

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
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REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

CORSICANA, TEXAS, September 1, 1902.

Governor Joseph D. Sayers, Austin, Texas.

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DEAR SIR: As required by law we hereby submit to your Excellency and through you to the Legislature, the following report for the two years beginning September 1, 1900, and ending August 31, 1902.

ORGANIZATION, ETC.

The organization continued as in former report until March 11, 1902, when Judge T. H. Bowman resigned as Superintendent and Joel H. Haden was by your Excellency nominated for Superintendent and was by the Board duly confirmed. Mrs. A. V. Winkler was at the same time elected matron. The place of Joel H. Haden, as trustee, being made vacant by his appointment as Superintendent, Captain W. A. Polk was by your Excellency appointed to fill out the unexpired term. He was duly qualified, and the Board now stands: W. D. Haynie, R. H. Daniel, Chas. H. Delafosse, J. W. Edens and W. A. Polk.

BUSINESS MEETINGS.

We have held regular meetings as required by the statutes and by-laws, and have at such meetings gone carefully over every department of the Home.

IMPROVEMENTS.

We have built a new and substantial barn of large dimensions at a cost of about \$1,500, and have also expended \$6,000 in repairs and additions in the way of galleries on the boys' and girls' dormitories, school building, hospital and the administration building. We have, also, at an expense of \$500, put in a deep-well pump that supplies the institution with an abundance of water for the laundry, sanitary purposes and other uses.

FINANCIAL.

In Appendix will be found a statement of financial operations as taken from the Superintendent's books, covering the full period of this report.

We also, as a matter of explanation and by way of impressing the necessity for them on the Legislature, desire to call your attention to the needs of this institution as set forth in the "Budget" hereto attached.

1. We have asked for three hundred dollars per year for an assistant matron to have charge of the building occupied by the little girls, and which is entirely separate and apart from the other buildings, and contains at this time 135 small girls, besides the sewing department. This is as little money as a competent and trustworthy person can be had for this place.

2. We ask for an increase in the salaries of three laundresses from \$160 each per year to \$240 each per year. From the organization of the institution the latter price was paid down to two years ago, and it is small pay for the arduous labor performed.

3. We ask for an appropriation of \$240 to employ an instructress in millinery and dressmaking to instruct the girls in these very useful pursuits, as in our judgment nothing is of more importance or can produce greater benefits.

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4. We ask for an appropriation of \$360 to employ an instructor in shoe shop so that the shops can run the whole year through. This will save the State a great deal of money, besides the great benefit it will be to the boys.

5. We ask for a salary of \$360 for an instructor in the broom and mattress factory, and urge the same reasons for this appropriation as for that of the shoe shop instructor.

6. We have asked for an increase in the fuel allowance from \$500 to \$1200 per annum as our experience has demonstrated that a less amount will not supply the institution with fuel.

7. We ask that the appropriation for general maintenance be increased from \$22,500 to \$30,000 as a less amount will not feed and clothe the children as they should be.

8. We have asked for an appropriation of \$15,000 to build a boys' dormitory. In the present crowded condition of the small building, where all the boys live, it is utterly impossible to maintain the right kind of discipline or to teach the boys any pride whatsoever in private ownership of their clothes. In this new building asked for we would suggest that rooms be provided to accommodate four boys, and each boy provided with a separate locker for his clothes in order that he may be taught to keep proper oversight over that which is his own. In addition proper rooms for rest and recreation should be provided, as well as comfortable rooms for the attendants. The present building can be used for the employes home, which is greatly needed.

9. We ask for \$10,000 to erect a steam plant sufficiently large to heat all buildings by steam and to run the pump and electric light plant, and such other machinery as from time to time may be needed. As at present situated everything on the premises is heated by wood stoves or fireplaces, and our pump is run with wood as fuel. This is not only expensive, but exceedingly dangerous, and in very cold weather entails absolute suffering.

10. We ask for \$2500 for an electric light plant. If the steam heating plant should be put in, then the same plant could operate the electric lights, and thus greatly reduce the appropriation asked for in No. 10. We submit that this would be a great saving, as we now pay more than \$1000 per year for wood and \$500 per year for electric lights, and do not have sufficient lights for our buildings. These two items would almost pay the expense of operating a steam plant that would heat all the buildings and furnish an abundance of lights; also run the deep-well pump when once such a plant is erected.

11. We ask for an appropriation to erect a separate room for the use of the music department and the kindergarten. The school building is already crowded to such an extent as to render the work of carrying on the school very uncomfortable, besides the very nature of the work in the music and kindergarten departments renders them very objectionable in the same building where quiet study is required.

12. We ask for an appropriation to stuce the school building and do general repairing. This amount of money expended now, in our judgment, would save the State a great deal more than if allowed to run longer. These repairs should be made as soon as possible.

13. The equipments, additions and improvements asked for by the report of the Industrial Manager are urgently needed, and we heartily

endorse the same and ask that due attention be given this important matter.

We have also asked for increase in the salaries of employes whenever we have considered it to be just and right that their salaries should be made commensurate with their duties to be performed, and in no case have we asked more than we thought absolutely just.

In conclusion, we thank your Excellency for the kind and courteous treatment you have always manifested toward this management, and bespeak for this very worthy institution an earnest and zealous friend in your Excellency, and ask that its very imperative needs be given that consideration to which they are entitled.

REPORT OF INDUSTRIAL MANAGER.

CORSICANA, TEXAS, September 1, 1902.

W. D. Haynie, President Board of Trustees.

DEAR SIR: I submit herewith a brief statement of the work done in the industrial department for the two years beginning September 1, 1900, and ending August 31, 1902.

During the fall of 1900 the boys were permitted to pick cotton for the farmers living in the neighborhood of the Home. They gathered about 50,000 pounds, for which they received the sum of \$325; one-half of this money was divided among the boys pro rata according to what each picked, the other one-half was turned over to the Superintendent to be used in supplying the girls with Christmas presents. In the fall of 1901 they were not taken out to pick cotton.

During these two years the boys have cultivated, with some help from hired laborers employed on the farm, the land belonging to the Home, there being in cultivation, including orchards and grounds, about two hundred and fifty acres.

During the year 1901, on account of protracted drouth, production was light. During the present year we have made good crops of everything except corn, which crop, on account of the severe drouth that prevailed in this section of country in the spring and early summer, was very light. We have raised an abundance of Irish potatoes and turnips, but the supply of other vegetables owing to the drouth has been light.

The boys have hauled from the cars 800 cords of wood. They have hauled from the city of Corsicana 300 loads of cotton seed meal and hulls; groceries and freight of other kinds, 250 loads. They have fed and cared for all the stock, amounting in all to more than 100 head, and have done the milking of fifty cows.

They have cut and supplied with wood all the stoves and fire-places in the Home, amounting in all to fifty-four in number; and have kept the grounds, orchard and drives in good condition; and have worked also in carpenter shop, plumbing shop, blacksmith shop, shoe shop and broom and mattress factory.

We have raised this year twenty acres of fine broom corn. We have already harvested one crop, and will have another from the same planting much more abundant and of better quality than the first. We will have a bountiful supply of broom corn to keep our factory running all next year.

The shoe shop, under the direction of Mr. Frank Holmes, and the broom and mattress factory, under the direction of Mr. G. W. Bounds, have each been operated six months. Mr. Holmes had under him in the shoe shop four crippled boys who made fine progress in acquiring a knowledge of the trade; they can now do most of the repairing necessary in the institution. Mr. Bounds had under him from time to time ten boys, all of whom made fine progress and are now making all the brooms and mattresses we need in the Home. The progress in the Industrial Department has been very satisfactory as far as it has gone, but the facilities at hand are entirely inadequate to enable the institution to do the great work it should do for these children. The capacity for useful employment and instruction along industrial lines should be greatly increased, in order that both the good of the State and children should be properly subserved; and in this connection I desire to call your attention to the needs submitted for this department and urge that these additions be made.

1. Ask for \$6000 to purchase additional land. Land adjoining that already owned by the State can be had at reasonable prices, and we should have at least two hundred acres more to afford proper pasturage for our stock, to give employment to our boys, and to raise provender for the dairy herd, which it is necessary to keep and which should be largely increased.

2. I have asked that enough money be appropriated to irrigate sufficient land to supply the Home with an abundance of fresh vegetables in season for table use and to furnish a sufficiency to be canned for winter use. We have the land and the water and all we need is the means of distributing it.

3. I have asked for a small canning factory in order that these children may during the summer months preserve enough fruits and vegetables to supply the tables during winter.

4. I have asked for a sorghum mill and equipments. We can easily make all the syrup here that can be consumed if provided with these things.

5. I have asked for an appropriation sufficient to treble the capacity of all our shops, so that instruction of the boys along mechanical lines may be largely increased. There is no reason why every shoe worn in the institution should not be made here in our own shops and by our own boys, under a competent instructor, who can be had for a very reasonable salary, and the shops can be run the year around and should be.

The broom and mattress factory should not only supply our own wants, but should supply the markets with these products. To aid in training these boys in these useful pursuits, the carpenter, blacksmith and plumbing shops should be enlarged and equipped so that the boys may be properly trained in these pursuits.

If these facilities are afforded I do not hesitate to say as a result of my experience and observation that these children can contribute very largely toward making this institution self-sustaining, to say nothing of the great benefits they would derive individually from the training. To enable these children to properly equip themselves along industrial lines to meet the obligations of useful men and women, and to enhance their chances for becoming good citizens and taxpayers, is the highest duty now confronting the governing power of Texas.

So far as this Home is concerned it is needed, not only from the standpoint of charity, but of utility. The one all controlling purpose here ought to be to make of these boys and girls men and women fully equipped—mentally, morally and industrially—to meet and discharge all the duties of life with credit to themselves and this great State.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

CORSICANA, TEXAS, September 1, 1902.

To His Excellency, Joseph D. Sayers, Governor of Texas.

DEAR SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith my report of present condition of the State Orphan Home, at Corsicana, Texas, and the operations of the same since August 31, 1900.

During the greater portion of the biennial period, covered by this report, the institution was under the management of my predecessor, Judge T. H. Bowman, from whose records I have drawn freely in its compilation.

On March 11, 1902, Judge T. H. Bowman tendered his resignation as Superintendent of the State Orphan Home to the Board of Trustees, who, on your nomination, immediately proceeded to elect me to fill the unexpired term; at the same meeting the Board, by unanimous vote, elected Mrs. A. V. Winkler matron, to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Mollie T. Bowman, resigned.

Conscious of the grave responsibilities devolving upon this position, and knowing that the manifold duties of the Superintendent of this institution demanded a rare combination of character, executive ability, firmness, kindness and patience, I entered upon my work with serious doubts as to my peculiar fitness and qualifications. I esteemed it no small matter to be made the custodian of three hundred helpless children, and to undertake to mould their character and instill into their minds a proper conception of the duties and responsibilities of life; but being in perfect sympathy with the great work the State has done and is doing here, I accepted the trust and entered upon the discharge of my duties, fully determined to give the best service I was capable of rendering; and to use every effort at my command to promote the moral and intellectual welfare of those committed to my care.

OTHER OFFICIALS.

The matron superintends the kitchen, dairy, dining room, laundry and sewing department, and sees that the dormitories are kept clean. Her numerous duties, though arduous and exacting, are being faithfully, zealously and conscientiously performed.

INDUSTRIAL MANAGER.

Mr. Jink Evans, the efficient industrial manager, directs the operations on the farm, garden, orchard and truck patches; keeps the drives, walks and yards in condition; looks after the sewerage and gives especial attention to the general sanitary condition of the buildings and grounds. Under his direction, with the exception of a little farm labor hired during the school term, all this work is done by the boys, without in any way interfering with their school duties.

The boys also attend to the milking, feeding and caring for stock on the premises; haul and cut wood, and do such other work as may be needed about the place.

Both by precept and example he teaches these boys the dignity, value and importance of labor. He is faithful, untiring and efficient in the discharge of his duties.

SHOPS.

The shoe shop has been under the direction of Mr. Frank Holmes, a most efficient instructor, well versed in his craft. He had four of the erippled boys working under him learning the trade, and they have all made very satisfactory progress.

The broom and mattress factory was under the direction of Mr. G. W. Bounds, a competent broom and mattress maker and upholsterer. Several of the boys under his instruction have already learned to do very creditable work and are now making all the brooms and mattresses needed in the institution, and I believe will in the near future be able to turn out finished products for the markets.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board meets at the Home at least once per month, and at such meetings go carefully over the premises, examine into the affairs of the Home, and manifest the greatest possible concern in its welfare. Their great zeal for the institution, and their kindly interest in the physical, moral and intellectual welfare of the children, have placed, not only myself and the matron, but also all of the employes of the institution, and the State as well, under many and lasting obligations to them.

EMPLOYES.

Our help in the various departments of the Home is competent, trustworthy and in every respect first-class. Some of these good women have been in the institution since its first organization and have devoted the best years of their lives to this noble work. The constant care and training of the child demands the highest possible standard of character in the individual nurse, and I am happy to state that these conditions are fully met in these faithful women.

FOOD AND CLOTHING.

Under the direction of the matron the table is bountifully supplied. with wholesome food, and in such variety as circumstances would permit. Milk and butter are furnished from the dairy, and ripe fruit and vegetables in season are attractive features added to the bill of fare. The children are neatly, but plainly, and comfortably clad.

HEALTH.

The health of the institution, with the exception of a few cases of fever and pneumonia and an epidemic of sore eyes, has been uniformly good. Our hospital has been in charge, respectively, of Miss Ida Walker, Miss Annie Bunn and Mrs. E. M. Keleher. Under the direction of our efficient physician, Dr. Clay Johnson, the unusually low mortality rate in the institution for the past two years is the highest comment that could be made on its management.

We have lost by death in the last two years two children. They both received genteel, Christian burial, local ministers kindly conducting the services. I trust the forthcoming Legislature will provide for a suitable monument sacred to the memory of the Orphan Home dead.

DORMITORIES.

The dormitories are kept neat and clean, the sleeping apartments properly aired and ventilated, and every effort is used to render the sleep of the children as comfortable and restful as the crowded condition of our sleeping apartments will permit.

SCHOOL.

A splendid school, consisting of kindergarten, primary, grammar and high school grades is maintained nine months in the year.

The school has been under the efficient management of Miss Maude Campbell, a lady of fine intellectual attainments, ripe scholarship, and superior executive ability. Under her administration the school has taken high rank among the educational institutions of the State.

She has been ably assisted by Misses Beuna Vaughan, Hixie Harrison, Texie Hornbeak, Birdie White, Lucille Wall and Angie Adams.

The kindergarten, under Miss Lena Taylor, has accomplished great results; she has been most ably assisted by Miss Malana Nelson, who is also a careful, conscientious and efficient kindergartner.

The school is supplied with a splendid musical department, under the d rection of Mrs. Annabell Morse, assisted by Miss Ellen Benson.

RELIGIOUS.

Chapel services are held every morning during the whole school term, under the direction of the principal; preaching every Sunday evening, also Sunday school. The Sunday school is under the direction of Mr. F. S. Brooks, of Corsicana, who has been identified with Sunday school work in the Home for the past eight years. Mr. Brooks is a thorough Christian gentleman, and one of the most ardent, aggressive and zealous Sunday school workers in Texas. The Sunday school is abundantly supplied with non-sectarian literature.

The pastors of the various churches in Corsicana, in turn, hold religious services with the children every Sunday evening, and from time to time, when convenient, children in the institution, who are members of the various religious bodies, are permitted to attend the churches to which they belong in the city.

VISITING.

The local public are permitted to visit the Home two days in the week, persons from other portions of the State or elsewhere are admitted at any time.

Relatives of children in the Home are permitted to visit the children

only during the vacation months, unless summoned in case of sickness or death.

STATUTORY.

As required by the statutes, I have conducted all necessary correspondence about the children, kept a record of the names, ages and such other data about their history as could be obtained; I have furnished the proper authorities with a list of the children within the scholastic age, and, as treasurer of this independent school district, I have submitted my report to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

As ex-officio secretary, I have kept a record of the proceedings of the Board of Trustees and have acted as storekeeper and accountant under the State Purchasing Agency act.

APPENDIX.

I append hereto the names of the children received, died, gone out, etc., also a full alphabetical list of three hundred and three children now in the Home.

In conclusion, I desire to testify to the cheerful obedience and respectful attention of the children, the uniform courtesy and hearty co-operation of the matron, industrial manager and all employes of the institution, the many kindnesses of the State Purchasing Agent, to all of whom and to you, Governor, for the patient indulgence you have shown me and the mark of your favor as expressed by my nomination, I herewith tender my sincere appreciation and heartfelt thanks.

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
