

Houston Art History Notes: Emma Richardson Cherry Paris Tour, Pt 2, 1900

In April, 1900, Cherry and her brother and sister-in-law, Mr. & Mrs. Edward Randolph Richardson, left Houston for a summer in Europe. One of their destinations was Paris, where they toured the *Exposition Universelle* and other wonders.










As she indicated on a postcard to her husband, who didn't go on the trip, they were staying near a stop on the brand new Paris Metro Line 1 (then the only line), opened to coordinate with the Expo. She wrote, "Under the pencil mark is where we descend to take the 'metro' ..."





When visiting Paris alone, she opted for a hotel on the more arty, and less expensive, Left Bank; but in 1900 she was with her very prosperous brother and his wife, so she stayed in considerable more luxury on the Right Bank. In addition to visiting the Exposition they toured the city, sometime in specially designed "Seeing Paris" automobiles.

Cherry had been to Europe before, so she acted as guide, which didn't leave her time to paint. But she did have time to sketch. She filled many pages of her sketchbook with the people and places they saw –

– including a highlight, the concert of American composer and bandleader, John Philip Sousa at the Exposition on July 14, 1900 (Bastille Day). She even sketched Sousa himself.

This beautiful 1962 photo of the gorgeous Deborah Dixon by Frank Horvet is in the show. Dixon is the daughter of equally gorgeous, and immensely talented, Houston artist Mildred Wood Dixon Sherwood, whose work has been included in many of the exhibitions HETAG has sponsored over recent years. One of her paintings is even in the MFAH permanent collection. Mildred died in 2018 but what a trove of beautiful art she left for us to enjoy.
