Henri Gadbois 1930-2018

Most of you know by now that Henri Gadbois died in October. Henri's career in Houston stretched back into the 1940s. He was one of the first Houston artists I met as I became enamored of Houston's art history. And the art fates couldn't have brought me under the spell of anyone better suited to really hook me. He was a pied piper for art - beautiful, engaging, fun art.

Henri always had an irresistible smile on his lips and an impish twinkle in his eyes. And he was always making and sharing paintings and drawings and ceramics and wonderful little decorative treasures - and dinner parties, both edible and faux.

Though I am not an artist, he engaged with me in a joint exploration of the wonders of both bark and condensation that made me feel that even I could share just a little in his artistic gifts. (If you follow either of us on Facebook, you'll understand what I'm talking about.) And he and Leila presented me with a slice of Gadbois special recipe faux birthday cake which is one my most treasured works of Houston art.

His many friends (and indeed there are many) are shedding very real tears of sadness that he's gone from us, but also of joy that he gave us, and leaves with us, so much love and beauty.




The Sphere of Art in Texas HemisFair 1968

Part of what we had to offer then, as now, was our art, and so there was an art exhibition at the Fair called *The Sphere of Art in Texas*. The Sphere of Art in Texas, HemisFair 1968: Houston artists at the Fair.








