maintained.—This would form the basis of a

history of legislation. By a comparison of all the bills on one subject a new bill could avoid the mistakes in earlier ones and adopt their good features.

2. *New Departures Suggested by the Work in Other States.*

A. *A Complete File of the Texas State Documents, the Reports of All State Officials Past and Present Should Be Indexed on Cards in One Index.*—Such a key to the experience of the past would prove invaluable to the historian, the present State officials, and those of the future. A similar index to the documents of New York State was consumed in the recent State Library fire at Albany.

B. *A Complete Compilation of Governors' Messages Should Be Made Containing a Thorough Index with Separate Indexes to Veto Messages.*—These documents form a record of State conditions unequalled elsewhere and the value of such a compilation would be marked to the legislator, the historian and the man of affairs. Such a compilation has been made and reprinted in New York State. If they could not be reprinted in one series an index to the originals would be of immense value.

C. *The Section Should Be in a Position to Compile and Publish Bulletins on Timely Subjects, Summarizing Legislation to Date and Presenting in Concise Form the Arguments Pro and Con.*—Wisconsin has issued 24 such bulletins of great value. New York State has a series of 40 legislation bulletins.

D. *Bill-Drafting.*—In the report of the Librarian of Congress on Legislative Reference Bureaus (62 Cong., 1st Sess., Sen. Doc. No. 7) bill-drafting from a library standpoint is thoroughly treated. The following remarks are suggested from this report:

The Legislature could employ a corps of bill-drafters to distinct advantage. Obviously they should be experts, non-partisan, "educated to an accurate use of the English language, trained in the law, competent to ascertain and compare precedent legislation, and, so far as practicable, familiar with this."

In Wisconsin the Legislative Reference Library is prepared to do this and does it to the credit of the whole State. In New York State the Legislature appoints a committee of three lawyers who may avail themselves of the facilities of the legislative reference department.

The difficulties of preparing correct legal measures is recognized by the most competent of statesmen, among them Mr. Bryce. The report just mentioned quotes Mr. Bryce and others on this point.

If bill-drafting is to be assigned to a corps of individuals either in the legislative reference library or under the Legislature's direct control the financial inducements should be such that men of high intellectual, educational and moral qualifications could be secured and the method of selection such that an unbiased endeavor would be assured.

RESULTS APPRECIATED.

These extensions would require some money, and that at a time when retrenchment is apparently a necessary policy in State finances. Yet the funds needed are comparatively small and smaller still in comparison to the increased efficiency developed and service rendered to all the State.

III. LIBRARY EXTENSION

The Library Commission was handicapped in its work with and for the public libraries by want of funds. During 1911 a small sum was available, but during 1912 there was no money for this purpose. Only such service could be given as was possible through correspondence.

The State Library is to serve all so far as its present staff and resources make this possible. The invitation extended by the Dallas-Galveston News to prepare a series of papers on the State Library's resources was cheerfully responded to by papers entitled: 1. The legislative reference section. 2. The Texas collection. 3. The manuscript collection. 4. History and biography. 5. Library extension. They were published in the Sunday issues of May 14, 21, 28, June 4 and 11, 1911.

For the purpose of obtaining information at first hand, concerning the needs and present condition of the public libraries and libraries of State institutions, the Secretary of the Library Commission visited sixteen of the former and six of the latter during May, 1911. The one thing that this inspection brought to the Secretary's attention was the urgent need of help for a number of libraries of each class. About half the public libraries visited are doing well and show by their good work what the others should and could do with proper aid and guidance. Help is needed along two lines: First, there is need of more books, or, what is essentially the same thing, a greater variety of books. This need is met most economically in other States by traveling libraries. Secondly, there is need of guidance and instruction in the management of these libraries. At present the Library Commission cannot help as it should, and as it is expected to help, for it has neither the money with which to supply traveling libraries nor the help necessary to organize the libraries of State institutions. These libraries are maintained at the public expense, and their efficiency concerns the State.

In concluding this report, I take pleasure in bringing to the attention of the Library Commission the loyalty, industry and efficiency with which the members of the staff have performed their duties, and thus made possible the progress noted in this report.

APPENDICES

1. JOINT RESOLUTION PASSED IN SECRET SESSION ON THE SUBJECT OF ESTABLISHING AMICABLE RELATIONS WITH MEXICO

Reference is made on pages 164-166 of the *Secret Journals of the Senate, Republic of Texas, 1836-45*, which accompanied the *First Biennial Report*, to the passage of a "Secret joint resolution on the subject of establishing amicable relations with Mexico," and to a "Secret additional joint resolution relative to the pacification and adjustment of existing differences between Texas and Mexico." Copies of these resolutions could not be found among the archives of Texas. However, it was known that copies of the resolutions had been furnished to General James Hamilton. Inquiry of those familiar with General Hamilton's papers elicited the fact that most of his papers had been destroyed or stolen during Federal occupation of Charleston. To an inquiry made at the British Legation, Mexico, it was replied that all the archives of the years prior to 1867 had been sent to London. Search made in the British Foreign Office brought to light the first-named of the resolutions.

Joint Resolution Passed in Secret Session on the Subject of Establishing Amicable Relations with Mexico.

Sec. 1st. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Republic of Texas in Congress assembled, That it views with entire approbation the policy of the Executive in establishing relations of Peace with Mexico.

Sec. 2. Be it further resolved that the President be authorized by and with the consent and advice of the Senate, to appoint a Commissioner whenever he shall deem the same expedient to enter into amicable negotiations with any person or persons properly accredited by Mexico for the adjustment of all difficulties, the establishment of a permanent peace and the Settlement of the Boundary as defined by the Act of Congress entitled "An Act to define the Boundary of the Republic of Texas, approved Dec. 19th 1836."

Sec. 3. Be it further resolved that should such a Treaty be formed between the Commissioner on the part of the Government of Texas and Mexico; and after the same may have been ratified and confirmed by the President and Senate of this Republic, our Commissioners of Loans in Europe are authorized to borrow the Amount which may be stipulated in said Treaty at an interest not exceeding Six per cent.

Sec. 4. Be it further resolved that the said Commissioners appointed on the part of Texas shall, if practicable, procure the guaranty of Great Britain for the faithful performance of the Treaty by both parties.

The above is copy of an enclosure in a letter from General Hamilton, addressed to Mr. Pakenham, British Minister in Mexico, dated New Orleans, January 2nd, 1840.

The Additional Secret Joint Resolution, approved on same date as the above, has not been found. The copyist writes, "I examined Vol. I of Texas, which contains Gen. Hamilton's correspondence, but he did not arrive in England, until 1st October 1840, and does not refer to it. I also looked through Mexico Vol. 134, where I found in Pakenham's despatch No. 20, a copy of a letter from Hamilton to him, enclosing only a copy of the Joint Resolution on the subject of establishing amicable relations with Mexico 21 Dec. 1839, but could not trace the 'Additional Joint Resolution'.

"I then referred to the Embassy Archives, where I found Hamilton's original letter to Pakenham, but that only contained the 'Joint Resolution' in his (Hamilton's) own handwriting, of which I have made a copy and enclose it with other copies.

"I could not find the 'Additional Joint Resolution' in the Archives."

PREFATORY NOTE

The Lamar Papers listed in the present calendar were acquired by the State Library in consequence of an act of the Legislature approved by Governor Campbell on March 19, 1909, making appropriation for their purchase from Mrs. Loretta Lamar Calder, of Beaumont, the daughter of President Lamar.

They consist mostly of Lamar's state papers, correspondence, editorials, poems, etc., of the historical material collected by him, largely from contemporaries, in preparation for histories of Texas and Mexico and for biographies of prominent Mexican and Texan historical characters, and of his more or less fragmentary manuscript histories and biographies based upon that material.

While the collection is obviously most valuable for the history of Texas, especially in the years from 1821 to 1841, inclusive, it also contains some material for the history of Nicaragua and Costa Rica in 1858 and 1859, the years when Lamar was the minister of the United States to those countries.

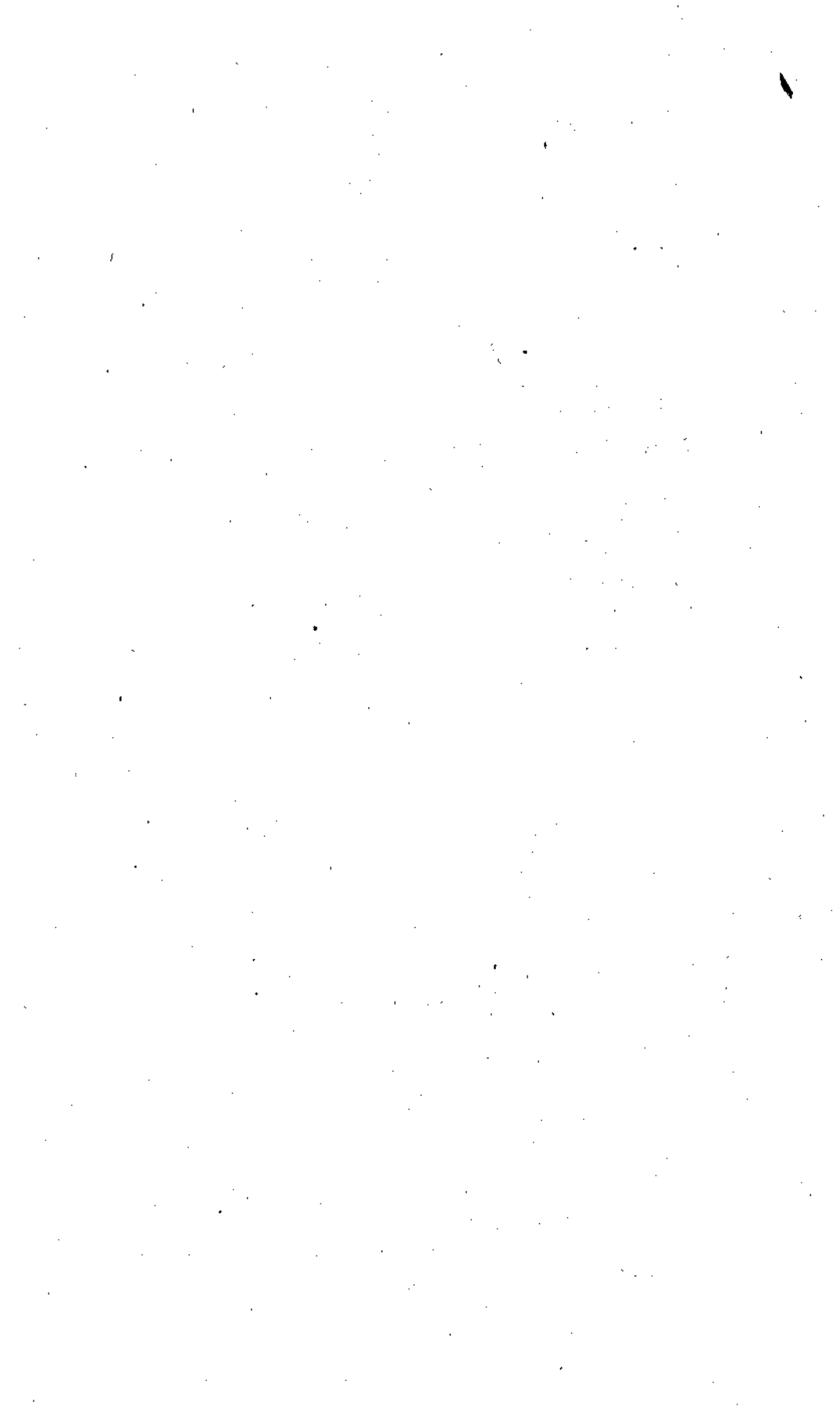
