Coleman to re-run for County Commissioner

Sanger resident and ment in the unincorporated Denton County Commissioner Hugh Coleman formally announced his bid today for re-election as Precinct One County Commissioner for Denton County.

"It has been an honor to serve and I am proud of the accomplishments and progress we have made for the citizens of Precinct One and Denton County." said Cole-

"Numerous civic leaders and citizens have contributed over \$70,000 (to date) to our campaign for the upcoming primary election and if returned to office I plan on pursuing the conservative policies of using taxpayer dollars wisely, promoting common sense in government, asking hard questions, improving county roads, encouraging municipal transportation infrastructure, and advancing appropriate development that creates jobs and supports quality of life for our families." said Coleman.

Coleman listed among his major accomplishments in office as opposing the creation of high-tax special districts that are used to sections of Denton County while leaving the cost burden

of police and fire protection and many other services to the taxpayers of the entire county. He also

battled the tolling of I-35 and ensured that the current expansion by Denton County and TXDOT include the promised additional free highway capacity. "Tolling existing highways is not the way to expand our transportation infrastructure. We need to ensure that the state pays for the needed infrastructure with the taxes that they have collected and not force those state highway expenses on local government – taxpayers should not be forced to pay twice for state highways".

Coleman is an advocate for open government and transparency. He has led by subsidize residential develop- example by publishing on children.

the Precinct One website his campaign finance information and personal financial statement. "I believe transparency and open government are essential to effective government. Knowing who gave money to candidates or official holders as well as knowing what they own are key pieces of information that every citizen should be able to know." said Coleman.

Coleman also listed as among his accomplishments in office as promoting job growth and economic development, assisting cities with their transportation and infrastructure needs, while at the same time improving and maintaining the 350+ miles of county roads in Denton County Precinct One. He also has fought against the purchase and placement of mobile speeding ticket cameras.

Coleman has served as County Commissioner in Precinct One since 2009. He is seeking re-election to a four-year term in the March 2016 Republican primary. He and his wife, Bernadette, an Occupational Therapist with the Denton County Special Education Co-Op, have two



Buc-ee's may be coming to Denton - on 38 acres between the intersection of Lillian Miller Parkway and I-35E and Unicorn Lake. The development would feature a 52,000 square foot retail center and 96 pumps for gas, as well as several retail pads for additional retailers or restaurants. Although Corinth turned down a proposed Buc-ee's last year, those negotiations between developers and the city included a zoning change, while the land in question in Denton is already zoned commercial, so no zoning change would be necessary. Developers recently hosted an open meeting to give details on the project, along with Aimee Bissett, Director of Development Services for the City of Denton and City Council Member Joey Hawkins. Developers for the project are currently negotiating with the City of Denton for tax abatements to help fund the project and have already offered to develop 15 acres of land

just behind the project as park space as well as pay \$2 million to help pay for an unerpass leading from Brinker Road under I-35E straight to the site.

Convention Center approved for **Rayzor Ranch**

Denton Council approved a series of agreements this month with O'Reilly Hotel Partners Denton and RED Development to proceed with the construction of a 70,000 square foot convention center, in conjunction with a 285-room Embassy Suites hotel on 13 acres in the Rayzor Ranch Town Center.

Pursuit of a convention center has been a standing major initiative of the Denton Chamber of Commerce board since 2008. 



Kim Komando Q&A

7 common tech myths busted

I know you've experienced sharing a "fact" you've known for years only to have someone point out that it's actually wrong. In the fast-changing tech universe, that's very common. Here are seven myths that I hear people say repeatedly, but which are not exactly ac-



- 1. Don't charge your gadget overnight. Many people are afraid to charge their phone or tablet overnight because they think it might overcharge and destroy the battery. I also field this question from people worried about leaving laptops plugged in 24/7. But modern electronics automatically stop charging and so don't overcharge.
- 2. Don't use third-party chargers. There's a difference between knockoff chargers and third-party chargers. A third-party charger is an Apple- or Android-compatible charger from a reputable company like Belkin or Monoprice. Third-party chargers are OK to buy. Just know that, in general, they won't charge your gadget as quickly or reliably as a maker's official charger. Knockoff chargers usually don't have a brand name, or they say they're from Apple, Samsung, HTC, etc. but have a ridiculously low price. Knockoffs are often responsible for the horror stories you hear about gadgets bursting into flames or electrocuting users. Avoid them at all costs. Your safest choice is to buy your charger directly from the gadget manufacturer.
- 3. It won't hurt to leave your gadget in the car or outdoors. Extreme heat and cold will harm both your battery life and battery health. I live in Phoenix, where during the summer car interiors can hit a blistering 160 degrees. Yes, it's a dry heat, but so is an oven. Here, I've seen cellphone batteries swell and be destroyed within hours. In areas where temperatures dip below freezing, your battery won't fare much better, and your gadget might actually die if you're trying to use it outdoors. When in doubt, read the label on the battery or your gadget's manual. Or visit the gadget maker's website and look in the support area. The battery will have an optimum operating-temperature range. Keep it in that range as much as possible.
- 4. Let your battery drain to zero before charging. Unlike older Nickel-Cadmium batteries, which had a "memory effect" that meant you had to drain them every time, Lithium-ion batteries (the kind in just about every modern gadget), don't have that problem. In fact, Li-ion batteries last longest when you keep them between 40% and 80% charged. Also, if you let Li-ion batteries discharge completely for too long, they can be permanently damaged or become dangerous. But Li-ions do have one polarizing challenge: The batteries have a built-in sensor that tells your gadget how much electricity is left in the battery and, over time, that stops matching up with the battery's actual charge. To reset it, you have to charge the Li-ion battery to full, let it run down to the point where your gadget gives you a serious battery warning and then charge it back up to full again. However, this only needs to be done every three months or so. For some gadgets, you might not need to do it at all. Apple used to recommend this process but now says it's no longer needed. Check your gadget's manual to see if it has any specific directions.
- 5. Always shut down your computer at night. This myth goes all the way back to the early days of computers. Back then, computer parts, especially hard drives, wore out much faster than they do today. So, the idea was that to make your computer last longer, you should always shut it down at night. Many people still cling to that concept. Of course, modern computers have more robust parts, which means you can let them run with little to no problem. Whether you shut down your computer nightly now just comes down to personal preference. If you want your computer to do things like back up, update or other intensive tasks, you can schedule them at night while you're not using your system. If you're concerned about saving energy, turn it off. Or you can use one of your computer's many power-saving modes, which are more convenient for getting it going again in the

Tip in a Tip: If you're computer slows down to a crawl, often a reboot brings it back to normal. And by the way, if your Internet connection is slower than usual, try turning off both your modem and router for 60 seconds. This usually works to speed things up.

- **6. More is always better.** This is a general myth that tech manufacturers love because it boosts sales. However, it isn't always true, and sometimes can even hurt you. You might be deciding between a laptop with a 256 gigabyte solid-state hard drive and a 1 terabyte conventional hard drive. A 1TB drive is four times larger, but an SSD is much faster and more reliable. Plus, most people rarely even fill up a 256GB hard drive. Similarly, you shouldn't automatically buy the camera with more megapixels or the smartphone with the highest-resolution screen. In a camera, image quality is as much about the size of the image sensor as the number of megapixels. With smartphone screens, after a certain point you can't tell the difference in resolution (and most high-end and mid-range smartphones are past that point), but a higher-resolution screen burns battery life faster.
- 7. Private browsing is totally private. Every Web browser has a private mode. When private browsing mode is on, the browser won't record where you go and it wipes most of the information someone could use to piece together your online travels. In Internet Explorer, Firefox and Safari, you enter private browsing mode using the keyboard shortcut CTRL + SHIFT + P (CTRL + OPTION + P on Mac). In Chrome, you use CTRL + SHIFT + N (OPTION + SHIFT + N on Macs). What you might not know is that private browsing isn't foolproof. It doesn't hide your browsing from your Internet service provider, the sites you visit or any law enforcement that happens to be watching. Ditto if there's a logger on the computer or the router is set to record sites visited. Like most things in tech, private only means that it's harder to find.

Start Your Own Investment 'Traditions'

Thanksgiving is just around the corner. And like all holidays, this one has plenty of traditions, such as Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade (started in 1924) and football (the first broadcast Thanksgiving Day game was played between the Detroit Lions and the Chicago Bears in 1934). Traditions are important, and you may want to establish some in one of the key activities of your own life: investing.

So, what sort of investment traditions could you start? Here are a few ideas:

- Invest regularly. By definition, engaging in a tradition means performing the same acts over and over. This type of behavior can impose discipline and consistency to your investing. For example, consider contributing the same amount of money each month to the same investments. When the price of these investments is down, your contribution will pay for more shares - in other words, you'll be "buying low," one of the key principals of investing. And when the price of your investments is up, you'll be a savvy enough investor to buy fewer shares. Over a long period, this technique can help lower the per-share price of your investments, but it does not guarantee a profit or protect against loss. To make it easier to follow through, you could set up monthly, automatic purchases of these investments from your checking or savings account.
- Increase 401(k) contributions when you get a raise. Why not make it a tradition to boost your contributions to your 401(k) or

other employer-sponsored plan every time your salary increases? Your 401(k) is a great way to save for retirement, as your contributions are typically made with pretax dollars, resulting in lower taxable income, and your earnings can grow on a tax-deferred basis. Even if you don't reach the contribution limit (which, in 2015, is \$18,000, or \$24,000 if you're 50 or older), you can help yourself make progress toward your retirement goals if you give your 401(k) a "raise" every time you get one.

• Review your progress

at least once a year. Pick one day a year - perhaps a "milestone" day, such as your birthday or wedding anniversary – to review your overall investment picture. Are your investments performing the way you had hoped? Is your portfolio properly diversified, or are there gaps you need to address? Are you investing too aggressively or too conservatively? A yearly review of your investments and long-term financial strategy, possibly with the help of a financial advisor, can help keep you on track toward your objectives. Of course, you don't need to wait 12 months before looking over your situation; you may need to adjust your holdings during the course of any given year, in response to changes in the financial markets or your individual needs. But by committing yourself to at least one fullscale review a year, you can greatly reduce unpleasant "surprises" while staying abreast of exactly where you are and where you're headed.

On Thanksgiving, you can enjoy the holiday's traditions, along with those that may be unique to your family. And someday, you may well be thankful that you followed some productive investment "traditions."





The Indians will need to do a lot more of this against Liberty-Eylua to keep them from putting eight players in the box, to stop the run, like Argyle and Springtown did. If Liberty-Eylua mans up and doesn't have a safety deep, Sanger needs to air it out to several capable receivers. Jackson has shown the ability to bootleg / scramble and throw well down field, or run for yardage outside the box.

Last Thursday night, Sanger sophomore quarterback CJ Jackson already earned his second playoff victory, in his young career. Sanger offense got off to a slow start, but the dual-threat sophomore quarterback finished with 223 total yards and two touchdowns to lead the Indians to a 55-36 victory over Springtown in the bi-district round of the Class 4A playoffs.

Sanger (10-1) became the third team in school history to win 10 games in a season, while Jackson improved to 2-1 as a starting quarterback in the playoffs.

While Jackson paced the Sanger offense, it was the defense and special teams of the Indians that made the biggest impact in the game. The Indians forced five turnovers, while senior kicker Dakota Branch forced the Porcupines to start inside their own 20-yard line six times and also downed a punt inside the 1-yard line.

Sanger junior Peyton Howard returned a Springtown kickoff 95 yards for a touchdown after the Porcupines scored on the opening possession of the second half.

While the Indian offense managed just 7 yards in the first quarter, the Sanger defense provided points early in the game. After the Indians were forced to punt on their first two offensive possessions, junior Cody Hunter intercepted a Springtown pass and returned it 49 yards before being stopped inside the 5-yard line.

Hunter's interception return set up a 3-yard touchdown run by Howard that gave the Indians a 7-0 lead. Although the interception return was stopped short of the goal line, Hunter got into the end zone later in the first half after intercepting another pass and returning it

70 yards for a touchdown. Although the Indian offense was stagnant in the first quarter, the long interception return by Hunter seemed to ignite the offensive attack. Jackson connected with junior Braven Smith for a 54-yard touchdown.
