

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# Business Review and Prospect

#### GENERAL BUSINESS

National business indexes during July have continued the general upward trend indicated in the June issue of the Review, and no evidence has yet appeared that the gradual upward tendency will be reversed during the next few weeks, or possibly even the next few months. Barron's business index, adjused for population growth and standard of living, is now at the highest point since 1929, but it still has some distance to go before reaching the peak of that year. Probabilities now are that this index will reach, and possibly exceed, the 1929 maximum before the present business cycle is completed should the national defense program, which is rapidly gaining momentum, attain the magnitude which is now expected.

Trends in prices of commodities and costs of living reflect the growing demand and buying power of the millions of workers who have been re-employed and the additional millions who were already at work and whose wages or salaries have been increased during recent months. The prospect of developing controls for holding prices in check is rapidly diminishing. A growing number of observers incline to the belief that inflationary forces are already out of control, and that prices and costs of living are destined to rise far above present levels.

#### TEXAS BUSINESS

The indexes of Texas industry and trade continue strongly upward, but less violently so than those of the Nation. This situation is in accordance with historical precedent, and the reasons have been outlined at various times in previous issues of the Review. There are growing indications that during the coming months the Texas composite business index will show greater gains than will the national business indexes.

All three of the main sources of income in Texasagriculture, minerals, and pay rolls from industry, commerce, and service occupations-show substantial increases and these are being reflected in a sharp rise in retail sales in comparison with a year ago. During the fall, year-to-year comparisons will be made with the substantial rise in business which occurred during the latter part of 1940, so that the margin of gain may narrow but actual retail sales will be the largest in the history of the State. With the curtailment in production of many types of consumers' goods, which is now beginning, and the increasing demand of consumers, prices and costs of living may be expected to rise substantially.

#### FARM CASH INCOME

Farm cash income in Texas during June, as computed by this Bureau, was \$42,714,000 compared with \$32,083,-000 during June, 1940, an increase of more than thirtythree per cent. (See note at bottom of following table.) During the first six months of the current year, the computed farm cash income was \$164,849,000 compared with \$131.547.000 during the corresponding period in 1940, an increase of more than twenty-five per cent.

Nors: Farm cash income as computed by this Burcau understates actual farm cash income by from 6 to 10 per cent. This situation results from the fact that means of securing complete local marketings, especially by truck, have not yet been fully developed. In addition, means have not yet been developed for computing cash income from all agricultural specialities of local importance in scattered areas throughout the State. This situation, however, does not impair the accuracy of the indexes to any appreciable extent.

The indexes of farm cash income based on the average monthly income from 1928-1932, adjusted for seasonal variation, differ sharply among the various crop reporting districts of the State. In most cases, these differences can be explained by the fact that the old specialized cotton producing areas of the State have failed to keep pace with the districts devoted largely to the production of livestock and livestock products or the production and processing of fruits and vegetables.

There are many indications that total farm cash income for 1941 will exceed by a considerable margin the fairly optimistic estimates made in this column earlier in the year. Even such crops as cotton and wheat may be expected to make considerably larger contributions to the total cash income than has been the case for several years, mainly because of the sharp rise in prices for these commodities.
